2015-16 Budget – Overview

The 2015-16 Victorian Budget is focussed on:

- Putting Victorian families first by investing in the services they depend on
- Prioritising investments to address growth in demand for health services
- Building health infrastructure to expand service delivery, particularly in growth areas
- Delivering election commitments



\$20 billion total output funding for Health and Human Services in 2015-16


The 2015-16 Budget includes:

- An additional \$1.38 billion over four years for health and hospital programs
- Over \$560 million for capital projects to support health and hospitals

The Budget comprises:

- **\$10.97 billion** for acute health in 2015-16
- \$691.8 million more than in the 2014-15 Budget (6.7 per cent increase)

• \$970 million in additional hospital funding to respond to growth in demand for services right across Victoria



\$60 million boost for elective surgery in 2015-16 to reduce waiting lists

\$200 million Hospital Beds Rescue Fund

Will open beds and other points of care as recommended by Dr Doug Travis, and considered by Dr Travis to provide best value for Victoria.

- 101 new beds and points of care
- 26 health services to benefit from additional investment








- \$8.4 million to restore funding for the free whooping cough vaccine program for expectant parents and parents of newborns
- \$28.7 million to establish 20 Super
 Pharmacies across metropolitan
 Melbourne and regional Victoria
- \$300,000 to undertake planning to support the implementation of a real time prescription monitoring system in Victoria

\$4 million to support the National Centre for Farmer Health





\$3.6 million to support Vision 2020, raising awareness about avoidable vision loss and blindness

- \$15 million for SunSmart education programs and to roll out shading infrastructure to parks, playgrounds and beaches
- \$1 million in additional state funding for QuitLine
- \$2.3 million to support PRONTO!,
 rapid HIV and syphilis testing delivered
 through a partnership between the
 Victorian AIDS Council and Burnet
 Institute








Strengthening medical research through:

- \$25 million to support Melbourne

 Genomics Health Alliance to establish a statewide clinical genomic sequencing capability
- \$1.3 million to support clinical trials and make Victoria an attractive place to conduct trials
- \$2 million to plan and support the establishment of a National Centre for Proton Beam Therapy at the VCCC

2015-16 Budget – Health Capital

 Over \$560 million TEI in Health Asset Funding provided for new and expanded hospital and health service buildings and equipment



In addition, pending Commonwealth contributions and further work, \$70
million in funding is being held in contingency to deliver the Aikenhead
Centre for Medical Discovery and Maroondah Breast Cancer Centre

2015-16 Budget – Health Capital

- \$200 million to build a new Western Women's & Children's Hospital
- \$70 million to replace clinical services hardware, IT, infrastructure and medical equipment
- \$20 million to expand Angliss Hospital
- \$16 million to expand Moorabbin Hospital



2015-16 Budget Highlights – Health Capital

- \$106.3 million to expand Casey Hospital
- \$10 million to expand the cardiac service at Ballarat Health
- \$15 million to undertake planning and early works for the Victorian Heart Hospital
- \$1 million for Goulburn Valley Health to plan and design a future redevelopment of the Shepparton campus





2015-16 Budget Highlights – Health Capital

- \$85 million to expand Werribee Mercy Hospital
- \$3.8 million to build a rooftop helipad at Monash Children's Hospital
- \$20 million for a Health Service Violence Prevention Fund



Challenges Ahead

- Impact of the Commonwealth Government's more than \$13.6 billion cuts to Victorian hospitals over the next ten years, under changes to the National Health Reform Agreement
- Impact of cuts to other National Partnership Agreements, such as preventive health, dental health and indigenous teenage sexual health
- Impact on Victorian hospitals as a result of Commonwealth Government policies to shift costs of healthcare onto consumers in relation to access to GPs
