

SCHOOL FOR THE START OF GRADE 5

MY FATHER WAS VEHIEMENTLY OPPOSED TO MY MOTHER HAVING ANYTHING TO DO WITH ME AND MY MOTHER WAS MAIDE TO TAKE ME TO ST AUGUSTINES BOYS HOME IN GEELONG. I ARRIVED AS STAUGUSTINES IN FEBRUARY 72, I WAS MADE A STATE WARD IN SEPTEMBER 72 AND IT WAS BACK DATED TO DEBRUARY. WARD Nº 91709.

WAS PLACED IN 4 DORM UNDER BROTHER AND MAD MY RIRST EXPERIENCE WITH THE "CUTS". TWAS IN 4 DORM FOR A SMORT TIME (MONTHS) BEFORE BEING TRANSFERRED TO A "COTTAGE". THIS WAS SUPPOSED TO REPLICATE A "HOME" ENVIRONMENT AND WAS RUN BY THEY MAD TWO CHILDREN, WE ADDRESSED THEM

AS MUM AND DAD.

THESE PEOPLE KEPT A JOCKEY'S WHIP IN THE WALK IN PANTRY AND WERE NOT AFRAID TO USE IT. IT LEFT US WITH IBLACK WELTS AS THICK AS YOUR FINGER MOYOU COULD SEE THE FOUNDED TONGUE OF THE WHIP ON OUR SKIN, SOMETIMES THESE WOWED WEEP CLEAR RUID AND HATTER SCAB OUER. WAS MORIE CONTROLLED BUT HURT MORE. MRS WOULD SOMETIMES JUST "LOSIE IT" AND SNOUTINHIT YOU JUST ABOUT ANYWHERE WAS ALSO FOND OF DISHING OUT A "KICK IN THE BUM" AS HE CALLED IT. HE ONCE KICKED ME HARID ENOUGH TO LIRT ME OFF THE FLOOR, FOR "SULKING". HE ARRIVED HOME FOR LUNCH TO FIND ME IN BED WITH A HIGH REVER, VOMITING AND DIARRHEA. SO MUCH FOR SULKING. I RAN AWAY EVENTUALLY, WAS CAUGHT AND BROUGHT BACK I TOLD BROTHER , WHO WAS IN CHARGE OF ST AUGUSTINES WHAT WAS GOING ON, BUT HE RANG TO COME GET ME WHEN WE GOT MRS BACK TO THE HOUSE MR WE WALKED UP THE HALLWAY AND AS SOON AS WE WERE OUT OF SIGHT OF THE BOYS, IN THE BEDROOM

A FLASH OF LIGHT, AND I WAS GETTING UP OFF

THE FLOOR. I RAN AWAY TWICE MORE BEFORE ! WAS PUT INTO THE MAIN HOME. I WAS TRAPPED WITH THESE PEOPLE FOR 5 YEARS. WE LIVED IN CEAR OF THE NEXT BELTING. YOU WOUND SOMETIMES PHYSICALLY CRINGE AS THEY WALLTED PAST YOU. PUNISHMENT OFTEN SEEMED ARBITRAILY OR REASONS TO PUNISH ACTIVELY SOUGHT. MRS TIPTOE UP THE HALLWAY AND LISTEN IF ANY ONE WAS TALKING AFTER LIGHTS OUT, IF YOU ARE ACTIVELY LOOK FOR A REASON TO PUNISH, YOU WILL FIND ONE THESE PUNISHMENTS WERE NEUER METED OUT

TO THEIR OWN TWO CHILDREN.

Summary of Allegations by Ian O'Meara Against Cottage Parents Mr. and Mrs. at St Augustines Boys Home, Geelong between 1972 and 1977.

Ian O'Meara was born on 1961. He is the youngest of nine children, being seven years younger than the eighth child. He has four brothers, four sisters and a step sister.

In 1969 Ian's father voluntarily placed Ian in St Aidens, Bendigo. Ian's father didn't want Ian living with his mother. Ian spent Christmas 1971 with his mother at Oakleigh, Victoria and she enrolled him in the local primary school for grade five. When Ian's father, who was very sick in the Port Fairy Hospital, learned of this he arranged for Ian to go to St Augustines Boys Home, Geelong. Ian was admitted to St Augustines Boys Home in February 1972 and was subsequently made a ward of the state.

Ian was housed in 4 Dormitory at St Augustines until late 1972 when he was transferred to a cottage within the grounds of St Augustines. The cottage parents were Mr. and Mrs. who had two children. There were nine boys from St Augustines, including Ian, in the cottage. Although not demanded by the number of the cottage boys called them mum and dad. Ian did not like this because they were not his parents. Once Ian was placed in the cottage he had little contact with his mother. He blames Mrs.

After a few days at the cottage Ian observed that Mrs. was short tempered and back-handed boys for minor things. Over time Mrs. was seen to be excessively heavy handed in her treatment of the boys. Ian alleges that he was beaten on a number of occasions by Mrs. with an implement he described as a horse whip which was kept in the pantry. When a boy did something that upset Mrs. she would throw a tantrum and flog a boy with the whip wherever she could land the blow. Ian was dealt with in this manner on one occasion for smoking. He alleged that boys were whipped for general misbehaviour and, on occasions, for unexplained reasons.

It is alleged that Mr. also used the whip on boys, including Ian, but he was more controlled and landed heavy strikes between the buttocks and ankles. On some occasions when Ian was struck with the whip, welt marks were left on him.

Ian related an incident where he claimed that on the particular morning he was at the breakfast table, feeling sick and was quiet. Mrs. accused him of sulking. Ian left the room and was walking to his room when he was kicked up the backside by Mr. with such force that he was lifted off the floor. As a result Ian spent the day off school, in bed.

Ian felt that the discipline enforced by Mrs. was unreasonable, and detailed an incident where he was prevented from going to an organised day at the Torquay Life Saving Club simply because he presumed that he would be attending without first asking for permission.

Ian ran away from the cottage on three occasions. One occasion was at the end of the Christmas holidays at the start of 1975. Ian returned after a short time, and a couple of days later went to see Brother Carey about his treatment at the cottage. Mrs. McNamara was contacted and came to get him and they returned to the cottage where he saw a ropable Mr. McNamara, who struck Ian a solid blow to the back of the head knocking him across a bed. Ian momentarily lost consciousness but did not receive medical treatment. When asked why he ran away from the cottage Ian explained, "I ran away because of Dorothy McNamara. I wanted out from under her and her husband." Ian said of his time at the cottage, "I reckon that would be about the closest thing to going to gaol."

Mr. died on 1975. Ian attended his father's funeral at Port Fairy and was accompanied by Mrs. and Brother Ian alleges that he wanted to speak to his mother at the church door on his arrival but was prevented from doing so by Mrs who pushed him past his mother into the church. Ian was taken back to St Augustines as soon as the funeral was completed at the cemetery. Ian's version is in contrast to records which state, "Ian met his mother at the funeral but appears quite hostile towards her and rejecting of her."

On the third occasion when Ian ran away from the cottage he was brought back by the police. He told Brother Gerald Mitchell about his mistreatment by the Arrangements were made for Ian to leave the cottage and he was returned to St Augustines Boys Home where he was housed. Ian was formally discharged from St Augustines on 30/5/1978 but had nowhere to go. He was supported by Brother Hewitt and allowed to stay at St Augustines for some time. Ian explained, "This wasn't St Augustines Boys Home. It was my home. I didn't know any different."

Ian has not had any contact with any of the boys from the cottage or St Augustines since he left there in 1978 and no knowledge of where any of them are now.

Conclusions

The assessors have reached the following conclusions:

(a)	That Ian was born on 1961
(b)	That Ian was admitted to St. Augustines Boys Home, Geelong in February 1972
(c)	That in late 1972 Ian was transferred to a cottage within the grounds of St. Augustines, under the care of cottage parents, Mr. and Mrs
(d)	That Ian's allegation that he was beaten by Mr. and Mrs. with an implement described as a horse whip, although denied by them, is supported by and a former resident of the cottage, who both revealed that the has a propensity to behave in the manner alleged
(e)	That Ian's allegation that he was kicked up the backside by Mr. is supported by Mr. admission that he would give a boy a kick up the 'bum' if the boy deserved it
(f)	That Ian's allegation that Mrs. was responsible for Ian's lack of contact with his mother is supported by records, although it was also the wish of Ian's father that he not stay with his mother at any time
(g)	That after considering all the available information, assessors are of the opinion that Ian was on occasions, physically mistreated by Mr. and Mrs. and Mrs. his allegations are substantiated.

Recommendation

Assessors recommend that this matter proceed to facilitation.
