Victorians homeless

Victorians felt their community faced pressures on several fronts

- ▶ 68.5% identified housing affordability and homelessness as an issue in their community and 35% said it was an issue for themselves
- ▶ **52.8%** identified **financial hardship and inclusion** as an issue in their community and 32.4% said it was an issue for themselves

DFFH was there to support Victorians in need

We responded to growing community needs

- ► Commenced 47,361 child protection investigations (↑15%)
- ► Authorised 448 children to an Aboriginal child protection agency
- ▶ Delivered family services to 19,854 families
- ▶ Opened 301,863 cases through The Orange Door, with 30% of people accessing directly through self-referral
- ► Delivered 33,985 family violence case management support episodes to victim survivors
- ▶ Provided **550,000 hours** of respite and support for carers
- ► Supported **231,390 households** with utility relief grants
- ► Issued 8,841 bond loans to help low-income Victorians access private rentals (↑27.5%)
- Supported 111,000 Victorians in public housing on any given night



We worked hard to improve the lives of Victorians

We delivered

- 2,392 new social homes and 286 new affordable homes across Victoria
- ▶ 313 pad and tampon vending machines installed in Free Pads and Tampons in Public Places program
- ► 116 grants to boost food security and deliver direct food relief
- 21 disability advocacy agencies funded to support an extra 800 Victorians with disability
- ► 47,000+ jobs created, boosting the economy and improving the livelihoods of Victorians.

► 137,000 risk assessments and safety plans using MARAM across health, education, justice and community services

In 2024-25, we...

Supported **Aboriginal leadership**, **culture** and **community**.

Added 4 teams to the Aboriginal Children in Aboriginal Care program, giving Aboriginal community-controlled organisations legal responsibility for an additional 144 Aboriginal children involved in the child protection system

Supported 27 place-based projects for Aboriginal-led approaches to preventing and responding to family violence through the Aboriginal Community Initiatives Fund.

Helped establish and maintain selfgoverning Aboriginal governance groups across Victoria, including:

- Metro and Regional based Governance Groups
- ► The department's Aboriginal Strategic Governance Forum (ASGF)
- ACCO caucus leadership role in agenda setting for the Aboriginal Children's Forum (ACF) increased and formalised.

Supported:

- Aboriginal women to recover from the trauma and impact of family violence
- improved access to early childhood, maternal and child health, and family support services

Strengthened engagement with First Nations young people through

- partnership with the Koorie Youth Council
- youth leadership and mentoring initiatives
- support for youth mentoring programs, building connection to culture and community and enhancing pathways to employment

Objective 2

Children, young people and families are safe, strong and supported.

Reports were made to child protection services about the safety and wellbeing of children - an **increase of 8.6%**

We launched Victorian Redress for Historical Institutional Abuse

- ► Applications for **Victorian Redress** opened on 10 December 2024
- ► Government committed \$165 million under the 2024–25 State Budget to deliver redress for people physically, psychologically or emotionally abused or neglected as children in institutional settings before 1990.

We worked to improve outcomes for children and young people in care

- ► Education support for children in care provides one-on-one tutoring from a qualified teacher for up to 500 of the more than 2,000 children and young people in care who are disengaged or at risk disengaging from education.
- ▶ Pathways to Good Health, delivered collaboratively with Department of Health, gives children who enter or re-enter statutory care pathways for health and disability supports.
- ► Housing First commenced for young people leaving care, providing at least two years of housing and three years of wraparound supports.

We supported wellbeing and engagement for South Sudanese, Somali, Afghan and Pasifika young people and their families through

- ► funding 6 Community Support Groups that support more than 2,500 young people and their families through education and training, mental health and employment as well as through cultural and community activities that foster positive engagement
- ▶ delivering the **Le Mana Pasifika Project** for at-risk Pasifika young people, which supported more than **1,000 Pasifika young people** in 2024–25.

We supported Victorians with disability

- publicly funded autism assessments for people who would otherwise be unable to afford an assessment
- engaged residents and their supports to co-design and build innovative Specialist Disability Accommodation
- Increased resourcing to the Youth Forensic
 Disability Clinical Service.

We provided more social and affordable housing to the community by progressing the delivery of:

- ► the Housing Statement's **High-Rise Redevelopment Program**
- more than 10,800 homes underway or complete (including 3,700 regional homes) through the Big Housing Build and Regional Housing Fund
- ▶ 2,740 homes under the innovative Ground Lease Model a mix of social, affordable, market rental and specialist disability accommodation.
- ► Upgrades to 1,716 public housing dwellings.

We supported Victorians experiencing homelessness by delivering:

- delivering Housing First programs, such as Journey to Social Inclusion which allocated support packages to more than 110 people experiencing chronic homelessness
- ► targeted housing & support to prevent youth homelessness through 4 additional initiatives: Village 21 Preston, Kids Under Cover Studios, Holmesglen Education First Youth Foyer and Homelessness Youth Dual Diagnosis Initiative.

In 2024-25, we...

Supported

delivery of the social services regulatory scheme and improved regulatory oversight through

 supporting establishment and operation of the Social Services Regulator in its first year.

Invested

in recruitment and retention strategies to support our community services workforce by

- working with the community services sector to recruit the right people for the right roles in the Jobs that Matter campaign
- targeting child protection recruitment within the campaign through Go Where You're Needed
- Focusing on regional locations with the highest vacancy rates by running localised campaigns in areas such as Gippsland, the Mallee and Wodonga.

Introduced

a new Service Agreement with the community service sector that

- provides the terms and conditions for community services organisations to use departmental funding
- includes new terms and conditions that strengthen protection against fraud and corruption.
