

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- Companies: Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to Proprietary Companies and to certain Associations not for Profit"—(Mr. Mackinnon).—
 Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 25 Aug., 1920, p. 38; read a second time and committed; motion, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider an amendment providing that on the coming into operation of this Act all proprietary companies shall cease to be entitled to the privileges and exemptions conferred on proprietary companies under the provisions of the Companies Act 1915—debated and, on division, negatived; Bill considered in Committee and passed remaining stages without amendment, 22 Sept., p. 62. (Assented to 28 September, 1920. Act No. 3073.)

(Assented to 31 August, 1920. Act No. 3052.)

FARM PRODUCE AGENTS: Bill to provide for the licensing of farm produce agents and for purposes incidental thereto—(Mr. Bailey).—Bill initiated and motion made, pursuant to the Standing Order for the Restoration of Lapsed Bills, That this Bill be now advanced through all its stages up to the consideration of the Bill in Committee—question resolved in the affirmative and Bill read a first time; read a second time and committed, 27 July, 1920, p. 22; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to and Bill read the third time with further amendments; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 19 Aug., p. 35; report from the

Clerk of corrections made by him in the Bill, 24 Aug., p. 37; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified, 16 Sept., p. 55; amendments considered—some agreed to, others disagreed with, others agreed to with amendments, one agreed to with a consequential amendment, and one disagreed with but a further amendment made, 22-3 Sept., pp. 63-4; the Council do not insist on their amendment in clause 10 disagreed with by the Assembly and agree to the amendment of the Assembly in the said clause, agree to the amendments of the Assembly on the amendments of the Council, do not insist on their amendment in the Third Schedule disagreed with by the Assembly but make a further amendment; further amendment of the Council agreed to, 23 Sept., p. 65. GREAT OCEAN ROAD (LANDS SALE): Bill relating to the sale of certain Crown lands in the County of Polwarth for the purposes of the construction of a highway to be known as the Great Ocean Road—(Mr. Mackinnon).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 Sept., 1920, p. 59; order for second reading read; Bill ruled a Private Bill; motion, by leave, That all the Private Bill Standing Orders be dispensed with, and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill—agreed to; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 22 Sept., p. 62; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 23 Sept., p. 65.—Bill not returned from the Council.

Hospitals and Charities: Bill to amend the law relating to hospitals and charities—(Mr. McPherson).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 6) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill, 6 July, 1920, p. 9; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 27 July, p. 24; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 4 Aug., p. 28.—Bill lapsed.

Housing and Reclamation: Bill relating to the providing of dwellings for persons of small means and for the reclamation and improvement of insanitary low-lying or over-crowded areas—(Mr. Hutchinson).
—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 15) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 11 Aug., 1920, pp. 29-30; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 31 Aug., p. 41; debate resumed and adjourned, 8 Sept., p. 50; 9 Sept., p. 51; debate continued—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Sept., p. 60.—Bill not returned from the Council.

Land: Bill to amend the law relating to the sale and occupation of Crown lands and for other purposes—
(Mr. Mackinnon).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 5) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill, 6 July, 1920, p. 9; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 27 July, p. 23; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 9 Sept., p. 51.—Bill lapsed.

LETTING OF DWELLING-HOUSES: Bill relating to the letting of certain classes of dwelling-houses—(Mr. Lawson).—Initiated and read a first time, 8 Sept., 1920, p. 49.—Bill lapsed.

LICENSING (LOCAL OPTION): Bill to amend section 297 of the Licensing Act 1915—(Mr. Greenwood).
—Motion made for leave to bring in a Bill intituled "A Bill to amend Section Two hundred and ninety-seven of the 'Licensing Act 1915'"; amendment proposed, That the words "Section Two hundred and ninety-seven of" be omitted—debated and, on division, negatived; Bill initiated and read a first time, 14 Sept., 1920, pp. 53-4; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time; amendment proposed, That all the words after "That" be omitted with a view of inserting in place thereof the words "this House is not in favour of passing the second reading of any Bill providing for the alteration of the three-fifths majority under section 297 of the Licensing Act 1915 unless adequate provision for compensation is first provided in such Bill"; amendment debated and negatived; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—question, on division, negatived, 15-16 Sept., p. 55.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT (WERRIBEE RATING): Bill relating to the rateability of certain lands in the municipal district of Werribee used for sewage farm and other purposes—(Mr. Robertson).—Initiated and read a first time, 11 Aug., 1920, p. 30.—Bill lapsed.

Marine: Bill to amend section 76 of the Marine Act 1915—(Mr. Baird).—Initiated and read a first time, 8 Sept., 1920, p. 50; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Sept., p. 61, the Council's agreement notified, 22 Sept., p. 62. (Assented to 28 September, 1920. Act No. 3072.)

Medical (Dentists) (Bill No. 2): Bill to amend Part II.—Dentists—of the Medical Act 1915—(Mr. Cotter).—Initiated and read a first time, 27 July, 1920, p. 23.—Bill lapsed.

Melbourne and Metropolitan Tramways: Bill to amend the Melbourne and Metropolitan Tramways Act 1918—(Mr. Lawson).—Initiated and read a first time, 8 Sept., 1920, p. 49; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Sept., p. 60; the Council's agreement notified, 22 Sept., p. 62. (Assented to 28 September, 1920. Act No. 3074.)

MENTAL TREATMENT: Bill to amend the law relating to the treatment of mental disorder in the cases of persons who are or have been on war service—(Mr. Baird).—Initiated and read a first time, 28 July, 1920, p. 25; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 12 Aug., p. 32; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Sept., p. 43; the Council's agreement notified, 14 Sept., p. 54. (Assented to 16 September, 1920. Act No. 3062.)

MUNICIPAL ENDOWMENT: Bill relating to municipal endowment—(Mr. McPherson).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 10) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill, 6 July, 1920, p. 10; considered in Committee: resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 27 July, p. 24; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 28 July, p. 25; the Council's agreement notified, 31 Aug., p. 42. (Assented to 7 September, 1920. Act No. 3055.)

MUNICIPAL LOANS (COMMONWEALTH): Bill to amend the Municipal Loans (Commonwealth) Act 1919—(Mr. McPherson).—Message from His Excellency the

Lieutenant-Governor (No. 16) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 11 Aug., 1920, p. 30; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Sept., p. 61; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Sept., p. 64. (Assented to 28 September, 1920. Act No. 3081.)

PHARMACEUTICAL CHEMISTS: Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Law relating to Pharmaceutical Chemists and for other purposes"—(Mr. Baird).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 8 Sept., 1920, p. 49; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 Sept., p. 65.—Bill lapsed.

Police Pensions: Bill for the restoration of police pensions and for other purposes—(Mr. Everard for Mr Farthing).—Initiated and read a first time, 27 July, 1920, p. 23.—Bill lapsed.

PRIMARY PRODUCTS ADVANCES: Bill to amend the Primary Products Advances Act 1919—(Mr. McPherson).—Initiated and read a first time, 8 Sept., 1920, p. 49; read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to and Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Sept., p. 57; the Council's agreement notified, 21 Sept., p. 60. (Assented to 28 September, 1920. Act No. 3068.)

Public Service: Bill to amend the law relating to the Public Service of Victoria—(Mr. Bard).— Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 7) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Pill of July 1999, we also considered to Consolidated. the Bill, 6 July, 1920, p. 10; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 27 July, p. 24; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 28 July, p. 25; debate resumed and adjourned, 3 Aug., p. 27; 4 Aug., p. 28; debate continued—Pill read a second time and committed, 10 Aug., p. 29; motion, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider an amendment for the purpose of establishing an industrial tribunal for the Public Service to determine wages and conditions of employment—debated and, on division, negatived after a motion to adjourn debate negatived on division, 11 Aug., pp. 30-31; motion, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider an amendment for the purpose of classifying certain persons who are employed temporarily as clerks in the Public Service, and who were so employed on the 28th day of February, 1914, and who had been so employed continuously since the 31st day of December, 1912, and had been then so employed for at least three years continuously, or for two or more terms amounting to at least four years in the aggregate—debated and, by leave, withdrawn; motion, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider an amendment for the purpose of establishing a Board of three, to whom any member of the Public Service dissatisfied with any decision of the Public Service Commissioner on any question of classification may appeal—debated and, on division, negatived; motion, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider an amendment for the purpose of establishing a Board of three, to whom any member of the Public Service dissatisfied with any decision of the Public Service Commissioner on any question of classification under clause 4 of the Bill

may appeal—debated and, on division, negatived; Bill considered in Committee, 17 Aug., p. 33; further considered in Committee, 18 Aug., p. 34; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments; recommitted for reconsideration of clause 12, omitted in Committee, and the schedules and the consideration of new clauses; considered in Committee; Committee reported progress; ruling submitted to Mr. Speaker by the Chairman of Committees on proposed new clause dealing with the General Division, which the Chairman regarded as being outside the scope of the Bill as read a second time; after debate, Mr. Speaker held that the Chairman of Committees was right in his ruling, as the proposed new clause could not be considered without an instruction from the House, as it was not relevant to any subject-matter of the Bill, which dealt with the Professional, Clerical, and Teachers' Division, but in no way dealt with the General Division, 24 Aug., pp. 37-8; Bill further considered in Committee, 24 Aug., p. 38; further considered in Committee and reported with further amendments, including the reinstatement of clause 12; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to, 25 Aug., p. 39; order for third reading read and discharged; Bill recommitted in respect of proposed amendments in paragraph (6) of clause 6; further considered in Committee and reported with a further amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; motion, That the Bill be recommitted for the consideration of the salary of the Secretary for Lands—debated and negatived; Bill read the third time, after debate; further amended after third reading; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 1 Sept., p. 43; the Council's agreement to the Bill with an amendment notified; 8 Sept., p. 48; amendment considered and agreed to, 8 Sept., p. 50. (Assented to 14 September, 1920. Act No. 3059.)

13. HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had this day attended His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, as follows:-

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

I have called you together that I may avail myself of your advice on matters of public

The most notable event of the recess was the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, who stirred the hearts and kindled the imagination of the people; so that the spontaneous and cordial greetings with which they everywhere received him expressed not only the sincerity of their welcome to the Prince himself, but their feeling of loyalty to the Throne of which he was the representative, and their sense of the unity of the Empire of which he was the symbol.

My Advisers, recognising the necessity for encouraging and increasing the output of primary products, have pursued and will continue to pursue the policy of assisting the producer and

stimulating the development of rural industries.

The settlement of discharged soldiers on farm lands has taken precedence over all other activities in the Lands Department.

Over 15,000 soldiers have applied for qualification certificates, and to these upwards of

11,702 certificates have been granted.

Five thousand and six soldiers have been allotted blocks by the Closer Settlement Board and the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission; and over half-a-million acres have been granted under licences for grazing.

Lands have been purchased to settle 2,100 additional soldiers, and further purchases are being

Over 1,000,000 acres have been acquired at a cost exceeding £7,127,646. Advances to the

soldiers already settled will probably amount to £3,000,000.

In view of the success of the Mildura-Merbein Irrigation Centre, the adjoining Red Cliffs Estate of 33,000 acres has been acquired, and will provide for 1,000 soldiers. Most of the blocks of the Stanhope Irrigation Area have been allotted for soldier settlement.

A sum of £80,000 has been provided to enable farmers in the drought areas to continue cropping for this year; and my Advisers have approved of limited advances being made in necessitous cases to a number of settlers in the newer Mallee country to furnish provisions and

Under the Fruit Act and the Primary Products Advances Act the sum of £336,000 has been advanced during the year for the establishment of meat works, fruit stores, and canning factories in country districts.

My Advisers will continue their efforts to find new outlets for fresh fruits, both in the State

and overseas.

The action of the Government in increasing the accommodation for the cool storage of perishable products from 750,000 to 1,350,000 cubic feet, and its persistent representations to the British shipping-control authorities, have resulted in more meat being exported than in any previous year and at prices never before excelled.

It is hoped that, from the operation of the Dairy Produce Act, which comes into force on the first of July, and from other progressive and educational measures which the Government has in contemplation, the productivity of dairying lands and the output of dairy factories will be greatly

increased.

The Government urged farmers to increase wheat production by extending the acreage under crop; and a material increase is anticipated. The recent favorable rains give prospects of a good harvest.

My Advisers are giving earnest consideration to the problem of furnishing adequate facilities for the conveyance of live stock by the railways and the provision of sites for saleyards and abattoirs.

It is proposed to introduce legislation to make available a further sum of £500,000 for the construction of main roads and bridges during the next three years; and it is also intended to provide the necessary funds for continuing the construction and improvement of developmental roads.

In connexion with the works under the River Murray Agreement, considerable progress has been made with the construction of the Torrumbarry weir and lock below Echuca; and the Victorian section of the large Hume Reservoir on the Upper Murray has been commenced.

The enlargement of the Waranga Basin is so near completion that additional water was

stored last season, and fully 80,000 acre-feet more will be stored this year.

The scheme for the irrigation of the large area of rich land near Maffra is well advanced. This scheme when completed will provide for the development of the sugar-beet industry, and the extension of agriculture in that part of Gippsland.

In the Wimmera-Mallee district, comprising some 9,000 square miles, there are now fully

4,000 miles of domestic and stock channels.

My Advisers have secured the services of Mr. Harold W. Clapp as Chairman of the Victorian Railways Commissioners. He will assume his duties at an early date.

It is estimated that the revenue from railways for the year 1919-20 will be about 28 per cent.

more than that of 1917-18, which was a record year.

As a result of the abnormal increase of traffic, the Department has now to handle the amount of business which would not, in the ordinary course, have been expected until the year 1925.

My Advisers are considering the matter of providing additional facilities for dealing with the traffic and the carrying out of certain works postponed during the war, such as new gravitation yards and the re-arrangement and extension of accommodation at country centres.

There has been a large increase in working expenses, owing to advances in wages and interest

charges and the higher cost of all supplies and materials.

In order to meet the increased expenditure, the Government approved of the recommendation of the Commissioners that rates and fares should be increased up to a maximum of 15 per cent. as from the 17th May last. The increase, however, does not apply to agricultural produce, manures, firewood, raw material consigned to country industries for manufacturing purposes, and manufactured products of such industries on the "up" journey. The average increase in rates and revenue will amount to about $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Increases in wages and salaries recommended by the Railways Classification Board will

amount approximately to £671,900 for the financial year.

The construction of new railways has proceeded slowly, owing to the limited available supplies of rails and materials; but new lines, totalling about 922 miles in length, are in course of construction.

Good progress has been made with the preliminary work of the scheme for the supply by the Electricity Commissioners of bulk electrical energy. Recognising the unsatisfactory position of fuel supply in Victoria, the Commissioners are pushing on with this side of the work as rapidly as circumstances will permit. It is difficult, however, to procure the plant required.

In addition to the supply of brown coal for general purposes, the Commissioners are making arrangements for a thorough investigation into the best method of dealing with Morwell brown coal

so as to produce from it a concentrated form of fuel.

In connexion with the Morwell scheme, the Commissioners will provide model housing accommodation for the employees, and a town will be erected on the most approved modern lines.

A Bill will be introduced to provide moneys for the further prosecution of the scheme; and proposals for the building of a railway line, diverting the present main Gippsland railway between Moe and Morwell to connect with the site of the works and township, are under consideration.

The Commissioners will, within a few months, report on the possibilities of the Kiewa River as a source of power; and will also submit a progress report in connexion with the linking up of the Newport power-house with the State Electric Supply Scheme and the control of all bulk supply of electricity.

Parliament will be asked to provide an increased appropriation to enable the Forests Commission to put into operation working plans for the development of the forests on lines of modern

and scientific practice.

It is estimated that there will be a considerable increase in forest revenue during the coming

year. Provision has been made for regular supplies of timber to the State Seasoning Works, and for making sawn timber available for public works at a lower cost than at present.

Deepening operations at Port Phillip Heads have been carried out during the year as vigorously as the supplies of coal and explosives permitted.

A depth of 43 feet at low water over a width of 1,300 feet will be proclaimed shortly. Dredging in the South Channel has also been proceeded with, and there is now available

at low-water a depth of 36 feet. H.M.S. Renown-the largest vessel that has yet visited Port Phillip-was able to reach her

berth at the Port Melbourne New Pier. There will be no difficulty- with ordinary expenditure-in maintaining sufficient depth,

both at the Heads and in the channels, for any ships which may be expected for many years.

Dredging at the outports has been hindered by shortage of coal supplies, but is now being carcice on at Warrnambool, Portland, and Gippsland Lakes.

The modern system of lighting which has proved so successful in Port Phillip and the outports has been extended to Western Port; and will be installed at the port of Gippsland Lakes.

A Bill to alter the constitution of the University, to fix the annual endowment, and to provide for important educational developments, will be submitted for your consideration.

A contract has been let for the erection of the new Arts and Education Block at the University, at a cost of £72,000. This building has been designed to keep pace with the growth of the work of the University; and at an early date other contracts will be entered into for the re-modelling and completion of the existing buildings.

There is improvement in gold mining, the yield to date being in advance of that of last year for the same period. The enhanced value of gold is an important factor, and will probably lead to

increased production.

The output of brown coal has risen considerably, and minerals generally are being actively investigated. Industrial development is anticipated with the enactment of legislation dealing with minerals.

In accordance with the Health Act passed last Session, the Commission of Public Health has been constituted, and is engaged in preparing the necessary machinery for putting the Act into operation generally.

My Advisers will submit to Parliament during this Session Bills dealing with housing and reclamation and building regulations, which will complete the scheme of health legislation which

was, to a large extent, dealt with in the Health Act.

The work of the Fair Profits Commission has had a steadying influence on the prices of commodities in Victoria, although it has to be recognised that the present high prices are, to a considerable extent, due to economic causes operating not only in Victoria but throughout the world.

The recent electoral canvas has revealed glaring anomalies in the present distribution of representation for the Legislative Assembly. My Advisers regret that these anomalies cannot be removed before the next general election, owing to the impossibility of providing for the requisite electoral machinery in the limited time available.

The Government propose to make additions to the salaries of officers of the Public Service and of teachers in the Education Department, in view of the high cost of living, and a scheme will be submitted to Parliament.

The prosperity of the State is reflected in the heavy receipts in the Consolidated Revenue and the Railways Revenue.

It is assured that there will be a surplus for the financial year.

Negotiations are in progress in connexion with the £6,000,000 London loan maturing on the 1st October, of which £550,000 will be absolutely redeemed.

In pursuance of their policy of decentralization and of supporting and stimulating rural industries, my Advisers will submit proposals for your consideration for the application of loan moneys for the construction of railways, country roads, and irrigation and water supply.

My Advisers also propose to make further advances under existing legislation in connexion with fruit and primary products, and have under consideration a scheme for making loans to assist approved country industries, with safeguards to protect the public funds.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The Estimates of Expenditure which will be laid before you have been prepared with a due regard to economy, and provide adequately for the requirements of the State.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

In addition to the proposed legislation already indicated, the following measures, among others, will be submitted for your consideration:—

A Hospitals and Charities Bill,

A Bill dealing with the Destruction of Vermin and Noxious Weeds,

A Bill to amend the Factories and Shops Acts,

A Bill to amend the Land Acts,

Bills relating to Crimes and Police Offences,

A Bill to amend the law relating to Income Tax so as to obtain uniformity in Federal and State income tax returns,

A Bill to provide for the Registration of Nurses;

A Bill relating to the Supply of Gas in the Metropolis,

A Local Government Acts Amendment Bill, and

A Metropolitan Drainage and Streams Bill.

I now leave you to your deliberations, which will, I trust, under the blessing of Divine Providence, materially promote the welfare of the people of Victoria.

Mr. McGregor reported that in Committee he had agreed to submit to Mr. Speaker a question of ruling. The Honorable Member for Williamstown desired in Committee to propose an amendment in the Public Service Bill dealing with the General Division. He found that there is nothing in the Bill dealing with the General Division. He had therefore ruled—"That new clause B offered by the Honorable Member could not be entertained without an instruction, as it was outside the scope of the Bill as read a second time."

And, after debate-

Mr. Speaker said- "First of all, I would like to say that the procedure of this House is completely in the hands of Members of the House. If they do not like the existing law of Parliament, this House, without reference to the other, can alter its Standing Orders and bring about any change in that regard it pleases. This House is completely master of its own procedure, but it must change its procedure in the way laid down by law. There have been two contentions put forward. I will deal with the second first-that the amendment is in order because it is in accordance with the title. That does not make an amendment in order. The Standing Orders themselves provide that an amendment may be made that is not in accordance with the title, and that the title may then be amended. title in no way governs the amendments which the House or the Committee may make in a Bill. question whether an amendment conforms to the title has nothing whatever to do with the matter. The other contention is that the Bill relates exclusively to the Public Service and to certain provisions of the Public Service Act, and that this amendment relates to certain other provisions of the Public Service Act. That is so, but it does not at all follow that the amendment is admissible. It may or may not be. It has been said that on previous occasions, when a Bill has been brought in by the Government or by a private Member for the purpose of amending certain sections of an Act, amendments of other sections have been introduced. No doubt, and properly so. If a certain principle embodied in one section was sought to be amended, then any other section which relates to and deals with that principle could be amended also. But it does not at all follow because the Government or a private Member brings in a Bill to amend, say, some minor section of an Act, that the Bill is open to amendment relating to totally different matters dealt with by the principal Act. The Commonwealth Senate has a special standing order, which provides that if a Bill is brought in to amend one part of an Act instructions can be given empowering the Committee to consider amendments which are not relevant to the subject-matter of the Bill, but are relevant to other subject-matters of the Act it is proposed to amend. We have no such provision in our Standing What they can do there we cannot do here unless we pass a similar standing order. Even then the Committee could not consider the amendment without an instruction. The law of this

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Parliament is that if a principle is sought to be made law by a Bill, whether that principle involves the amendment of an existing principle or not, that principle must first of all be discussed in the House at the second reading, and then if the House approves of that principle it sends it on to the Committee to consider the details, and the Committee, in dealing with the Bill, must keep to the principle that the House has approved. The Committee can introduce no other principle without an instruction from the House empowering the Committee to introduce the new principle. As Honorable Members on both sides of the House have indicated by their speeches, this Bill, while it deals with the Professional, Clerical, and Teachers' Division, as well as with some other matters, in no way deals with the General Division. Certainly the Public Service Act deals with the General Division—ection 30 does that. But this Bill does not. The subject-matter of the Bill is different, and our Standing Orders say that any new clause introduced even by way of instruction must be relevant to the subject-matter of the Bill. It is not relevant to the Clerical Division which this Bill deals with, nor to the Teachers' Division, nor to the Professional Division, nor is it relevant to the subject-matter that is certainly to be found in the Public Service Act, but not in this Bill. Before that new principle can be considered in Committee, the House must first of all have approved of the principle and given authority to the Committee to deal with it. That has not been done. I think that the Chairman is right in ruling that the Committee cannot consider this clause without an instruction from the House."


