State care leavers

Ms Patten, thank you for raising the matter of supports for young people leaving care in Victoria.

Every year approximately 500 young people between the ages of 16 years and 18 years leave care in Victoria.

The Roadmap for Reform sets out the Government's long term vision and commitment to support vulnerable children, young people and families, including young people transitioning from care.

The government invests more than \$11 million per annum in programs to support young people as they transition from care to independent adulthood. These supports include:

- Information, support and referral services
- Access to flexible brokerage
- Specific supports for Aboriginal young people leaving care
- Springboard program — intensive support for young people leaving residential care, to maintain or get back into education, training and/or employment

The Government is strengthening and improving supports for young people leaving care through current trials underway in the southern part of Victoria and the Barwon area — the 'Better Futures' initiatives are trialling a new practice model approach and resources to support young people transitioning to independence.

New investment of \$10.1 million over four years will provide for additional housing assistance for young people transitioning from care, and those leaving youth justice. Assistance may include subsidies to enable young people in kinship care and foster care to remain in these living arrangements after their 18th birthday.

In April 2017 the Government announced it was commencing negotiations for the trial of a Social Impact Bond to improve outcomes for young people leaving care. This project is in the joint development phase, with negotiations progressing well. Further details regarding this exciting initiative will be announced in the near future.

The Andrews Labor Government's Youth Policy is strengthening our engagement with young people across Victoria and is introducing a number of mechanisms which enable young people to shape government reforms, including services, policies and programs that benefit young people. It is disappointing that the Federal Liberal Government has cut funding to the National Youth Week Program which highlighted Australia's young people.

To support young people and celebrate the vital role they play in our community we are almost doubling our investment for an inaugural Victorian Youth Week in 2018 which acknowledges and celebrates the inspiring and motivated young people across Victoria.

The Andrews Labor Government has invested in a number of new and innovative programs to provide stronger support for vulnerable young people living in areas of social and economic disadvantage. These programs include the Empower Youth program, the Aboriginal Youth Mentoring Program and the Young Pasifika program.

As part of the \$4 million Empower Youth program, youth workers have been engaged by eight organisations working in high priority communities to provide intensive and tailored support to young people to enhance their health and wellbeing, education and training, community participation and pathways to employment.

Funding for the Empower Youth Program was determined through a competitive grant round. In the western suburbs, Wyndham City Council has received funding to deliver an Empower Youth project and the South Sudanese Community Association has been funded to deliver a project to support and empower South Sudanese young people in Wyndham and Brimbank.

The government is also continuing to fund core youth programs such as Advance, FReeZA and Engage! Which are designed to provide young people with more opportunities in activities such as community engagement, mentoring, volunteering, leadership and skill building.

I would encourage all youth organisations to apply for competitive grants available through the Youth Affairs portfolio, information about grant programs can be found on the Youth Central website.

Bendigo and Campaspe police resources

I thank the Member for her question regarding police numbers and resources throughout the area of Bendigo and Campaspe.

As the member will be aware, the Andrews Labor Government has provided the biggest boost to frontline police in Victoria's history. In total, the Government is funding 3135 additional frontline police, over the next five years, on top of attrition, to support police respond to crime in our communities.

Analysis of latest crime statistics, to the year ending 30 September 2017, shows that the rate of offences per 100 000 population decreased by 1.7 per cent in Greater Bendigo and decreased by 4.4 per cent in Campaspe compared to the 12 months prior.

Victoria Police's state-of-the-art new Staff Allocation Manual (SAM) uses a range of data, including baseline staffing needs, recorded crime, calls for police assistance and response times for different types of crime to plan for deployments.

As the decision of how and where resources are deployed is the responsibility of the Chief Commissioner, I have referred the matter to his office and have been advised of the following.

At present, Victoria Police balance counter service hours to the public in a flexible manner to ensure the best possible use of available resources. The Chief Commissioner for Police recognises that proactive operations, putting resources where they are needed and responding to calls for assistance will best address crime and other community concerns.

Therefore, if a police station is closed, including 16 hour Police Stations, members may already be out on patrol. If police attendance is required the public should always ring '000'.

Alternatively, to report non-urgent incidents and/or behaviour offences the public can contact Crimestoppers at www.crimestoppersvic.com.au or phone 1800 333 000.

With regard to Rochester Station, Victoria Police advises that this station does receive regular night shift patrols with the Kyabram night shift divisional van tasked to focus on the Kyabram cluster station Response Zones, which includes Rochester.

There are also additional proactive patrols on night shift provided by police members from the Echuca Police Station and the Campaspe Highway Patrol is also regularly tasked for patrol duties in and surrounding Rochester.

Mornington Peninsula schoolies week

I thank the member for his question and the opportunity to demonstrate how Victoria Police is a proactive and vigilant organisation within the community. I also share the member's concern for the safety of the community and the young school leavers who are particularly prone to risky behaviour at this time.

The aim of the police response to 'schoolies' week is to provide a highly-visible presence to identified areas along the Mornington Peninsula, including the Rye foreshore, as a deterrent to crime and anti-social behaviour and to ensure the safety of all persons involved in schoolies activities, as well as the community. To achieve this, the Southern Metro Region resourced a number of initiatives throughout the schoolies period.

The Southern Metro Region resourced two Divisional Van Units and a Patrol Sergeant to be allocated for each afternoon shift, while one afternoon shift also reverted to a twilight shift running between 6pm and 2am on a Friday and Saturday night. An additional twilight shift also operated on a Friday and Saturday night, with a pro-active policing unit operating on the twilight shift for 14 of the 18 days. Victoria Police advised that if required, extra police resources could also be allocated from Mornington, Hastings and Frankston police service areas.

In the lead up to and during the 2017 schoolies week, Rosebud Police worked with a number of stakeholder partners including the Mornington Peninsula Shire, particularly Youth Services and Environment Protection, Red Frogs Australia support network, Life Saving Victoria and Stays / Airbnb.

Rosebud Police also initiated Media strategies via 'Eye-watch' and local newspapers. While consideration of entertainment was raised in the lead up to schoolies, proposed venues such as Point Nepean National Park, Mornington Racecourse and the Dromana Drive-In were rejected by event promoters. The provision of some type of entertainment for 'schoolies' is to be considered next year to manage and contain crowd behaviour and enhance security.

United Voice website

The Government is aware of the Rate My Boss website. A review of the website shows clearly on the front page that the union, United Voice, is responsible for it.

As the Minister for Industrial Relations I have no regulatory responsibilities for the content of this website.

I share the Members concern for websites that seek to raise money under ulterior motives, for example the "Save the CFA" website operated by the Liberal Party which sought donations for the Liberal Party.

I encourage anyone interested in providing a donation to assist United Voice's campaign to ensure hospitality staff are treated and paid lawfully to be clear that the website is, as is clearly marked, operated by United Voice.

The issue that the union raises is a serious one, the member may be aware that a recent investigation by the Fair Work Ombudsman found more than 800 hospitality industry employers had under paid staff by around \$2.3 million.

REPLY:

The government and the Cohuna District Hospital Board of Management are committed to maintaining a safe high quality maternity service in Cohuna and are taking all necessary steps to achieve this.

The decision to temporarily suspend birthing services at Cohuna District Hospital was taken very seriously by the Board of Management and supported by the Director of Medical Services. The decision was made in the interest of the safety of the women and their babies who utilise the service.

Cohuna District Hospital is a designated level 2 maternity service which includes ante and post-natal care and birthing. A level 2 maternity service is required to be appropriately staffed to safely provide a birthing service 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

The Board was concerned that only one general practitioner obstetrician was available to provide this 24 hour service. This led to the decision to temporarily suspend the service in the interest of safety. Fortunately the decision was able to be reversed when interim locum medical support was secured.

Cohuna District Health is actively working with health services and agencies in the region to secure ongoing medical support for the maternity service. This includes engagement with the Rural Workforce Agency Victoria and local Primary Health Network to support general practitioner recruitment in the region.

Safer Care Victoria, the lead agency for quality and safety in Victoria, has conducted an independent assessment of maternity services at Cohuna District Hospital to support the Board and the Department of Health and Human Services to plan for the future provision of maternity services for the women and babies of Cohuna.
