

# NOTICES OF MOTION

#### GENERAL BUSINESS

- 1 MR McGRATH (Lowan)—To move, That this House deplores the low priority given to road funding by both the Commonwealth and Victorian Governments which has resulted in a serious decline in the standard and effectiveness of the Victorian country road network and, in view of the huge sums raised from the motorists, calls on the Government to allocate additional road funding, in particular, to rural municipalities.
- 2 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer for using accounting gymnastics to mislead the people of Victoria that the Government had reduced outlays in real terms in the 1986-87 Budget whereas, for the fifth Budget in a row, outlays did increase in real terms.
- 3 MR CROZIER—To move, That this House views with concern the rising incidence of major crime in Victoria, and condemns the Government and the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for their failure to provide the Victoria Police with either the resources or the powers to combat it.
- 4 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House condemns the Government for indexing State taxes and charges to the Consumer Price Index, a policy which locks Victoria and Australia into Labor's disastrous inflation rate.
- 5 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House notes with concern a report that, but for its Government guarantee, the State Electricity Commission of Victoria would be insolvent and condemns the Government for eroding the financial viability of the State Electricity Commission of Victoria, the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works, the Port of Melbourne Authority and the Grain Elevators Board.
- 6 MR REYNOLDS—To move, That this House condemns the Government for making misleading promises of car parking and additional public parkland in connection with the construction of the National Tennis Centre.
- 7 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House calls on the Government to prepare Victoria for a plan to rescue the State from the economic disaster its policies have produced, and in particular—(a) to immediately release forward estimates of expenditure and receipts for 1987–88 and available subsequent years; (b) to prepare an effective program for substantial restraint in State Government expenditure, taxation and loan-raisings; and (c) to implement that expenditure restraint program from June 1987 so as to give Victoria the advantage of reversal of the Government's profligate spending throughout the whole of the next financial year.
- 8 MR GUDE—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to provide for the recognition of individual rights of persons to belong or not belong to an association and to amend the *Industrial Relations Act* 1979, and for other purposes.
- 9 MR GUDE—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to promote industry, trade and commerce, to outlaw secondary boycott action, to provide for a right of action for loss or damages should a secondary boycott occur and to amend the *Trade Unions Act* 1958, the *Industrial Relations Act* 1979, and for other purposes.

- 10 MR GUDE—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill relating to the payment of commercial accounts payable by the State or by an authority of the State.
- 11 MR POPE—To move, That this House congratulates the Government and in particular the Minister for Transport for the expansion of public transport, especially in the area of bus services which benefit Victorians who have not been adequately serviced during the years of neglect by successive Liberal Governments.
- 12 MR MICALLEF—To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the continued development of training initiatives and skill centres which are producing a skilled workforce to meet the challenge of the introduction of advanced technology and the restructuring of industry by—(a) expansion of existing industry training network, including the development of a Metals Industry Advanced Training Centre; and (b) designing a comprehensive and integrated system of skilled training for industry.
- 13 MR GUDE—To move, That this House takes note of the Report of the Ombudsman on investigations relating—to—Complaints of Unreasonable—Termination of Services with Victoria's 150th Anniversary Celebrations Secretariat and Inadequate Compensation following such Dismissal.
- 14 MR PLOWMAN—To move, That this House—(a) expresses its grave concern at the decision of Mr Speaker to grant the call to the Honourable the Premier as the first speaker in the debate on Grievances on Thursday, 5. March 1987 and expresses its dissent from Mr Speaker's subsequent rejection of the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition in relation to this matter; and (b) affirms the view that the long standing practice and custom of the House in giving priority to a non-Ministerial member in the first instance for the Grievance debate should continue to be observed.
- 15 MRS SETCHES—To move, That this House congratulates the Government for its successful and continuing efforts to raise the status of women in the Victorian community through increased access to education, training and employment opportunities, transport, health, child-care and other support services which enhance the opportunities and options for participation in the wider community.
- 16 MR EVANS (Ballarat North)—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Minister for Transport for the planned savage retrenchments of workers at the Ballarat V/Line Workshop and rebukes the Government for its lack of consideration of the workers and their families.
- 17 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 18 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border; and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect

that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.

- 19 MR RICHARDSON—To move, That this House opposes unconditionally the proposed Australia Card.
- 20 MR POPE—To move, That this House congratulates the Government and, in particular, the Minister for Conservation, Forests and Lands, for the Conservation Strategy for Victoria, especially in light of the Opposition and National Party's negative attitude and demonstrated lack of concern towards matters pertaining to Conservation.

- 1 MR CROZIER—To move, That this House views with concern the rising incidence of major crime in Victoria, and condemns the Government and the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for their failure to provide the Victoria Police with either the resources or the powers to combat it.
- 2 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House condemns the Government for indexing State taxes and charges to the Consumer Price Index, a policy which locks Victoria and Australia into Labor's disastrous inflation rate.

# NOTICES OF MOTION

- 1 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House notes with concern a report that, but for its Government guarantee, the State Electricity Commission of Victoria would be insolvent and condemns the Government for eroding the financial viability of the State Electricity Commission of Victoria, the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works, the Port of Melbourne Authority and the Grain Elevators Board.
- 2 MR REYNOLDS—To move, That this House condemns the Government for making misleading promises of car parking and additional public parkland in connection with the construction of the National Tennis Centre.
- 3 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House calls on the Government to prepare Victoria for a plan to rescue the State from the economic disaster its policies have produced, and in particular—(a) to immediately release forward estimates of expenditure and receipts for 1987-88 and available

- subsequent years; (b) to prepare an effective program for substantial restraint in State Government expenditure, taxation and loan-raisings; and (c) to implement that expenditure restraint program from June 1987 so as to give Victoria the advantage of reversal of the Government's profligate spending throughout the whole of the next financial year.
- 4 MR GUDE—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to provide for the recognition of individual rights of persons to belong or not belong to an association and to amend the *Industrial Relations Act* 1979, and for other purposes.
- 5 MR GUDE—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to promote industry, trade and commerce, to outlaw secondary boycott action, to provide for a right of action for loss or damages should a secondary boycott occur and to amend the *Trade Unions Act* 1958, the *Industrial Relations Act* 1979, and for other purposes.
- 6 MR GUDE—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill relating to the payment of commercial accounts payable by the State or by an authority of the State.
- 7 MR POPE—To move, That this House congratulates the Government and in particular the Minister for Transport for the expansion of public transport, especially in the area of bus services which benefit Victorians who have not been adequately serviced during the years of neglect by successive Liberal Governments.
- 8 MR MICALLEF—To move, That this House congratulates the Government for the continued development of training initiatives and skill centres which are producing a skilled workforce to meet the challenge of the introduction of advanced technology and the restructuring of industry by—(a) expansion of existing industry training network, including the development of a Metals Industry Advanced Training Centre; and (b) designing a comprehensive and integrated system of skilled training for industry.
- 9 MR GUDE—To move, That this House takes note of the Report of the Ombudsman on investigations relating to Complaints of Unreasonable Termination of Services with Victoria's 150th Anniversary Celebrations. Secretariat and Inadequate Compensation following such Dismissal.
- 10 MR PLOWMAN—To move, That this House—(a) expresses its grave concern at the decision of Mr Speaker to grant the call to the Honourable the Premier as the first speaker in the debate on Grievances on Thursday, 5 March 1987 and expresses its dissent from Mr Speaker's subsequent rejection of the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition in relation to this matter; and (b) affirms the view that the long standing practice and custom of the House in giving priority to a non-Ministerial member in the first instance for the Grievance debate should continue to be observed.
- 11 MRS SETCHES—To move, That this House congratulates the Government for its successful and continuing efforts to raise the status of women in the Victorian community through increased access to education, training and employment opportunities, transport, health, child-care and other support services which enhance the opportunities and options for participation in the wider community.
- 12 MR EVANS (Ballarat North)—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Minister for Transport for the planned savage retrenchments of workers at the Ballarat V/Line Workshop and rebukes the Government for its lack of consideration of the workers and their families.

- 13 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 14 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border, and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.
- 15 MR RICHARDSON—To move, That this House opposes unconditionally the proposed Australia Card.
- 16 MR POPE—To move, That this House congratulates the Government and, in particular, the Minister for Conservation, Forests and Lands, for the Conservation Strategy for Victoria, especially in light of the Opposition and National Party's negative attitude and demonstrated lack of concern towards matters pertaining to Conservation.
- 17 MR LEA—To move, That this House condemns the Government and the Minister for Education for their gross mismanagement of the discipline regulations in government schools, which has led to instability and low teacher morale.
- 18 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer and calls on the Premier to discharge the Treasurer from his WorkCare responsibilities, in that he has—
  - (a) allowed the administration of WorkCare to become a shambles;
  - (b) caused the scheme to be very substantially unfunded by capitulating to union pressure in the design and amendment of the scheme by allowing waste of employers' premiums and by financial mismanagement;
  - (c) failed to exercise existing powers under the Act to collect revenue owing to the scheme from previous insurers;
  - (d) failed to make the rehabilitation process work effectively;
  - (e) failed to establish systems which prevent some doctors and other treatment providers facilitating abuse of the scheme;
  - (f) failed to effectively counter fraudulent and exaggerated claims;
  - (g) caused needless hardships at both a personal and financial level to employees and employers; and
  - (h) continues to deny employers adequate access to the system especially as it relates to disputed claims.

- 19 MR GUDE—To move, That this House calls on the Premier to scrap the failed WorkCare Scheme as quickly as possible, to minimize the present hardship of WorkCare on individuals and companies alike, and introduce a fully funded scheme which will not drain the State's finances and which—
  - 1. Protects people genuinely injured in the workplace.
  - Provides real incentive for preventative risk-management of workplace injury.
  - 3. Provides prompt and effective rehabilitation and retraining for those who need it.
  - 4. Minimizes the cost of administration to the people of Victoria.
  - 5. Removes the present Government monopoly.
  - 6. Confines compensation to actual cases of genuine workplace injury arising out of employment.
  - 7. Establishes a tribunal which is both fair and just to employers and employees alike.
- 20 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House takes note of the Tenth Report from the Legal and Constitutional Committee on Subordinate Legislation concerning the issue of Premier's Certificates.
- 21 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns—(a) the Minister for Labour in allowing his Permanent Head, Mr Phillip Bentley, to persecute Mr G. G. Williams, the Senior Inspector for Lifts and Cranes, notwithstanding that Mr Williams has been cleared by a police Inquiry; and (b) the Minister's failure to control other actions of Mr Bentley which have (i) caused a breakdown in morale; (ii) caused a strike by officers of his Department; (iii) left Victoria dangerously undermanned in a vital area of industrial safety; and (iv) allowed appointment of unqualified staff—and calls on the Minister to dismiss Mr Bentley or resign himself.
- 22 MR COOPER-To move, That-
  - 1. The Firearms (Prohibited Weapons) Regulations 1987 (Statutory Rule No. 374 of 1987) be disallowed; and
  - 2. This House is of the view that the Firearms Regulations 1984 should be amended as follows:

"For paragraph (a) in Regulation 24 of the Firearms Regulations 1984 substitute—

- '(a) A firearm which—
  - (i) is not a pistol;
  - (ii) is a centre-fire rifle;
  - (iii) is semi-automatic;
  - (iv) has a bulk reloading capacity of 8 or more rounds of ammunition;
  - (v) is in the opinion of the Registrar of Firearms of a kind requiring the exercise of special precautions;
- (aa) A firearm which is a centre-fire semi-automatic rifle which incorporates a pistol grip in its design or configuration at the time of manufacture, or which is subsequently fitted;
- (ab) A firearm which is a semi-automatic rifle fitted with a folding stock;'."

23 MR WHITING—To move, That Regulations 2 and 5 of the Freedom of Information (Exempt Offices) Regulations 1987 (Statutory Rule No. 266/ 1987) and the Public Service (Unauthorised Disclosure) Regulations 1987 (Statutory Rule No. 275/1987) be disallowed.

- 1 GOVERNMENT POLICIES ERODING LIVING STANDARDS—CENSURE—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns the Government for pursuing policies which have seriously eroded living standards for Victorian families and individuals by—(a) making Victorians the highest-taxed citizens in Australia; (b) accumulating a record official debt which has burdened Victorians with crippling debt servicing costs; (c) instituting and supporting policies which have made Victoria the inflation State of Australia; (d) imposing hidden taxes on gas, electricity, water and other State services; (e) reducing essential services against the community interest; and (f) discriminating against people and industries in country Victoria. (Mr Kennett).
- 2 CONSUMPTION TAX—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns proposals to introduce a broad based consumption tax or similar taxes in Australia, as this would increase the cost of living of Victorians, impose an inequitable tax burden on low and middle income earners, and put an unbearable burden on the wages system—and on the amendment—That all the words after "House" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof the words "notes proposals to introduce a broad based consumption tax or similar taxes in Australia and condemns the present Victorian Government for increasing State taxes which depress the living standards of Victorian families and other households by adding to their cost of living and increasing the prices of vital goods and services such as electricity, gas, water, petrol, insurance, finance and other common consumption items such as beer and cigarettes". (Mr Perrin).
- 3 WORKCARE ADMINISTRATION AND OPERATION—CENSURE—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns the Government for the many deficiencies in the administration and operation of Workcare and the Accident Compensation Commission and views with particular alarm—
  (a) delays in payment; (b) the lack of supervision of fraudulent claims; (c) the future cost of the scheme; (d) the lack of incentive to resume work; (e) the excessive level of benefits; (f) the ineffectiveness of rehabilitation; (g) general administration difficulties; and (h) failure to make adequate financial arrangements with the Commonwealth Government. (Mr Gude).
- 4 COMMONWEALTH GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns proposals of the Liberal Party for the withdrawal of Commonwealth Government assistance to State and Local Government. (Dr Coghill).
- 5 LOWER INCOME HOUSING—CENSURE—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns the Government for the failure of its economic strategy to provide adequate housing for those on lower incomes and those in impoverished circumstances and urges the Premier to redirect his Government's policies to ensure that the cost of home finance is kept within reach of Victoria's young families—and on the amendment—That all the words after "House" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof the words "notes the Government's economic strategy to provide adequate housing for those on lower incomes and those in impoverished circumstances, and draws attention to the failure of the State Liberal Party to dissociate itself from the Federal Liberal Party's proposal to terminate the Commonwealth/State Housing Agreement, though such a termination could effectively halve the provision of public housing, home ownership assistance

- and a range of emergency programmes and result in dire consequences for families and individuals seeking housing assistance and for the Housing Industry.". (Mrs Toner).
- 6 FUNDING OF REGIONAL LIBRARIES—Resumption of debate on the question—
  That this House expresses its grave concern at the failure of the Government to provide sufficient funding for regional libraries in the last financial year and the announcement by the Minister for the Arts that there will be a further reduction of \$2 million in regional library funding in 1987-88 and calls on the Government to honor the election promise to provide funding for libraries on a 50/50 basis. (Mr Mathews).
- VICTORIAN GRAIN INDUSTRY—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House calls on the Government to strengthen the Victorian grain industry by—(a) reducing freight and handling charges for the Victorian grain industry for the 1987-88 season by 20 per cent of present charges; (b) returning the control of the Grain Elevators Board to the grain growers themselves through the election of their own representatives; (c) discontinuing the Public Authority Dividend on the Grain Elevators Board and returning to the Board the \$15.5 million wrongfully collected under this tax; (d) ensuring that V/Line is the principal agent for the transportation of grain; and (e) ensuring that the Grain Elevators Board remain the major grain handling authority on a State-wide basis—and on the amendment—That the expression "strengthen the Victorian grain industry by—(a) reducing freight and handling charges for the Victorian grain industry for the 1987-88 season by 20 per cent of present charges; (b) returning the control of the Grain Elevators Board to the grain growers themselves through the election of their own representatives; (c) discontinuing the Public Authority Dividend on the Grain Elevators Board and returning to the Board the \$15.5 million wrongfully collected under this tax; (d)" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof the words "continue to strengthen the Victorian grain industry by". (Mr Roper).
- 8 POLICE (POWERS OF INVESTIGATION) BILL—(from Council)—(Mr John)—Second reading.
- TRANSPORT—CENSURE OF MINISTER—Resumption of debate on the question— That this House deplores the Minister for Transport's grossly inept handling of the Transport portfolio and in particular condemns the Minister for—(a) allowing borrowings for the Ministry of Transport to exceed three billion dollars; (b) allowing the loss of \$953 million for the 1985-86 financial year, which is the equivalent of \$1813.00 a minute; (c) introducing a policy of selling off as many of the Ministry's assets as possible and in particular land including freeway reservations; (d) borrowing \$50 million in the 1986-87 financial year for a so-called "redundancy scheme"; (e) continuing inability to satisfactorily negotiate with Transport Unions noting there were 45 533 days lost through industrial unrest in 1985-86, compared with 2268 in 1981-82; (f) not ensuring adequate safety procedures are in place to ensure the safety of patrons using Victoria's public transport; (g) his continual unpreparedness to honour his written undertakings—and, in the interests of Victoria, calls on the Premier to remove the Minister from the Transport portfolio forthwith. (Mr McGrath, Lowan).
- 10 EDUCATION (SCHOOL COUNCIL POLICIES) BILL—(from Council)—Second reading.
- 11 ROAD FUNDING—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House deplores the low priority given to road funding by both the Commonwealth and Victorian Governments which has resulted in a serious decline in the standard and effectiveness of the Victorian country road network and, in

view of the huge sums raised from the motorists, calls on the Government to allocate additional road funding, in particular, to rural municipalities. (Mr Wallace).

(Mr Roper).

- 6 MRS SETCHES—To move, That this House congratulates the Government for its successful and continuing efforts to raise the status of women in the Victorian community through increased access to education, training and employment opportunities, transport, health, child-care and other support services which enhance the opportunities and options for participation in the wider community.
- 7 MR EVANS (Ballarat North)—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Minister for Transport for the planned savage retrenchments of workers at the Ballarat V/Line Workshop and rebukes the Government for its lack of consideration of the workers and their families.
- 8 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 9 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border; and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect

that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.

- 10 MR RICHARDSON—To move, That this House opposes unconditionally the proposed Australia Card.
- 11 MR POPE—To move, That this House congratulates the Government and, in particular, the Minister for Conservation, Forests and Lands, for the Conservation Strategy for Victoria, especially in light of the Opposition and National Party's negative attitude and demonstrated lack of concern towards matters pertaining to Conservation.
- 12 MR LEA—To move, That this House condemns the Government and the Minister for Education for their gross mismanagement of the discipline regulations in government schools, which has led to instability and low teacher morale.
- 13 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer and calls on the Premier to discharge the Treasurer from his WorkCare responsibilities, in that he has—
  - (a) allowed the administration of WorkCare to become a shambles:
  - (b) caused the scheme to be very substantially unfunded by capitulating to union pressure in the design and amendment of the scheme by allowing waste of employers' premiums and by financial mismanagement;
  - (c) failed to exercise existing powers under the Act to collect revenue owing to the scheme from previous insurers;
  - (d) failed to make the rehabilitation process work effectively;

  - (f) failed to effectively counter fraudulent and exaggerated claims;

  - (h) continues to deny employers adequate access to the system especially as it relates to disputed claims.
- 14 MR GUDE—To move, That this House calls on the Premier to scrap the failed WorkCare Scheme as quickly as possible, to minimize the present hardship of WorkCare on individuals and companies alike, and introduce a fully funded scheme which will not drain the State's finances and which—
  - 1. Protects people genuinely injured in the workplace.
  - 2. Provides real incentive for preventative risk-management of workplace injury.
  - 3. Provides prompt and effective rehabilitation and retraining for those who need it.
  - 4. Minimizes the cost of administration to the people of Victoria.
  - 5. Removes the present Government monopoly.
  - 6. Confines compensation to actual cases of genuine workplace injury arising out of employment.
  - 7. Establishes a tribunal which is both fair and just to employers and employees alike.

- 15 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House takes note of the Tenth Report from the Legal and Constitutional Committee on Subordinate Legislation concerning the issue of Premier's Certificates.
- 16 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns—(a) the Minister for Labour in allowing his Permanent Head, Mr Phillip Bentley, to persecute Mr G. G. Williams, the Senior Inspector for Lifts and Cranes, notwithstanding that Mr Williams has been cleared by a police Inquiry; and (b) the Minister's failure to control other actions of Mr Bentley which have (i) caused a breakdown in morale; (ii) caused a strike by officers of his Department; (iii) left Victoria dangerously undermanned in a vital area of industrial safety; and (iv) allowed appointment of unqualified staff—and calls on the Minister to dismiss Mr Bentley or resign himself.

- '(a) A firearm which—
  - (i) is not a pistol;
  - (ii) is a centre-fire rifle:
  - (iii) is semi-automatic;
  - (iv) has a bulk reloading capacity of 8 or more rounds of ammunition; and
  - (v) is in the opinion of the Registrar of Firearms of a kind requiring the exercise of special precautions;
- (aa) A firearm which is a centre-fire semi-automatic rifle which incorporates a pistol grip in its design or configuration at the time of manufacture, or which is subsequently fitted;
- (ab) A firearm which is a semi-automatic rifle fitted with a folding stock;"."
- 18 MR BROWN—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Land Act 1958 concerning the rights of certain lessees of railway land and for other purposes.

- 1 MR REYNOLDS—To move, That this House condemns the Government for making misleading promises of car parking and additional public parkland in connection with the construction of the National Tennis Centre.
- 2 MR STOCKDALE—To move, That this House calls on the Government to prepare Victoria for a plan to rescue the State from the economic disaster its policies have produced, and in particular—(a) to immediately release forward estimates of expenditure and receipts for 1987-88 and available subsequent years; (b) to prepare an effective program for substantial restraint

- 4 MR GUDE—To move, That this House takes note of the Report of the Ombudsman on investigations relating to Complaints of Unreasonable Termination of Services with Victoria's 150th Anniversary Celebrations Secretariat and Inadequate Compensation following such Dismissal.
- 5 MR PLOWMAN—To move, That this House—(a) expresses its grave concern at the decision of Mr Speaker to grant the call to the Honourable the Premier as the first speaker in the debate on Grievances on Thursday, 5 March 1987 and expresses its dissent from Mr Speaker's subsequent rejection of the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition in relation to this matter; and (b) affirms the view that the long standing practice and custom of the House in giving priority to a non-Ministerial member in the first instance for the Grievance debate should continue to be observed.

- 8 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 9 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border; and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.

- 3 MR GUDE—To move, That this House takes note of the Report of the Ombudsman on investigations relating to Complaints of Unreasonable Termination of Services with Victoria's 150th Anniversary Celebrations Secretariat and Inadequate Compensation following such Dismissal.
- 4 MR PLOWMAN—To move, That this House—(a) expresses its grave concern at the decision of Mr Speaker to grant the call to the Honourable the Premier as the first speaker in the debate on Grievances on Thursday, 5 March 1987 and expresses its dissent from Mr Speaker's subsequent rejection of the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition in relation to this matter; and (b) affirms the view that the long standing practice and custom of the House in giving priority to a non-Ministerial member in the first instance for the Grievance debate should continue to be observed.

- 7 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 8 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border; and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.
- 9 MR RICHARDSON—To move, That this House opposes unconditionally the proposed Australia Card.

  - (h) continues to deny employers adequate access to the system especially as it relates to disputed claims.
  - 13 MR GUDE—To move, That this House calls on the Premier to scrap the failed WorkCare Scheme as quickly as possible, to minimize the present hardship of WorkCare on individuals and companies alike, and introduce a fully funded scheme which will not drain the State's finances and which—
    - 1. Protects people genuinely injured in the workplace.
    - 2. Provides real incentive for preventative risk-management of workplace injury.
    - 3. Provides prompt and effective rehabilitation and retraining for those who need it.
    - 4. Minimizes the cost of administration to the people of Victoria.
    - 5. Removes the present Government monopoly.
    - 6. Confines compensation to actual cases of genuine workplace injury arising out of employment.
    - 7. Establishes a tribunal which is both fair and just to employers and employees alike.
  - 14 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House takes note of the Tenth Report from the Legal and Constitutional Committee on Subordinate Legislation concerning the issue of Premier's Certificates.
  - 15 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns—(a) the Minister for Labour in allowing his Permanent Head, Mr Phillip Bentley, to persecute Mr G. G. Williams, the Senior Inspector for Lifts and Cranes, notwithstanding that Mr Williams has been cleared by a police Inquiry; and (b) the Minister's failure

- 6 FUNDING OF REGIONAL LIBRARIES—Resumption of debate on the question— That this House expresses its grave concern at the failure of the Government to provide sufficient funding for regional libraries in the last financial year and the announcement by the Minister for the Arts that there will be a further reduction of \$2 million in regional library funding in 1987-88 and calls on the Government to honor the election promise to provide funding for libraries on a 50/50 basis. (Mr Mathews).

- 6 MR EVANS (Ballarat North)—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Minister for Transport for the planned savage retrenchments of workers at the Ballarat V/Line Workshop and rebukes the Government for its lack of consideration of the workers and their families.
- 7 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 8 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border; and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.
- 9 MR RICHARDSON—To move, That this House opposes unconditionally the proposed Australia Card.
- 10 MR POPE—To move, That this House congratulates the Government and, in particular, the Minister for Conservation, Forests and Lands, for the Conservation Strategy for Victoria, especially in light of the Opposition and National Party's negative attitude and demonstrated lack of concern towards matters pertaining to Conservation.
- 11 MR LEA—To move, That this House condemns the Government and the Minister for Education for their gross mismanagement of the discipline regulations in government schools, which has led to instability and low teacher morale.

  - (a) allowed the administration of WorkCare to become a shambles;

  - (h) continues to deny employers adequate access to the system especially as it relates to disputed claims.
- 13 MR GUDE—To move, That this House calls on the Premier to scrap the failed WorkCare Scheme as quickly as possible, to minimize the present hardship of WorkCare on individuals and companies alike, and introduce a fully funded scheme which will not drain the State's finances and which—
  - 1. Protects people genuinely injured in the workplace.
  - Provides real incentive for preventative risk-management of workplace injury.
  - 3. Provides prompt and effective rehabilitation and retraining for those who need it.
  - 4. Minimizes the cost of administration to the people of Victoria.
  - 5. Removes the present Government monopoly.
  - 6. Confines compensation to actual cases of genuine workplace injury arising out of employment.
  - 7. Establishes a tribunal which is both fair and just to employers and employees alike.
- 14 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House takes note of the Tenth Report from the Legal and Constitutional Committee on Subordinate Legislation concerning the issue of Premier's Certificates.
- 15 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns—(a) the Minister for Labour in allowing his Permanent Head, Mr Phillip Bentley, to persecute Mr G. G. Williams, the Senior Inspector for Lifts and Cranes, notwithstanding that Mr Williams has been cleared by a police Inquiry; and (b) the Minister's failure to control other actions of Mr Bentley which have (i) caused a breakdown in morale; (ii) caused a strike by officers of his Department; (iii) left Victoria dangerously undermanned in a vital area of industrial safety; and (iv) allowed appointment of unqualified staff—and calls on the Minister to dismiss Mr Bentley or resign himself.

- (ab) A firearm which is a semi-automatic rifle fitted with a folding stock;"."

- 3 MR GUDE—To move, That this House takes note of the Report of the Ombudsman on investigations relating to Complaints of Unreasonable Termination of Services with Victoria's 150th Anniversary Celebrations Secretariat and Inadequate Compensation following such Dismissal.
- 4 MR PLOWMAN—To move, That this House—(a) expresses its grave concern at the decision of Mr Speaker to grant the call to the Honourable the Premier as the first speaker in the debate on Grievances on Thursday, 5 March 1987 and expresses its dissent from Mr Speaker's subsequent rejection of the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition in relation to this matter; and (b) affirms the view that the long standing practice and custom of the House in giving priority to a non-Ministerial member in the first instance for the Grievance debate should continue to be observed.

- 5 MRS SETCHES—To move, That this House congratulates the Government for its successful and continuing efforts to raise the status of women in the Victorian community through increased access to education, training and employment opportunities, transport, health, child-care and other support services which enhance the opportunities and options for participation in the wider community.

- 7 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 8 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border; and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.

- 6 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.

#### NOTICES OF MOTION

- 1 MR GUDE—To move, That this House takes note of the Report of the Ombudsman on investigations relating to Complaints of Unreasonable Termination of Services with Victoria's 150th Anniversary Celebrations Secretariat and Inadequate Compensation following such Dismissal.
- 2 MR PLOWMAN—To move, That this House—(a) expresses its grave concern at the decision of Mr Speaker to grant the call to the Honourable the Premier as the first speaker in the debate on Grievances on Thursday, 5 March 1987 and expresses its dissent from Mr Speaker's subsequent rejection of the point of order raised by the Leader of the Opposition in relation to this matter; and (b) affirms the view that the long standing practice and custom of the House in giving priority to a non-Ministerial member in the first instance for the Grievance debate should continue to be observed.
- 3 MRS SETCHES—To move, That this House congratulates the Government for its successful and continuing efforts to raise the status of women in the Victorian community through increased access to education, training and employment opportunities, transport, health, child-care and other support services which enhance the opportunities and options for participation in the wider community.

- 4 MR KENNETT—To move, That this House condemns the Government for the failure of the Premier and the Minister for Property and Services to act with due propriety by—(a) misleading the House in relation to the Government's involvement in the Nunawading Re-election proceedings; (b) the interference of the Minister in the decision not to prosecute senior Australian Labor Party officials; (c) the failure of the Premier to accept responsibility for the actions of the Solicitor-General; and (d) the failure of both the Premier and the Minister to accept the standards of Ministerial responsibility previously advocated by the Premier.
- 5 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House condemns the Victorian Government and the Premier for—(a) bungling the adminstration of daylight-saving, resulting in chaos and confusion to communities; (b) the callous disregard of the interests of communities in Victoria affected by daylight-saving, especially those located along the New South Wales/Victorian Border; and (c) the gross breach of the unqualified undertakings given to Parliament when introducing the Summer Time (Amendment) Act 1983 to the effect that daylight-saving dates and hours would not be altered by proclamation of the Governor in Council unless in an emergency or to achieve uniformity with adjoining States—and calls upon the Premier to take such action so as to remove the authority of the Governor in Council to alter summer time by proclamation and restore that power to the Parliament.
- 6 MR RICHARDSON—To move, That this House opposes unconditionally the proposed Australia Card.
- 7 MR POPE—To move, That this House congratulates the Government and, in particular, the Minister for Conservation, Forests and Lands, for the Conservation Strategy for Victoria, especially in light of the Opposition and National Party's negative attitude and demonstrated lack of concern towards matters pertaining to Conservation.
- 8 MR LEA—To move, That this House condemns the Government and the Minister for Education for their gross mismanagement of the discipline regulations in government schools, which has led to instability and low teacher morale.
- 9 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns the Treasurer and calls on the Premier to discharge the Treasurer from his WorkCare responsibilities, in that he has—
  - (a) allowed the administration of WorkCare to become a shambles;
  - (b) caused the scheme to be very substantially unfunded by capitulating to union pressure in the design and amendment of the scheme by allowing waste of employers' premiums and by financial mismanagement;
  - (c) failed to exercise existing powers under the Act to collect revenue owing to the scheme from previous insurers;
  - (d) failed to make the rehabilitation process work effectively;
  - (e) failed to establish systems which prevent some doctors and other treatment providers facilitating abuse of the scheme;
  - (f) failed to effectively counter fraudulent and exaggerated claims;
  - (g) caused needless hardships at both a personal and financial level to employees and employers; and
  - (h) continues to deny employers adequate access to the system especially as it relates to disputed claims.

- 10 MR GUDE—To move, That this House calls on the Premier to scrap the failed WorkCare Scheme as quickly as possible, to minimize the present hardship of WorkCare on individuals and companies alike, and introduce a fully funded scheme which will not drain the State's finances and which—
  - 1. Protects people genuinely injured in the workplace.
  - Provides real incentive for preventative risk-management of workplace injury.
  - 3. Provides prompt and effective rehabilitation and retraining for those who need it.
  - 4. Minimizes the cost of administration to the people of Victoria.
  - 5. Removes the present Government monopoly.
  - Confines compensation to actual cases of genuine workplace injury arising out of employment.
  - 7. Establishes a tribunal which is both fair and just to employers and employees alike.
- 11 MR LIEBERMAN—To move, That this House takes note of the Tenth Report from the Legal and Constitutional Committee on Subordinate Legislation concerning the issue of Premier's Certificates.
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  - 1. The Firearms (Prohibited Weapons) Regulations 1987 (Statutory Rule No. 374 of 1987) be disallowed; and
  - 2. This House is of the view that the Firearms Regulations 1984 should be amended as follows:

"For paragraph (a) in Regulation 24 of the Firearms Regulations 1984 substitute—

  - (iv) has a bulk reloading capacity of 8 or more rounds of ammunition; and
  - (v) is in the opinion of the Registrar of Firearms of a kind requiring the exercise of special precautions;
- (aa) A firearm which is a centre-fire semi-automatic rifle which incorporates a pistol grip in its design or configuration at the time of manufacture, or which is subsequently fitted;
- (ab) A firearm which is a semi-automatic rifle fitted with a folding stock:"."

- 14 MR BROWN—To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Land Act 1958 concerning the rights of certain lessees of railway land and for other purposes.
- 15 MR EVANS—To move, That this House endorses the Government's call for expressions of interest in the establishment of a pulpmill in East Gippsland and expresses the opinion that—(a) such a project should be based on the need to ensure an expanding and improved resource base; and (b) no further areas should be declared as National or other Parks until the resource base needed to support this development and the timber industry on a sustained yield basis is established.
- 16 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns the Honourable Minister for Labour for misleading the Parliament and the people of Victoria on 3 separate occasions in respect to his replies to:

Question on Notice No. 251 asked on 15 October 1987 regarding the police inquiry into Mr Geoff Williams;

Question on Notice No. 249 asked on 15 October 1987 regarding the issuing of a licence to Shaun Christian King; and

Question without Notice asked on 14 October 1987 regarding the Building Workers Industrial Union of Australia election.

- 17 MR ROWE—To move, That this House congratulates the Victorian Government for its strong and unequivocal stand in favour of multi-culturalism and for having consistently supported multi-cultural policies through the establishment and maintenance of the Ethnic Affairs Commission.
- 18 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Labour for—
  - (a) publicly condemning the directors of Antang Pty. Ltd., by fallaciously alleging without any real evidence that they had acted in a conspiratorial and illegal way in the purchase and sale of B.L.F. properties and for failing to publicly apologise for the terrible wrong he did to the directors through his inaccurate allegations;
  - (b) suppressing police reports which quite clearly recommend that the B.L.F. investigations be terminated because of the lack of a credible complaint; and
  - (c) the continued waste of public money in an inquiry which according to senior police reports should be concluded.
- 19 MR GUDE—To move, That this House condemns compulsory unionism as is practiced in Victoria, especially in the building industry, because it represents a violation of the fundamental right of freedom of association laid down in the United Nations declaration of civil and political rights.
- 20 MR WHITING—To move, That the Rules of the Council of Legal Education (Amendment No. 1) 1988 (Statutory Rule No. 93/1988) be disallowed. (Notice given 9 August 1988).
- 21 MR GUDE—To move, That this House notes the fact that ugly and slanderous graffiti has recently appeared on many Victorian building sites and that the Cain Government has not publicly denounced such graffiti and its instigators and condemns the Cain Government for its failure to—(a) support the legal activities of independent contractors, Trouble Shooters Incorporated, which is the object of the graffiti; and (b) instigate an immediate inquiry into this matter.

- Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns the Government for pursuing policies which have seriously eroded living standards for Victorian families and individuals by—(a) making Victorians the highest-taxed citizens in Australia; (b) accumulating a record official debt which has burdened Victorians with crippling debt servicing costs; (c) instituting and supporting policies which have made Victoria the inflation State of Australia; (d) imposing hidden taxes on gas, electricity, water and other State services; (e) reducing essential services against the community interest: and (f) discriminating against people and industries in country Victoria. (Mr Kennett).
- 2 CONSUMPTION TAX—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns proposals to introduce a broad based consumption tax or similar taxes in Australia, as this would increase the cost of living of Victorians, impose an inequitable tax burden on low and middle income earners, and put an unbearable burden on the wages system—and on the amendment—That all the words after "House" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof the words "notes proposals to introduce a broad based consumption tax or similar taxes in Australia and condemns the present Victorian Government for increasing State taxes which depress the living standards of Victorian families and other households by adding to their cost of living and increasing the prices of vital goods and services such as electricity, gas, water, petrol, insurance, finance and other common consumption items such as beer and cigarettes". (Mr Perrin).
- 3 WORKCARE ADMINISTRATION AND OPERATION—CENSURE—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns the Government for the many deficiencies in the administration and operation of Workcare and the Accident Compensation Commission and views with particular alarm—
  (a) delays in payment; (b) the lack of supervision of fraudulent claims; (c) the future cost of the scheme; (d) the lack of incentive to resume work; (e) the excessive level of benefits; (f) the ineffectiveness of rehabilitation; (g) general administration difficulties; and (h) failure to make adequate financial arrangements with the Commonwealth Government. (Mr Gude).
- 4 COMMONWEALTH GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns proposals of the Liberal Party for the withdrawal of Commonwealth Government assistance to State and Local Government. (Dr Coghill).
- 5 LOWER INCOME HOUSING—CENSURE—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House condemns the Government for the failure of its economic strategy to provide adequate housing for those on lower incomes and those in impoverished circumstances and urges the Premier to redirect his Government's policies to ensure that the cost of home finance is kept within reach of Victoria's young families—and on the amendment—That all the words after "House" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof the words "notes the Government's economic strategy to provide adequate housing for those on lower incomes and those in impoverished circumstances, and draws attention to the failure of the State Liberal Party to dissociate itself from the Federal Liberal Party's proposal to terminate the Commonwealth/State Housing Agreement, though such a termination could effectively halve the provision of public housing, home ownership assistance and a range of emergency programmes and result in dire consequences for families and individuals seeking housing assistance and for the Housing Industry." (Mr Roper).

  - TRANSPORT—CENSURE OF MINISTER—Resumption of debate on the question—That this House deplores the Minister for Transport's grossly inept handling of the Transport portfolio and in particular condemns the Minister for—(a) allowing borrowings for the Ministry of Transport to exceed three billion dollars; (b) allowing the loss of \$953 million for the 1985–86 financial year, which is the equivalent of \$1813.00 a minute; (c) introducing a policy of selling off as many of the Ministry's assets as possible and in particular land including freeway reservations; (d) borrowing \$50 million in the 1986–87 financial year for a so-called "redundancy scheme"; (e) continuing inability to satisfactorily negotiate with Transport Unions noting there were 45 533 days lost through industrial unrest in 1985–86, compared with 2268 in 1981–82; (f) not ensuring adequate safety procedures are in place to ensure the safety of patrons using Victoria's public transport; (g) his continual unpreparedness to honour his written undertakings—and, in the interests of Victoria, calls on the Premier to remove the Minister from the Transport portfolio forthwith.
