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QUESTIONS ON NOTICE

Answers to the following questions on notice were circulated on the date shown. Questions have been incorporated from the notice paper of the Legislative Council. Answers have been incorporated in the form supplied by the departments on behalf of the appropriate ministers. The portfolio of the minister answering the question on notice starts each heading.

Police and emergency services: protective services officers — advertising

8179. MS PENNICUIK — To ask the Minister for Employment and Industrial Relations (for the Minister for Police and Emergency Services): In relation to Victoria Police’s recruitment billboard advertising campaign for protective services officers:

- (1) What is the budget for billboard advertising in the 2011–12, 2012–13 and 2013–14 financial years.
- (2) As at 22 November 2011 —
 - (a) how many billboards have been hired at and in the vicinity of train stations;
 - (b) how many billboards have been hired at bus stops; and
 - (c) how many billboards have been hired at all other locations.
- (3) As at 22 November 2011, what has been the total amount spent on billboard advertising for —
 - (a) design and printing;
 - (b) hire of billboards at and in the vicinity of train stations;
 - (c) hire of billboards at bus stops;
 - (d) hire of billboards at all other locations; and
 - (e) all other costs.
- (4) How is Victoria Police measuring the number of applications received as a result of billboard advertising.

ANSWER:

I am advised that:

- (1) Expenditure for billboard advertising for the recruitment of Protective Services Officers in 2011–12 was \$259 875.

Specific budgets for billboard advertising in 2012–13 and 2013–14 have not been established.

- (2) Victoria Police advises that information regarding the number of billboards hired is collated by period, rather than for a specific date. Also, data detailing the number of billboards hired can only be provided as a total for all locations, which is 470 billboards for the period September to November 2011 inclusive.
- (3) Victoria Police advises that information regarding the cost of billboard advertising is collated by period, rather than for a specific date and that some costs cannot be broken down by location. Total expenditure for billboard advertising for the period September to November inclusive was \$123 703. This comprises \$10 170 for design, \$6633 for printing, \$80 085 for hire at railway stations (which can be separately identified), and \$26 814 for hire at other locations.
- (4) While Victoria Police measures the number of applications and the impact of the overall campaign, there is no reliable measure that links billboard advertising and the number of applications received.

Environment and climate change: state environment protection policy — noise control

8554. MS PENNICUIK — To ask the Minister for Health (for the Minister for Environment and Climate Change): In relation to section 19 of the Environment Protection Act 1970, under which the authority must ensure that a state environment protection policy (SEPP) or a waste management policy is reviewed before the expiry of the period of 10 years after the policy came into effect or the policy was last reviewed: When will the minister commission a review of SEPP No. 2 (Control of Music Noise from Public Premises), which was declared in 1989 and amended in 1999, as required under section 19 of the act and according to the process outlined in section 18.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

The Department of Sustainability and Environment and the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) are expected to release a Statutory Policy Review in early 2013 that commits them to delivering a simpler, more streamlined and accountable framework for State Environment Protection Policies (SEPPs) and Waste Management Policies (WMPs).

DSE and EPA are currently working through a priority list of SEPPs and WMPs to be reviewed under this new framework.

Ageing: home and community care — city of Greater Bendigo

8574. MS BROAD — To ask the Minister for Ageing:

- (1) What was the state government funding contribution to the City of Greater Bendigo Home and Community Care (HACC) Services in:
 - (a) 2010; and
 - (b) 2011.
- (2) What will be the state government funding contribution to the City of Greater Bendigo HACC Services in 2013.
- (3) Have there been cuts to HACC services at the City of Greater Bendigo; if so, what HACC services have been cut at the City of Greater Bendigo.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

- (1) The HACC program is jointly funded by the commonwealth and state governments. Total funding through the HACC program to the local government area of Greater Bendigo was
 - (a) \$10 990 000 as at 1 July 2010
 - (b) \$11 444 000 as at 1 July 2011
- (2) It is not yet possible to specify the allocation from the HACC program at 1 July 2013 to the LGA of Greater Bendigo. The state and commonwealth budgets are due in May 2013.
- (3) Total HACC funds (commonwealth and state) have grown from \$606.1 million in 2011–12 to \$640.8 million in 2012–13. Funds in the LGA of Greater Bendigo have also grown over that time.

Public transport: Maryborough–Ararat railway line — future

8689. MS PULFORD — To ask the Minister for Planning (for the Minister for Public Transport): In relation to the Maryborough–Ararat railway line:

- (1) Does the government intend to reopen the line.
- (2) What time frame does the government have for reopening the line; and
- (3) How much has been spent by governments on the line —
 - (a) between 1992 and 1999;
 - (b) between 1999 and 2010; and
 - (c) since 2010.

ANSWER:

I am informed that, as at the date the question was raised:

(1–2) The government currently has no plans to reopen the line between Maryborough and Ararat.

(3) (a–c)

The line was maintained in operating condition following its conversion from broad gauge to standard gauge in 1995 until it was booked out of service in 2004. However, no specific data is available showing expenditure on the line for the years you have requested, either while it was operating or since it has been booked out of service.

Water: Snowy River — scientific committee re-establishment

8702. MR LENDERS — To ask the Minister for Higher Education and Skills (for the Minister for Water): In relation to the Snowy Scientific Committee (SSC) established under the Snowy Hydro Corporatisation Act 1997 (cth), to which Victoria appoints members, when will the independent SSC be re-established.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

Under the terms of the Snowy Hydro Corporatisation Act 1997 (NSW) which governs the establishment and ongoing membership of the Snowy Scientific Committee, Victoria's role is limited to the provision of two persons for appointment to the committee by the responsible NSW minister.

To that end, on 14 March 2012, the Victorian government advised the state government of New South Wales that the Victorian government's nominees were Professor Sam Lake and Mr Graeme Dear.

The Victorian government maintains its support for the Snowy Scientific Committee to continue the role for which it was first established in 2008. However, as the process is specified under NSW legislation, the Victorian government's discretion in this matter is limited. Accordingly, the timing of the committee's re-establishment is a matter for the NSW government to determine.

Water: Snowy River — flow monitoring

8703. MR LENDERS — To ask the Minister for Higher Education and Skills (for the Minister for Water): What was the amount of funding provided to the Snowy River Flow Response Monitoring project by the government in:

- (a) 2009–10;
- (b) 2010–11;
- (c) 2011–12; and
- (d) 2012–13.

ANSWER:

I am informed that:

The Victorian government has provided the following funding to the New South Wales government for the Snowy River Flow Response Monitoring project:

- (a) 2009–10 — \$80 000
- (b) 2010–11 — \$100 000
- (c) 2011–12 — \$100 000
- (d) For the 2012–13 financial year and beyond, Victoria is proposing to achieve more cost effective and targeted monitoring through a collaboration between DSE and the East Gippsland Catchment Management Authority, rather than contributing funds through New South Wales. Work is currently being finalised for this new monitoring program, concentrating on improved Victorian outcomes as a result of increased Snowy environmental flows. While the final budget allocation has yet to be determined, it is expected to be broadly consistent with previous years.

Water: Snowy River — flow monitoring

8704. MR LENDERS — To ask the Minister for Higher Education and Skills (for the Minister for Water): Has the minister been advised of any changes to the resourcing of the Snowy River Flow Response Monitoring project on the part of the New South Wales government.

ANSWER:

My department is unaware of the budget that has been allocated by the New South Wales government for resourcing the Snowy River Flow Response Monitoring project. This is a matter for the New South Wales government.

Public transport: Department of Transport — traffic infringement notices

8711. MR BARBER — To ask the Minister for Planning (for the Minister for Public Transport): In 2011–12:

- (1) How many reports of non-compliance from Authorised Officers were received by the Department of Transport.
- (2) How many ticket infringement notices were issued by the Department of Transport; and of those infringements issued —
 - (a) how many requests for review were received by the Department of Transport; and of those requests for review received, how many original decisions were overturned and no longer pursued; and
 - (b) how many ticket infringement matters were prosecuted at the Infringements Court.
- (3) How many matters were referred to the Infringements Court for consideration of special circumstances.
- (4) On how many separate occasions did the department have to appear at the Infringements Court.
- (5) How many challenged infringement notices were waived ('waived' not meaning they were found not guilty of the offence, but that the amount due under the infringement was not enforced by the Infringements Court).
- (6) How many penalties under the current section 228H(1) of the Transport (Compliance and Miscellaneous) Act 1983 have been issued to accredited companies to date.
- (7) Of this amount, how many have been issued to bus companies, how many have been issued to train companies and how many have been issued to tram companies.
- (8) For each of the five gazetted categories of 'relevant incidents', how many have been reported against each one.

- (9) Since the Ombudsman's report in December 2010, how many new full-time equivalent positions have been created within the Department of Transport to administer the new authorised officer protocols.
- (10) How many additional full-time equivalent positions will be required over the forward estimates.

 - (a) 32 339 requests for review were received. 591 decisions were withdrawn, and 17 152 decisions were withdrawn with official warnings.
 - (b) The department does not prosecute matters at the Infringements Court. However, the department has prosecuted 11 787 ticket and behavioural related matters in the Magistrates Court and the Children's Court.
- (3) No matters were referred to the Infringements Court for consideration of special circumstances. However, 2205 matters were referred to the Magistrate's Court for consideration of special circumstances.

The department does not appear at the Infringements Court. However, the department has appeared 779 times at the Magistrates Court and the Children's Court.

Roads: Federation Trail — extension

8982. VicRoads is currently consulting with stakeholders including the Department of Transport, Public Transport Victoria, V/Line, VicTrack, and Australian Rail Track Corporation regarding options for extension of the trail to Williamstown Road. VicRoads expects to complete this consultation and determine a preferred option in early 2013.

VicRoads will determine a construction start date and estimated completion date once a preferred option has been identified.

Health: Kew Residential Services site — revenue

9239. MS PENNICUIK — To ask the Minister for Health: In relation to the Ombudsman’s Report ‘Investigation into the probity of the Kew Residential Services and St Kilda Triangle developments, June 2010’, in particular recommendation 10 that the Department of Human Services (DHS) should ‘report on the financial return to the state from the Kew Residential Services (KRS) project in its annual report’, and noting that the DHS annual report for both 2011 and 2012 made no mention of Kew Cottages (or KRS) and that the 2011–12 Report for Major Projects (in the financial report, page 68) reports reduced revenue from land development (Kew Residential Land Development) of \$21 127 in 2012 against \$56 543 in 2011:

- (1) As all assets relating to the former Kew Residential Services site were transferred to Major Projects Victoria located within the Department of Business and Innovation in 2007–08, the financial information relating to this development appears in their annual report.

The Department of Human Services Annual Report 2011–12 includes expenditure relating to a project management fee paid to Major Projects Victoria.

- (2) The Department of Human Services will continue to report on expenditure relating to project management fees paid to Major Projects Victoria for the Kew Residential Services project.
