

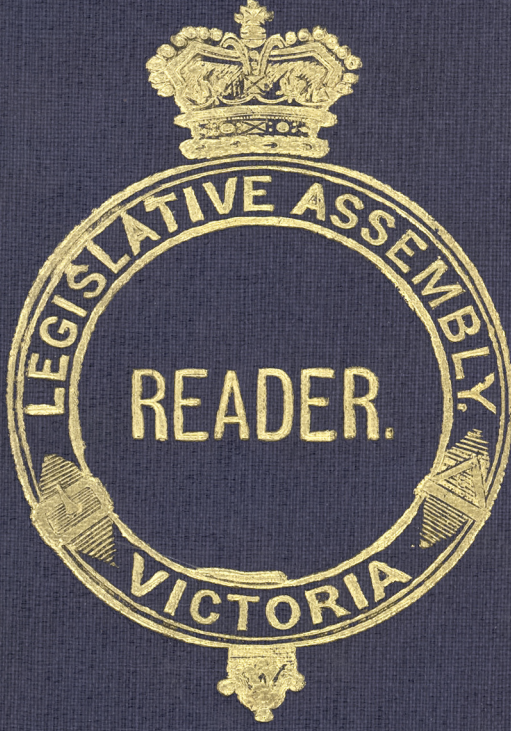

### Questions.

GRAHAM: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Water Supply if, in view of the statements appearing in the daily press relative to the construction of the Trawool storage basin on the Goulburn by a private syndicate, he will, before giving any encouragement to such proposal, consider the advisability of constructing this reservoir as a national work, so as not to give any vested rights which may prove detrimental to the best interests of the people of Northern Victoria.
