

- 1. Mr. Bent: To call the attention of the Commissioner of Railways and Roads to the state of the Brighton road, from the Elsternwick Hotel to the 10th mile-post, and to ask if he will cause a report to be made by an officer of his department, with a view to its reconstruction.



NOTICES OF MOTION:—
1. Mr. Grant: To move, That in the opinion of this House it is imperatively necessary in the interests of humanity and civilization, and as the most effectual way of stopping the slave trade in the South Pacific, that the British Government should take immediate possession of all the islands in the Pacific Ocean, not already occupied by or under the protectorate of any civilized power; and in the event of the Imperial Government declining to do so, that their sanction be sought to enable the Australian colonies and New Zealand jointly, or any of them separately, to take possession of such islands as dependencies.

That an Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor embodying the foregoing resolution, and requesting him to forward the same to the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

2. Mr. Woods: To move

(1.) That, in the opinion of this House, the present ruinous price of coal, both for manufacturing and domestic purposes, is due to the fact that we are dependent for our supplies on a foreign market, and from the absence of all local competition.

(2.) That the supposed coal-fields of Victoria remain up to the present time practically undeveloped.

(3.) That it is advisable to institute forthwith a systematic and continuous search for coal in this

(4.) That, in order to make such search effectual, the formation of coal prospecting companies be encouraged by offering to such companies a subsidy on actual work necessary to the prospecting.(5.) On the discovery of a payable seam of coal, such coal prospecting company shall be entitled to

an area of one square mile, to be selected by themselves, and may, on application to the Minister of Mines, claim a coal mining lease over the same.

(6.) That boring or other prospecting operations shall be conducted under the direct supervision of the company, inspection of works, books, machinery, &c., to be at all suitable times open to officers appointed by the Government, and that the selection of sites be subject to the approval of the Minister of Mines.

(7.) In all cases where a payable seam of coal has been discovered, all sums advanced to assist in such prospecting shall be returned.

(8.) That, contingent upon the above resolutions being adopted, an Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor, requesting His Excellency to cause to be placed on an Additional Estimate for 1872-3, a sum not exceeding pounds, to provide for carrying the above resolutions into effect.
