- Issues identified on appointment to Office:
 - Reliance on non-recurrent funding for recurrent services
 - Lapsing funding
 - National Reform agreement detrimental to Victoria
 - Price pressures, (public holiday funding)
 - > Ambulance Victoria facing significant financial pressure
 - > Multiple industrial awards to be renegotiated
 - HealthSMART implementation issues
 - Unfunded capital projects


Commonwealth/State Relations

- Inter-governmental issues have created uncertainty for health budgeting and planning.
 - Commonwealth Grants Comm. Recommendations reduces GST revenue
 - National Health Reform Agreement 'under development'
 - Unresolved 'implementation plans'
 - Health and Hospital Fund bids outcome unknown
 - Poorly defined promises and allocations

Health Budget Highlights

- \$13 billion expenditure overall \$1.3 billion additional over 4 years to strengthen Hospital Services
 - > \$448 million for 800 beds commitment
 - \$540 million for increased hospital services
- \$413 million investment in Ambulance Services
- \$107 million over 4 years for chronic disease prevention
- \$218 million over 4 years for aged care services
- \$522 million for infrastructure investment

Health Budget: Hospitals

 \$1.3 billion over 4 years (\$317.2m in 2011-12) to strengthen Hospital Services

The first 100 of the 800 beds

Increased hospital capacity

- 18,250 patients to be admitted for urgent or critical care
- 48,500 patients to be treated in emergency departments
- Elective surgery
 - 12,000 people treated in 2011-12
- Meeting cost pressures
- Improving performance across the system
- Boost to Ballarat health services

Health Budget: Ambulance

- \$413 million investment in Ambulance Services
 - Halving the cost of membership fees (\$242m)
 - \$171m for Ambulance services:



- Upgrade & build new stations - \$16m
- MICA units
- Motorcycle paramedic units
- 310 new paramedics
- 30 patient transport offices

Health Budget: Rural Services

- \$315 million to expand services in rural Victoria
 - \$67.0 m over four years for country hospital upgrades, including Ballan, Echuca, Kerang and Warragul to be funded from the new Country Hospitals Fund
 - \$12.0m to attract and retain medical professionals to rural and regional areas.
 - \$102m (TEI) New Bendigo Hospital (expanded)
 - \$56m Rural Capital Support
 - \$73.4m Boost for Ballarat health services
 - 200 new paramedics for regional Victoria

Health Budget: Prevention

- \$107 million over 4 years for chronic disease prevention
 - Bowel cancer screening (\$2m)
 - Diabetes nurse specialists (\$1m)
 - Healthy Living Victoria Life! Diabetes and cardiovascular disease prevention program (\$22.2m)
 - Victorian EyeCare Service expansion (\$3.2m)
 - NPA on Preventative Health Chronic Disease Prevention in Victoria (\$79m)

Health Budget: Further highlights



- Palliative care (\$34.4m)
- \$26.5m to improve oral health
 - Early intervention
 - Employment
 - Including funding to support relocation of dentists to rural areas
 - Mobile dental units

Health Budget: Infrastructure

- \$522 million for infrastructure investment
 - >\$116.0m to increase capacity, including
 - Olivia Newton John Cancer & Wellness Centre Stage 2B;
 - Northern Hospital ED expansion;
 - Maroondah Hospital expansion;
 - Frankston Hospital Inpatient dept expansion


Monash Children's

\$244.0m from the Health Infrastructure fund\$67.0m from the Country Hospital Fund

Monash Children's

- Funded Project
 - \$250m funding; \$60m this term
 - \$8.5m brought forward for planning certainty
- 2 Design Options
- Aim for best and most efficient service solution.
- Best Option requires land acquisition and detailed planning before construction commencement
























Box Hill Expansion

Bendigo Hospital


 \$102m to redevelop Bendigo Hospital as a world class health facility




Victorian Health Priorities Framework 2012-2022: Metropolitan Health Plan

- The Health Priorities Framework responds to the challenges of the ageing population, increases in chronic disease and rising health costs.
- Informed by Consultations and Ministerial Advisory Council





Victorian Health Priorities Framework 2012-2022: Metropolitan Health Plan

- By 2022, Victoria's Health system should be:
 - Responsive to people's needs
 - People are as healthy as they can be (optimal health status)
 - People are managing their own health better
 - People enjoy the best possible health care service outcomes
 - Rigorously informed and informative
 - Care is clinically effective and cost-effective and delivered in the most clinically effective and cost-effective service settings.
 - The health system is highly productive and health services are cost-effective and affordable.
