Treasurer: entertainment expenses

29. Mr WELLS to ask the Minister for Finance, WorkCover and the Transport Accident Commission for the Treasurer — what entertainment expenses, including restaurant and catering, were incurred by the Treasurer and ministerial staff in 2005.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

During 2005 \$2070 was spent on entertainment expenses by the Treasurer’s Office. This includes expenditure on fruit.

Treasurer: entertainment expenses

470. Mr WELLS to ask the Minister for Finance, WorkCover and the Transport Accident Commission for the Treasurer — in 2006 —

- (1) What entertainment expenses, including restaurant and catering, were incurred by the Treasurer and ministerial staff.
- (2) What expenses were incurred by the Treasurer and ministerial staff for the purchase of alcohol.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

- (1) During 2006 \$2,139 was spent on entertainment expenses by the Treasurer’s Office. This includes expenditure on fruit.
- (2) Details relating to the purchase of alcohol are not available.

1605. Mr WELLS to ask the Minister for Finance, WorkCover and the Transport Accident Commission for the Treasurer — what expenses were incurred by the Treasurer and ministerial staff for the purchase of alcohol in 2007–08.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

Details relating to the purchase of alcohol are not available.

Finance, WorkCover and the Transport Accident Commission: Shire of Yarra Ranges — budget submission

1746. Mr HODGETT to ask the Minister for Finance, WorkCover and the Transport Accident Commission for the Treasurer with reference to the submission made by the Shire of Yarra Ranges to the 2009–10 State Budget —

- (1) Has the Treasurer read the submission.
- (2) Will the Government provide funding to tackle the weed problem throughout the Yarra Ranges region by committing \$500,000 per annum for a period of five years in the 2009–10 Budget.
- (3) Will the Government provide funding to improve railway service frequency along the Lilydale and Belgrave lines to 15 minute off-peak weekday services and 30 minute Sunday evening services in the 2009–10 Budget.
- (4) Will the Government provide funding to extend bus services and frequencies over weekdays, weekends and evenings in the 2009–10 Budget.
- (5) Will the Government provide funding for parking upgrades for an additional 150 cars at Lilydale and Mooroolbark railway stations in the 2009–10 Budget.
- (6) Will the Government provide \$150,000 worth of funding per annum for a period of two years to assist the Shire of Yarra Ranges to appoint a suitably qualified town centre officer to liaise between developers in the Chirnside Park Major Activity Centre and complete relevant planning scheme amendments to give effect to the structure plan that has been developed in the 2009–10 Budget.
- (7) Will the Government use well-located surplus government land for new affordable housing developments.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

In partnership with the Shire of Yarra Ranges, the Government will provide \$250 000 a year for four years with a matched contribution from the Council for weed control.

The Government is taking action on transport through the Victorian Transport Plan so that Victorians can have the best transport network in Australia. Delivering the best transport system will mean Victorians can spend less time commuting and more time with family and friends. To deliver this goal, the Government will deliver more train, tram and bus services and upgrade transport infrastructure across metropolitan and regional Victoria.

The Government committed \$3 million over two years (2008–09 and 2009–10) for the Expert Assistance Program (EAP) to finalise and implement structure planning for Principal and Major Activity Centres. The EAP provides flexible service to support Councils in progressing the completion or implementation of structure planning in activity centres. Funding is provided through a negotiated grants process when Councils meet appropriate criteria for the EAP and requirements are reviewed by an Expert Panel.

To achieve more homes, Victoria is funding registered not-for-profit housing associations to grow the supply of social housing. In addition, the Government is committed to investigating the use of well located surplus government land for new affordable housing developments. I encourage the Shire of Yarra Ranges to contact one or more housing associations in the region to discuss potential housing developments.

Water: potable water

1895. Mr WALSH to ask the Minister for Water has a potable water substitution target been established for greater Melbourne; if so —

- (1) What is the target.
- (2) When was the target established.

- (3) Who was responsible for establishing the target.
- (4) Has the overall target been broken down to annual sub-targets and individual targets for Melbourne Water and the three metropolitan water retailers.
- (5) How is the term 'potable substitution' defined for the purpose of the target.
- (6) Has Melbourne Water, South East Water, Yarra Valley Water or City West Water advised the Minister on how they intend to meet their share of the potable water substitution target; if so, when was the advice received.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

1. The target is detailed in action 4.36 of the Central Region Sustainable Water Strategy.
2. The target was established in 2006.
3. The Government set the target.
4. The target has not been broken down into individual targets for each water business.
5. Potable substitution targets are described in terms of the volume of drinking water that will be freed up by alternate water source projects.
6. The water businesses provided me with their Melbourne Metropolitan Reuse and Recycling Plan in November 2008.

Children and early childhood development: Take a Break program

1919. Mr SMITH (*Warrandyte*) to ask the Minister for Children and Early Childhood Development with reference to the State and Commonwealth funded Take a Break child care program —

- (1) How many places have received funding since 2000.
- (2) Has the overall funding for the program increased between 2000 and 2008 —
 - (a) if so, what has been the increase;
 - (b) if not, has there been a decrease in funding and by what amount.
- (3) What is the process whereby an organisation can be allocated funding.

ANSWER:

I am informed as follows:

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development has administered the Take a Break program since August 2007. The program was administered by the Department of Human Services prior to this time.

In the 2007–08 financial year the Department provided funding to 216 organisations for programs at 235 children's services locations. In the 2008–09 financial year the Department provided funding to 191 organisations for programs at 213 children's services.

The Whole of Victorian Government agreed NGO indexation rate is applied to the program funding. As a result, overall funding has increased from \$1.73 million in 2007–08 to an allocation of \$1.827 million for the 2009–10 financial year.

- If any two of the major criteria are met, the facility is included on the bushfire risk register.
- In addition, two further minor criteria are being applied for consideration for including on the risk register:

Water: non-residential water users

2662. Mr WALSH to ask the Minister for Water with reference to non-residential water users using more than 10 million litres of water each year:

- (1) How many have completed and submitted a water management action plan to their local water authority.
- (2) For each user that has completed and submitted a water management action plan to their local water authority:
 - (a) what is their name;
 - (b) where are they located;
 - (c) when was the plan submitted.
- (3) How many users have been retrofitted to meet the water component of the five star standard for buildings.
- (4) For each project for each user that has been retrofitted to meet the water component of the five star standard for buildings:
 - (a) what are the details;

- (b) how much Government funding was allocated;
 - (c) how much Government funding was spent;
 - (d) what was the overall cost.
 - (e) what was the completion date.
 - (f) when did the project commence.
- (5) What is the total amount the Government has spent on the Pathways to Sustainability Program?

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

In October 2003 the voluntary Pathways to Sustainability program between Melbourne's top 200 non-residential water consumers and their respective water corporations was launched. The program was designed to increase water efficiency among these significant water using customers by developing water management plans.

The success of the Pathway to Sustainability Program within Melbourne led to its expansion to other non-residential customers across the State and in 2007, as part of the Permanent Water Saving Rules developed by Victoria's water corporations, the water management action plan (waterMAP) program was implemented. These plans are mandatory for all non-residential customers that use 10 million litres or more of water per annum and aim to identify ways in which businesses can reduce their water use or use the water more efficiently. WaterMAP covers 1,750 customers throughout Victoria, with 1,200 based in Melbourne and 550 based in regional Victoria.

In the 2008/09 year, waterMAP customers across the State saved approximately 5 billion litres of water. Combined with the 10 billion litres of water savings made over 2007/08, waterMAP customers have saved around 15 billion litres of water since the program's inception.

Detailed information on customer names, water use, location and date of waterMAP submissions is held by the water corporations and is not published as this is commercial in confidence information.

As part of the waterMAP program, three industry groups—Australian Industry Group (AiG), Plastics and Chemical Industries Australia (PACIA) and Victorian Employers Chamber of Commerce and Industry (VECCI)—have been granted \$1 million in funding by the Victorian Government to work with their industry sectors on demonstration or benchmarking programs. Further allocation of funding and resources to develop relationships and work with waterMAP customers are managed by each respective water corporation. Allocation of funding varies between water corporations, depending on the size and number of its waterMAP customers.

The Victorian Government has been active in improving water efficiencies in its building and operations across its entire portfolio of office accommodation since 2007. Eighteen buildings have been upgraded to become water efficient, with the regional offices completed by 2008 and the city buildings by June 2009. These office buildings have been fitted with flow restrictors, water efficient showerheads, water efficient toilets and where appropriate, waterless urinals. The Government has spent more than \$1.5 million on this scheme

The Government also has had the Green Lease Scheme in place since 2007. This scheme requires buildings that are to be leased by the Government to meet 4 Star water efficiency standards of the National Australian Built Environment Rating System, which rates environmental performance of existing buildings on a 1-5 star scale.

The implementation of an Energy Performance Contract project designed to significantly reduce the energy and water consumption of 16 Government-owned buildings will include an upgrade of fire water services in the Treasury Precinct, which will further reduce water consumption.

Water: schools — water efficiency program

2669. Mr WALSH to ask the Minister for Water with reference to schools that have been retrofitted to be water efficient as part of the Sustainable Water Efficiency Program for schools initiative:

- (1) How many schools have been retrofitted.
- (2) For each project at each school:
 - (a) what are the details;
 - (c) how much Government funding was allocated;
 - (d) how much Government funding was spent;
 - (e) what was the total cost;
 - (f) what was the completion date;
 - (g) when did the project commence?
- (3) What is the total amount the Government has spent on the initiative?

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

The Schools Water Efficiency Program (SWEP) was set up to help all schools connected to a reticulated water supply to save water and promote water awareness throughout the community. The main delivery of this program commenced in March 2006, however some schools participated in an earlier trial in the last quarter of 2005.

This \$3 million program offered a solution to water conservation through simple measures, such as fitting flow-control valves and fixing leaky taps or cisterns. It also identified where action may be taken to best target water savings in the future.

Similar works were completed on all schools requiring retrofits with only the number of action items varying as size of the schools increased.

Schools paid no up-front costs for the audits and retrofit works but repaid the cost of the works over two to three years. The costs of audits and retrofit works were set on the basis of the size of the school and subsidised to ensure no schools were disadvantaged. Fees for this service ranged from \$1733 for a small primary school (less than 250 students) to \$6250 for a large secondary school (greater than 1200 students). If schools were found to be water efficient (less than five per cent savings found), no fees were charged to the schools.

The total expenditure on the program to date is \$4.2 million which is a higher expenditure than original funding because fees repaid by schools have been reinvested in the program. The costs for each school have not been itemised but are in accordance with the Table of Costs provided below.

There were 1610 public schools and 129 private and independent schools that undertook the program. There are about 200 schools yet to have the retrofit works completed due to access to the schools. The works on these schools should be finished before school starts in 2010.

The Department of Education and Early Childhood Development assisted the public schools with the audit component of this program.

A list of the schools that participated in the program is attached. A table of the schedule of fees that applied to various categories of schools is provided below.
