Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA)

The VCAA provides high-quality curricula and assessment for all Victorian schools.

Curriculum

- Victorian Curriculum (F-10)
- Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE)
- VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM)
- Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC)
- Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL)

Quality Assessment and Regulation Division (QARD)

QARD is responsible for the regulation of around 5,000 early childhood services in Victoria under:

- the National Quality
 Framework
- the Victorian Children's Services Act and Regulations.

QARD is also the regulator of the Child Safe Standards for all early childhood services in Victoria.

As the regulator, QARD supports children attending early childhood services by:

- promoting their safety, health and wellbeing
- improving their educational and developmental outcomes

Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA)

The VRQA is Victoria's education and training regulator.

Primary, secondary and specialist education

Schools and non-school education providers must meet registration standards

Home schooling

Approximately 11,691 students were registered for home schooling (as at June 2025).

In addition to regulating schooling, the VRQA also has responsibility for adult education functions, including apprenticeships, traineeships and Registered Training Organisations

Victorian Institute of Teaching (VIT)

The VIT regulates members of the teaching profession for both school and early childhood education. It supports teaching practice through professional standards.

Its responsibilities include:

- accrediting initial teacher education programs that prepare early career teachers working in Victoria
- monitoring the suitability of registered teachers
- supporting beginner teachers to enter the profession
- investigating instances of misconduct, incompetence or lack of fitness to teach
- regulating compliance with the codes of conduct and ethics



Best Start, Best Life: building the early childhood workforce supply and quality


- 11.5% increase in the number of fully registered early childhood teachers since 2024
- 800 educators supported to upskill from a Certificate III to a Diploma qualification since 2024
- more than 5,000 scholarships awarded since 2018, removing financial and other barriers to study early childhood teaching
- 10 new partnerships with tertiary education providers established since 2024 to support more Victorians to obtain early childhood educator and teacher qualifications
- 70 Early Years Learning Networks operating across Victoria in 2024-25 to connect and support early childhood teachers
- more than 800 grants awarded in 2024 to support provisionally registered early childhood teachers to progress to full registration
- 841 experienced teachers completed the Effective Mentoring Program to support early childhood teachers in 2024-25

NAPLAN in 2025

Victorian students achieved the best overall results nationwide

Highest scores:

- in 18 of 20 measures, Victoria ranked first or second
- Victorian primary school students ranked first or second in all 10 domains

Greatest improvement:

- mean scores were higher in 17 of the 20 measures, compared to 2024
- Victorian secondary students exceeded the results of their 2024 peers on every measure

More students excelling and fewer needing additional support:

- 70% of Victorian students were 'strong' or 'exceeding' in 18 of 20 measures
- Only 7.3% of Victorian students needed additional support

Excellence in teaching and learning: strengthening evidence-based approaches

Achievements in 2024-25:

- started implementing the updated **Victorian Teaching and Learning Model** in all Victorian government schools
- developed more than 4,000 high-quality, curriculum-aligned lesson plans to support effective and consistent teaching practice. These lesson plans had more than 1.2 million views and 143,000 downloads
- started implementing Victoria's **reading position**, including a requirement of **25 minutes** of daily explicit teaching of phonics in early primary years
- 93% of government primary schools already using this approach to teach reading, well ahead of the 2027 requirement
- 94% of government schools already choosing to use Grade 1 Phonics Check before it becomes mandatory in 2026
- Victoria's mathematics position announced in May 2025, with work under way to lift students' numeracy attainment
- more than 55,000 students accessed the Victorian High-Ability Program and the Victorian Challenge and Enrichment Series
- more than 120,000 students accessed additional targeted learning support or intensive support

South Geelong Primary School

Work continues to close the learning achievement gap between First Nations students and their non-First Nations peers. While the gap remains unacceptably large, 2025 NAPLAN results show the gap in average attainment for First Nations students in Reading decreased for both Grade 3 and Year 9 students.


