

(1.) That with a view to make the National Water Supply schemes of some use to the Public, the Honorable the Minister of Mines be requested to invite tenders, as follows, viz.:

(1.) For the completion, within twelve months from date, of the Coliban Water Supply to Sandhurst, including the maintenance of the whole of the works for a period of seven years thereafter in a constant state of efficiency, and with a capacity of carrying fifty millions of gallons of water every twenty-four hours.

(11.) For the completion of the Geelong works within seven months from date, including main-

tenance, for a period of seven years from date in a constant state of efficiency.

(III.) Contractors in each case to furnish their own designs, supervision, management, labor, tools, material, and everything else necessary for the due completion of the designs previously submitted to and approved of by the Honorable the Minister of Mines; and that fortnightly progress payments on the work done and material used be made on the basis of 75 per cent on the actual value of the labor and material.

(IV,) That substantial and satisfactory bonds be furnished by the contractors to the Government for the due performance of the contract, and subsequent maintenance.

- (2.) Contingent on the above resolutions being adopted by this House, That the Government be empowered to incur an expenditure of not more than £50,000 in carrying out the same.
- 4. Mr. Ramsay: To move, That, in the opinion of this House, it is desirable that the various reserves for public gardens, recreation grounds, and public institutions throughout the colony should be gazetted as permanently reserved from sale.
- 5. Mr. Cohen: To move, That in the opinion of this House it is undesirable that the Reserve known as the Royal Park should be further reduced by sale or otherwise.
- 6. Mr. Philipps: To move, That this House will, to-morrow, resolve itself into a committee of the whole to consider the propriety of presenting an Address to His Excellency the Governor praying that the sum of £264 14s. 4d., out of the reserve pension fund of £10,000 be placed upon an Additional Estimate, the same being the amount Mr. J. B. Humffray is entitled to under his inchoate rights which accrued to him whilst a responsible Minister of the Crown prior to the passing of the Act for the Abolition of Pensions.
- 7. Mr. ZEAL: To move, That, in the opinion of this House-
  - (1.) The Engineer-in-Chief of Railways should report upon the advisability of all "up" trains from East Melbourne discharging their passengers at the present Hawthorn platform, and of all "down" trains to the east starting from the platform at present exclusively used for the Windsor and Brighton trains, thus obviating the necessity of the present dangerous intersection of the "up" and "down" lines at the eastern end of the Elizabeth street platform.

(2.) That in future all trains leaving any terminal station on the Hobson's Bay Railway be provided with three tail lamps, such lamps to be kept constantly lighted after sundown.

- 8. Mr. WALKER: To move, That in the opinion of this House it is necessary for the relief of selectors throughout the colony, and for the encouragement of further settlement, as well as to secure compliance with The Land Act of 1869, that all money paid by selectors exceeding £1 per acre should be returned to the payers.
- 9. Mr. Woods: To move-
  - (1.) That the Victorian railways, together with all offices, stations, workshops, sheds, tools, plant, material, rolling-stock, &c., &c., be offered for absolute sale to the highest bidder beyond a fixed minimum price to be fixed upon.
  - (2.) That advertisements calling for tenders for the purchase of the Victorian railways be inserted for a period of twelve months in all the leading newspapers of the colonies, and in newspapers to be selected by the Government in Europe and America.
  - (3.) That the fixed minimum price decided upon by the Government at the time of calling for the said tenders be placed under seal, and in safe custody, until the expiry of twelve months after calling for such tenders, at which time, should any offer to purchase have been made exceeding the minimum price fixed, the Government shall cause a valuation to be made of the increase or decrease in the value of the property offered (excepting any increase or decrease in the value of the land reserved for the railways) and add to or diminish the minimum price fixed twelve months previously, as the case may be.
  - (4.) That one of the conditions of the sale of the Victorian railways be that the whole of the purchasemoney realised by such sale be expended on further railway extension in the colony, not to compete with the existing lines, but to act as feeders to the same.
  - (5.) That these resolutions be carried into effect with as little delay as possible.
- 10. Mr. Langton: To move, That this House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the following resolutions:-
  - (1.) That, in accordance with the practice of the Imperial Parliament, the supplies granted for any year shall be applicable only to the charges which will come in course of payment during such year.
  - (2.) That there be appointed in every session a Standing Committee of this House, to be called the "Committee of Public Accounts," to have the same functions and powers as the like Committee appointed by the British House of Commons.
  - (3.) That a Bill be brought in, and a Standing Order submitted to give effect to the foregoing resolution.
