Young people in Victoria

Just over 1 million Victorians are between the ages of 12-25



The majority of young Victorians are healthy, active and participating in education, employment and community life.

Young Victorians face different challenges from previous generations that will affect their life experiences into the future, including:

- delayed transition from family life to independent living;
- interaction via social media;
- economic uncertainty;
- a greater sense of personal empowerment; and
- growing and changing communities.

Young people make up 19 per cent of the Victorian population

Vision

That all young Victorians experience healthy, active and fulfilling lives and have the opportunity to achieve their full potential, participate in the workforce and be involved in their community

Principles

- Empowering all young people
- Listening, responding to and promoting young people
- Delivering through partnerships
- Remaining relevant for young people
- Understanding families and communities

Aims

- Young people are engaged education and training, further education and training pathways, employment
- Young people are involved decision-making, activities and programs, communities
