
Our Achievements

- Impressive attendances at our cultural institutions, including:
 - 570, 537 visitors to the NGV Yayoi Kusama exhibition, the most popular ticketed exhibition in the NGV's history
 - a record breaking 2.65+ million visitors in 2023-24 to the State Library Victoria, the 3rd most popular library in the world
 - almost 1.1 million people enjoyed 1,120 performances at Arts Centre Melbourne venues.
- Supported 144 venues through the first round of 10,000 Gigs: The Victorian Gig Fund.
 - Provided grants to **22** festivals through the 2024 round of the Live Music Festivals Fund.

Our Achievements

- Presented a major Victorian First Peoples Art and Design Fair Showcase at the 2025 Melbourne Art Fair.
- Provided over \$3 million of investment to Victorian First Nations artists, projects and companies.
- Invested \$3.6 million in the GameChanger Academy, developing in-demand screen industry skills.
- Investment in the VICSCREEN strategy is creating over 40,000 jobs and has generated over \$1.7 billion in direct economic expenditure between 2021-2025.





State of the Portfolio

- Victoria's creative industries contribute **\$41.4 billion** to the State's economy, representing **8.4%** of the total economy in 2023-24.
- The creative economy employs approximately 327,000
 Victorians 8.7% of the total State workforce.
- Victoria's screen sector injected \$331 million into the economy in 2023–24.
- Continuing to deliver Australia's largest cultural infrastructure project – the \$1.7 billion Melbourne Arts Precinct Transformation project.
