The bill is void. It is unlawful to present it to the Governor for royal assent.
Absolute majority	18 (2AA)	Qualification and appointment of judges.	<p>The third reading must be passed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • in the Assembly, by a minimum of 45 out of 88 members • in the Council, by a minimum of 21 out of 40 members. 	The bill is void. It is unlawful to present it to the Governor for royal assent.
Absolute majority	18 (2A)	Under the Constitution, the Supreme Court has unlimited jurisdiction within Victoria. Sometimes a bill indirectly impacts on that jurisdiction, for example by not allowing an appeal to the Supreme Court.	<p>The minister must make a statement giving the reasons for impacting the Supreme Court's powers. Also, the third reading must be passed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • in the Assembly, by a minimum of 45 out of 88 members. • in the Council, by a minimum of 21 out of 40 members. 	The bill is still valid and becomes law but the sections impacting on the Supreme Court are void.
