MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS.

WEDNESDAY, 5TH SEPTEMBER, 1962.

1. The Council met pursuant to the Proclamation of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, bearing date the fourteenth day of August, 1962, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk and is as follows:—

PROROGUING PARLIAMENT AND FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE SECOND SESSION OF THE FORTY-SECOND PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c.

WHEREAS the Parliament of Victoria stands adjourned until such day and hour as may be fixed by the President of the Legislative Council and the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly respectively: Now I, the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria until Wednesday, the fifth day of September, 1962, and I do hereby fix Wednesday, the fifth day of September, 1962, aforesaid, at the hour of half-past Two o'clock in the afternoon, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Spring-street, in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my hand and the seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this fourteenth day of August, in the year of Our Lord One thousand nine hundred and sixty-two, and in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

2. Approach of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor.—The approach of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor was announced by the Usher of the Black Rod.

His Excellency came into the Council Chamber, and commanded the Usher of the Black Rod to desire the immediate attendance of the Legislative Assembly, who being come with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:—

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I have called you together for the consideration of important public business.

Owing to the appointment of His Excellency, General Sir Dallas Brooks, Governor of Victoria, as the Administrator of the Commonwealth of Australia during the absence abroad of the Governor-General, the honour of opening this Session has devolved upon me.

All Victorians are delighted by the news that Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. and His Royal Highness the Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, will come to Australia next year. Plans for the visit are in course of preparation and an enthusiastic welcome will be accorded our Royal Visitors during their stay in Victoria.

By reason of this visit my advisers have been pleased to invite Her Majesty the Queen to extend the appointment of His Excellency General Sir Dallas Brooks as Governor of Victoria until 31st March, 1963. Her Majesty has graciously approved the request, and my advisers are confident that the citizens of Victoria will enthusiastically support this extension.

It is with profound regret that I refer to the deaths of Mr. H. Kane and Mr. W. J. Towers, both of whom rendered valuable service to this State as Members of the Legislative Assembly.

Discussions on the European Common Market have proved the extent to which Victoria depends for its financial stability on the welfare of its primary industries.

Although the future of overseas trade is still not clear, my advisers have the satisfaction of knowing that, whatever may befall primary industries, they will not fail for any want of efficiency.

Much of the recent progress of Victoria as a primary producing State, which has brought it to the position where it now produces nearly one-third of Australia's primary production, is due to the long-term policy of agricultural research and education which has been pursued. No other State in Australia, and few countries in the world, are provided with so many first class agricultural research stations with such a wide range of successful activities.

Despite periods of exceptionally dry weather in many areas during the past year, Victoria's live-stock population has grown to new record levels. The State's wheat yield last season was well above the previous ten-year average, despite the difficult seasonal conditions.

The important work of eradicating tuberculosis in cattle has been continued, and good results have been achieved.

The dairy herd recording system and sire proving work in Victoria has received high praise, both from farmers and scientists. This work enables the continuous selection of top sires to ensure beneficial results from the artificial breeding of cattle.

One matter which is hampering agricultural development is the shortage of veterinary surgeons; but this should be remedied in a few years with the prospective opening, at an early date, of the Veterinary School at the University of Melbourne.

Important additions have been completed at Dookie Agricultural College, and work has commenced on new buildings at Longerenong Agricultural College in furtherance of agricultural education in this State.

My advisers are aware of the important part that afforestation plays in rural development and planting has recently commenced at Koetong, near Corryong, of the largest plantation yet planned by the Forests Commission. It is intended to plant 1,000 acres each year to achieve the maximum plantation size of 40,000 acres. The project, when completed, will employ 1,000 men locally in the forestry and timber industries and will lead to the development of a particularly valuable natural decentralised industry.

The discovery of the Sirex wood wasp, which was introduced from overseas, has caused serious concern throughout Australia. Urgent and strenuous action has been taken to prevent the insect from spreading beyond the limits of the present known zones of occurrence, and ultimately to eradicate it completely.

A prison forestry farm has been established at Olsen's Bridge, in Gippsland. This project should be of immense value in the rehabilitation of prisoners, besides assisting materially in the State's planting programme. A second camp is already planned.

The State Rivers and Water Supply Commission delivered a record quantity of water for irrigation throughout the State in the very dry 1961-62 irrigation season. This was made possible only by the additional storage and distribution facilities recently completed.

My advisers appreciate that capacity of water storage is one of the vital keys to rural welfare. Early this year, an additional amount of 250,000 acre feet became available, as the Eppalock Dam Project reached the stage where it began to store water.

Plans have been announced for the construction of two more major water storages, one in north-eastern Victoria on the Buffalo River and the other at Lake Bellfield in the Grampians.

Brown coal still stands as the State's most important mineral asset. Production last year reached a record figure of well over 16 million tons.

The State Electricity Commission is pushing on with major extensions to its power generating projects in order to meet the rapidly increasing demand for electric power.

The Hazelwood Power Station will commence operations in 1964, whilst the 240,000 kilowatt extension of the Yallourn Power Station has been completed.

A further 60,000 kilowatt generator is scheduled to come into service at Morwell Power Station next year.

The Commission's self-help scheme continues to play an important role in the rural development programme, and has facilitated the extension of supply to such areas as Orbost and Portland.

At present, over 940,000 consumers are served from the State inter-connected system, and more than 410,000 of these are located outside the metropolitan area. New consumers are being connected at the rate of over 30,000 per year, of which more than two-thirds are outside the metropolis.

The State is honoured to be named as the venue for the Sixth World Power Conference to be held in October next. This Conference will be attended by world leaders in the fields of fuel and power development.

The Mines Department is assisting in the search for oil, by providing technical advice in the geological interpretation of samples and basic geological data. Special attention is also being given to the task of ascertaining the nature and extent of the State's underground water resources.

Land Settlement continues to attract the interest of young men seeking farms.

The Lands Department is endeavouring to meet a sustained demand for Crown Lands by making areas available for application in various parts of the State.

A recent amendment to the Land Act has enabled existing industries in country areas to obtain land for the purposes of expansion.

My advisers plan to exploit further the tourist potential of the State. Tourist attractions are being developed and, to increase interstate business, buildings to house Victorian Government Tourist Bureaux have been purchased in Adelaide, Sydney and Brisbane.

Since the establishment of the Tourist Development Authority in 1958, a sum of £676,560 has been allocated from the Tourist Fund to assist in the development of tourist projects.

Loans for those projects, amounting to £117,610, have been approved, and grants totalling £209,000 have been made for tourist roadworks.

The Government is aware of the economic potential of the tourist industry and its importance to country areas, and will continue to give a full measure of support to its development.

Steady progress has been made in maintaining and improving the National Parks of the State.

Despite some slowing down of industrial development, a number of new and important industries have been attracted to country areas. An important factory recently opened near Shepparton offers a new and growing market for primary producers in the Goulburn Valley. With the development of an aluminium smelter and a new cement plant in the Geelong area, much greater use will be made, in the near future, of the valuable Anglesea brown coal-fields. Other ventures encouraged by the Government at Ballarat and Rosedale are based on local primary production.

Evidence is already available of the benefits to this State to be derived from action taken to improve rail and road facilities and to develop services in the Cudgewa-Corryong area, so as to meet needs arising from the works of the Snowy Mountains Hydro Electric Authority.

At the other extremity of the State, a modern fish cannery, which will give added stability to the fishing industry, is being built at Portland.

The completion of the Standard Gauge railway link to Albury has resulted in substantial increases in freight traffic in the first months of operation. Passenger traffic has also increased, and the new Luxury Express "Southern Aurora" has, since its inception, achieved an extremely high overall ratio of occupied berths. The completion of Spencer-street station later this year will not only contribute substantially to the attractiveness of Interstate Railway Services but will provide first-class modern facilities for country travellers using this important passenger terminal.

Included in the Railway Department's Capital Works programme this year is the purchase of 30 new "blue" trains to improve suburban services.

To the 30th June this year the Housing Commission has completed 46,970 dwellings with a capital expenditure of £142,000,000.

Nearly £10,000,000 will be expended during the current financial year in building new houses and flats.

Whilst continuing with the policy of allotting 45 per cent. of annual capital expenditure to country areas as against 55 per cent. to the metropolis, the Housing Commission has, in recent years, concentrated its metropolitan activity on slum reclamation, and will continue to develop projects at North Melbourne, Port Melbourne, Kensington, Carlton, Prahran and Williamstown.

Slum reclamation areas totalling 65 acres have already been re-developed, a further 10 acres are in an advanced stage of development, and an additional 50 acres are in process of being cleared.

Over recent years, though the media of the Housing Commission, the Home Finance Trust and the Co-operative Housing Movement, the Government has done everything possible to encourage home purchase in the belief that home ownership helps to make a person a more contented and a more responsible citizen. During this Session, it is the intention of the Government to introduce legislation which will help further to smooth the path to home ownership.

Education will continue to be given the highest possible priority. Victoria is at present spending more per pupil than any other State in the Commonwealth. Although expenditure on education has more than doubled over the past seven years, my advisers are well aware that there is much yet to be achieved.

Before the beginning of the next school year it is anticipated that eleven new High Schools, three new Technical Schools and six new Primary Schools will be ready for occupation.

Every effort is being made to increase further the rate of recruitment of teachers, and a site has been acquired, adjacent to Monash University, for the establishment of another Secondary Teachers' College.

Great progress has been made at Monash with the accelerated building programme, and it is known that the number of students enrolled in 1963 will be twice this year's number.

The Report being prepared by the Committee which is investigating the establishment of a third University is well under way, and is expected to be completed later this year.

My advisers will continue to develop health services to meet the needs of the ever-growing population of the State. The new air ambulance service has already played a major part in saving life. A Poisons Information Centre has been established in Melbourne. The legislation passed in the last Parliament to facilitate uniform control of poisons and drugs throughout Australia is being implemented.

Two major hospital projects, the Royal Children's Hospital and the Dental Hospital, will soon be completed. A tender has been let for the erection of a new 80-bed Sandringham and District Memorial Hospital. Works at present in progress will provide an additional 400 beds in public hospitals during the current year.

My advisers are seriously concerned that the Federal Government has not seen fit to continue its subsidy for capital improvements of mental hospitals. This will mean a slowing down of this important activity, but, despite this set-back, the new mental hospital at Traralgon will shortly be functioning, and clinical services in the Latrobe Valley and Gippsland are being extended. Psychiatric treatment and advice is now available at a Clinical Centre at Bendigo and a full-time Psychiatrist Superintendent has been appointed to the Warrnambool Mental Hospital. Every effort will be made, within the funds available, to improve mental sickness services throughout the State.

Following the decision of the Commonwealth Government to provide the State with certain training equipment, plans for the expansion of Civil Defence activities have been initiated. The State Emergency Plan will be extended and integrated with the Civil Defence Organization.

My advisers have given special attention to the need for restoring confidence in the economic position of this State and, in particular, to encouraging a revival within the building industry. Reference has already been made to proposed measures to encourage home purchase and home ownership, and the housing Commission's accelerated programme of slum reclamation. But, in addition, there are a number of major building projects sponsored by the Government to which reference should be made.

Considerable progress has been achieved in the new National Art Gallery and Cultural Centre Project. Excavations have been completed and a contract will soon be let for structural work to ground level.

A new and modern hall, which will provide additional exhibit space, will be completed at the Exhibition Building in time for the International Trade Fair to be held in 1963.

Work is proceeding on the building of the Latrobe Library and provision is being made to complete the project to its full plan instead of building in two stages, as was originally intended. Contracts have been let for the remodelling of the old Government Printing Office as a much needed step towards providing modern office accommodation for the Victorian Public Service.

Planning is well advanced for a new 10 storey Public Office Building in Treasury Place and it is hoped to commence work on this project towards the end of the present financial year.

A site at the corner of William and Lonsdale streets has been purchased and cleared for the erection of a multi-storey building to house 20 new Law Courts and work on this project will commence as soon as possible. The State Insurance Office has been given approval to purchase and clear a site in Collins-street for the erection of a new office to meet the growing needs of this business. Plans are being prepared for new offices for the Transport Regulation Board and the Motor Registration Branch at Carlton.

Five new Court Houses and 20 new Police Stations will be built during the current financial year, a large proportion of them being in country districts, and outline plans are being prepared for the erection of a modern Public Office Building at Geelong to serve the needs of that ever expanding community.

Wherever possible my advisers will expedite building projects both in the metropolitan area and the country districts of Victoria and thereby will set an example of confident development which should encourage private enterprise to expand and develop throughout the State.

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

A supplementary appropriation will be sought in respect of expenditure from the Consolidated Revenue in the year 1961-62. I am able to say that, including the expenditure to be covered in that Supplementary Appropriation, the Consolidated Revenue Account was in balance for the year 1961-62.

A Supply Bill to make further provision for the Services of the year 1962-63 will be placed before you, and the detailed Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the year will be presented.

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

A very comprehensive legislative programme will be submitted to you during the coming Session. A number of important Bills will be introduced arising out of the Budget proposals which will be submitted to you next week.

Included in the legislative programme will be a Bill to increase benefits under Workers' Compensation legislation, and proposals to amend the Country Fire Authority Act and the Forests Act to co-ordinate and improve the methods available for fighting bush fires in this State and to protect the property of prudent landowners against the neglect of others.

Other important legislative proposals will include the setting up of a Drainage Authority for the Dandenong Creek area, the implementation of the recommendations of the Statute Law Revision Committee with regard to the property of married persons, comprehensive provisions to protect the purchasers of land, and a complete revision of the Police Offences Act.

Bills will also deal with the following subjects:-

Agricultural Colleges (Establishment of Trading Fund).

Soil Conservation.

Co-operative Housing.

Rural Finance and Settlement.

Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works (Increased Borrowing Powers).

Local Government (Removal of Fire Hazards).

Justices Act (Amendment).

Sale of Human Blood (Prevention).

Boiler Inspection.

Housing Advances and Loans (Procuration Fees).

I now leave you to the discharge of your duties in the earnest hope that, with the blessing of Divine Providence, your deliberations may advance the welfare of the State.

Which being concluded, a copy of the Speech was delivered to the President, and a copy to Mr. Speaker, and His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor left the Chamber.

The Legislative Assembly then withdrew.

- 3. The President took the Chair and read the Prayer.
- 4. Death of the Clerk-Assistant.—The death, since the last sitting of the House, of Vincent Anthony Lyons, Clerk-Assistant and Clerk of Committees of the Legislative Council, having been announced to the House—
 - The Honorable G. L. Chandler moved, by leave, That this House place on record its deep sense of the loss it has sustained through the death of its Clerk-Assistant, Vincent Anthony Lyons, and its high appreciation of the valuable services rendered by him as an Officer of Parliament.

And other Honorable Members and the President having addressed the House-

The question was put and, Honorable Members signifying their assent by standing in their places, unanimously resolved in the affirmative.

TUESDAY, 25TH SEPTEMBER, 1962.

 - On the motion of the Honorable G. L. Chandler, the Bill transmitted by the foregoing Message was read a first time and ordered to be printed and, by leave, to be read a second time later this day.
- 3. Abolition of Capital Punishment Bill.—The Honorable J. W. Galbally, by leave, having asked for a ruling on the question whether in debating this Bill it would be in order for reference to be made to the case of Robert Peter Tait on whom the sentence of death was pending—

The President said-

The subject of the discussion is a ruling that I may make in the event of the Honorable Member introducing another Bill. The purpose of the Bill on the Notice Paper is to abolish capital punishment. Under that Bill I very definitely rule that no mention must be made of a certain person who is under sentence of death. Any such mention will be out of order. The point the Honorable Member is discussing, I think, in the event of his bringing in another Bill, is what will my ruling be if he mentions a certain individual. Certainly, I will rule out of order any mention of Tait in the debate on the Bill at present on the Notice Paper. My view is quite clearly upheld by the passages in the 16th Edition of May's Parliamentary Practice to which the Honorable Member referred, but at the moment we are in a peculiar position in that the Honorable Member is putting forward tentatively a proposition and inviting me to make a ruling, which I will not do at this stage. I do not know what Mr. Galbally's Bill will be. He is inviting me to give consideration to some future matter which he has not yet enunciated. It is unusual for the Honorable Member to bring forward such a matter, but he has indicated to the House that he proposes—

The Hon. J. W. Galbally—With great respect, Mr. President, I have not indicated that as yet. I was merely asking for your ruling on my Bill dealing with capital punishment. I had hoped that I had made that clear.

The President.—My ruling on the Honorable Member's Bill relating to capital punishment is that the Honorable Member must not mention an individual because, to me, May makes it quite clear that such a reference would be out of order. The Honorable Member has mentioned the passage at page 457 of May which states—

"A capital sentence cannot be raised in debate while the sentence is pending."

Even that statement would rule out the debate. May continues—

"After a sentence has been executed, the Minister responsible may be criticized on the relevant vote in supply, or on a substantive motion, or on a substantive motion for the adjournment."

It seems to me to be quite clear that under the Bill on the Notice Paper, I must, as the presiding officer, abide by the rules of debate which are set down with great clarity. Therefore, I rule that any discussion of the capital sentence which is pending cannot be brought out in debate.

4. Administration and Probate (Family Provision) Bill.—On the motion (by leave without notice) of the Honorable R. J. Hamer, leave was given to bring in a Bill to amend the Administration and Probate Act 1958 to enable proper Provision to be made out of the Estate of a Person dying intestate for the Maintenance and Support of his Dependants, and for other purposes, and the said Bill was read a first time and ordered to be printed and to be read a second time on the next day of meeting.

WEDNESDAY, 26TH SEPTEMBER, 1962.

- 1. The President took the Chair and read the prayer.
- 2. Capital Punishment Commutation Bill.—The Honorable J. W. Galbally moved, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to commute the sentence of death imposed upon Robert Peter Tait and to substitute therefor a term of life imprisonment.

Debate ensued.

.....

The President said-

I thank Honorable Members for their contributions. I shall deal first with Mr. Galbally's proposition that the United Kingdom practice is different from that adopted here in relation to the prerogative of mercy. It is true that the intervention by the Home Secretary advises Her Majesty on the Royal clemency, but here it is not an individual but His Excellency the Governor through the Executive Council who has the right to exercise the prerogative of mercy.

I cannot see the difference between these two. I am glad that Honorable Members have brought to my notice Standing Order No. 308 which has been recited and which in my mind says that this Council must adhere to the usages of the House of Commons. It is clearly my duty as Presiding Officer to enforce those usages and those rules which the House of Commons has prescribed and has for a long number of years adhered to, with only minor alterations.

The question of the supremacy of Parliament has been brought up. Mr. Galbally has quoted Dicey, Halsbury and Pratt's International Law. It is my view that the powers of Parliament can only be exercised within the framework of those rules. That in itself does not seem to interfere with the sovereignty of Parliament because Parliament alone can alter those rules if it wishes. No-one else can alter the rules of procedure.

I feel bound in this matter to follow the House of Commons usage and, in doing that, I think it is incumbent upon me to recite to the House a ruling given by Mr. Speaker Morrison in relation to a case somewhat similar to this. Before doing that I may mention that Halsbury might be referred to in that it substantiates the view expressed in May's Parliamentary Practice on the question that has already been mentioned respecting the exercise of the prerogative of mercy. Halsbury affirms the principle that where the death sentence is under consideration the matter could not be the subject of discussion in Parliament until after the death sentence has been carried out. I refer to Halsbury's Laws of England, the Third Edition, volume 7, at page 243.

To substantiate that ruling further, I should like to refer to the ruling which I mentioned earlier. It was made by Mr. Speaker Morrison on the 27th January, 1953, and was in respect of a case in which he disallowed a motion of censure on the Home Secretary in regard to his advice on the Royal clemency. Mr. Speaker Morrison stated—

"I have listened to what the honorable member said, and I fully appreciate the deep feeling that exists in many parts of the country on this matter. I should like to state what my conception of my authority was for taking the action I took. The Order Paper is a document published by the authority of the House, and the Speaker is charged, among other duties, with doing his best to see that nothing out of order or irregular appears upon it. Frequently, the Speaker has had to intervene—I have done so myself—when motions are offered. I have convinced an honorable member that a motion was out of order, or, I have taken some action myself.

In this case, the motion of the honorable member, which I saw late last night, dealt with the case of a capital sentence which is still pending, and there is a long line of authorities, including predecessors, who say that, while a capital sentence is pending, the matter should not be discussed in the House.

The honorable member for Nelson and Colne (Mr. S. Silverman) did refer to the general doctrine that any action of a Minister, and any responsibility which he exercises departmentally, is one for which he is answerable to the House, but in this particular case of a sentence of a capital character which has not been executed, there is the strongest possible precedent for saying that the House should not discuss it, either by questions, on the motion for the adjournment of the House or by any other means whatsoever."

There are rulings by other Speakers to which I could refer, but the most important one is that given by Mr. Speaker Morrison on 27th January, 1953, from which I have already quoted. Mr. Speaker Clifton Brown supported, in substance, the ruling given by Mr. Speaker Morrison on the matter of capital sentences and, in so doing, concluded with these words—

"I have stated that that is the practice of the House, and I cannot alter the practice of the House."

That seems to be my position here to-day—that I cannot alter the practice of the House. Indeed, it is my duty to uphold the practice of the House which, without question, is based upon the practice of the House of Commons. Therefore, in my opinion, it would be improper to allow this Bill to proceed. The very nature of its title indicates to me that the Bill would be out of order, irrespective of what Mr. Galbally may indicate that he might include in the measure, for it is not apparent to me that it would be included. Accordingly, Mr. Galbally's motion should be removed from the Notice Paper.

Further, I ought to point out to Mr. Galbally that he is in some difficulty under Standing Order No. 311. The Honorable Member is entitled to introduce a private member's Bill on this day which is set aside for that purpose, but I would rule that this measure is also a private Bill inasmuch as it deals with an individual, for a specific purpose for an individual. Private Bills are dealt with under Standing Order No. 311 which states-

"Until special Standing Orders for the initiation of private Bills have been adopted, the Council will not enter on the consideration of any private Bill which has not first been considered by the Assembly and referred by that body for the concurrence of the Council."

Clearly if, for technical reasons, I rule—and I do so rule—that this is a private Bill, the Honorable Member is out of order in initiating it in this Chamber without first of all submitting a motion for the suspension of the Standing Orders for the purpose.

On those two grounds, I declare the Bill to be out of order. I may mention that yesterday evening I thought I might then refuse permission to Mr. Galbally to have the measure listed on the Notice Paper at all, but, in view of the fact that the Honorable Member was unavoidably absent, I thought fit to wait until to-day to make my ruling so as to afford me additional time to consider the matter, which is an important one and to which I have given deep consideration. That is my ruling.

Before Mr. Galbally proceeds to discuss this motion, I wish to intervene. I refer to May's Parliamentary Practice, 16th Edition, where at page 403, under the heading "Motions and the Rule of Anticipation" there are these words—

"A motion must not anticipate a matter already appointed for consideration by the House, whether it be a bill or an adjourned debate upon a motion."

Further, May states this-

"Stated generally, the rule against anticipation (which applies to other proceedings as well as motions) is that a matter must not be anticipated if it is contained in a more effective form of proceeding than the proceeding by which it is sought to be anticipated, but it may be anticipated if it is contained in an equally or less effective form. A bill or other order of the day is more effective than a motion; a substantive motion more effective than a motion for the adjournment of the House . . ."

It seems to me quite clear that the Bill before the House, to wit, a Bill for the abolition of capital punishment, contains in more effective form the matter which Mr. Galbally proposes to discuss on his motion for the adjournment. Therefore, I rule the motion for the adjournment of the House to be out of order.

The Hon. J. W. Galbally.—It is rather unusual, I suggest, to rule out a motion without hearing argument.

The President.—Well, I shall accord the Honorable Member that privilege and hear him.

After hearing Honorable Members on the matter of his ruling-

The President said further—

Mr. Galbally has delivered his second-reading speech on his Bill to abolish capital punishment. From memory, he brought in, when making that speech, the very matters that he now wishes to discuss on the motion which is now before Members for the adjournment of the House.

The Hon. J. W. Galbally.—With great respect, Mr. President, I did not mention the Government's failure to appoint a Royal Commission.

The President.—I invite Mr. Galbally to wait until I enunciate the matters on which he proposed to speak, which were the appointment of a Royal Commission or public inquiry to inquire into the incidence of homicide in the States which impose capital punishment as against the States which do not and the deterrent effect as against other forms of punishment. As I recollect, in his speech on the Bill for the abolition of capital punishment, Mr. Galbally mentioned other States and other countries where capital punishment has been abolished and informed this House at some length, and by quoting authorities, that the deterrent effect of capital punishment was not great. It seems to me that the current motion for the adjournment of the House embodies the same matters as those to which Mr. Galbally addressed himself when explaining his Bill to abolish capital punishment, which fortifies me in my ruling that this is a typical example against the rule of anticipation. It is clear that this adjournment motion is akin to Mr. Galbally's second-reading speech on the Bill to abolish capital punishment, and, as the presiding officer, it is my duty to rule the motion out of order.

 - (c) In sub-section (4) for the words "persons liable to be rated have voted at the poll" there shall be substituted the words "votes cast at the poll are".

No. 1.—Motor Car Bill—Clause 3—

- 3. (1) The Principal Act is hereby amended as follows:—
 - (a) In sub-section (1) of section three—
 - (i) after the interpretation of "Chief Commissioner" there shall be inserted the following interpretation:—
 - "Commercial trailer" means any vehicle without motive power of its own and used for the carriage of passengers for hire or for the carriage of goods for hire or in the course of trade and drawn by a motor car and detachable therefrom.";
 - (ii) after the interpretation of "Primary producer" there shall be inserted the following interpretation:—
 - "Private trailer" means any vehicle without motive power of its own, constructed or adapted for being drawn by a motor car and any machine which is mounted on wheels and is constructed or adapted for being drawn by a motor car, but excluding—
 - (a) a machine constructed and used exclusively as an agricultural implement;
 - (b) a vehicle constructed and used exclusively for any purposes other than for the carriage of a boat and—
 - (i) weighing less than four hundredweights unladen;
 - (ii) the width of which, does not exceed the width of the towing vehicle as produced by the manufacturer; and
 - (iii) the overall length of which, does not exceed ten feet.';
 - (iii) for the interpretation of "Trailer" there shall be substituted the following interpretation:—
 - "Trailer" means a commercial trailer or a private trailer.;

(b) For section C of the Second Schedule under the heading "FEES ON THE REGISTRATION OR THE RENEWAL OF THE REGISTRATION OF MOTOR CARS AND TRAILERS." there shall be substituted the following section:—

"C .- Trailers attached to motor cars (other than motor cycles)-

- (c) In sub-section (1) of section ninety-three after paragraph (a) there shall be inserted the following paragraph:—
 - "(aa) prescribing and making provision with respect to the construction of and equipment to be carried on trailers or any specified type or classification of trailers"
- (2) At the end of section three of the Road Traffic Act 1958 there shall be inserted the following section:—
 - '3A. (1) There shall be established and kept in the Treasury a fund to be called the "Traffic Commission Fund".
 - (2) As soon as practicable after the thirtieth day of June in each financial year there shall be paid out of the Country Roads Board Fund into the Traffic Commission Fund an amount equal to four-fifths of one per centum of the total amount paid into the Country Roads Board Fund during the last preceding financial year other than any amount paid to the credit of the Roads Maintenance Account.
 - (3) Moneys to the credit of the Traffic Commission Fund shall be applied by the Minister on the recommendation of the Commission—
 - (a) for any works or projects calculated to improve road safety or traffic control;
 - (b) for the establishment or improvement of school crossings;
 - (c) for or towards the construction purchase and installation on any road of traffic control lights; and
 - (d) for the costs of the administration of and with respect to the carrying out of the functions of the Traffic Commission.'
 - (3) Sub-section (3) of section thirty-nine of the Country Roads Act 1958 shall be repealed.
- (4) In sub-section (4) of section thirty-nine of the Country Roads Act 1958 the words "and in addition to any amounts authorized to be applied for traffic control lights under the last preceding sub-section" shall be repealed.
