
Boy dead, two missin

DISTRAUGHT mother Georgia Stavrou yesterday mourned her precious 6-year-old

son Kyri, and won-dered if her husband George would come home alive.

What had been planned as a father-son camping adventure for the opening of the duck season turned to tragedy when their boat capsized near Castlemaine, north-west of Melbourne.

The pair were in the

The pair were in the small aluminium dingy with four of Mr Stavrou's friends.

All six were thrown into Cairn Curran Res-ervoir. It is believed none wore a life jacket.

Four of the party, including Kyrl, were rescued just after 6am, but the youngster died after being pulled from the water.

Mr Stavrou, 38, was missing last night, along with friend Paul Athanasiadis.

The other men in the boat were Mr Athanasiadis's father, Ari, Harry Tsikkos and Mr Stavrou's nephew, Gary Stylianou.

Joe Dicicco, who pulled three of the men to safety, said he heard his friends' screams about 5.50am yesterday.

He said the five adults were all wearing waders which would have weighed them down when the boat capsized.

"It's a death sentence in a boat," he said.

Mr Dicicco and his brother, Steve, raced to the water when they heard the screams.

They rescued two men clinging to the upturned boat. The third man swam to the shore.

"I can still see the little boy now," he said.

An off-duty police officer, who was camped
nearby and joined in the
search, said: "It was
a recipe for disaster. Six
people in a three-metre
boat is ridiculous. They
were wearing waders,

they had their guns and they had three cases of shotgun cartridges (each weighing 22kg)."

A police spokesman said the underwater and shore search, involving about 50 people, was wound down about 5pm.

State Emergency Ser-State Emergency Service boats will resume patrolling early this morning.
Relatives last night kept a vigil at the reservoir.

George Efthymiou, a relative of Mr Stavrou, said the Greek Cypriot community would be devastated.

He said Mr Stavrou, until a few years ago, was a popular Greek nightclub performer using the stage name of George Kypyrios.

He said Mr Stavrou's father was preparing to fly from Cyprus to be with his family.

Speaking from her

Speaking from her family's home in Kealba in the western suburbs, Mrs Stavrou, 33, said: "My darling angel Kyri... he was so precious.

"It was so precious.
"It was his first excursion with his daddy."
The shocked mother said she could not contemplate life without her son and husband of 11 years

The couple also has a two-year-old son, Eric.

"George and Kyri set off on Friday night after George closed his shop in Moonee Ponds," Mrs Stavrou said. you for more than one night honey'. George went to the opening of last year's duck season.

"Kyri was excited because it was his first time camping with his dad.

"It was his first time away from his mum overnight and he found it so hard to leave me.

"They were going to come home about lunch time today because George said told me he couldn't 'stay away from

"He was encouraged by his friends to go along this year and he didn't want to let them

"He was wearing waders. When the boat turned over they would have filled with water. They would be like lead.

"We just don't know. The police say he might have made it to the bank."
