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
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

#### NOTICE OF MOTION

- \*1. MR McGRATH (Wimmera) To move, That the Report of the Standing Orders Committee upon Fees for Private Bills be adopted and that the following be adopted in lieu of the Standing Order No. 168(d):
  - "(d) Unless the House expresses the view that fees should be dispensed with -
    - before any private Bill is read a second time in the Legislative Assembly, a deposit of \$1000 shall be paid to the Department of the Legislative Assembly; and
    - (ii) the promoter shall be liable to pay the costs of printing and circulation of the Bill; the advertisements placed pursuant to S.O. 168(*b*); all costs of a Select Committee appointed pursuant to S.O. 168(*c*); and any other expenses involved in the preparation and passage of the Bill.
    - (da) The sum of such amounts (less the deposit of \$1000) shall be paid to the Department of the Legislative Assembly before the Clerk of the Parliaments presents the Bill for Royal Assent."

### GENERAL BUSINESS

#### NOTICES OF MOTION

- 1. MR WEIDEMAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for (a) the foresight and initiative shown in ensuring that our State sporting facilities for squash, table tennis, badminton, basketball, swimming, equestrian and hockey are of a standard suitable to capitalise on acclimatisation and training of our own and overseas athletes in preparation for the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games; and (b) the hosting of major sporting events such as the 1995 World Police and Fire Games and the 1995 VicHealth Australian Masters Games that will further showcase Melbourne and maintain its status as the sporting capital, through the construction of the \$52 million Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre at Albert Park, the \$632,000 upgrade and indoor arena development at Werribee Park Equestrian Centre enabling it to gain national training centre status, and the \$50,000 upgrade of lighting at the State Hockey Centre.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House calls on the Government to establish a coastal
  management authority to oversee and co-ordinate the management of Victoria's
  coastline.
- 3. MR PATERSON To move, That this House notes the strong growth potential of food and agricultural industries in Victoria and calls on the Minister for Agriculture to advise the Assembly on what initiatives are required to realise Victorian potential based on its competitive strengths.
- 4. MR COLE To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to protect public sector employees who disclose information to the media and members of public, so as to ensure that public sector employees are not victimised for providing such information where it is in the public interest to do so.
- 5. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Minister for Community Services for increasing the funding to domestic violence services in Victoria by approving the allocation of \$700,000 recurrent and \$919,526 one-off grants to expand these services.
- 6. **MR DOLLIS** To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 7. MR HYAMS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Finance in reaching an agreement on, and implementing, sustainable superannuation reforms for the State's public sector employees.
- 8. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to provide for right-to-know in the chemical industry as recommended by the Landy Panel in its March 1992 report, so as to require chemical companies and government agencies to provide information to the public about the use, manufacture and storage of hazardous chemicals.
- 9. MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Minister responsible for Youth Affairs for his initiative in establishing regional youth committees to co-ordinate the resources available to disadvantaged youth from the Government, private and voluntary sectors.

- 10. MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its disastrous education policies and funding cuts which have resulted in (a) the closure of over 210 schools and the sacking of over 8300 teachers; and (b) significant increases in class sizes and reduced curriculum and subject choices for students and notes that the impact of these policies has been greatest on disadvantaged students and those in country Victoria.
- 11. MR McARTHUR To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Energy and Minerals for action taken to substantially increase the level of mineral exploration and development in Victoria while ensuring proper environmental safeguards and condemns the Opposition, when in Government, for driving the mining industry out of the State.
- 12. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ripon for failing to oppose budget cuts and Government policies that have led to the closure of the Clunes Hospital, thereby causing extreme hardship to the residents of Clunes and surrounding areas.
- 13. MR COOPER To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in that re-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly dissociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House all of the facts relating to this involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government 14. for its double-standards and hypocrisy in wasting millions of dollars of taxpayers money as evidenced by - (a) the creation of extra paid parliamentary positions including Parliamentary Secretaries, extra Committee Chairpersons, additional Ministers, and silver service in the dining room at a cost of \$2.5 million; (b) the \$28.5 million the Government is spending to relocate the offices of the Planning, Major Projects, Housing, WorkCover and Local Government departments to Treasury Reserve; (c) the \$9.2 million the Government is spending to renovate the Premier's and the Treasurer's offices, and tens of thousands of dollars it is spending for the Premier and the Treasurer to lease levels 14 and 15 of the ANZ Tower while their offices are upgraded; (d) the \$8 million the Government has spent on WorkCover advertisements, \$900,000 political advertising by the Education Department and the \$400,000 it has spent on advertisements opposing new Federal industrial relations laws; (e) up to \$1 billion in VDP and superannuation payouts to public sector workers who have moved to Queensland and New South Wales; (f) the \$1 million the Government has spent on renovations to the offices of the Ministers for Health, Police and Emergency Services and Energy and Minerals; (g) the \$3 million spent on a 16-page colour brochure on the Audit Commission Report in 1993 and \$4 million allocated for a 30-page colour brochure to be sent to all households in October 1994; (h) the \$800,000 media advertisements and brochures supporting the Employee Relations Act 1992; (i) the \$170,000 the Government spent on renovations to the London residence of Victoria's Agent-General; (i) the \$150,000 on media advertising and pamphlets promoting the 1993 April Economic Statement; (k) the \$4 million wasted on legal action to stop the

flow-on of Victorian workers to Federal awards; (*l*) the \$500,000 spent on "Education News" a newspaper to promote the Minister for Education - and further, that this House notes that this extravagant and wasteful use of taxpayers money has occurred at the same time as the Government has refused to provide additional funds for hospitals, ambulance services and child abuse programs, thereby placing the lives of hundreds of Victorians at risk.

- 15. DR NAPTHINE To move, That this House congratulates the State Government for achieving a significant reduction in the number of Victorians waiting for urgent surgery.
- 16. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to implement the recommendation of the Auditor-General in his May 1994 report that Governmentowned business undertakings be required to disclose related Party information in their financial statements.
- 17. MR DOYLE To move, That this House commends the Government for building new schools in growth areas of Melbourne and regional Victoria for the benefit of students well into the next century.
- 18. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation that sets down guidelines and reporting requirements to ensure that businesses awarded Government consultancies and other contracts do not have a conflict of interest because of other work they have performed or are performing in the public or private sectors.
- 19. MRS McGILL To move, That this House commends the Government for the way in which it has restructured the Victorian equal opportunity system to provide for greater accountability and efficiency while preserving the independence of the system from Government.
- 20. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Wimmera for failing to oppose budget cuts and Government policies that have led to the closure of the Murtoa Hospital, thereby causing extreme hardship to the residents of Murtoa and surrounding areas.
- 21. MR KILGOUR To move, That the Government is to be commended for the initiative it has shown in establishing the Ministerial Steering Committee for Emergency Services Telecommunications and the unit within the Department of Justice responsible for the development and implementation of a shared communication facilities for call taking and dispatch of Victoria's emergency services organisations, as the innovative approach taken to the delivery of this important service to the community will result in significant cost savings from the rationalisation of communication networks and the improved management of the resources of our emergency services when responding to emergency calls.
- 22. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Rodney for failing to oppose budget cuts and Government policies that have led to the closure of the Elmore Hospital, thereby causing extreme hardship to the residents of Elmore and surrounding areas.
- 23. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for its introduction of the City Circle tram service.

- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for 24. examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that - (a) in a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Industrial Relations Act 1988 of the Commonwealth; (b) in answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to that Act; (c) the agenda of the briefing to Statutory Authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations - Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(II) "The Federal Legislation - implications and options - Ian Douglas"; (d) Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and (e) the response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 25. MR HYAMS To move, That this House congratulates the Minister for Industry and Employment and the Victorian Government on providing a flexible employee relations system in Victoria which will enhance business opportunities and expand jobs for Victorians.
- 26. MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Industry Services for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Nunawading paying on average an extra \$35.74 this financial year, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$157.27 this financial year.
- 27. MR CLARK To move, That this House supports the reforms to financial management and accountability which have been introduced by the Government since its election and supports the steps being taken by the Government to introduce further reforms.
- 28. MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Frankston for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Frankston paying on average an extra \$74.65 per year by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 29. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulate both the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing and the Minister for Education for initiating the review into the sad state of the status of sport and physical education in Victorian schools, and the impact that this was having on our youth, who were found to be obese and unfit, and implementing the recommendations from the review, detailed in the Moneghetti report.
- 30. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bentleigh for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Bentleigh paying on average an extra \$45.70 per year by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.

- 31. MR McARTHUR To move, That this House congratulates the Minister for Agriculture for his work in promoting the development of rural areas and in particular the initiatives that have been put in place in the Sunraysia and the Goulburn Valley and in so doing the Assembly calls upon the Government to develop similar incentives in other areas of Victoria and target specific programs to enable rural Victoria to further improve its vital contribution to the economic well being of the State.
- 32. MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Bayswater paying on average an extra \$69.51 per year by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 33. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Minister for Community Services for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people which has seen the commitment of an additional \$10 million of funding to expand and enhance services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 34. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Oakleigh for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in her Electorate paying on average an extra \$35.27 in this financial year, while water rates for households in Brighton in the Treasurer's Electorate will fall by an average \$31.88 this financial year.
- 35. **MR CLARK** To move, That this House commends the Government for bringing about a dramatic improvement in WorkCover costs in the interests of all Victorians.
- 36. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Cranbourne for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Cranbourne paying on average an extra \$98.15 by 1996, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$121.35 during this period.
- 37. MR PHILLIPS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Small Business for the development and implementation of Australia's first one stop business shop, which brings the resources of the Commonwealth, State and Local Government together under one roof to assist Victorian small business operators.
- 38. MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Heidelberg paying on average an extra \$38.69 this financial year, while water rates for households in Brighton in the Treasurer's Electorate will fall by an average \$31.88.
- 39. MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Energy and Minerals for action taken in encouraging the re-development of gold mining in this State and particularly in the Golden Triangle, whilst ensuring proper environmental safeguards and condemns the Opposition, when in Government, for its lack of assistance to this important industry.
- 40. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Member for Warrandyte for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Warrandyte paying on average an extra \$92.88 by 1996, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$121.35 during this period.

- 41. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on its decision to develop a bulk chemical storage facility at Point Lillias.
- 42. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Member for Essendon for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Essendon paying on average an extra \$39.70 by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 43. MR DOYLE To move, That this House congratulates the State Government for its initiative in developing a specific Cancer and Heart Offensive to reduce the number of Victorians who die prematurely because of cancer and heart disease.
- 44. MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Frankston East for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Frankston East paying on average an extra \$74.65 by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 45. MR ELDER To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to promoting opportunities for students and teachers to further their knowledge in the vital curriculum area of Languages Other Than English.
- 46. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Member for Eltham for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Eltham paying on average an extra \$92.88 per year by 1996, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$121.35 during the same period.
- 47. **MR RYAN -** To move, That this House commends the Government for its improvements to the administration of prosecutions in the State of Victoria.
- 48. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Mooroolbark for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Mooroolbark paying on average an extra \$46.14 in this financial year, while water rates for households in Brighton in the Treasurer's Electorate will fall by an average \$31.88 in the same period.
- 49. MR STEGGALL To move, That this House calls on the Commonwealth Government to renegotiate the Commonwealth-State financial arrangements in a way which eliminates the subsidy of more than \$650 million which the Commonwealth Government itself acknowledges Victorian taxpayers are forced to contribute to other States.
- 50. MR LONEY To move, That the Greater Geelong Planning Scheme, Amendment No. R77 be wholly revoked.
- 51. MR JENKINS To move, That the Parliament recognises the significant improvements to the welfare and rehabilitation of convicted offenders sentenced to a term of imprisonment that will result from the contracting out of three major prison facilities to the private sector.
- 52. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes with concern the results from a survey conducted among parents of the Woodbine Pre-School in Cranbourne North, which services the electorates of Cranbourne and Dandenong and has shown (a) 78% finding it difficult or very difficult to pay fees; (b) 42% know at least one child whose parents could not afford to send them to a state pre-school in 1994; (c) 89% believe the State Government should increase funding to pre-schools; (d) 95% are concerned or very

- concerned about the larger class sizes; (e) 84% believe the maximum class size consistent with quality is below 22; (f) 98% believe the maximum class size consistent with quality is below 25 and calls on the Member for Cranbourne to represent the needs of his constituents by opposing this Government's pre-school funding changes.
- 53. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Cranbourne for his failure to secure any of the \$59 million funding allocated for capital works at Government schools towards improvements at the 17 Government schools within his electorate.
- 54. **DR VAUGHAN** To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bentleigh for failing to represent the interests of her electorate as evidenced by the lack of a single premium station within her electorate, while the Government provides fully staffed premium stations throughout marginal seats in the Eastern suburbs.
- 55. **MR ROWE** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on achieving the best financial outcome in public transport for over twenty years.
- 56. **MR THOMSON** (*Pascoe Vale*) To move, That this House condemns the Government following the release of ABS figures related to small business which show that 42,400 jobs have been lost in small business in Victoria since November 1992.
- 57. MR TANNER To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on its successful initiative to introduce the WorkCover Workers' Compensation Scheme into Victoria which has achieved major advances by (a) reducing unfunded liabilities from \$2,100 million to financial viability; (b) providing lower premiums for employers in Victoria; (c) creating a work environment which reduces accidents; and (d) encouraging injured employees to return to work as soon as possible thereby aiding their recovery from injury.
- 58. MR BILDSTIEN To move, That this House congratulates the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for gaining private sector sponsorship for the VicTalent scheme which assists talented athletes from country Victoria with travel and accommodation for training and competition purposes, introducing a culturally relevant sport and recreation program for Koori youth to address issues raised in the report into Deaths in Custody, implementing the Active Seniors program, initiating activities associated with the recognition of coaches in sport in this, the "Year of the Coach", and the volunteer Involvement Program targeting training and recognition activities for the thousands of volunteers who contribute many hours annually to the successful running of sport and recreation organisations and activities, in this State.
- 59. **MR HYAMS** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the introduction of a comprehensive policy for private investment in public sector infrastructure.
- 60. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House notes the vital importance of quality research and development programs for the future competitiveness of Victoria's rural industries and calls on the Minister for Agriculture to outline the government's forward program for rural research and development.
- 61. MR TANNER To move, That this House commends the Minister for Community Services for increasing funding for homeless people in the Southern Region by \$770,000, as this will see a major new service based in Dandenong for homeless people, provide additional domestic violence outreach support for women in the St Kilda area and create a new support service for homeless Kooris in St Kilda.

- 62. MR PATERSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Small Business for recent initiatives taken through Small Business Victoria to assist the development of export opportunities for Victorian small business.
- 63. MRS HENDERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on improving budget outcomes and preventing further indebtedness and increased taxation and particularly notes the general acceptance and community support for the way in which the programme has been managed.
- 64. MR PERTON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Energy and Minerals for the far-sighted macro-economic and micro-economic reforms to Victoria's electricity industry to the benefit of present and future generations of Victorians and condemns the Opposition, when in Government, for kowtowing to the trade unions and not instituting all the necessary reforms.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That (a) this House condemns members of the ALP for their causing four by-elections namely, Doutta Galla (\$144,900), Broadmeadows (\$80,000), Coburg (approx. \$80,000), Williamstown (approx. \$80,000) totalling approx. \$384,900; and (b) members of the Government further call on the ALP internal factions consisting of Centre Unity, Socialist Left, the Pledge Group, Independents and any other subfactions that may exist, to provide all support necessary to the current Leader of the Opposition, the Member for Broadmeadows, so as not to cause a further by-election thereby costing Victorian taxpayers more of their resources.
- 66. MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House expresses its concern that the Chinese Museum Gardens at Bendigo still have not received any appropriate level of Government funding despite claims by the Member for Bendigo East, before the State Election that "the Coalition supports the project completely" and despite his further claims in May, 1994 that the project was a top priority tourist project which was "vital" for Bendigo.
- 67. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bendigo West and the Minister for Health for their failure to secure funding for capital works needed for the Mount Alexander Hospital to consolidate onto one site, that being the only option identified by the hospital and the Health Department for acute beds and services to remain viable under the current case-mix formula.
- 68. **DR NAPTHINE** To move, That this House condemns the Member for Albert Park for his false and misleading statements made in the House on 20 and 27 May, 1994 concerning public health services at Ballarat and Bendigo and calls upon the Member for Albert Park to apologise for those comments to the respective health services and the communities of Ballarat and Bendigo.
- 69. MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his decision to name the Leader of the Opposition on 15 September 1994, given that (a) Mr Speaker's claim to have had "no option" but to order the Leader of the Opposition to withdraw was incorrect and indeed was not followed by Mr Speaker himself later the same day, by the Deputy Speaker the previous day and on numerous other occasions by numerous chairpersons; (b) Mr Speaker gave the Leader of the Opposition no opportunity to explain his remarks, in breach of Standing Order No. 112 and opportunities given to Government Members on other occasions to explain their remarks; (c) the request for withdrawal was not made at the first available opportunity, given that the Treasurer only sought a withdrawal on the fifth occasion he rose to speak, after the Leader of the Opposition's comments; and (d) Mr Deputy Speaker has

- correctly identified the dangers of limiting "the normal cut and thrust of Parliamentary debate" so much that it will become "boring beyond belief".
- 70. MR THOMSON (*Pascoe Vale*) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his obsequiousness towards the Premier and Treasurer and urges Mr Speaker to apply the same standards and rules towards them as he does to other Honourable Members.
- 71. DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure, in response to the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition concerning the response by the Treasurer to a question without notice on Thursday 15 September 1994, to direct the Treasurer to answer the question in accordance with the ordinary meaning of the word "answer" and that his response must be relevant within the ordinary meaning of the word "relevant".
- 72. MR THOMSON (*Pascoe Vale*) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for naming on Tuesday, 4 October 1994 the Member for Yan Yean for refusing to withdraw remarks directed at Government Members collectively, when he has refused to order the withdrawal of remarks directed at Opposition members collectively, for example on 15 September 1994 (*Hansard p.413*).
- 73. DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his comments purporting to quote guidelines stated by Speaker Coghill in respect of answers to questions without notice and draws attention to and requires that Ministers observe the guidelines issued by Speaker Coghill on 11 August 1992 recorded in Hansard at pages 13 and 14, including especially that "answers must be directly responsive, relevant, succinct, limited to the subject matter of the question, may provide statements of policy or the intentions of the government, including information on examinations of policy options and other actions which the Minister has had undertaken, but must not debate the matter".
- 74. MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House noting that the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, MP, promised at a public meeting held on 9 September 1992 at 7.00 p.m. at St Phillip's Church with over 100 people present that construction would be carried out within 2 years to widen Waterdale Road, West Heidelberg and as this has not happened, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for breaking his promise and calls on the Minister for Roads and Ports to ensure that construction is immediately undertaken to widen Waterdale Road, West Heidelberg.
- 75. **MR FINN** To move, That this House condemns the Honourable the Leader of the Opposition for (a) his refusal to dissociate himself from the disgraceful racial slur on the Australian-Greek community by the Honourable David White, MLC; and (b) his blatant hypocrisy in writing to the Acting Race Discrimination Commissioner over minor alleged indiscretions by Government Members whilst at the same time condoning overt racism by a senior member of the Australian Labor Party.
- 76. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House, having regard to the special community and environmental characteristics of the Dandenongs, condemns the Member for Monbulk for his failure to support the creation of a Dandenong Ranges Municipality, and calls on the Minister for Local Government to review the Interim Report of the Local Government Board in the light of the overwhelming demonstration of public support by the local residents for the creation of a Dandenong Ranges Municipality.

- 77. MR LEIGH To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Pascoe Vale for his decision to resign from State Parliament and seek to win the Federal seat of Wills from Mr P. Cleary; (b) further condemns him for costing Victorian taxpayers at least \$80,000 the cost of the by-election added to the \$224,900 already spent on by-elections in safe Labor seats since October 1992; and (c) calls on him to re-think his decision and not desert his constituents in Pascoe Vale.
- 78. MR THOMSON (*Pascoe Vale*) To move, That this House condemns the Member for Mordialloc for his hypocrisy in failing to condemn the Member for Kooyong for his recent resignation and consequent by-election.
- 79. **MR THOMSON** (*Pascoe Vale*) To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Employee Relations Act* 1992.
- 80. **DR COGHILL** To move, That the Government be condemned for the atmosphere of fear and intimidation which has discouraged individuals of integrity and capacity from putting themselves forward for consideration for appointment to senior positions in the service of the Victorian public such as that of Ombudsman.
- 81. MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for using the Community Support Fund as a Ministerial Slush Fund and for failing to ensure that sufficient funds are allocated for research into the social impact of gambling in Victoria and to support people with gambling related problems.
- 82. MR BRACKS To move, That this House joins with the President of the Employee Relations Commission in condemning the Government for its failure to provide a legislative framework for industrial relations that ensures (a) employment contracts are fair and properly scrutinised; (b) the Employee Relations Commission is given power to resolve disputes through compulsory arbitration and conciliation; and (c) there is adequate remedies for proven unfair dismissal cases.

- 85. MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Member for Eltham for gross negligence towards his constituents in relation to the Government's decision to cancel an agreement for construction of a new 24 hour police station in Eltham and notes that during 1994 the Honourable Member for Eltham only spoke in the House on two occasions for a total of six minutes at a cost to Eltham taxpayers of \$15,000 per minute.

- 86. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Attorney-General for attempting to pervert the course of justice by (a) summoning the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) to her home on 2 August 1993 in response to media reports that the DPP was considering charging the Premier with contempt for comments he made that day on the Ray Martin show about the charging of a man over 3 Frankston murders; (b) taking at least two phone calls from the Premier that night during which parties discussed the question of contempt charges being laid against the Premier; (c) informing the DPP after one of those calls that the Premier was not happy about the contempt matter; and (d) at some time during that evening advising the DPP that she had referred his public comments in relation to police shootings to the Solicitor-General to seek his view on a possible contempt.
- 87. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Premier for attempting to pervert the course of justice by making at least two telephone calls to the Attorney-General at her home on the night of 2 August 1993 following reports in the media that the then Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) Mr Bernard Bongiorno was considering charging the Premier with contempt for comments he made that day on the Ray Martin show about the charging of a man over 3 Frankston murders when the Premier (a) knew that the DPP was present at the Attorney-General's home during at least one of those calls; (b) according to the Attorney-General, rang her specifically to get advice in relation to the DPP considering contempt charges against him; and (c) according to the Attorney-General during one of those calls, informed her he was not happy about the DPP considering issuing contempt charges against him.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Deputy Premier 88. for his contempt of the judicial process and his total disregard of the right of an accused to be considered innocent until proven guilty in that on 5 April 1995 a person was charged with murder and attempted murder; and on the Neil Mitchell show on 3AW on Thursday, 6 April the Deputy Premier, in absolute contempt of the judicial process, referred to prior charges against the accused and these remarks were then reported in the Herald Sun on Friday, 7 April; and because under the amended section 46 of the Public Prosecutions Act 1994 only the Attorney-General can issue contempt proceedings for a contempt of court relating to the administration of justice in relation to a pending proceeding; and section 49 of the amended Public Prosecutions Act refers to the amendment of the Constitution to prevent the Supreme Court hearing an application for contempt from anyone else other than the Attorney-General; and the amended Public Prosecutions Act obliges and the Opposition requests the Attorney-General to seek advice from the Solicitor-General, before exercising her power under section 46(1) and further, that the above requests should be initiated in view of public concerns following allegations made on the Four Corners program on the ABC on 10 April 1995 that the possibility of the Premier being charged with contempt by the DPP was one of the main reasons the Public Prosecutions Act was amended to give the Attorney-General sole powers to issue contempt proceedings.
- 89. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health and Coalition Members of Parliament for ignoring the health needs of rural communities and calls upon the Minister to halt plans for the forced closure or merger of more country community health services, including women's health services.
- 90. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House censures the Minister for Public Transport for his disgraceful conduct in visiting Mrs Lorraine Perry of Wonthaggi in March this year, two days after her husband's funeral when he demanded she sell the stock of her nursery, gave her only seven days to agree and said that unless she agreed he would

MR COLE To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to protect public sector employees who disclose information to the media and members of public, so as to ensure that public sector employees are not victimised for providing such information where it is in the public interest to do so.
- 5. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Minister for Community Services for increasing the funding to domestic violence services in Victoria by approving the allocation of \$700,000 recurrent and \$919,526 one-off grants to expand these services.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- MR HYAMS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Finance in reaching an agreement on, and implementing, sustainable superannuation reforms for the State's public sector employees.
- 8. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to provide for right-to-know in the chemical industry as recommended by the Landy Panel in its March 1992 report, so as to require chemical companies and government agencies to provide information to the public about the use, manufacture and storage of hazardous chemicals.
- 9. MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Minister responsible for Youth Affairs for his initiative in establishing regional youth committees to co-ordinate the resources available to disadvantaged youth from the Government, private and voluntary sectors.

- 10. MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its disastrous education policies and funding cuts which have resulted in (a) the closure of over 210 schools and the sacking of over 8300 teachers; and (b) significant increases in class sizes and reduced curriculum and subject choices for students and notes that the impact of these policies has been greatest on disadvantaged students and those in country Victoria.
- 11. MR McARTHUR To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Energy and Minerals for action taken to substantially increase the level of mineral exploration and development in Victoria while ensuring proper environmental safeguards and condemns the Opposition, when in Government, for driving the mining industry out of the State.
- 12. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ripon for failing to oppose budget cuts and Government policies that have led to the closure of the Clunes Hospital, thereby causing extreme hardship to the residents of Clunes and surrounding areas.
- 13. MR COOPER To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in that re-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly dissociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House all of the facts relating to this involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government 14. for its double-standards and hypocrisy in wasting millions of dollars of taxpayers money as evidenced by - (a) the creation of extra paid parliamentary positions including Parliamentary Secretaries, extra Committee Chairpersons, additional Ministers, and silver service in the dining room at a cost of \$2.5 million; (b) the \$28.5 million the Government is spending to relocate the offices of the Planning, Major Projects, Housing, WorkCover and Local Government departments to Treasury Reserve; (c) the \$9.2 million the Government is spending to renovate the Premier's and the Treasurer's offices, and tens of thousands of dollars it is spending for the Premier and the Treasurer to lease levels 14 and 15 of the ANZ Tower while their offices are upgraded; (d) the \$8 million the Government has spent on WorkCover advertisements, \$900,000 political advertising by the Education Department and the \$400,000 it has spent on advertisements opposing new Federal industrial relations laws; (e) up to \$1 billion in VDP and superannuation payouts to public sector workers who have moved to Queensland and New South Wales; (f) the \$1 million the Government has spent on renovations to the offices of the Ministers for Health, Police and Emergency Services and Energy and Minerals; (g) the \$3 million spent on a 16-page colour brochure on the Audit Commission Report in 1993 and \$4 million allocated for a 30-page colour brochure to be sent to all households in October 1994; (h) the \$800,000 media advertisements and brochures supporting the Employee Relations Act 1992; (i) the \$170,000 the Government spent on renovations to the London residence of Victoria's Agent-General; (j) the \$150,000 on media advertising and pamphlets promoting the 1993 April Economic Statement; (k) the \$4 million wasted on legal action to stop the

flow-on of Victorian workers to Federal awards; (*l*) the \$500,000 spent on "Education News" a newspaper to promote the Minister for Education - and further, that this House notes that this extravagant and wasteful use of taxpayers money has occurred at the same time as the Government has refused to provide additional funds for hospitals, ambulance services and child abuse programs, thereby placing the lives of hundreds of Victorians at risk.

- DR NAPTHINE To move, That this House congratulates the State Government for achieving a significant reduction in the number of Victorians waiting for urgent surgery.
- 16. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to implement the recommendation of the Auditor-General in his May 1994 report that Governmentowned business undertakings be required to disclose related Party information in their financial statements.
- 17. MR DOYLE To move, That this House commends the Government for building new schools in growth areas of Melbourne and regional Victoria for the benefit of students well into the next century.
- 18. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation that sets down guidelines and reporting requirements to ensure that businesses awarded Government consultancies and other contracts do not have a conflict of interest because of other work they have performed or are performing in the public or private sectors.
- 19. MRS McGILL To move, That this House commends the Government for the way in which it has restructured the Victorian equal opportunity system to provide for greater accountability and efficiency while preserving the independence of the system from Government.
- 20. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Wimmera for failing to oppose budget cuts and Government policies that have led to the closure of the Murtoa Hospital, thereby causing extreme hardship to the residents of Murtoa and surrounding areas.
- 21. MR KILGOUR To move, That the Government is to be commended for the initiative it has shown in establishing the Ministerial Steering Committee for Emergency Services Telecommunications and the unit within the Department of Justice responsible for the development and implementation of a shared communication facilities for call taking and dispatch of Victoria's emergency services organisations, as the innovative approach taken to the delivery of this important service to the community will result in significant cost savings from the rationalisation of communication networks and the improved management of the resources of our emergency services when responding to emergency calls.
- 22. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Rodney for failing to oppose budget cuts and Government policies that have led to the closure of the Elmore Hospital, thereby causing extreme hardship to the residents of Elmore and surrounding areas.
- 23. **MR LEIGH** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for its introduction of the City Circle tram service.

- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for 24. examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -(a) in a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, OC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Industrial Relations Act 1988 of the Commonwealth; (b) in answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to that Act; (c) the agenda of the briefing to Statutory Authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations - Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(II) "The Federal Legislation - implications and options - Ian Douglas"; (d) Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, OC on the Federal Legislation; and (e) the response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 25. MR HYAMS To move, That this House congratulates the Minister for Industry and Employment and the Victorian Government on providing a flexible employee relations system in Victoria which will enhance business opportunities and expand jobs for Victorians.
- 26. **MR CLARK** To move, That this House supports the reforms to financial management and accountability which have been introduced by the Government since its election and supports the steps being taken by the Government to introduce further reforms.
- 27. MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Frankston for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Frankston paying on average an extra \$74.65 per year by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 28. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulate both the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing and the Minister for Education for initiating the review into the sad state of the status of sport and physical education in Victorian schools, and the impact that this was having on our youth, who were found to be obese and unfit, and implementing the recommendations from the review, detailed in the Moneghetti report.
- 29. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bentleigh for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Bentleigh paying on average an extra \$45.70 per year by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 30. MR McARTHUR To move, That this House congratulates the Minister for Agriculture for his work in promoting the development of rural areas and in particular the initiatives that have been put in place in the Sunraysia and the Goulburn Valley and in so doing the Assembly calls upon the Government to develop similar incentives in other areas of Victoria and target specific programs to enable rural Victoria to further improve its vital contribution to the economic well being of the State.

- 31. MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Bayswater paying on average an extra \$69.51 per year by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 32. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Minister for Community Services for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people which has seen the commitment of an additional \$10 million of funding to expand and enhance services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 33. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Oakleigh for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in her Electorate paying on average an extra \$35.27 in this financial year, while water rates for households in Brighton in the Treasurer's Electorate will fall by an average \$31.88 this financial year.
- 34. MR CLARK To move, That this House commends the Government for bringing about a dramatic improvement in WorkCover costs in the interests of all Victorians.
- 35. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Cranbourne for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Cranbourne paying on average an extra \$98.15 by 1996, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$121.35 during this period.
- 36. MR PHILLIPS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Small Business for the development and implementation of Australia's first one stop business shop, which brings the resources of the Commonwealth, State and Local Government together under one roof to assist Victorian small business operators.
- 37. MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Heidelberg paying on average an extra \$38.69 this financial year, while water rates for households in Brighton in the Treasurer's Electorate will fall by an average \$31.88.
- 38. MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Energy and Minerals for action taken in encouraging the re-development of gold mining in this State and particularly in the Golden Triangle, whilst ensuring proper environmental safeguards and condemns the Opposition, when in Government, for its lack of assistance to this important industry.
- 39. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Member for Warrandyte for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Warrandyte paying on average an extra \$92.88 by 1996, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$121.35 during this period.
- 40. **MR PERRIN** To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on its decision to develop a bulk chemical storage facility at Point Lillias.
- 41. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Member for Essendon for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Essendon paying on average an extra \$39.70 by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.

- 42. **MR DOYLE** To move, That this House congratulates the State Government for its initiative in developing a specific Cancer and Heart Offensive to reduce the number of Victorians who die prematurely because of cancer and heart disease.
- 43. MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Frankston East for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Frankston East paying on average an extra \$74.65 by 1995, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$139.31 during the same period.
- 44. MR ELDER To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to promoting opportunities for students and teachers to further their knowledge in the vital curriculum area of Languages Other Than English.
- 45. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Member for Eltham for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Eltham paying on average an extra \$92.88 per year by 1996, while water rates for households in Toorak will fall by an average \$121.35 during the same period.
- 46. MR RYAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its improvements to the administration of prosecutions in the State of Victoria.
- 47. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Mooroolbark for failing to oppose changes to water rates which will result in households in Mooroolbark paying on average an extra \$46.14 in this financial year, while water rates for households in Brighton in the Treasurer's Electorate will fall by an average \$31.88 in the same period.
- 48. MR STEGGALL To move, That this House calls on the Commonwealth Government to renegotiate the Commonwealth-State financial arrangements in a way which eliminates the subsidy of more than \$650 million which the Commonwealth Government itself acknowledges Victorian taxpayers are forced to contribute to other States.
- 49. MR LONEY To move, That the Greater Geelong Planning Scheme, Amendment No. R77 be wholly revoked.
- 50. MR JENKINS To move, That the Parliament recognises the significant improvements to the welfare and rehabilitation of convicted offenders sentenced to a term of imprisonment that will result from the contracting out of three major prison facilities to the private sector.
- 51. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes with concern the results from a survey conducted among parents of the Woodbine Pre-School in Cranbourne North, which services the electorates of Cranbourne and Dandenong and has shown (a) 78% finding it difficult or very difficult to pay fees; (b) 42% know at least one child whose parents could not afford to send them to a state pre-school in 1994; (c) 89% believe the State Government should increase funding to pre-schools; (d) 95% are concerned or very concerned about the larger class sizes; (e) 84% believe the maximum class size consistent with quality is below 22; (f) 98% believe the maximum class size consistent with quality is below 25 and calls on the Member for Cranbourne to represent the needs of his constituents by opposing this Government's pre-school funding changes.

- 52. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Member for Cranbourne for his failure to secure any of the \$59 million funding allocated for capital works at Government schools towards improvements at the 17 Government schools within his electorate.
- 53. **DR VAUGHAN** To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bentleigh for failing to represent the interests of her electorate as evidenced by the lack of a single premium station within her electorate, while the Government provides fully staffed premium stations throughout marginal seats in the Eastern suburbs.
- 54. **MR ROWE** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on achieving the best financial outcome in public transport for over twenty years.
- 55. **MR TANNER** To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on its successful initiative to introduce the WorkCover Workers' Compensation Scheme into Victoria which has achieved major advances by (a) reducing unfunded liabilities from \$2,100 million to financial viability; (b) providing lower premiums for employers in Victoria; (c) creating a work environment which reduces accidents; and (d) encouraging injured employees to return to work as soon as possible thereby aiding their recovery from injury.
- 56. MR BILDSTIEN To move, That this House congratulates the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for gaining private sector sponsorship for the VicTalent scheme which assists talented athletes from country Victoria with travel and accommodation for training and competition purposes, introducing a culturally relevant sport and recreation program for Koori youth to address issues raised in the report into Deaths in Custody, implementing the Active Seniors program, initiating activities associated with the recognition of coaches in sport in this, the "Year of the Coach", and the volunteer Involvement Program targeting training and recognition activities for the thousands of volunteers who contribute many hours annually to the successful running of sport and recreation organisations and activities, in this State.
- 57. **MR HYAMS** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the introduction of a comprehensive policy for private investment in public sector infrastructure.
- 58. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House notes the vital importance of quality research and development programs for the future competitiveness of Victoria's rural industries and calls on the Minister for Agriculture to outline the government's forward program for rural research and development.
- 59. MR TANNER To move, That this House commends the Minister for Community Services for increasing funding for homeless people in the Southern Region by \$770,000, as this will see a major new service based in Dandenong for homeless people, provide additional domestic violence outreach support for women in the St Kilda area and create a new support service for homeless Kooris in St Kilda.
- 60. MR PATERSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Small Business for recent initiatives taken through Small Business Victoria to assist the development of export opportunities for Victorian small business.
- 61. MRS HENDERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on improving budget outcomes and preventing further indebtedness and increased taxation and particularly notes the general acceptance and community support for the way in which the programme has been managed.

- 62. MR PERTON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Energy and Minerals for the far-sighted macro-economic and micro-economic reforms to Victoria's electricity industry to the benefit of present and future generations of Victorians and condemns the Opposition, when in Government, for kowtowing to the trade unions and not instituting all the necessary reforms.
- 63. MR LEIGH To move, That (a) this House condemns members of the ALP for their causing four by-elections namely, Doutta Galla (\$144,900), Broadmeadows (\$80,000), Coburg (approx. \$80,000), Williamstown (approx. \$80,000) totalling approx. \$384,900; and (b) members of the Government further call on the ALP internal factions consisting of Centre Unity, Socialist Left, the Pledge Group, Independents and any other subfactions that may exist, to provide all support necessary to the current Leader of the Opposition, the Member for Broadmeadows, so as not to cause a further by-election thereby costing Victorian taxpayers more of their resources.
- 64. MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House expresses its concern that the Chinese Museum Gardens at Bendigo still have not received any appropriate level of Government funding despite claims by the Member for Bendigo East, before the State Election that "the Coalition supports the project completely" and despite his further claims in May, 1994 that the project was a top priority tourist project which was "vital" for Bendigo.
- 65. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bendigo West and the Minister for Health for their failure to secure funding for capital works needed for the Mount Alexander Hospital to consolidate onto one site, that being the only option identified by the hospital and the Health Department for acute beds and services to remain viable under the current case-mix formula.
- 66. DR NAPTHINE To move, That this House condemns the Member for Albert Park for his false and misleading statements made in the House on 20 and 27 May, 1994 concerning public health services at Ballarat and Bendigo and calls upon the Member for Albert Park to apologise for those comments to the respective health services and the communities of Ballarat and Bendigo.
- 67. DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure, in response to the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition concerning the response by the Treasurer to a question without notice on Thursday 15 September 1994, to direct the Treasurer to answer the question in accordance with the ordinary meaning of the word "answer" and that his response must be relevant within the ordinary meaning of the word "relevant".
- 68. DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his comments purporting to quote guidelines stated by Speaker Coghill in respect of answers to questions without notice and draws attention to and requires that Ministers observe the guidelines issued by Speaker Coghill on 11 August 1992 recorded in Hansard at pages 13 and 14, including especially that "answers must be directly responsive, relevant, succinct, limited to the subject matter of the question, may provide statements of policy or the intentions of the government, including information on examinations of policy options and other actions which the Minister has had undertaken, but must not debate the matter".

- 69. MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House noting that the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, MP, promised at a public meeting held on 9 September 1992 at 7.00 p.m. at St Phillip's Church with over 100 people present that construction would be carried out within 2 years to widen Waterdale Road, West Heidelberg and as this has not happened, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for breaking his promise and calls on the Minister for Roads and Ports to ensure that construction is immediately undertaken to widen Waterdale Road, West Heidelberg.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House condemns the Honourable the Leader of the Opposition for (a) his refusal to dissociate himself from the disgraceful racial slur on the Australian-Greek community by the Honourable David White, MLC; and (b) his blatant hypocrisy in writing to the Acting Race Discrimination Commissioner over minor alleged indiscretions by Government Members whilst at the same time condoning overt racism by a senior member of the Australian Labor Party.
- 71. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House, having regard to the special community and environmental characteristics of the Dandenongs, condemns the Member for Monbulk for his failure to support the creation of a Dandenong Ranges Municipality, and calls on the Minister for Local Government to review the Interim Report of the Local Government Board in the light of the overwhelming demonstration of public support by the local residents for the creation of a Dandenong Ranges Municipality.
- 72. MR LEIGH To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Pascoe Vale for his decision to resign from State Parliament and seek to win the Federal seat of Wills from Mr P. Cleary; (b) further condemns him for costing Victorian taxpayers at least \$80,000 the cost of the by-election added to the \$224,900 already spent on by-elections in safe Labor seats since October 1992; and (c) calls on him to re-think his decision and not desert his constituents in Pascoe Vale.
- 73. DR COGHILL To move, That the Government be condemned for the atmosphere of fear and intimidation which has discouraged individuals of integrity and capacity from putting themselves forward for consideration for appointment to senior positions in the service of the Victorian public such as that of Ombudsman.
- 74. MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for using the Community Support Fund as a Ministerial Slush Fund and for failing to ensure that sufficient funds are allocated for research into the social impact of gambling in Victoria and to support people with gambling related problems.
- 75. MR BRACKS To move, That this House joins with the President of the Employee Relations Commission in condemning the Government for its failure to provide a legislative framework for industrial relations that ensures (a) employment contracts are fair and properly scrutinised; (b) the Employee Relations Commission is given power to resolve disputes through compulsory arbitration and conciliation; and (c) there is adequate remedies for proven unfair dismissal cases.
- 76. MR LEIGH To move, That, in the matter of busing Craigieburn School students, this House condemns the Member for Yan Yean for (a) ruthlessly using students as pawns in an effort to promote his political interests by encouraging parents to pull their children out of school; (b) abusing taxpayer funded facilities in the form of staff, fax and other office equipment in order to orchestrate a political campaign under the guise of a spontaneous community protest; (c) ignoring the fact that the current policy under which bus services are provided in his electorate was established by former Labor

- Premier, Joan Kirner; and (d) distressing parents by alleging that it is not operationally safe for students to travel on the bus services provided.
- 77. MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Member for Bellarine for refusing to represent the interests of residents and police on the Bellarine Peninsula and blindly defending the Government's arrogant and ill considered proposals to sell off police housing in country areas, including three in his own electorate.
- 78. MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Member for Eltham for gross negligence towards his constituents in relation to the Government's decision to cancel an agreement for construction of a new 24 hour police station in Eltham and notes that during 1994 the Honourable Member for Eltham only spoke in the House on two occasions for a total of six minutes at a cost to Eltham taxpayers of \$15,000 per minute.
- 79. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Attorney-General for attempting to pervert the course of justice by (a) summoning the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) to her home on 2 August 1993 in response to media reports that the DPP was considering charging the Premier with contempt for comments he made that day on the Ray Martin show about the charging of a man over 3 Frankston murders; (b) taking at least two phone calls from the Premier that night during which parties discussed the question of contempt charges being laid against the Premier; (c) informing the DPP after one of those calls that the Premier was not happy about the contempt matter; and (d) at some time during that evening advising the DPP that she had referred his public comments in relation to police shootings to the Solicitor-General to seek his view on a possible contempt.
- 80. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Premier for attempting to pervert the course of justice by making at least two telephone calls to the Attorney-General at her home on the night of 2 August 1993 following reports in the media that the then Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP) Mr Bernard Bongiorno was considering charging the Premier with contempt for comments he made that day on the Ray Martin show about the charging of a man over 3 Frankston murders when the Premier (a) knew that the DPP was present at the Attorney-General's home during at least one of those calls; (b) according to the Attorney-General, rang her specifically to get advice in relation to the DPP considering contempt charges against him; and (c) according to the Attorney-General during one of those calls, informed her he was not happy about the DPP considering issuing contempt charges against him.
- 81. seek advice from the Solicitor-General, before exercising her power under section 46(1) and further, that the above requests should be initiated in view of public concerns following allegations made on the Four Corners program on the ABC on 10 April 1995 that the possibility of the Premier being charged with contempt by the DPP was one of the main reasons the Public Prosecutions Act was amended to give the Attorney-General sole powers to issue contempt proceedings.

- 2. # NOTICES OF MOTION

- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its attack on student unions and calls on the Government to repeal its voluntary student union legislation which is discriminatory and designed to disempower students.
- MR ELDER To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for providing the Koorie Open Door Education (KODE) policy enabling aboriginal communities to manage their own schools from Prep to Year 12 at Glenroy and Morwell.
- 3. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House notes the recommendations of the Premier's Drug Advisory Council and calls on the Government to immediately develop a Victorian Drug Strategy which (a) aims at reducing drug usage and drug abuse in the Victorian community; (b) adopts a "harm minimisation" approach for those involved in drugs; (c) increases access to preventative and educative programs which aim to prevent drug abuse and addiction; and (d) expands drug treatment and rehabilitation programs, and further calls on the Government to introduce any legislation necessary to give effect to such a strategy.

- MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b), the emphasis on standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress and; (c) for highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 11. **MR BRACKS** To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.

MR BRUMBY To move; That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent; accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- 16. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.
- 17. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.
- 18. MR McGRATH (Warrnambool) To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to the principles of the framework for delivery of psychiatric services in this State, and also for recognising the enormous contribution potential of the consumers and carers in policy and guidelines development in the area of mental health.

- 19. - 20. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.

MR BRUMBY To move, That this House acknowledges rural Victoria's huge contribution to the Victorian economy and notes with concern the Government's lack of support for rural industries and communities as evidenced by its (a) lack of encouragement for economic development in country Victoria; (b) decision to end the uniform electricity tariff, leading to higher electricity charges for farmers and rural consumers; (c) privatisation and downsizing of four Government regional veterinary laboratories; (d) closure of rural schools and hospitals; (e) failure to take effective action to prevent country people paying significantly more for petrol than Melbourne residents; (f) closure of 6 passenger rail services in country Victoria; (g) failure to develop effective transport linkages to export markets, in particular its failure to ensure effective reforms and improvements are made to the operation of the Port of Melbourne; and (h) lack of adequate direction and support for the Victorian wool industry.
- 12. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for fostering co-operation between schools, TAFE institutes, private providers and universities to maximise credit transfer and course articulation arrangements, so that students can move from one sector to another with recognition for previous study.
- 13. **MR DOLLIS** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning and Local Government and the Kennett Government for (a) substituting Ministerial discretion for the planning process; (b) undermining public participation and public accountability in the planning process; (c) intervening in the planning process to the long-term detriment of Melbourne and its urban amenity; (d) ignoring and weakening environmental assessment mechanisms; and (e) allowing the ad-hoc subdivision of valuable parts of Victoria's environmental assets.
- 14. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and Minister for Sport for the continuing foresight and initiative shown in ensuring that State sporting facilities are of a suitable standard to capitalise on acclimatisation and training of our own and overseas athletes in preparation for the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games, and to successfully attract and conduct major sporting events which will further showcase Melbourne and maintain its status as the sporting capital.
- 15. MR BRUMBY To move; That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent; accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and

- distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- 16. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.
- 17. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.
- 18. MR McGRATH (Warrnambool) To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to the principles of the framework for delivery of psychiatric services in this State, and also for recognising the enormous contribution potential of the consumers and carers in policy and guidelines development in the area of mental health.
- 19. - 20. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- 21. - MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on the improvements to roads in all parts of Victoria and its highly successful Better Roads Program.
- 7. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.
- 8. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b), the emphasis on standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress; and (c) for highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 9. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.
- 10. MR RYAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the many initiatives it has pursued to encourage economic development in country Victoria.

- 11. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House acknowledges rural Victoria's huge contribution to the Victorian economy and notes with concern the Government's lack of support for rural industries and communities as evidenced by its (a) lack of encouragement for economic development in country Victoria; (b) decision to end the uniform electricity tariff, leading to higher electricity charges for farmers and rural consumers; (c) privatisation and downsizing of four Government regional veterinary laboratories; (d) closure of rural schools and hospitals; (e) failure to take effective action to prevent country people paying significantly more for petrol than Melbourne residents; (f) closure of 6 passenger rail services in country Victoria; (g) failure to develop effective transport linkages to export markets, in particular its failure to ensure effective reforms and improvements are made to the operation of the Port of Melbourne; and (h) lack of adequate direction and support for the Victorian wool industry.
- 12. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for fostering co-operation between schools, TAFE institutes, private providers and universities to maximise credit transfer and course articulation arrangements, so that students can move from one sector to another with recognition for previous study.
- 13. **MR DOLLIS** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning and Local Government and the Kennett Government for (a) substituting Ministerial discretion for the planning process; (b) undermining public participation and public accountability in the planning process; (c) intervening in the planning process to the long-term detriment of Melbourne and its urban amenity; (d) ignoring and weakening environmental assessment mechanisms; and (e) allowing the ad-hoc subdivision of valuable parts of Victoria's environmental assets.
- 14. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and Minister for Sport for the continuing foresight and initiative shown in ensuring that State sporting facilities are of a suitable standard to capitalise on acclimatisation and training of our own and overseas athletes in preparation for the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games, and to successfully attract and conduct major sporting events which will further showcase Melbourne and maintain its status as the sporting capital.
- 15. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent, accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- 16. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.

- 17. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.
- 18. MR McGRATH (Warrnambool) To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to the principles of the framework for delivery of psychiatric services in this State, and also for recognising the enormous contribution potential of the consumers and carers in policy and guidelines development in the area of mental health.
- 19. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House notes the report of the Standing Orders Committee 1992 and changes in other Parliaments in other States and Territories to improve the effectiveness of Parliament and to increase opportunities for broader Parliamentary debate and scrutiny, and calls on the Parliament to amend the Sessional and Standing Orders to achieve (a) a more responsible and accountable Question Time of one hours duration each sitting day; and (b) more time for Opposition and Private Members' Business in the House by (i) shifting Grievances from Wednesdays to Thursdays; (ii) introducing 90 second statements; (iii) allowing extensions of time on the adjournment where a member's time has been unreasonably infringed; and (iv) allowing full debate on all Bills unless the Opposition agrees to the guillotine.
- 20. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- 21. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its continuing attacks on the basic democratic rights of Victorians and calls on the Government to amend the Constitution Act 1975 to guarantee the separation of powers and entrench other key democratic rights and safeguards.
- 22. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates this Government for the steps it has taken to assist disadvantaged and homeless youth in the State of Victoria.
- 23. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its cuts and mismanagement of the public hospital system which has led to long waiting lists and delays in treatment for patients.

## GENERAL BUSINESS

#### NOTICES OF MOTION

- 1. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House notes the recommendations of the Premier's Drug Advisory Council and calls on the Government to immediately develop a Victorian Drug Strategy which (a) aims at reducing drug usage and drug abuse in the Victorian community; (b) adopts a "harm minimisation" approach for those involved in drugs; (c) increases access to preventative and educative programs which aim to prevent drug abuse and addiction; and (d) expands drug treatment and rehabilitation programs, and further calls on the Government to introduce any legislation necessary to give effect to such a strategy.
- MR RYAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the responsible manner in which it has implemented the development of the gaming industry in Victoria.
- 3. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its education policies which have resulted in (a) increased class sizes in primary and secondary schools; (b) the loss of specialist teachers; (c) a decline in Year 12 retention rates; and (d) huge differences in educational outcomes between regions.
- 4. MR COOPER To move, That this House, while regretting the lack of genuine policy commitment by the Labor Party to transport issues, congratulates the Government on its transport achievements during its first term in office and applauds the commitments to further improve the transport system in Victoria during the coming four years as outlined in the Public Transport Policy of the Coalition published in March 1996.

MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34

- years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.

MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b), the emphasis on standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress; and (c) for highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 9. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.

MR STOCKDALE - To move, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider amendments to - (a) ensure that the exemption from stamp duty for costs of refurbishment of lots in existing buildings sold "off-the-plan" is restricted to refurbishment carried out between the date of the contract and the date of the conveyance; (b) limit the exemption from stamp duty on a conveyance of real property of a company to a shareholder on winding up of the company to circumstances where the winding up is by a court or, in the case of a voluntary winding up, the Comptroller is satisfied that the winding up is not part of an arrangement or Schedule devised with the collateral purpose of reducing stamp duty.

MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 42. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 43. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 44. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 45. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 46. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.

- 47. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 48. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 49. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 50. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 51. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 53. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 54. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 55. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 57. **MR BRACKS** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.

- 59. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 60. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 61. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 62. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 63. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 64. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 65. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 66. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 67. **MS GARBUTT -** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 68. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 69. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 70. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.

- 71. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 72. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 73. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 78. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- \*79. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests;

- (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- \*80. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- \*81. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- \*82. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13

May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer \*83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.

- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 80. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.

- 81. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 82. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.

- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 91. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.

MR BRUMBY To move, That this House acknowledges rural Victoria's huge contribution to the Victorian economy and notes with concern the Government's lack of support for rural industries and communities as evidenced by its (a) lack of encouragement for economic development in country Victoria; (b) decision to end the uniform electricity tariff, leading to higher electricity charges for farmers and rural consumers; (c) privatisation and downsizing of four Government regional veterinary laboratories; (d) closure of rural schools and hospitals; (e) failure to take effective action to prevent country people paying significantly more for petrol than Melbourne residents; (f) closure of 6 passenger rail services in country Victoria; (g) failure to develop effective transport linkages to export markets, in particular its failure to ensure effective reforms and improvements are made to the operation of the Port of Melbourne; and (h) lack of adequate direction and support for the Victorian wool industry.
- 10. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for fostering co-operation between schools, TAFE institutes, private providers and universities to maximise credit transfer and course articulation arrangements, so that students can move from one sector to another with recognition for previous study.
- 11. **MR DOLLIS** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning and Local Government and the Kennett Government for (a) substituting Ministerial discretion for the planning process; (b) undermining public participation and public accountability in the planning process; (c) intervening in the planning process to the long-term detriment of Melbourne and its urban amenity; (d) ignoring and weakening environmental

- assessment mechanisms; and (e) allowing the ad-hoc subdivision of valuable parts of Victoria's environmental assets.
- 12. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and Minister for Sport for the continuing foresight and initiative shown in ensuring that State sporting facilities are of a suitable standard to capitalise on acclimatisation and training of our own and overseas athletes in preparation for the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games, and to successfully attract and conduct major sporting events which will further showcase Melbourne and maintain its status as the sporting capital.
- 13. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent, accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- 14. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.
- 15. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.
- 16. MR McGRATH (Warrnambool) To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to the principles of the framework for delivery of psychiatric services in this State, and also for recognising the enormous contribution potential of the consumers and carers in policy and guidelines development in the area of mental health.
- 17. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House notes the report of the Standing Orders Committee 1992 and changes in other Parliaments in other States and Territories to improve the effectiveness of Parliament and to increase opportunities for broader Parliamentary debate and scrutiny, and calls on the Parliament to amend the Sessional and Standing Orders to achieve (a) a more responsible and accountable Question Time of one hours duration each sitting day; and (b) more time for Opposition and Private Members' Business in the House by (i) shifting Grievances from Wednesdays to Thursdays; (ii) introducing 90 second statements; (iii) allowing extensions of time on the adjournment where a member's time has been unreasonably infringed; and (iv) allowing full debate on all Bills unless the Opposition agrees to the guillotine.
- 18. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the

police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.

- 19. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its continuing attacks on the basic democratic rights of Victorians and calls on the Government to amend the Constitution Act 1975 to guarantee the separation of powers and entrench other key democratic rights and safeguards.
- 20. **MR WELLS** To move, That this House congratulates this Government for the steps it has taken to assist disadvantaged and homeless youth in the State of Victoria.
- 21. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its cuts and mismanagement of the public hospital system which has led to long waiting lists and delays in treatment for patients.
- 22. **MR KILGOUR** To move, That this House commends the Government for its initiative to spend \$1 billion on school facilities over the next four years.
- 23. **MR BRUMBY** To move, That this House notes that during the election campaign the Kennett Government made the following promises to the people of Victoria (a) to create 150,000 new jobs in Victoria; (b) to retain Victoria's water industry assets in public ownership; and (c) to not implement any plans for large-scale reduction in public sector jobs and calls on the Government to honour these promises.
- 24. MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Government on its housing policy with particular reference to the continuing efficient management and maintenance of public housing.
- 25. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 26. **MR LEIGH -** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 27. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 28. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.
- 29. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.

- 30. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 31. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- 32. MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program of prison privatisation.
- 33. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 34. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- 35. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 36. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 37. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 38. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 39. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 40. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 41. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.

- 42. **MR TREASURE** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 43. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 44. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 45. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 46. **MR WELLS** To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 47. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 48. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 49. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 50. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 51. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 52. **MR PATERSON** To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 53. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.

- 54. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 55. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 59. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 60. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 61. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 62. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 63. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 64. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 65. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.

- 66. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 67. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 68. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 69. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 70. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 71. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 72. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 73. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 74. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 75. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.

- 76. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 77. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 78. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 80. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 81. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions - (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares - one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 - in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 82. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 84. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to

- obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 85. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 86. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 87. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its education policies which have resulted in (a) increased class sizes in primary and secondary schools; (b) the loss of specialist teachers; (c) a decline in Year 12 retention rates; and (d) huge differences in educational outcomes between regions.

MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- 19. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its continuing attacks on the basic democratic rights of Victorians and calls on the Government to amend the Constitution Act 1975 to guarantee the separation of powers and entrench other key democratic rights and safeguards.
- 20. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates this Government for the steps it has taken to assist disadvantaged and homeless youth in the State of Victoria.
- 21. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its cuts and mismanagement of the public hospital system which has led to long waiting lists and delays in treatment for patients.
- 22. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government for its initiative to spend \$1 billion on school facilities over the next four years.
- 23. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House notes that during the election campaign the Kennett Government made the following promises to the people of Victoria (a) to create 150,000 new jobs in Victoria; (b) to retain Victoria's water industry assets in public ownership; and (c) to not implement any plans for large-scale reduction in public sector jobs and calls on the Government to honour these promises.

- 24. MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Government on its housing policy with particular reference to the continuing efficient management and maintenance of public housing.
- 25. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 26. **MR LEIGH** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 27. **MR PANDAZOPOULOS** To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 28. **MR PATERSON** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.
- 29. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 30. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 31. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- 32. **MR TRAYNOR** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program of prison privatisation.
- 33. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 34. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- 35. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.

- 36. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 37. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 38. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 39. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 40. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 41. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 42. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 43. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 44. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 45. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 46. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.

- 47. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 48. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 49. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 50. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 51. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 53. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 54. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 55. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 57. **MR BRACKS** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 58. **MR ASHLEY -** To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.

- 59. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 60. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 61. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 62. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 63. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 64. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 65. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 66. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 67. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 68. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 69. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 70. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.

- 71. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 72. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 73. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 74. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 75. **MR BATCHELOR -** To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 76. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 77. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 78. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 79. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests;

- (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 80. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 81. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 82. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13

May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 84. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 85. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 86. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 87. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant

information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 88. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 89. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 90. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.

- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 91. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd: (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 92. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 93. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 95. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.

- 40. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 41. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 42. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 43. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 44. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 45. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 46. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.

- 47. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 48. **MRS PEULICH -** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 49. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 50. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 51. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 53. **MR DOLLIS** To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 54. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 55. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 57. **MR BRACKS** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.

- 59. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 60. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 61. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 62. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 63. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 64. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 65. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 66. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 67. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 68. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 69. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 70. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.

- 71. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 72. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 73. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 74. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 75. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 76. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 77. **MRS MADDIGAN** To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 78. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 79. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests;

- (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 80. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 81. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 82. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13

May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 84. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 85. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 86. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 87. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant

information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 88. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 89. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 90. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.

- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 91. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 92. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 93. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 95. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 96. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.

- 97. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 98. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 99. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 100. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 101. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 102. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 103. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 104. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 105. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.

- 106. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 107. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 108. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 109. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 110. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.
- 111. MS BURKE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its continued promotion of innovation in public housing and its commitment to providing diverse solutions to Victoria's changing housing needs.
- 112. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its strategic approach to the development of the communications and multi-media sector in Victoria.
- 113. ### NOTICES OF MOTION

- 1. **MR MILDENHALL** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its education policies which have resulted in (a) increased class sizes in primary and secondary schools; (b) the loss of specialist teachers; (c) a decline in Year 12 retention rates; and (d) huge differences in educational outcomes between regions.
- 2. MR COOPER To move, That this House, while regretting the lack of genuine policy commitment by the Labor Party to transport issues, congratulates the Government on its transport achievements during its first term in office and applauds the commitments to further improve the transport system in Victoria during the coming four years as outlined in the Public Transport Policy of the Coalition published in March 1996.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for mismanaging the Child Protection system and for ignoring expert advice on Child Protection.

- 6. - 7. - 71. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 72. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 73. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 74. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 75. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 76. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 77. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 78. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 79. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests;

- (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 80. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 81. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 82. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13

- May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- 83. MR LONEY - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 84. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 85. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 86. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.

- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 88 guestions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 89. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 90. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his

- family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the *Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act* 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 91. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 92. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 93. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.

- 72. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 73. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 74. **MR BATCHELOR** To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 75. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 76. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 77. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 78. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests;

- (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 79. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 80. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 81. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13

- May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 82. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 83. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 84. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 85. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant

information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

- 87. MRS CAMPBELL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 88. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 89. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.

- 90. MR MILDENHALL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 91. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 92. **MR SMITH** (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 93. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 94. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 95. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.

- 96. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.

- MR COOPER To move, That this House, while regretting the lack of genuine policy
  commitment by the Labor Party to transport issues, congratulates the Government on
  its transport achievements during its first term in office and applauds the commitments
  to further improve the transport system in Victoria during the coming four years as
  outlined in the Public Transport Policy of the Coalition published in March 1996.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for mismanaging the Child Protection system and for ignoring expert advice on Child Protection.
- MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on the improvements to roads in all parts of Victoria and its highly successful Better Roads Program.

- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 78. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 79. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 80. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions - (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares - one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 - in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 81. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 82. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 83. - 90. MR MILDENHALL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 91. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.
- 5. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b) emphasising standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress; and (c) highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 6. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.
- MR RYAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the many initiatives it has pursued to encourage economic development in country Victoria.

- 8. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House acknowledges rural Victoria's huge contribution to the Victorian economy and notes with concern the Government's lack of support for rural industries and communities as evidenced by its (a) lack of encouragement for economic development in country Victoria; (b) decision to end the uniform electricity tariff, leading to higher electricity charges for farmers and rural consumers; (c) privatisation and downsizing of four Government regional veterinary laboratories; (d) closure of rural schools and hospitals; (e) failure to take effective action to prevent country people paying significantly more for petrol than Melbourne residents; (f) closure of 6 passenger rail services in country Victoria; (g) failure to develop effective transport linkages to export markets, in particular its failure to ensure effective reforms and improvements are made to the operation of the Port of Melbourne; and (h) lack of adequate direction and support for the Victorian wool industry.
- 9. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for fostering co-operation between schools, TAFE institutes, private providers and universities to maximise credit transfer and course articulation arrangements, so that students can move from one sector to another with recognition for previous study.
- 10. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning and Local Government and the Kennett Government for (a) substituting Ministerial discretion for the planning process; (b) undermining public participation and public accountability in the planning process; (c) intervening in the planning process to the long-term detriment of Melbourne and its urban amenity; (d) ignoring and weakening environmental assessment mechanisms; and (e) allowing the ad-hoc subdivision of valuable parts of Victoria's environmental assets.
- 11. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and Minister for Sport for the continuing foresight and initiative shown in ensuring that State sporting facilities are of a suitable standard to capitalise on acclimatisation and training of our own and overseas athletes in preparation for the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games, and to successfully attract and conduct major sporting events which will further showcase Melbourne and maintain its status as the sporting capital.
- 12. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent, accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- 13. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.

- 14. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.
- 15. MR McGRATH (Warrnambool) To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to the principles of the framework for delivery of psychiatric services in this State, and also for recognising the enormous contribution potential of the consumers and carers in policy and guidelines development in the area of mental health.
- 16. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House notes the report of the Standing Orders Committee 1992 and changes in other Parliaments in other States and Territories to improve the effectiveness of Parliament and to increase opportunities for broader Parliamentary debate and scrutiny, and calls on the Parliament to amend the Sessional and Standing Orders to achieve (a) a more responsible and accountable Question Time of one hours duration each sitting day; and (b) more time for Opposition and Private Members' Business in the House by (i) shifting Grievances from Wednesdays to Thursdays; (ii) introducing 90 second statements; (iii) allowing extensions of time on the adjournment where a member's time has been unreasonably infringed; and (iv) allowing full debate on all Bills unless the Opposition agrees to the guillotine.
- 17. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- 18. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its continuing attacks on the basic democratic rights of Victorians and calls on the Government to amend the Constitution Act 1975 to guarantee the separation of powers and entrench other key democratic rights and safeguards.
- 19. **MR WELLS** To move, That this House congratulates this Government for the steps it has taken to assist disadvantaged and homeless youth in the State of Victoria.
- 20. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its cuts and mismanagement of the public hospital system which has led to long waiting lists and delays in treatment for patients.
- 21. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government for its initiative to spend \$1 billion on school facilities over the next four years.
- 22. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House notes that during the election campaign the Kennett Government made the following promises to the people of Victoria (a) to create 150,000 new jobs in Victoria; (b) to retain Victoria's water industry assets in public ownership; and (c) to not implement any plans for large-scale reduction in public sector jobs and calls on the Government to honour these promises.

- 23. MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Government on its housing policy with particular reference to the continuing efficient management and maintenance of public housing.
- 24. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 25. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 26. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 27. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.
- 28. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 29. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 30. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- 31. MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program of prison privatisation.
- 32. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 33. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- 34. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.

- 35. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 36. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 37. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 38. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 39. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 40. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 41. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 42. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 43. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 44. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 45. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.

- 46. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 47. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 48. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 49. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 50. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 51. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 52. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 53. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 54. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 55. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 56. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 57. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.

- 58. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 59. **MR PATERSON** To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 60. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 61. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 62. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 63. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 64. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 65. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 66. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 67. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 68. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 69. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.

- 70. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 71. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 72. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 73. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 74. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 75. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 76. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 77. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 78. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests;

- (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 79. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 80. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 81. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13

- May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 82. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 83. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 84. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 85. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant

### **GENERAL BUSINESS**

### NOTICES OF MOTION

 MR THWAITES - To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for mismanaging the Child Protection system and for ignoring expert advice on Child Protection.

New Entry.

- MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on the improvements to roads in all parts of Victoria and its highly successful Better Roads Program.
- 3. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.
- 4. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b) emphasising standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress; and (c) highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 5. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.
- 6. **MR RYAN** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the many initiatives it has pursued to encourage economic development in country Victoria.
- 7. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House acknowledges rural Victoria's huge contribution to the Victorian economy and notes with concern the Government's lack of support for rural industries and communities as evidenced by its (a) lack of encouragement for economic development in country Victoria; (b) decision to end the uniform electricity tariff, leading to higher electricity charges for farmers and rural consumers; (c) privatisation and downsizing of four Government regional veterinary laboratories; (d) closure of rural schools and hospitals; (e) failure to take effective action to prevent country people paying significantly more for petrol than Melbourne residents; (f) closure of 6 passenger rail services in country Victoria; (g) failure to develop effective transport linkages to export markets, in particular its failure to ensure effective reforms and improvements are made to the operation of the Port of Melbourne; and (h) lack of adequate direction and support for the Victorian wool industry.
- 8. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for fostering co-operation between schools, TAFE institutes, private providers and universities to maximise credit transfer and course articulation arrangements, so that students can move from one sector to another with recognition for previous study.

- 9. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning and Local Government and the Kennett Government for (a) substituting Ministerial discretion for the planning process; (b) undermining public participation and public accountability in the planning process; (c) intervening in the planning process to the long-term detriment of Melbourne and its urban amenity; (d) ignoring and weakening environmental assessment mechanisms; and (e) allowing the ad-hoc subdivision of valuable parts of Victoria's environmental assets.
- 10. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and Minister for Sport for the continuing foresight and initiative shown in ensuring that State sporting facilities are of a suitable standard to capitalise on acclimatisation and training of our own and overseas athletes in preparation for the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games, and to successfully attract and conduct major sporting events which will further showcase Melbourne and maintain its status as the sporting capital.
- 11. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent, accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.
- 13. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.
- 14. MR McGRATH (Warrnambool) To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to the principles of the framework for delivery of psychiatric services in this State, and also for recognising the enormous contribution potential of the consumers and carers in policy and guidelines development in the area of mental health.

MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- 17. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its continuing attacks on the basic democratic rights of Victorians and calls on the Government to amend the *Constitution Act* 1975 to guarantee the separation of powers and entrench other key democratic rights and safeguards.
- 18. **MR WELLS -** To move, That this House congratulates this Government for the steps it has taken to assist disadvantaged and homeless youth in the State of Victoria.
- 19. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its cuts and mismanagement of the public hospital system which has led to long waiting lists and delays in treatment for patients.

- 26. **MR PATERSON** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.

- 27. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.

- 72. - 74. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 75. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 76. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 77. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 78. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.

- 79. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 80. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 81. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 82. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant

information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.

- 83. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.

MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning and Local Government and the Kennett Government for (a) substituting Ministerial discretion for the planning process; (b) undermining public participation and public accountability in the planning process; (c) intervening in the planning process to the long-term detriment of Melbourne and its urban amenity; (d) ignoring and weakening environmental assessment mechanisms; and (e) allowing the ad-hoc subdivision of valuable parts of Victoria's environmental assets.
- 10. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and Minister for Sport for the continuing foresight and initiative shown in ensuring that State sporting facilities are of a suitable standard to capitalise on acclimatisation and training of our own and overseas athletes in preparation for the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games, and to successfully attract and conduct major sporting events which will further showcase Melbourne and maintain its status as the sporting capital.
- 11. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent, accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.
- 13. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.
- 14. MR McGRATH (Warrnambool) To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to the principles of the framework for delivery of psychiatric services in this State, and also for recognising the enormous contribution potential of the consumers and carers in policy and guidelines development in the area of mental health.
- 15. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House notes the report of the Standing Orders Committee 1992 and changes in other Parliaments in other States and Territories to improve the effectiveness of Parliament and to increase opportunities for broader Parliamentary debate and scrutiny, and calls on the Parliament to amend the Sessional and Standing Orders to achieve (a) a more responsible and accountable Question Time of one hours duration each sitting day; and (b) more time for Opposition and Private Members' Business in the House by (i) shifting Grievances from Wednesdays to Thursdays; (ii) introducing 90 second statements; (iii) allowing extensions of time on the adjournment where a member's time has been unreasonably infringed; and (iv) allowing full debate on all Bills unless the Opposition agrees to the guillotine.

- 16. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.
- 17. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its continuing attacks on the basic democratic rights of Victorians and calls on the Government to amend the *Constitution Act* 1975 to guarantee the separation of powers and entrench other key democratic rights and safeguards.
- 18. **MR WELLS** To move, That this House congratulates this Government for the steps it has taken to assist disadvantaged and homeless youth in the State of Victoria.
- 19. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its cuts and mismanagement of the public hospital system which has led to long waiting lists and delays in treatment for patients.
- 20. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government for its initiative to spend \$1 billion on school facilities over the next four years.
- 21. **MR BRUMBY** To move, That this House notes that during the election campaign the Kennett Government made the following promises to the people of Victoria (a) to create 150,000 new jobs in Victoria; (b) to retain Victoria's water industry assets in public ownership; and (c) to not implement any plans for large-scale reduction in public sector jobs and calls on the Government to honour these promises.
- 22. MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Government on its housing policy with particular reference to the continuing efficient management and maintenance of public housing.
- 23. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 24. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 25. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 26. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.

- 27. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 28. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 29. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program
  of prison privatisation.
- 31. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 32. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- 33. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 34. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 35. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 36. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 37. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 38. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.

- 39. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 40. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 41. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 42. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 43. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 44. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 45. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 46. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 47. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 48. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 49. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 50. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.

- 51. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 52. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 53. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 54. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 55. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 56. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 57. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 58. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 59. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 60. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 62. **MR SPRY** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 63. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.

- 64. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 65. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 66. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 67. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 68. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 69. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 70. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 71. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 72. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 73. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.

- 74. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 75. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 76. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 77. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 78. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 79. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions - (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares - one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 - in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 80. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 81. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 82. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to

- obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 83. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 84. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 85. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 86. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.

- 87. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 88. - MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 89. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.

## NOTICES OF MOTION

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for mismanaging the Child Protection system and for ignoring expert advice on Child Protection.
- MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on the improvements to roads in all parts of Victoria and its highly successful Better Roads Program.
- 3. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.
- 4. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b) emphasising standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress; and (c) highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 5. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.
- 6. MR RYAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the many initiatives it has pursued to encourage economic development in country Victoria.

MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 24. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 25. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 26. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.
- 27. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 28. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 29. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program
  of prison privatisation.
- MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 32. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 34. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.

- 35. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.

- 40. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 41. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 42. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 43. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 44. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 45. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 46. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.

- 47. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 48. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 49. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 50. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 51. **MR DOLLIS** To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 52. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 54. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 55. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 56. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 57. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 58. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.

MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.

MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.

- 70. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.

- 71. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 72. - 75. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 76. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 77. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.

- 78. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 79. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 80. MR THWAITES - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- 81. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development

arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.

- 82. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 83. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 84. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 85. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there

- was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 86. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 87. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 88. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- 89. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the

announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.

- 90. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 91. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 93. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 95. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 96. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.

- 97. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 98. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 99. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 100. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House notes the report of the Standing Orders Committee 1992 and changes in other Parliaments in other States and Territories to improve the effectiveness of Parliament and to increase opportunities for broader Parliamentary debate and scrutiny, and calls on the Parliament to amend the Sessional and Standing Orders to achieve (a) a more responsible and accountable Question Time of one hours duration each sitting day; and (b) more time for Opposition and Private Members' Business in the House by (i) shifting Grievances from Wednesdays to Thursdays; (ii) introducing 90 second statements; (iii) allowing extensions of time on the adjournment where a member's time has been unreasonably infringed; and (iv) allowing full debate on all Bills unless the Opposition agrees to the guillotine.
- 15. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province by-election in 1985 by orchestrating a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the by-election; (b) further notes the refusal of the Honourable Member for Thomastown to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal and now calls on the Honourable Member to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members' involvement in this corrupt incident; and (c) calls on all members of the Opposition to publicly disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown and to support the demand that he disclose to the House the facts relating to his involvement in this gross abuse of the electoral system.

- 16. **MR BRUMBY** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its continuing attacks on the basic democratic rights of Victorians and calls on the Government to amend the *Constitution Act* 1975 to guarantee the separation of powers and entrench other key democratic rights and safeguards.
- 17. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates this Government for the steps it has taken to assist disadvantaged and homeless youth in the State of Victoria.
- 18. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its cuts and mismanagement of the public hospital system which has led to long waiting lists and delays in treatment for patients.
- 19. **MR KILGOUR** To move, That this House commends the Government for its initiative to spend \$1 billion on school facilities over the next four years.
- 20. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House notes that during the election campaign the Kennett Government made the following promises to the people of Victoria (a) to create 150,000 new jobs in Victoria; (b) to retain Victoria's water industry assets in public ownership; and (c) to not implement any plans for large-scale reduction in public sector jobs and calls on the Government to honour these promises.
- MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Government on its housing policy
  with particular reference to the continuing efficient management and maintenance of
  public housing.
- 22. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 24. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 25. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.
- 26. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 27. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 28. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.

- 29. MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program of prison privatisation.
- 30. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 31. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- 32. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 33. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 34. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 36. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 37. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 38. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 39. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.

- 40. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 41. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 42. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 43. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 44. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 45. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 46. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 47. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 48. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 49. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 50. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 51. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.

- 52. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 53. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 54. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 55. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 56. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 57. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 58. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 59. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 60. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 61. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 62. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 63. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 64. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.

- 65. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 66. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 67. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 68. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 69. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 70. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 71. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 73. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.

- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 75. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 76. MR HULLS - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 77. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 78. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the

Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (*d*) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- 79. MR THWAITES - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 80. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 81. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.

- 82. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 83. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 84. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 85. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.

- 86. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 87. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- 88. MR MILDENHALL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 89. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.

- 90. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.

MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 34. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 35. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 36. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 37. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 38. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.

- 39. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 40. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 41. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 42. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 43. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 44. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 45. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 46. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 47. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 48. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 49. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 50. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.

- 51. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 52. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 53. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 54. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 55. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 56. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 57. **MR PATERSON** To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 58. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 59. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 60. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 61. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 62. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.

- 63. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 64. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 65. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 66. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 67. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 68. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 69. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 70. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 71. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 72. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.

- 73. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 75. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 76. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 77. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 78. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions - (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares - one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 - in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- 79. MR THWAITES - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- 80. MR LONEY - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 81. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make"

improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.

- 82. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 83. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 84. MR HULLS - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- 85. MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in

- light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 86. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 87. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 88. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 89. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is

- aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 90. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 91. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 92. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 93. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 94. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 95. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 96. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 97. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 98. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.

- 99. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 100. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 101. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 102. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- 103. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 104. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.

## NOTICES OF MOTION

- MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on the improvements to roads in all parts of Victoria and its highly successful Better Roads Program.
- 2. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.

MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 53. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 54. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 55. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 56. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 57. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 58. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 59. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.

- 60. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 61. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 62. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 63. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 64. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 65. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 66. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 67. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 68. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 69. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 70. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 71. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition

Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless by-elections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.

- 72. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 73. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 75. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 76. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 77. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when

the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.

- 78. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- 80. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business

- dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 81. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 82. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 83. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 84. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- 85. MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.

- 86. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 87. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 88. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.

- 89. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 90. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 91. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 92. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 93. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 94. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 95. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 96. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.

MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.

MR BATCHELOR - To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because - (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government - (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34

- 34. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 35. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 36. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 37. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 38. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.

- 39. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 40. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 41. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 42. **MR WELLS -** To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 43. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 44. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.

- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. **MR BRACKS** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 59. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.

- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. **MR PLOWMAN** (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless by elections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the

- residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 75. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr

Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 78. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the

Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that - (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.

- 82. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 84. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co

Ltd in accordance with the *Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act* 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.

- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 87. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.

- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.

- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- 102. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.

contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anticompetitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and
taxpayers because - (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial
roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows

Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government - (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.

- 2. - 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.

- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. **MR ASHLEY -** To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 59. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.

- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.

- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 75. MR HULLS - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions - (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares - one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 - in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 78. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make"

- improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 82. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- 84. MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in

- light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 87. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading, and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is

- aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.

- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- 102. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.

- 107. MS BURKE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its continued promotion of innovation in public housing and its commitment to providing diverse solutions to Victoria's changing housing needs.
- 108. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its strategic approach to the development of the communications and multi-media sector in Victoria.
- 109. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the development of (i) a comprehensive strategy to combat the use and abuse of illicit drugs, particularly by young Victorians, and (ii) a network of drug and alcohol free entertainment venues designed to give teenagers under 18 years of age a safe, secure and drug free alternative to pubs and clubs.
- 110. **MS McCALL** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for positioning Victoria as the leading tourist destination in Australia.
- 111. MR JENKINS To move, That this House congratulates the Government for attracting new investment in the Victorian economy which will produce more long-term, sustainable jobs.
- 112. MR McLELLAN (Frankston East) To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing young people with the opportunity to develop life skills and leadership potential through the establishment of the Victorian Youth Development Program and other initiatives.
- 113. MR ELDER To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Footscray for deliberately misleading the House during Question Time on Tuesday, 12 November 1996 when he falsely asserted that the Minister for Education had (i) threatened schools which the Member for Footscray said were targeted for closure when no schools have been targeted for closure by the Minister; and (ii) also indicated schools will "be accorded the lowest priority for discretionary major maintenance and refurbishment funds" when the Minister has never done so; and (b) questions the Member's motives given that the Member for Footscray is a former shadow Attorney-General and should know that the allocation of resources by the Department of Education and the priority of school funding is not based on matters which amount to discrimination on account of age, impairment, industrial activity or lawful sexual activity under section 6 of the Equal Opportunity Act 1995.
- 114. - 43. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 44. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.

- 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. **MR BRACKS** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. **MR ASHLEY -** To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.

- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 59. **MR THWAITES -** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.

- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. **MR BATCHELOR** To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 75. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines

- licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 78. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and

his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.

- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 82. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 83. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should

invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

- 84. MRS CAMPBELL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- 87. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.

- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. **MR SMITH** (*Glen Waverley*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.

- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- 102. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.

- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.
- 107. MS BURKE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its continued promotion of innovation in public housing and its commitment to providing diverse solutions to Victoria's changing housing needs.
- 108. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its strategic approach to the development of the communications and multi-media sector in Victoria.
- 109. **MR LUPTON** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the development of (i) a comprehensive strategy to combat the use and abuse of illicit drugs, particularly by young Victorians, and (ii) a network of drug and alcohol free entertainment venues designed to give teenagers under 18 years of age a safe, secure and drug free alternative to pubs and clubs.
- 110. **MS McCALL** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for positioning Victoria as the leading tourist destination in Australia.
- 111. MR JENKINS To move, That this House congratulates the Government for attracting new investment in the Victorian economy which will produce more long-term, sustainable jobs.
- 112. MR McLELLAN (Frankston East) To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing young people with the opportunity to develop life skills and leadership potential through the establishment of the Victorian Youth Development Program and other initiatives.
- 113. MR ELDER To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Footscray for deliberately misleading the House during Question Time on Tuesday, 12 November 1996 when he falsely asserted that the Minister for Education had (i) threatened schools which the Member for Footscray said were targeted for closure when no schools have been targeted for closure by the Minister; and (ii) also indicated schools will "be accorded the lowest priority for discretionary major maintenance and refurbishment funds" when the Minister has never done so; and (b) questions the Member's motives given that the Member for Footscray is a former shadow Attorney-General and should know that the allocation of resources by the Department of Education and the priority

- of school funding is not based on matters which amount to discrimination on account of age, impairment, industrial activity or lawful sexual activity under section 6 of the *Equal Opportunity Act* 1995.
- 114. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.

MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 40. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 41. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 42. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 43. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 44. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.

- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.

- 59. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.

- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. **MR BATCHELOR** To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. **MRS MADDIGAN** To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 75. MR HULLS - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in

the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.

- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 78. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- 79. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's

decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.

- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 82. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

- 84. MRS CAMPBELL - To move. That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- 87. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month

- period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.

- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- 102. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.

- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.
- 107. MS BURKE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its continued promotion of innovation in public housing and its commitment to providing diverse solutions to Victoria's changing housing needs.
- 108. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its strategic approach to the development of the communications and multi-media sector in Victoria.
- 109. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the development of (i) a comprehensive strategy to combat the use and abuse of illicit drugs, particularly by young Victorians, and (ii) a network of drug and alcohol free entertainment venues designed to give teenagers under 18 years of age a safe, secure and drug free alternative to pubs and clubs.
- 110. MS McCALL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for positioning Victoria as the leading tourist destination in Australia.
- 111. MR JENKINS To move, That this House congratulates the Government for attracting new investment in the Victorian economy which will produce more long-term, sustainable jobs.
- 112. MR McLELLAN (Frankston East) To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing young people with the opportunity to develop life skills and leadership potential through the establishment of the Victorian Youth Development Program and other initiatives.
- 113. MR ELDER To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Footscray for deliberately misleading the House during Question Time on Tuesday, 12 November 1996 when he falsely asserted that the Minister for Education had (i) threatened schools which the Member for Footscray said were targeted for closure when no schools have been targeted for closure by the Minister; and (ii) also indicated schools will "be accorded the lowest priority for discretionary major maintenance and refurbishment funds" when the Minister has never done so; and (b) questions the Member's motives given that the Member for Footscray is a former shadow Attorney-General and should know that the allocation of resources by the Department of Education and the priority of school funding is not based on matters which amount to discrimination on account of age, impairment, industrial activity or lawful sexual activity under section 6 of the Equal Opportunity Act 1995.

MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.
- 2. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b) emphasising standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress; and (c) highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 3. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.
- 4. MR RYAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the many initiatives it has pursued to encourage economic development in country Victoria.
- 5. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for fostering co-operation between schools, TAFE institutes, private providers and universities to maximise credit transfer and course articulation arrangements, so that students can move from one sector to another with recognition for previous study.

- 33. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 34. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 35. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 36. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 37. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 38. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 39. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 40. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 41. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 42. **MR WELLS** To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 43. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 44. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.

- 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.

- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 59. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.

- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. **MR PLOWMAN** (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. **MR BATCHELOR** To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 75. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines

- licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 78. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.

- 79. MR LONEY - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 82. **MR SMITH** (*Glen Waverley*) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 83. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that

his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 84. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.

- 87. MR MILDENHALL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.

- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.

- 102. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.

# LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF VICTORIA

## GENERAL BUSINESS

### NOTICES OF MOTION

- 1. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Government for entering a contract with the Transurban consortium for the City Link project which is anti-competitive and places an unacceptable financial burden on Victorian motorists and taxpayers because (a) the contract requires the closure or narrowing of major arterial roads in Melbourne so as to force cars onto the City Link tollway, and allows Transurban to claim compensation from the Government if any of these traffic measures are removed; (b) the contract requires Transurban to be compensated for lost tollway revenue if, amongst other things, the Government (i) upgrades alternative roads; (ii) builds a rapid transit link to Tullamarine Airport; and (iii) upgrades other alternative transport routes to City Link; and (c) the contract requires motorists to pay tolls for 34 years, at a total cost of about \$7 billion, whereas the actual construction cost of City Link is \$1.2 billion.
- 2. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Education for (a) initiating positive moves to improve curriculum at all school levels so as to ensure standards of education and practices are world best; (b) emphasising standardised testing of students at secondary level so that all parents are kept informed of their children's progress; and (c) highlighting the importance of the role of dedicated teachers and for supporting their professional standing in our community.
- 3. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.
- 4. MR RYAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the many initiatives it has pursued to encourage economic development in country Victoria.
- 5. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House acknowledges rural Victoria's huge contribution to the Victorian economy and notes with concern the Government's lack of support for rural industries and communities as evidenced by its (a) lack of encouragement for economic development in country Victoria; (b) decision to end the uniform electricity tariff, leading to higher electricity charges for farmers and rural consumers; (c) privatisation and downsizing of four Government regional veterinary laboratories; (d) closure of rural schools and hospitals; (e) failure to take effective action to prevent country people paying significantly more for petrol than Melbourne residents; (f) closure of 6 passenger rail services in country Victoria; (g) failure to develop effective transport linkages to export markets, in particular its failure to ensure effective reforms

- and improvements are made to the operation of the Port of Melbourne; and (h) lack of adequate direction and support for the Victorian wool industry.
- 6. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for fostering co-operation between schools, TAFE institutes, private providers and universities to maximise credit transfer and course articulation arrangements, so that students can move from one sector to another with recognition for previous study.
- 7. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning and Local Government and the Kennett Government for (a) substituting Ministerial discretion for the planning process; (b) undermining public participation and public accountability in the planning process; (c) intervening in the planning process to the long-term detriment of Melbourne and its urban amenity; (d) ignoring and weakening environmental assessment mechanisms; and (e) allowing the ad-hoc subdivision of valuable parts of Victoria's environmental assets.

MR BRUMBY To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce measures to bring about a more transparent, accountable and fair electoral system and calls on the Government to introduce (a) legislation requiring full disclosure of all donations to all political parties to stem the use of trust funds like the Free Enterprise Foundation and the Cormack Foundation to hide the source of donations to the Liberal and National Parties; (b) legislation based on the provisions of the Commonwealth Electoral Act 1918 to provide for the financing of political parties to mitigate against corruption in the political fund raising process and to ensure equitable access to paid media during election campaigns; (c) truth-in-advertising legislation to prohibit the publication and distribution of untrue misleading or deceptive election advertisements in election periods; and (d) legislation regulating advertising during election periods by privatised utilities and other companies relying on government licences or contracts.
- MR KILGOUR To move, That this House applauds the Government for its recognition of the food industry and the support given to the salinity program and other food growing initiatives.
- 11. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House, noting the continuing and unacceptably high level of youth unemployment, calls on the Government to convene an immediate Youth Jobs Summit and develop concrete proposals to significantly reduce youth unemployment levels.

- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. MR PLOWMAN (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition

Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless by-elections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.

- 71. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 75. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when

the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.

- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 78. MR THWAITES - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- 79. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business

- dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the *Electricity Industry Act* 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 82. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 83. MR HULLS - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- 84. MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.

- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- 87. MR MILDENHALL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.

- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.

- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- 102. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.

- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.
- 107. MS BURKE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its continued promotion of innovation in public housing and its commitment to providing diverse solutions to Victoria's changing housing needs.
- 108. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its strategic approach to the development of the communications and multi-media sector in Victoria.
- 109. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the development of (i) a comprehensive strategy to combat the use and abuse of illicit drugs, particularly by young Victorians, and (ii) a network of drug and alcohol free entertainment venues designed to give teenagers under 18 years of age a safe, secure and drug free alternative to pubs and clubs.
- 110. MS McCALL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for positioning Victoria as the leading tourist destination in Australia.
- 111. MR JENKINS To move, That this House congratulates the Government for attracting new investment in the Victorian economy which will produce more long-term, sustainable jobs.
- 112. MR McLELLAN (Frankston East) To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing young people with the opportunity to develop life skills and leadership potential through the establishment of the Victorian Youth Development Program and other initiatives.
- 113. MR ELDER To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Footscray for deliberately misleading the House during Question Time on Tuesday, 12 November 1996 when he falsely asserted that the Minister for Education had (i) threatened schools which the Member for Footscray said were targeted for closure when no schools have been targeted for closure by the Minister; and (ii) also indicated schools will "be accorded the lowest priority for discretionary major maintenance and refurbishment funds" when the Minister has never done so; and (b) questions the Member's motives given that the Member for Footscray is a former shadow Attorney-General and should know that the allocation of resources by the Department of Education and the priority of school funding is not based on matters which amount to discrimination on account of age, impairment, industrial activity or lawful sexual activity under section 6 of the Equal Opportunity Act 1995.
- 114. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the failure of the government to institute a Ministerial Code of Conduct or enforce proper standards of ministerial behaviour as evidenced by (a) the abject failure of the Attorney-General to resign over a massive conflict of interest in relation to her ownership of BHP shares while being involved in decision dealing with BHP; (b) the failure of the Minister for Conservation and Land Management to resign over a blatant conflict of interest in relation to her ERG shares;

- and (c) the continuing failure of the Premier to resign over his flagrant conflict of interest in relation to his family's ownership of shares in companies that were involved in deals with the Government.
- 115. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for it's waste and mismanagement in it's excessive use of consultants.
- 116. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government over the massive breach of it's election promise in announcing the proposed merger of up to 113 schools in Victoria, and in particular that the rights of schools to remain open are being trampled by a Government intent on forcing schools to merge or face massive financial disadvantages.
- 117. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 22. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 23. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 24. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.
- 25. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 26. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 27. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- 28. **MR TRAYNOR -** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program of prison privatisation.
- MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 30. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- 31. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 32. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.

- 33. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 34. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 35. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 36. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 37. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 38. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 39. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 40. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 41. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 42. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 43. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 44. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.

- 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT -** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.

- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 59. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. **MR SPRY** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. **MS GARBUTT -** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.

- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. **MR PLOWMAN** (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- 75. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines

licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.

- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 78. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 82. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 83. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that

his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.

- MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 84. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.

- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 87. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. **MR SMITH** (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.

- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.

- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.

MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the failure of the government to institute a Ministerial Code of Conduct or enforce proper standards of ministerial behaviour as evidenced by (a) the abject failure of the Attorney-General to resign over a massive conflict of interest in relation to her ownership of BHP shares while being involved in decision dealing with BHP; (b) the failure of the Minister for Conservation and Land Management to resign over a blatant conflict of interest in relation to her ERG shares; and (c) the continuing failure of the Premier to resign over his flagrant conflict of interest in relation to his family's ownership of shares in companies that were involved in deals with the Government.
- 115. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for it's waste and mismanagement in it's excessive use of consultants.
- 116. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government over the massive breach of it's election promise in announcing the proposed merger of up to 113 schools in Victoria, and in particular that the rights of schools to remain open are being trampled by a Government intent on forcing schools to merge or face massive financial disadvantages.

  with particular reference to the continuing efficient management and maintenance of
  public housing.
- 21. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 22. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 23. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 24. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.

- 25. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 26. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 27. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- 28. MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program of prison privatisation.
- MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.
- 30. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- 31. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 32. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 33. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 34. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 35. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 36. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.

- 37. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 38. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 39. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 40. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.
- 41. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 42. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 43. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 44. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.

- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.
- 53. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- 59. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.

- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.
- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. **MR PLOWMAN** (*Benambra*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.

- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 75. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the

following questions - (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares - one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 - in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.

- 78. MR THWAITES - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares, whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the Today Tonight show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make"

- improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.
- 82. MR SMITH (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 83. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- 84. MRS CAMPBELL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in

- light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 87. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is

- aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. **MR SMITH** (*Glen Waverley*) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.
- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 93. **MR PATERSON** To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.

- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.
- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.

- 107. MS BURKE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its continued promotion of innovation in public housing and its commitment to providing diverse solutions to Victoria's changing housing needs.
- 108. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its strategic approach to the development of the communications and multi-media sector in Victoria.
- 109. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the development of (i) a comprehensive strategy to combat the use and abuse of illicit drugs, particularly by young Victorians, and (ii) a network of drug and alcohol free entertainment venues designed to give teenagers under 18 years of age a safe, secure and drug free alternative to pubs and clubs.
- 110. **MS McCALL** To move, That this House congratulates the Government for positioning Victoria as the leading tourist destination in Australia.
- 111. MR JENKINS To move, That this House congratulates the Government for attracting new investment in the Victorian economy which will produce more long-term, sustainable jobs.
- 112. MR McLELLAN (Frankston East) To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing young people with the opportunity to develop life skills and leadership potential through the establishment of the Victorian Youth Development Program and other initiatives.

MR ELDER To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Footscray for deliberately misleading the House during Question Time on Tuesday, 12 November 1996 when he falsely asserted that the Minister for Education had (i) threatened schools which the Member for Footscray said were targeted for closure when no schools have been targeted for closure by the Minister; and (ii) also indicated schools will "be accorded the lowest priority for discretionary major maintenance and refurbishment funds" when the Minister has never done so; and (b) questions the Member's motives given that the Member for Footscray is a former shadow Attorney-General and should know that the allocation of resources by the Department of Education and the priority of school funding is not based on matters which amount to discrimination on account of age, impairment, industrial activity or lawful sexual activity under section 6 of the Equal Opportunity Act 1995.
- 114. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the failure of the government to institute a Ministerial Code of Conduct or enforce proper standards of ministerial behaviour as evidenced by (a) the abject failure of the Attorney-General to resign over a massive conflict of interest in relation to her ownership of BHP shares while being involved in decision dealing with BHP; (b) the failure of the Minister for Conservation and Land Management to resign over a blatant conflict of interest in relation to her ERG shares; and (c) the continuing failure of the Premier to resign over his flagrant conflict of interest in relation to his family's ownership of shares in companies that were involved in deals with the Government.
- 115. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for it's waste and mismanagement in it's excessive use of consultants.

- 116. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government over the massive breach of it's election promise in announcing the proposed merger of up to 113 schools in Victoria, and in particular that the rights of schools to remain open are being trampled by a Government intent on forcing schools to merge or face massive financial disadvantages.
- 117. MR THWAITES To move, That this House, noting the severe problems with Victoria's Child Protection Service, the failure of the Minister for Community Services to properly manage his portfolio and the fact that the Government has repeatedly ignored the advice of experts for improvements to the system, calls on the Government to immediately institute a Royal Commission into the Child Protection Service in Victoria.
- 118. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect Mt Stirling from inappropriate downhill skiing development, including proposals for gondolas, cable cars, ski lifts and resort accommodation, despite the opposition of existing users, local groups, the Mansfield community and a great number of people from across Victoria, including over 20,000 who have petitioned Parliament.
- 119. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House confirms its belief in the separation of powers and the independence of the Auditor-General and believes that the interests of the Parliament and taxpayers are best served by an Auditor-General with a single independent voice with audit responsibility extending across the whole spectrum of government activity free from government influence or control and with a mandate to audit and investigate wherever and in whatever way deemed necessary to properly and fully scrutinise Government activity and provide unfettered, clear and independent advice to the Parliament.
- 120. - 3. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Government for (a) the mishandling of the casino tendering process; and (b) its "open slather" approach to gambling in Victoria, including inadequate industry standards, the failure to introduce an advertising code of conduct and insufficient support services for problem gamblers.

- 19. **MR BRUMBY** To move, That this House notes that during the election campaign the Kennett Government made the following promises to the people of Victoria (a) to create 150,000 new jobs in Victoria; (b) to retain Victoria's water industry assets in public ownership; and (c) to not implement any plans for large-scale reduction in public sector jobs and calls on the Government to honour these promises.
- MR SPRY To move, That this House commends the Government on its housing policy
  with particular reference to the continuing efficient management and maintenance of
  public housing.
- 21. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for its waste and mismanagement of millions of taxpayers' dollars, including unjustified expenditure on political advertising, and accordingly calls on the Government to establish proper standards for the dissemination of government advertisements by introducing legislation to prevent taxpayers' money being spent on political advertising by Government departments and authorities especially during election periods.
- 22. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent performance in the area of Aboriginal Affairs during its first term in office.
- 23. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House notes the disparity between petrol prices in the country and the city and calls on the Government to deliver on its election promise to take effective action to reduce petrol prices in rural Victoria.
- 24. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its support for Victoria's youth, with the successful introduction of regional youth committees.
- 25. **MR THWAITES** To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for (a) secretly privatising and contracting out ambulance services which has led to a crisis in the ambulance service; and (b) seeking to privatise public health services which will lead to higher costs and reduced access for Victorians.
- 26. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing gifted students with opportunities to reach their full potential.
- 27. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to retain all aspects of the State's water industry in public ownership so as to ensure the delivery of high-standard and affordable services to the people of Victoria.
- 28. MR TRAYNOR To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its program of prison privatisation.
- 29. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to amend the Employee Relations Act 1992 to provide for family leave consistent with the provisions of the Family Leave Test Case decision of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission, November 1995.

- 30. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Rural Development for the ongoing implementation of comprehensive programs and initiatives that recognise the particular economic strengths and advantages of regional/rural Victoria.
- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House supports the introduction of legislation to outlaw racial vilification.
- 32. MR CLARK To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training on establishing the VETNET Electronic Communications Network, linking all TAFE institutes, the Office of Training and Further Education and the Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre, to further improve communications in Victoria's state training system.
- 33. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect high conservation value old growth native forest from being exported as woodchip.
- 34. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government on actions it has taken to assist the farming industries and to provide better services in country Victoria.
- 35. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Government to introduce legislation to give the Employee Relations Commission of Victoria the power to regulate the wages and conditions of owner-drivers in the road transport industry.
- 36. MR WELLS To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for expanding the resources of Victoria's TAFE sector to improve access to technology and to provide better quality courses, particularly in regional areas.
- 37. MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Transport for failing to introduce automatic ticketing on the Met system in accordance with the timeline set out in the March 1993 tender specifications for the contract with the OneLink company, and notes that this three-year delay has cost taxpayers approximately \$120 million in lost Budget savings.
- 38. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its excellent record of monetary management and in turning the economy of this State around therefore giving opportunity for continued development.
- 39. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to adequately fund and resource the state training system as outlined in the original agreement establishing the Australian National Training Authority, thereby jeopardising Victoria's opportunity to be Australia's pre-eminent centre of manufacturing skills.
- 40. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its tourism initiatives, in particular, its award winning "You'll Love Every Piece Of Victoria" campaign.

- 41. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House calls on the Victorian Government to increase resources from the Community Support Fund for ethno-specific counselling services and bi-lingual counsellors for problem gamblers in this State's various ethnic communities.
- 42. MR WELLS To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Education for its initiatives in providing Victorian students and teachers with expanded opportunities in physical and sport education.
- 43. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the Victorian Coast and Port Phillip Bay from pollution particularly pollution entering the marine environment via the storm water drainage system.
- 44. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government for reducing small business costs and restoring confidence in the small business sector.
- 45. MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Premier for reappointing the Member for Kew as Minister for Fair Trading noting that between 1992 and 1996 she has been rated by consumer groups as being the equal worst Minister for Consumer Affairs in Australia.
- 46. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House commends the Government on its reform of the Education System which put schools back in the control of the principal and school council and provides students with the latest technology and testing procedures.
- 47. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its inactivity on Native Title rights for the Victorian Aboriginal community, and calls on the Government to become pro-active and provide leadership in demonstrating support for Kooris and progress in the process of reconciliation.
- 48. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Coalition Government on its commitment to disability services in Victoria and, further, the House notes the Government's dedication to the needs of the disadvantaged in our community.
- 49. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the appointment of the member for Pakenham to the Ministries of Planning and Local Government concurrently because of the inherent conflict of interest.
- 50. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its commitment to the young people of Victoria by its many initiatives including youth housing and its support of youth development officers, its central register for crisis beds and the excellent job it has done in restructuring services to ensure the best possible outcomes for the youth of Victoria.
- 51. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government's support of the Interpreter Card initiative while at the same time making cuts to language services, with the consequence that many people in the State's ethnic communities, have had to wait for unacceptable periods to access interpreters, thus denying them access and equity in Government service provision.
- 52. **MR PATERSON** To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its reforms to the State's pre-school and child care arrangements and welcomes the flexibility, equity and responsiveness achieved.

- 53. **MR BRACKS** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to put in place a comprehensive manufacturing industry policy for Victoria.
- 54. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for having negotiated with the Commonwealth a significant redevelopment of accommodation and support services for Victoria's homeless people.
- 55. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect the environment by properly implementing the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act* 1988 and delaying the release of the Flora and Fauna Guarantee Strategy.
- 56. MR PATERSON To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its disgraceful attempts to mislead the community over the Government's reform programme, particularly in the area of maternal and child health.
- 57. MR BRACKS To move, That this House calls on the Kennett Government to introduce legislation to ensure open, honest and accountable reporting of State finances, including a commitment to provide updates of the State's finances, Budget forward estimates and whole of Government financial reports when State elections are called.
- 58. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House commends the Government for recognising the importance of older Victorians to their communities and for enhancing the range of services available to them.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its unfair and discriminatory treatment of rural hospitals and health services.
- 60. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government for increasing the number of public rental properties by approximately 3,000 during its first term, clearly demonstrating its response to those in need in the Victorian community.
- 61. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Kennett Government for its breaches of the National Mental Health Strategy and its cuts and mismanagement of psychiatric services.
- 62. MR RICHARDSON To move, That this House commends the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for establishing an Open Training Market, using competitive tendering to allocate growth monies and so encouraging competition between public and private training providers.
- 63. **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to address Melbourne's chronic levels of air pollution despite clear evidence that people are becoming sick and dying from respiratory related illnesses.
- 64. MR PERRIN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the provision of world class public transport for the Grand Prix by successfully conducting the largest movement of people via the public transport service to a single sporting event over a four day period in this nation's history.
- 65. MR LEIGH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the highly successful Premium Station program which is developing the MET's 61 busiest stations so that they are staffed from the first to the last train, have vastly improved lighting with closed circuit television on platforms and station surrounds as well as enclosed fully serviced booking offices and waiting areas.

- 66. MR PHILLIPS To move, That the House commends the Government for the standardisation of the western grain lines and the lines between Ararat and Dunolly via Maryborough as well as the construction of a grain interchange at Dunolly to allow grain to be easily transferred from broad to standard gauge and vice-versa, in order to improve the efficient and flexible transportation of grain to Victoria's ports.
- 67. MR TREASURE To move, That this House commends V/Line Freight for achieving a 100% improvement in labour productivity in two years and subsequently being ranked by the Commonwealth Government's Bureau of Industry Economics as the world's most improved freight railway in recent years.
- 68. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the State Government on the policy decision to ban scallop dredging on Port Phillip Bay from 1997, which will further improve the environmental health of the bay.
- 69. MR PLOWMAN (Benambra) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its achievements in mental health, in particular those problems associated with cross border anomalies including compulsory admissions and treatment orders.
- 70. MR FINN To move, That this House (a) expresses concern at attempts by prominent Members of the Australian Labor Party to immediately remove large numbers of Opposition Members from this Parliament; (b) deplores the language used in a letter written by former Federal Member, Pete Steedman, which described various Opposition Members in this Parliament as "as thick as two bricks", "treacherous and a waste of space", "lazy and a Branch manipulator and stacker", "yesterday's man", and "a corruption of the Party's rules"; and (c) urges Opposition Members to strenuously resist all attempts for their forced resignations, thereby avoiding expensive and needless byelections, such as the ones conducted in the Fifty-second Parliament in the Electoral Districts of Williamstown, Broadmeadows and Coburg, and the three by-elections in the Electoral Province of Doutta Galla.
- 71. MR BATCHELOR To move, That the agreements amending the Melbourne City Link Agreement tabled in the House on 14 May 1996 be disallowed.
- 72. MR CAMERON To move, That this House calls on the Commissioners of the Shire of Mount Alexander not to dispose of community assets against the wishes of the people of the Shire, and requests them to immediately cease planning for the sale of community assets.
- 73. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the Commissioners of the City of Moonee Valley be condemned for their failure to accept the community's view that the city should have 12 councillors, in light of the fact that: (i) this was the majority view of the residents following a community consultation process undertaken at considerable expense to the residents of Moonee Valley; and (ii) at the public meetings held throughout the city, only one person supported the Council interim report's recommendation for 7 councillors.
- 74. MRS MADDIGAN To move, That the State Government be condemned for its decision to proceed immediately with the building of the new Museum, despite the fact that the general community, and the City of Melbourne Councillors are opposed to the Exhibition Buildings site.

- MR HULLS To move. That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 75. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions - (a) in view of the Premier's admission on 15 May 1996 that he bought shares in Guangdong Corporation Ltd "as sign of good faith and to encourage Chinese companies to list in Australia" why the Premier did not publicise his support by listing his shareholding in the Members of Parliament Register of Interests; (b) whether Mr Bruce Mathieson suggested the Premier invest in any other company floats being underwritten by Mr Mathieson's company, Sino Securities International; and (c) when Mr Bruce Mathieson approached the Premier some time prior to the listing of Guangdong Corporation in September 1993, whether the Premier was aware that the Government was considering increasing the number of gaming machines licences in Victoria and that the outcome of this decision would directly impact on Mr Mathieson.
- 76. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in view of the fact that the Government announced increases in the number of gaming machines in Victoria from 15,000 to 45,000 in the period between 6 September 1993, when the Premier met with Mr Richard Li and Mr Bruce Mathieson of Sino Securities to discuss Guangdong Corporation Ltd and 17 September 1993 when the Premier's family purchased 50,000 shares in Guangdong, whether the Premier acknowledges that his investment raises, at the very least, a perceived conflict of interest; (b) how long the Premier has known Mr Bruce Mathieson; (c) whether the Premier will provide details of his business dealings with Mr Bruce Mathieson; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in the Guangdong Corporation.
- 77. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) why the Premier made two applications for shares one for 20,000 and one for 80,000 in the Guangdong Corporation in September 1993; (b) whether the Premier was told at any time prior to purchasing shares in the Guangdong Corporation that the float was likely to be over-subscribed; (c) whether the Premier has ever had discussions with Mr Bruce Mathieson about Mr Mathieson's business activities in relation to poker machines; and (d) whether the Premier believes there is no conflict of interest in the purchase of shares in his wife's name in the Guangdong Corporation given that the shares were purchased with the assistance of Mr Bruce Mathieson at the same time as the Government was making major decisions about the gambling industry in Victoria.
- 78. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions (a) in light of the advice dated 13 September 1993 from Sino Securities International Ltd to the Australian Stock Exchange that the directors of Guangdong Corporation would be unlikely to accept any future applications for shares,

whether the Premier can explain that an application for shares in his wife's name was received, processed and accepted after this date, and indeed, is it not a fact that the only reason this occurred was because of the influence exerted by the Premier's friend and gaming machine king, Mr Bruce Mathieson; and further (b) whether the Premier can reconcile Mr Bruce Mathieson's statement on the *Today Tonight* show on 14 May 1996 that he had never in his life approached the Premier, or had any discussions with him in relation to shares, with the statement in the letter the Premier faxed to Channel 7 on 13 May 1996 which states that Bruce Mathieson approached him (the Premier) in 1993 about the public float of the Guangdong Corporation.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 79. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd - (a) whether the Premier was aware that HRL Ltd acquired the former research and development arm of the SECV in 1994 in a privatisation deal that was not put up for public tender in contravention of government guidelines; (b) whether the Premier was aware that the Government has a 40% shareholding in HRL Ltd through the shell of the SECV; (c) whether the Premier had any discussions with Kerry Stokes concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; (d) whether the Premier had any discussions with the Treasurer concerning HRL Ltd's decision to bail out Amskan; and (e) in view of the Premier's statement in the House on 15 May 1996 that there is no conflict of interest in shares that he owns provided the company concerned is not involved in any business dealings with the Government, whether the Premier will explain why the purchase of shares by his family in Amskan does not involve a conflict of interest.
- 80. MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all the relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd and whether the Premier is aware that the Electricity Industry Act 1996 has been amended to penalise employees of the newly created Office of the Chief Electrical Inspector who "make improper use of any information acquired only in the course of his or her duties to obtain directly or indirectly any pecuniary or other advantage for himself or herself or for any other person", and are Members of Parliament subject to the same prohibition.
- 81. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd: whether the Premier now considers he has a conflict of interest in respect of his family's shareholding in Amskan Ltd in view of the fact that (i) Amskan shareholders voted on Friday, 31 May 1996 to enter into a Deed of Company Arrangement with HRL Ltd; (ii) the Deed has resulted in a write down of the value of Amskan shares to allow HRL to buy out 80% of Amskan; and (iii) the directors of Amskan have not ruled out continuing negotiations with Transurban in relation to the supply of vehicle identification technology under new ownership and Transurban confirmed on 5 June 1996 that it is yet to select a vehicle identification supplier.

- 82. **MR SMITH** (*Glen Waverley*) To move, That this House condemns the repetitious and time wasting activities of the State Labor Party in attempting to stop the business of the House and thus deny other Members raising significant matters of public importance.
- 83. MR HULLS - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with all relevant information in relation to his family's shareholding in an unknown transponder technology company Amskan Ltd: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (b) when the Premier was advised that his family should buy 80,000 shares in Amskan Ltd; (c) whether Andrew Peacock or any other person associated with Transurban advised the Premier that his family should invest in Amskan Ltd, in June 1995; (d) when the Premier first became aware of the existence of Amskan Ltd; (e) whether the Premier was aware that Amskan Ltd had been negotiating with Transurban to supply vehicle identification technology if Transurban was awarded the City Link contract; and (f) whether the Premier was aware that there was a "potential role in Melbourne's City Link project for Amskan ... until last September when Amskan crashed" according to the Chief Executive of the Transurban Group, Mr Kim Edwards.
- 84. MRS CAMPBELL - To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co including: - (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy 20,000 shares in Arthur Yates & Co; (b) whether Mr Laurie Cox, then Chairman of Potter Warburg and member of the Premier Kennett's business round table, advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd; (c) whether the Premier will explain his family's successful investment in Arthur Yates in view of the fact that the float was so keenly sought that commentators noted at the time that "retail investors will be lucky to get more than a handful of shares"; (d) whether the Premier can explain the fact that his family was among the top 150 shareholders in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd float in light of the fact that it closed heavily over-subscribed; and (e) who advised the Premier's family to sell its interest in the Arthur Yates float on 21 November 1994.
- 85. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates & Co Ltd: (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Arthur Yates and Co Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (b) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in the Arthur Yates & Co Ltd.
- 86. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Acacia Resources Ltd: (a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in the keenly sought after

gold mining company Acacia Resources Ltd; (b) whether any Director of Acacia Resources Ltd or any person associated with the Shell Corporation advised the Premier to invest in Acacia Resources Ltd; (c) who advised the Premier's family to sell its shares in Acacia Resources Ltd on 20 May 1996; (d) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's share holding in Acacia Resources Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; and (e) what profit the Premier made from his family's investment in Acacia Resources Ltd.

- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer 87. questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd: -(a) who advised the Premier that his family should buy shares in Gary Morgan's gold mining company Haoma Mining Ltd; (b) whether John Elliott or Gary Morgan advised the Premier that his family should invest in Haoma Mining Ltd; (c) whether the Premier and his family bought additional shares in Haoma Mining Ltd in May 1995 prior to the announcement on 25 May 1995 that Western Mining Corporation was entering into a joint venture deal with Haoma; (d) whether the Premier is aware that the Australian Securities Commission is investigating share transactions in Haoma in the two month period in 1995 when share prices jumped from 28 cents to 85 cents in relation to allegations of insider trading; and (e) why the Premier's family sold its shares in Haoma on 20 May 1996.
- 88. MS KOSKY To move, That this House condemns the Premier's failure to answer questions about potential conflicts of interest involving his family share dealings, and his failure to declare his family share dealings on the Members of Parliament Register of Interests, and now calls on the Premier to provide the House with answers to the following questions in relation to his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd including (a) why the Premier failed to disclose his family's shareholding in Haoma Mining Ltd in accordance with the Members of Parliament (Register of Interests) Act 1978; (b) whether the Government has any contractual dealings of any type with any companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan; (c) whether the Premier is aware of any contracts between companies owned and/or associated with Mr Gary Morgan and the State Liberal Party; and (d) how much profit did the Premier make from his family's investment in Haoma Mining Ltd.
- 89. **MR SMITH** (Glen Waverley) To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its selection of Albert Park as the venue for the Australian Grand Prix and notes that the venue now has bi-partisan political support.
- 90. MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for his mismanagement of the hospital system as evidenced by the crisis in hospital emergency departments and the Minister's unfounded excuse that this has been caused by "an unusual seasonal increase" and his extraordinary statement that the first time he was aware of the delay at St Vincent's Hospital Emergency Department was when he read it in the morning's press.
- 91. MR TREASURE To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its commitment to the management of Victoria's parks network and the improvement of facilities to make the State's most popular natural attractions more accessible to a wider range of visitors.

- 92. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government, in the light of the record number of patients waiting for long periods on trolleys in hospital emergency departments because no beds are available, to re-open at least 300 beds which have been closed in public hospitals, and abandon its plans to close or downgrade eight Melbourne hospitals.
- 93. MR PATERSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Conservation and Land Management for its program of improved coastal management.
- 94. MR THWAITES To move, That this House calls on the Government to provide additional hospital services in the eastern and south-eastern suburbs of Melbourne without decimating Melbourne's major teaching hospitals which serve people from all over Victoria.
- 95. MRS McGILL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing greater support to Victoria's foster care givers and giving due recognition to the invaluable role these volunteers play in providing stability and guidance to young people in need.
- 96. MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its abject failure to respond to the draconian budget cuts to Higher Education in the Federal Budget and that this Government stands condemned for abandoning post school education opportunities for students in regional Victoria in both regional university campuses and TAFE Institutes.
- 97. MR ASHLEY To move, That this House congratulates this Government for its commitment to Victoria's pre-school children through the Government's initiatives to provide all government funded kindergartens and pre-schools with a \$2,500 grant that will enable pre-schools and kindergartens to buy a range of items that will improve services for children.
- 98. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for his failure to take adequate action to prevent the outbreak of workplace violence against apprentices, in particular the Minister's handling of the David McHugh case where as an apprentice cabinet maker he was doused with paint thinners and set alight by his workplace supervisors, and calls on the Minister to (i) immediately honour his commitment to increase the number of Apprenticeship Supervisors, and (ii) hold an open inquiry where apprentices, employers, unions and the parents of apprentices can freely report on the victimisation and abuse of apprentices in the workplace.
- 99. MR KILGOUR To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for implementing policies that will achieve the Government's target of \$6 billion per annum in exports of agriculture and processed food products by the year 2001.
- 100. MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for failing to ensure effective quality of service standard provisions in the sale contract agreements with the privatised electricity distributors thereby subjecting Victorians to increases in disconnections and outages particularly in the region serviced by United Energy which was singled out by the Regulator-General as being below acceptable standards.

- 101. MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Agriculture and Resources for assisting the establishment of world class research and training facilities with the ability to put Australia first in responding to increased international demand for quality meat.
- 102. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its moves to rezone and sell another public park, Schintler's Reserve in West Melbourne, despite its substantial use by the Centro Argentino De Victoria Club, for soccer, basketball, English classes and a wide range of community activities, and despite the Club's requests for discussions on a possible purchase of the Reserve which have been rudely ignored.
- 103. MR THOMPSON To move, That this House congratulates the Government and the Minister for Tertiary Education and Training for successfully negotiating with the Commonwealth Government for the restoration of \$6 million of pipeline funding for 463 student places in Victorian universities which had been unjustly withdrawn by the Keating Labor Government.
- 104. MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the achievement of vast improvements in public transport service delivery and punctuality, and significant patronage increases in 1995/96, across all modes, building on the previous financial year's strong growth.
- 105. MR FINN To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the Public Transport Corporation's transportation of hundreds of thousands of football fans to matches throughout the season, to the City of Geelong and across metropolitan Melbourne.
- 106. MR SPRY To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its housing policy and the emphasis it places on providing public housing for people with high needs.
- 107. MS BURKE To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its continued promotion of innovation in public housing and its commitment to providing diverse solutions to Victoria's changing housing needs.
- 108. MRS PEULICH To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the success of its strategic approach to the development of the communications and multi-media sector in Victoria.
- 109. MR LUPTON To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the development of (i) a comprehensive strategy to combat the use and abuse of illicit drugs, particularly by young Victorians, and (ii) a network of drug and alcohol free entertainment venues designed to give teenagers under 18 years of age a safe, secure and drug free alternative to pubs and clubs.
- 110. MS McCALL To move, That this House congratulates the Government for positioning Victoria as the leading tourist destination in Australia.
- 111. MR JENKINS To move, That this House congratulates the Government for attracting new investment in the Victorian economy which will produce more long-term, sustainable jobs.

- 112. MR McLELLAN (Frankston East) To move, That this House congratulates the Government for providing young people with the opportunity to develop life skills and leadership potential through the establishment of the Victorian Youth Development Program and other initiatives.
- 113. MR ELDER To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Footscray for deliberately misleading the House during Question Time on Tuesday, 12 November 1996 when he falsely asserted that the Minister for Education had (i) threatened schools which the Member for Footscray said were targeted for closure when no schools have been targeted for closure by the Minister; and (ii) also indicated schools will "be accorded the lowest priority for discretionary major maintenance and refurbishment funds" when the Minister has never done so; and (b) questions the Member's motives given that the Member for Footscray is a former shadow Attorney-General and should know that the allocation of resources by the Department of Education and the priority of school funding is not based on matters which amount to discrimination on account of age, impairment, industrial activity or lawful sexual activity under section 6 of the Equal Opportunity Act 1995.
- 114. MR HULLS To move, That this House condemns the failure of the government to institute a Ministerial Code of Conduct or enforce proper standards of ministerial behaviour as evidenced by (a) the abject failure of the Attorney-General to resign over a massive conflict of interest in relation to her ownership of BHP shares while being involved in decision dealing with BHP; (b) the failure of the Minister for Conservation and Land Management to resign over a blatant conflict of interest in relation to her ERG shares; and (c) the continuing failure of the Premier to resign over his flagrant conflict of interest in relation to his family's ownership of shares in companies that were involved in deals with the Government.
- 115. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House condemns the Government for it's waste and mismanagement in it's excessive use of consultants.
- 116. MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Government over the massive breach of it's election promise in announcing the proposed merger of up to 113 schools in Victoria, and in particular that the rights of schools to remain open are being trampled by a Government intent on forcing schools to merge or face massive financial disadvantages.
- 117. MR THWAITES To move, That this House, noting the severe problems with Victoria's Child Protection Service, the failure of the Minister for Community Services to properly manage his portfolio and the fact that the Government has repeatedly ignored the advice of experts for improvements to the system, calls on the Government to immediately institute a Royal Commission into the Child Protection Service in Victoria.
- 118. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to protect Mt Stirling from inappropriate downhill skiing development, including proposals for gondolas, cable cars, ski lifts and resort accommodation, despite the opposition of existing users, local groups, the Mansfield community and a great number of people from across Victoria, including over 20,000 who have petitioned Parliament.
- 119. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House confirms its belief in the separation of powers and the independence of the Auditor-General and believes that the interests of the Parliament and taxpayers are best served by an Auditor-General with a single independent voice with audit responsibility extending across the whole spectrum of government activity free from government influence or control and with a mandate to

- audit and investigate wherever and in whatever way deemed necessary to properly and fully scrutinise Government activity and provide unfettered, clear and independent advice to the Parliament.
- 120. MR BRUMBY To move, That this House, noting the importance of the separation of powers and the independence of the Auditor-General from the executive, condemns the government for its cowardly, underhand and insidious attempt to nobble the Auditor-General and undermine the authority of the Parliament, and calls on all government members to support the independence and integrity of the Auditor-General.
- 121. MR DOLLIS To move, That this House (a) reaffirms it's commitment to an independent Auditor-General reporting directly to Parliament on all aspects of Government activity; and (b) reaffirms it's belief that the independence of the office of the Auditor-General from the Government of the day, is a cornerstone of our Westminster Parliamentary tradition.
- 122. MR BRACKS To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer (a) for misleading the House on the views of the Auditor-General in relation to the proposed review of the Auditor-General's office; and (b) for misleading the House as to the attitude of the New South Wales Government in relation to the National Competition Policy and it's effect on the office of the New South Wales Auditor-General.
- 123. MR COOPER To move, That this House (a) condemns the Leader of the Opposition for deliberately misleading the House on 3 December 1996 when he stated during a debate on Business of the House that two of the appointees to the independent panel to review the Audit Act 1994 are people who have been subject of scathing reports by the Auditor-General, and that the House notes that contrary to the deliberately false and misleading claims by the Leader of the Opposition that neither of the two individuals so cavalierly slandered by him have been investigated or subjected to any scathing reports by the Auditor-General; and (b) therefore calls on the Leader of the Opposition to withdraw the allegations he made and to apologise to the individuals concerned.
- \*124. MR McARTHUR To move, That this House (a) condemns the Member for Williamstown for misleading the House on Thursday, 21 November 1996 when he stated that the Public Accounts and Estimates Committee had summoned the Auditor-General to appear before the Committee knowing this to be untrue; and (b) deplores the Member's failure to take the opportunity to correct the record in the accepted manner by way of personal explanation given that the Member was well aware of his error.
- \*125. MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its support of proposals for major developments at Tidal River in Wilsons Promontory National Park which will allow for a huge increase in roofed accommodation, including a 150 bed hotel and a 45 bed commercial lodge, leading to a vast increase in the disturbance to the natural environment at Tidal River, an overwhelming visual intrusion where there is none at present, increased sewerage, drainage and associated infrastructure and the commercial exploitation of the park at a time when funds for the protection of our National Parks are being slashed.
