

PROCEEDINGS ON BILLS

[N.B.—The paging referred to relates to the Volume of Votes and Proceedings, &c., Session 1962-63.]

ADMINISTRATION AND PROBATE (FAMILY PROVISION): Bill intituled "An Act to amend the 'Administration and Probate Act 1958' to enable proper Provision to be made out of the Estate of a Person dying intestate for the Maintenance and Support of his Dependants and for other purposes"—(Mr. Rylah).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 17 Oct., 1962, p. 38; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 17 Oct., 1962, p. 39; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 8 Nov., p. 56. (Assented to 20 November, 1962. Act No. 6920.)

ADOPTION OF CHILDREN (PROPERTY): Bill intituled "An Act to amend Section Eight of the 'Adoption of Children Act 1958' as to the effect of the making of Adoption Orders upon the Devolution of Property"—(Mr. Rylah).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 4 Dec., 1962, p. 78; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 5 Dec., p. 79; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council with the Assembly's amendment desired, 11 Dec., p. 86; the Council's agreement to the amendment notified, 12 Dec., p. 90. (Assented to 18 December, 1962. Act No. 6971.)

ADULT EDUCATION: Bill to amend section 66 of the Education Act 1958—(Mr. Rylah for Mr. Bloomfield).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 12 Sept., 1962, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 18 Sept., p. 18; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Oct., p. 33; the Council's agreement notified, 30 Oct., p. 48. (Assented to 7 November, 1962. Act No. 6904.)

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGES (FINANCIAL): Bill to amend section 9 of the Agricultural Colleges Act 1958 and for other purposes—(Mr. Turnbull, Kara Kara).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 3) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 5 Sept., 1962, p. 10; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 12 Sept., p. 14; debate resumed—Bill read a second time, and passed remaining stages

without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 25 Sept., p. 24; the Council's agreement notified, 16 Oct., p. 37. (Assented to 19 October, 1962. Act No. 6896.)

AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION (CONTINUATION): Bill relating to agricultural education—(Mr. Turnbull, Kara Kara).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 5 Sept., 1962, p. 9; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Sept., p. 24; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 14) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Oct., pp. 37-8; the Council's agreement notified, 31 Oct., p. 50; report by the Clerk of the Parliaments of a clerical error in the Bill; error corrected and the Council's concurrence with the correction desired, 7 Nov., p. 53; the Council's agreement in correction of clerical error notified, 13 Nov., p. 57. (Assented to 20 November, 1962. Act No. 6914.)

APPROPRIATION: Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the 30th June, 1963, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this and the last preceding session of Parliament—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 6 Dec., 1962, pp. 80-3; the Council's agreement notified, 19 March, 1963, p. 94. (Assented to 18 December, 1962. Act No. 6977.)

BAIRNSDALE (UNIMPROVED RATING POLL): Bill to postpone the time for taking the poll on a proposal to adopt rating on unimproved values in the Shire of Bairnsdale, and for other purposes—(Mr. Porter).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 18 Sept., 1962, p. 17; order for second reading read; Bill ruled a Private Bill; motion, That all the Private Bill Standing Orders be dispensed with and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill—agreed to, motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Sept., p. 23; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Oct., p. 27; the Council's agreement notified, 4 Oct., p. 28. (Assented to 9 October, 1962. Act No. 6893.)

BANK HOLIDAYS (SATURDAY): Bill to amend the *Bank Holidays Act 1958*—(Mr. Rylah for Mr. Bolte).—Initiated and read a first time, 12 Sept., 1962, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned—10 Oct., p. 32; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 23 Oct., p. 41; the Council's agreement notified, 15 Nov., p. 59. (Assented to 20 November, 1962. Act No. 6926.)

BARLEY MARKETING (AMENDMENT): Bill intituled "*An Act to amend the 'Barley Marketing Act 1958'*"—(Mr. Turnbull, Kara Kara).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 28 Nov., 1962, p. 74; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 5 Dec., p. 80. (Assented to 11 December, 1962. Act No. 6955.)

BEAUFORT LANDS: Bill to provide upon the surrender to Her Majesty of certain land in the parish of Beaufort for the reservation thereof as a site for municipal purposes, and for the revocation of the reservation of certain other land in the said parish temporarily reserved as a site for the Carngham and Beaufort District Road Board's Offices and for the grant thereof to the president councillors and ratepayers of the Shire of Ripon, and for other purposes—(Mr. Rylah for Mr. Turnbull, Kara Kara).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 19 Sept., 1962, p. 19; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Sept., p. 23; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Oct., p. 37; the Council's agreement notified, 31 Oct., p. 50. (Assented to 7 November, 1962. Act No. 6912.)

BOILERS INSPECTION (AMENDMENT): Bill intituled "*An Act to amend the 'Boilers Inspection Act 1958'*"—(Mr. Mibus).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 24 Oct., 1962, p. 45; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 30 Oct., p. 47; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 8 Nov., p. 56; further considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time, 11 Dec., p. 87. (Assented to 18 December, 1962. Act No. 6966.)

BRIGHTON (CRAMER-STREET) LAND: Bill to provide for the closing of a certain street in the City of Brighton known as Cramer-street and for the opening in lieu thereof of a public footway and for the vesting in Brighton Grammar School of part of the land on which the said street is formed and for other purposes—(Mr. Porter).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 18 Sept., 1962, p. 17; order for second reading read; Bill ruled a Private Bill; motion, That all the Private Bill Standing Orders, except those relating to the payment of fees be dispensed with, and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill—agreed to; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Sept., p. 23; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Oct., p. 37; the Council's agreement notified, 31 Oct., p. 50. (Assented to 7 November, 1962. Act No. 6908.)

BUILDING CONTRACTS (DEPOSITS): Bill intituled "*An Act for the Regulation of certain Building Contracts and for incidental purposes*"—(Mr. Rylah).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 29 Nov., 1962, p. 75; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 29 Nov., p. 76; debate resumed and adjourned, 11 Dec., p. 88; debate continued—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council with the Assembly's amendment desired, 12 Dec., p. 89; the Council's agreement to the amendment notified, 12 Dec., p. 90. (Assented to 18 December, 1962. Act No. 6973.)

BUNGAREE AND WARRENHEIP LANDS EXCHANGE: Bill to provide for the revocation of the reservation of certain land in the parish of Bungaree temporarily reserved as a site for public recreation and for the exchange thereof for certain other land in the parish of Warrenheip to be reserved as a site for public recreation—(Mr. Petty).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 19 March, 1963, p. 96; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 March, p. 97; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 April, p. 109; the Council's agreement notified, 24 April, p. 118. (Assented to 30 April, 1963. Act No. 6982.)

CHILDREN'S WELFARE (RECEPTION CENTRES): Bill to amend the *Children's Welfare Act 1958* to make provision for the approval of reception centres for the accommodation and maintenance of children or young persons and for other purposes connected therewith—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Oct., 1962, p. 32; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 16 Oct., p. 36; debate resumed and adjourned, 23 Oct., p. 42; debate continued—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 7 Nov., p. 53; the Council's agreement notified, 22 Nov., p. 68. (Assented to 27 November, 1962. Act No. 6935.)

COMPANIES: Bill to amend section 222 of and the Second Schedule to the *Companies Act 1961*—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 19 March, 1963, p. 97; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 March, p. 98; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 27 March, p. 101; the Council's agreement notified, 24 April, p. 118. (Assented to 30 April, 1963. Act No. 6985.)

COMPANIES (TRUSTEES FOR DEBENTURE HOLDERS): Bill intituled "*An Act to amend Section Seventy-four of the 'Companies Act 1961'*"—(Mr. Rylah).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 23 April, 1963, p. 116; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 30 April, p. 120; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 15 May, p. 136. (Assented to 28 May, 1963. Act No. 7007.)

- CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (No. 1):** Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £23,961,255 to the service of year 1962-63—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 19 Sept., 1962, pp. 20-21; the Council's agreement notified, 2 Oct., p. 27. (Assented to 1 October, 1962. Act No. 6892.)
- CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (No. 2):** Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £13,899,145 to the service of year 1962-63—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 20 Nov., 1962, pp. 62-3; the Council's agreement notified, 22 Nov., p. 68. (Assented to 27 November, 1962. Act No. 6936.)
- CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (No. 3):** Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £3,022,363 to the service of year 1961-62—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 20 Nov., 1962, pp. 63-5; the Council's agreement notified, 29 Nov., p. 75. (Assented to 4 December, 1962. Act No. 6948.)
- CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (No. 4):** Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £36,601,010 to the service of year 1963-64—(Mr. Bolte).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 3 April, 1963, pp. 105-7; the Council's agreement notified, 23 April, p. 115. (Assented to 23 April, 1963. Act No. 6979.)
- CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (No. 5):** Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £1,428,217 to the service of the year 1962-63—(Mr. Petty).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 April, 1963, pp. 120-1; the Council's agreement notified, 15 May, p. 136. (Assented to 21 May, 1963. Act No. 6998.)
- CO-OPERATION (DEPUTY REGISTRAR):** Bill to amend section 83 of the *Co-operation Act 1958*—(Mr. Petty).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 23 April, 1963, p. 115; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 24 April, p. 117; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 1 May, p. 123; the Council's agreement notified, 15 May, p. 134. (Assented to 21 May, 1963. Act No. 6995.)
- CO-OPERATIVE HOUSING SOCIETIES:** Bill to amend the *Co-operative Housing Societies Act 1958*, and for other purposes—(Mr. Petty).—Initiated and read a first time, 12 Sept., 1962, p. 14; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 12 Sept., p. 15; debate resumed and adjourned, 26 Sept., p. 26; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 11) recommending an Appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Oct., pp. 32-33; the Council's agreement notified, 31 Oct., p. 50. - CORONERS (MEDICAL EXPENSES):** Bill to amend sections 29 and 35 of the *Coroners Act 1958*—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 8 Nov., 1962, p. 54; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 Nov., p. 59; the Council's agreement notified, 29 Nov., p. 75. (Assented to 4 December, 1962. Act No. 6946.)
- COUNTY COURT (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *County Court Act 1958*—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 8 Nov., 1962, p. 54; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Nov., p. 69; the Council's agreement notified, 4 Dec., p. 78. (Assented to 11 December, 1962. Act No. 6951.)
- COUNTY COURT (JUDGES):** Bill to repeal the limitation of the number of Judges of the County Court holding office and for other purposes—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 5 Sept., 1962, p. 9; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 12 Sept., p. 14; debate resumed—Bill read a second time, and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 19 Sept., p. 19; the Council's agreement notified, 26 Sept., p. 26. (Assented to 1 October, 1962. Act No. 6891.)
- COUNTRY FIRE AUTHORITY (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Country Fire Authority Act 1958*, and for other purposes—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 8 Nov., 1962, p. 54; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 14 Nov., p. 58; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 28 Nov., p. 74; the Council's agreement notified, 12 Dec., p. 89. (Assented to 18 December, 1962. Act No. 6956.)
- COUNTRY ROADS (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Country Roads Act 1958*—(Mr. Petty).—Initiated and read a first time, 31 Oct., 1962, p. 49; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 7 Nov., p. 52; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 26) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 Nov., p. 60; the Council's agreement notified, 28 Nov., p. 74. (Assented to 4 December, 1962. Act No. 6943.)

DRAINAGE AREAS (RATES): Bill to amend section 31 of the *Drainage Areas Act 1958* and for purposes connected therewith—(Mr. Porter).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 19 March, 1963, p. 96; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 March, p. 97; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 April, p. 110; the Council's agreement notified, 24 April, p. 118. (Assented to 30 April, 1963. Act No. 6984.)

EDUCATION (SCHOOL COMMITTEES): Bill to amend the *Education Act 1958* with respect to school Committees—(Mr. Bloomfield).—Initiated and read a first time, 18 Sept., 1962, p. 18; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Oct., p. 32; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time, concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 7 Nov., p. 53; the Council's agreement notified, 20 Nov., p. 65. (Assented to 27 Nov., 1962. Act No. 6930.)

ELECTORAL PROVINCES AND DISTRICTS: Bill to provide for an increase in the number of electoral provinces and electoral districts and for the redivision of Victoria into electoral provinces and electoral districts and for other purposes—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 1 May, 1963, p. 122; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 1 May, p. 123; debate resumed—Bill read a second time, on division, and committed; Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 44) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time, on division; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 14 May, pp. 131–2.—Bill not returned from the Legislative Council.

ELIZA'S RESTAURANT: Bill to provide for the renewal of a certain restaurant licence at St. Kilda for the remainder of the year 1963—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 19 March, 1963, p. 97; order for second reading read; Bill ruled a Private Bill; motion, That all the Private Bill Standing Orders, except those relating to the payment of fees, be dispensed with, and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill—agreed to; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 March, p. 98; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, concurrence of the Legislative Council desired 26 March, p. 100; the Council's agreement notified, 9 April, p. 110. (Assented to 10 April, 1963. Act No. 6978.)

ENTERTAINMENTS TAX (PARTIAL ABOLITION): Bill to amend the *Entertainments Tax Act 1958* and for other purposes—(Mr. Bolte).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Oct., 1962, p. 31; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Oct., p. 32; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the

Governor (No. 15) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 17 Oct., pp. 39–40.

ENTERTAINMENTS TAX.—House resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means; resolution fixing entertainments tax reported and agreed to 17 Oct., p. 40.

Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 Oct., p. 40; the Council's agreement notified, 30 Oct., p. 48. (Assented to 7 November, 1962. Act No. 6903.)

ESTATE AGENTS (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the *Estate Agents Act 1958*—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 April, 1963, p. 111; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 April, p. 115; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 1 May, p. 123; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 May, p. 125; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified; amendments considered and agreed to, 16 May, pp. 138–9; report by the Clerk of the Parliaments of clerical errors in the Bill; errors corrected and the Council's concurrence with corrections desired, 22 May, p. 143; the Council's agreement in correction of errors notified, 23 May, p. 144. (Assented to 28 May, 1963. Act No. 7012.)

FOREIGN JUDGMENTS: Bill intituled "An Act to make Provision for the Enforcement in Victoria of Judgments given in the United Kingdom or in other Countries (whether Commonwealth Countries or not) which accord Reciprocal Treatment to Judgments given in Victoria, for Facilitating the Enforcement in other Countries of Judgments given in Victoria, and for other purposes"—(Mr. Rylah).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 2 Oct., 1962, p. 27; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 9 Oct., p. 30; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 8 Nov., p. 55. (Assented to 20 November, 1962. Act No. 6916.)

FORESTS (FURTHER AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the *Forests Act 1958*—(Mr. Turnbull, Kara Kara).—Initiated and read a first time, 31 Oct., 1962, p. 49; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 13 Nov., p. 57; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 30) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 27 Nov., p. 72; amendment suggested by the Council on consideration of the Bill in Committee; suggested amendment made, 12 Dec., p. 90; the Council's agreement to the Bill (including the amendment made by the

Assembly which was suggested by the Council) with amendments notified; amendments considered and agreed to, 12 Dec., p. 90. (*Assented to 18 December, 1962. Act No. 6976.*)

FRIENDLY SOCIETIES (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the *Friendly Societies Act 1958*—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Oct., 1962, p. 32; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 16 Oct., p. 36; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed, 7 Nov., p. 53.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.—Mr. Deputy-Speaker reported that the House had, that day, attended His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Speech Mr. Speaker had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy as follows:—

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

I have called you together for the consideration of important public business.

Owing to the appointment of His Excellency, General Sir Dallas Brooks, Governor of Victoria, as the Administrator of the Commonwealth of Australia during the absence abroad of the Governor-General, the honour of opening this Session has devolved upon me.

All Victorians are delighted by the news that Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. and His Royal Highness the Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, will come to Australia next year. Plans for the visit are in course of preparation and an enthusiastic welcome will be accorded our Royal Visitors during their stay in Victoria.

By reason of this visit my advisers have been pleased to invite Her Majesty the Queen to extend the appointment of His Excellency General Sir Dallas Brooks as Governor of Victoria until 31st March, 1963. Her Majesty has graciously approved the request, and my advisers are confident that the citizens of Victoria will enthusiastically support this extension.

It is with profound regret that I refer to the deaths of Mr. H. Kane and Mr. W. J. Towers, both of whom rendered valuable service to this State as Members of the Legislative Assembly.

Discussions on the European Common Market have proved the extent to which Victoria depends for its financial stability on the welfare of its primary industries.

Although the future of overseas trade is still not clear, my advisers have the satisfaction of knowing that, whatever may befall primary industries, they will not fail for any want of efficiency.

Much of the recent progress of Victoria as a primary producing State, which has brought it to the position where it now produces nearly one-third of Australia's primary production, is due to the long-term policy of agricultural research and education which has been pursued. No other State in Australia, and few countries in the world, are provided with so many first class agricultural research stations with such a wide range of successful activities.

Despite periods of exceptionally dry weather in many areas during the past year, Victoria's live-stock population has grown to new record levels. The State's wheat yield last season was well above the previous ten-year average, despite the difficult seasonal conditions.

The important work of eradicating tuberculosis in cattle has been continued, and good results have been achieved.

The dairy herd recording system and sire proving work in Victoria has received high praise, both from farmers and scientists. This work enables the continuous selection of top sires to ensure beneficial results from the artificial breeding of cattle.

One matter which is hampering agricultural development is the shortage of veterinary surgeons ; but this should be remedied in a few years with the prospective opening, at an early date, of the Veterinary School at the University of Melbourne.

Important additions have been completed at Dookie Agricultural College, and work has commenced on new buildings at Longerenong Agricultural College in furtherance of agricultural education in this State.

My advisers are aware of the important part that afforestation plays in rural development and planting has recently commenced at Koetong, near Corryong, of the largest plantation yet planned by the Forests Commission. It is intended to plant 1,000 acres each year to achieve the maximum plantation size of 40,000 acres. The project, when completed, will employ 1,000 men locally in the forestry and timber industries and will lead to the development of a particularly valuable natural decentralised industry.

The discovery of the Sirex wood wasp, which was introduced from overseas, has caused serious concern throughout Australia. Urgent and strenuous action has been taken to prevent the insect from spreading beyond the limits of the present known zones of occurrence, and ultimately to eradicate it completely.

A prison forestry farm has been established at Olsen's Bridge, in Gippsland. This project should be of immense value in the rehabilitation of prisoners, besides assisting materially in the State's planting programme. A second camp is already planned.

The State Rivers and Water Supply Commission delivered a record quantity of water for irrigation throughout the State in the very dry 1961-62 irrigation season. This was made possible only by the additional storage and distribution facilities recently completed.

My advisers appreciate that capacity of water storage is one of the vital keys to rural welfare. Early this year, an additional amount of 250,000 acre feet became available, as the Eppalock Dam Project reached the stage where it began to store water.

Plans have been announced for the construction of two more major water storages, one in north-eastern Victoria on the Buffalo River and the other at Lake Bellfield in the Grampians.

Brown coal still stands as the State's most important mineral asset. Production last year reached a record figure of well over 16 million tons.

The State Electricity Commission is pushing on with major extensions to its power generating projects in order to meet the rapidly increasing demand for electric power.

The Hazelwood Power Station will commence operations in 1964, whilst the 240,000 kilowatt extension of the Yallourn Power Station has been completed.

A further 60,000 kilowatt generator is scheduled to come into service at Morwell Power Station next year.

The Commission's self-help scheme continues to play an important role in the rural development programme, and has facilitated the extension of supply to such areas as Orbost and Portland.

At present, over 940,000 consumers are served from the State inter-connected system, and more than 410,000 of these are located outside the metropolitan area. New consumers are being connected at the rate of over 30,000 per year, of which more than two-thirds are outside the metropolis.

The State is honoured to be named as the venue for the Sixth World Power Conference to be held in October next. This Conference will be attended by world leaders in the fields of fuel and power development.

The Mines Department is assisting in the search for oil, by providing technical advice in the geological interpretation of samples and basic geological data. Special attention is also being given to the task of ascertaining the nature and extent of the State's underground water resources.

Land Settlement continues to attract the interest of young men seeking farms.

The Lands Department is endeavouring to meet a sustained demand for Crown lands by making areas available for application in various parts of the State.

A recent amendment to the Land Act has enabled existing industries in country areas to obtain land for the purposes of expansion.

My advisers plan to exploit further the tourist potential of the State. Tourist attractions are being developed and, to increase interstate business, buildings to house Victorian Government Tourist Bureaux have been purchased in Adelaide, Sydney, and Brisbane.

Since the establishment of the Tourist Development Authority in 1958, a sum of £676,560 has been allocated from the Tourist Fund to assist in the development of tourist projects.

Loans for those projects, amounting to £117,610, have been approved, and grants totalling £209,000 have been made for tourist roadworks.

The Government is aware of the economic potential of the tourist industry and its importance to country areas, and will continue to give a full measure of support to its development.

Steady progress has been made in maintaining and improving the National Parks of the State.

Despite some slowing down of industrial development, a number of new and important industries have been attracted to country areas. An important factory recently opened near Shepparton offers a new and growing market for primary producers in the Goulburn Valley. With the development of an aluminium smelter and a new cement plant in the Geelong area, much greater use will be made, in the near future, of the valuable Anglesea brown coal-fields. Other ventures encouraged by the Government at Ballarat and Rosedale are based on local primary production.

Evidence is already available of the benefits to this State to be derived from action taken to improve rail and road facilities and to develop services in the Cudgewa-Corryong area, so as to meet needs arising from the works of the Snowy Mountains Hydro-Electric Authority.

At the other extremity of the State, a modern fish cannery, which will give added stability to the fishing industry, is being built at Portland.

The completion of the standard gauge railway link to Albury has resulted in substantial increases in freight traffic in the first months of operation. Passenger traffic has also increased, and the new luxury express "Southern Aurora" has, since its inception, achieved an extremely high overall ratio of occupied berths. The completion of Spencer-street station later this year will not only contribute substantially to the attractiveness of interstate railway services but will provide first-class modern facilities for country travellers using this important passenger terminal.

Included in the Railway Department's capital works programme this year is the purchase of 30 new "blue" trains to improve suburban services.

To the 30th June this year the Housing Commission has completed 46,970 dwellings with a capital expenditure of £142,000,000.

Nearly £10,000,000 will be expended during the current financial year in building new houses and flats.

Whilst continuing with the policy of allotting 45 per cent. of annual capital expenditure to country areas as against 55 per cent. to the metropolis, the Housing Commission has, in recent years, concentrated its metropolitan activity on slum reclamation, and will continue to develop projects at North Melbourne, Port Melbourne, Kensington, Carlton, Prahran and Williamstown.

Slum reclamation areas totalling 65 acres have already been re-developed, a further 10 acres are in an advanced stage of development, and an additional 50 acres are in process of being cleared.

Over recent years, though the media of the Housing Commission, the Home Finance Trust and the Co-operative Housing Movement, the Government has done everything possible to encourage home purchase in the belief that home ownership helps to make a person a more contented and a more responsible citizen. During this Session, it is the intention of the Government to introduce legislation which will help further to smooth the path to home ownership.

Education will continue to be given the highest possible priority. Victoria is at present spending more per pupil than any other State in the Commonwealth. Although expenditure on education has more than doubled over the past seven years, my advisers are well aware that there is much yet to be achieved.

Before the beginning of the next school year it is anticipated that eleven new High Schools, three new Technical Schools and six new Primary Schools will be ready for occupation.

Every effort is being made to increase further the rate of recruitment of teachers, and a site has been acquired, adjacent to Monash University, for the establishment of another Secondary Teachers' College.

Great progress has been made at Monash with the accelerated building programme, and it is known that the number of students enrolled in 1963 will be twice this year's number.

The Report being prepared by the Committee which is investigating the establishment of a third University is well under way, and is expected to be completed later this year.

My advisers will continue to develop health services to meet the needs of the ever-growing population of the State. The new air ambulance service has already played a major part in saving life. A Poisons Information Centre has been established in Melbourne. The legislation passed in the last Parliament to facilitate uniform control of poisons and drugs throughout Australia is being implemented.

Two major hospital projects, the Royal Children's Hospital and the Dental Hospital, will soon be completed. A tender has been let for the erection of a new 80-bed Sandringham and District Memorial Hospital. Works at present in progress will provide an additional 400 beds in public hospitals during the current year.

My advisers are seriously concerned that the Federal Government has not seen fit to continue its subsidy for capital improvements of mental hospitals. This will mean a slowing down of this important activity, but, despite this set-back, the new mental hospital at Traralgon will shortly be functioning, and clinical services in the Latrobe Valley and Gippsland are being extended. Psychiatric treatment and advice is now available at a Clinical Centre at Bendigo and a full-time Psychiatrist Superintendent has been appointed to the Warrnambool Mental Hospital. Every effort will be made, within the funds available, to improve mental sickness services throughout the State.

Following the decision of the Commonwealth Government to provide the State with certain training equipment, plans for the expansion of Civil Defence activities have been initiated. The State Emergency Plan will be extended and integrated with the Civil Defence Organization.

My advisers have given special attention to the need for restoring confidence in the economic position of this State and, in particular, to encouraging a revival within the building industry. Reference has already been made to proposed measures to encourage home purchase and home ownership, and the Housing Commission's accelerated programme of slum reclamation. But, in addition, there are a number of major building projects sponsored by the Government to which reference should be made.

Considerable progress has been achieved in the new National Art Gallery and Cultural Centre Project. Excavations have been completed and a contract will soon be let for structural work to ground level.

A new and modern hall, which will provide additional exhibit space, will be completed at the Exhibition Building in time for the International Trade Fair to be held in 1963.

Work is proceeding on the building of the Latrobe Library and provision is being made to complete the project to its full plan instead of building in two stages, as was originally intended. Contracts have been let for the remodelling of the old Government Printing Office as a much needed step towards providing modern office accommodation for the Victorian Public Service.

Planning is well advanced for a new 10 storey Public Office Building in Treasury Place and it is hoped to commence work on this project towards the end of the present financial year.

A site at the corner of William and Lonsdale streets has been purchased and cleared for the erection of a multi-storey building to house 20 new Law Courts and work on this project will commence as soon as possible. The State Insurance Office has been given approval to purchase and clear a site in Collins-street for the erection of a new office to meet the growing needs of this business. Plans are being prepared for new offices for the Transport Regulation Board and the Motor Registration Branch at Carlton.

Five new Court Houses and 20 new Police Stations will be built during the current financial year, a large proportion of them being in country districts, and outline plans are being prepared for the erection of a modern Public Office Building at Geelong to serve the needs of that ever-expanding community.

Wherever possible my advisers will expedite building projects both in the metropolitan area and the country districts of Victoria and thereby will set an example of confident development which should encourage private enterprise to expand and develop throughout the State.

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

A supplementary appropriation will be sought in respect of expenditure from the Consolidated Revenue in the year 1961-62. I am able to say that, including the expenditure to be covered in that Supplementary Appropriation, the Consolidated Revenue Account was in balance for the year 1961-62.

A Supply Bill to make further provision for the services of the year 1962-63 will be placed before you, and the detailed Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the year will be presented.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

A very comprehensive legislative programme will be submitted to you during the coming Session. A number of important Bills will be introduced arising out of the Budget proposals which will be submitted to you next week.

Included in the legislative programme will be a Bill to increase benefits under Workers' Compensation legislation, and proposals to amend the Country Fire Authority Act and the Forests Act to co-ordinate and improve the methods available for fighting bush fires in this State and to protect the property of prudent landowners against the neglect of others.

Other important legislative proposals will include the setting up of a Drainage Authority for the Dandenong Creek area, the implementation of the recommendations of the Statute Law Revision Committee with regard to the property of married persons, comprehensive provisions to protect the purchasers of land, and a complete revision of the Police Offences Act.

Bills will also deal with the following subjects:—

- Agricultural Colleges (Establishment of Trading Fund).
- Soil Conservation.
- Co-operative Housing.
- Rural Finance and Settlement.
- Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works (Increased Borrowing Powers).
- Local Government (Removal of Fire Hazards).
- Justices Act (Amendment).
- Sale of Human Blood (Prevention).
- Boiler Inspection.
- Housing Advances and Loans (Procuration Fees).

I now leave you to the discharge of your duties in the earnest hope that, with the blessing of Divine Providence, your deliberations may advance the welfare of the State.

Mr. Speaker said—

I am in some doubt whether an amendment of this type can rightly be made by the Council ; I feel it might be an infringement on the financial privileges of this House.

In dealing with this matter, one must consider the spirit of what is laid down and, accordingly, I would summarize the position in this way : Parliament has agreed, at this stage, to the compulsory inspection of second-hand motor vehicles, and it has agreed that a fee for the inspections should be prescribed. This House agreed to the inspection of vehicles and to the payment of a fee for that purpose, but it did not impose any limit on the fee which might be prescribed.

With a limitation on the fee to a given figure, and with the possibility that the inspection may cost more than the prescribed fee, the remainder must be borne by someone and, obviously, it will have to be borne by the Treasury. If this expense is borne by the Treasury, it becomes a burden on the people. In other words, on the one hand, it will relieve the individual whose motor car is affected and, on the other hand, it will impose an additional financial obligation on the Treasury. As I stated earlier, I am in some doubt concerning this matter. It is not a clear case, and I should be prepared to leave it to the wisdom of this House as to the action which should be taken. In my opinion, it is doubtful whether the Legislative Council has the right to amend this Bill as it proposes in amendment No. 17.

Motion made and question proposed—That this amendment be disagreed with (*Mr. Bolte*)—and, after debate, by leave, withdrawn.

Motion made and question—That this House does not admit the right of the Council to make this amendment and therefore it cannot be entertained (*Mr. Bolte*)—put, after debate, and agreed to.

(1) In section one of the Principal Act in the part of the Table relating to sub-division (4) of Division 2 of Part IV. for the expression " s. 103 " there shall be substituted the expression " ss. 102A-103 ".

(2) In the Principal Act after the heading "*Subdivision 4.—Summary Jurisdiction in Indictable Offences*" and before section one hundred and three there shall be inserted the following new sections:—

' 102A. (1) Where any person is charged before justices assembled in petty sessions—

(a) with any of the following offences, namely:—

- (i) simple larceny or any felony made punishable as for simple larceny;
- (ii) larceny from the person;
- (iii) larceny in a dwelling-house;
- (iv) larceny as a clerk or servant;
- (v) larceny as a bailee;
- (vi) embezzlement as a clerk or servant—

and the amount or value of the chattel money valuable security or property alleged to have been stolen or embezzled does not in the judgment of the justices exceed the sum of Five hundred pounds;

- (b) with any offence against section one hundred and thirty-four of the *Crimes Act* 1958 (not being an offence in relation to a dwelling-house) and the amount or value of the property the subject-matter of the offence does not in the judgment of the justices exceed the sum of Five hundred pounds;
- (c) with any offence against section one hundred and thirty-five of the *Crimes Act* 1958 (not being an offence in relation to any church chapel meeting-house or other place of divine worship or any dwelling-house);
- (d) with any offence against section one hundred and eighty-seven of the *Crimes Act* 1958 and the amount or value of the chattel money or valuable security alleged to have been obtained or (as the case may be) the amount of the debt or liability alleged to have been incurred does not in the judgment of the justices exceed the sum of Five hundred pounds;
- (e) with any offence against section one hundred and eighty-eight of the *Crimes Act* 1958 and the amount or value of the money chattel or valuable security alleged to have been paid or delivered does not in the judgment of the justices exceed the sum of Five hundred pounds;
- (f) with any offence against section three hundred and thirty or section three hundred and thirty-one of the *Crimes Act* 1958 and the amount or value of the property alleged to have been received does not in the judgment of the justices exceed the sum of Five hundred pounds;
- (g) with any offence against section twenty-two or section thirty-four of the *Pawnbrokers Act* 1958 and the value of the article or articles pledged or to which the pledge-ticket or forged pledge-ticket refers or purports to refer does not in the judgment of the justices exceed the sum of Five hundred pounds;
- (h) with any offence against section nineteen of the *Crimes Act* 1958;
- (i) with any offence of assault occasioning actual bodily harm against section thirty-seven of the *Crimes Act* 1958;

- (j) with the misdemeanour of indecent assault against sub-section (1) of section fifty-five of the *Crimes Act 1958* ;
- (k) with having attempted to commit any of the offences referred to in paragraphs (a) to (j) of this section (irrespective of the amount or value of any chattel money valuable security property debt or liability involved)—

it shall be lawful for the justices to hear and determine the charge in a summary way and if the person charged confesses the same or if the justices after hearing the whole case for the prosecution and for the defence find the charge proved then the justices may convict the person charged and commit him to gaol for imprisonment for a term of not more than one year, and if they find the charge not proved they shall dismiss the charge :

Provided that if the person charged does not consent or if the justices are of opinion that the charge is from any circumstances fit to be prosecuted by proceedings as for an indictable offence rather than to be disposed of summarily, the justices shall instead of summarily adjudicating thereon deal with the case in all respects as if they had no authority finally to hear and determine the same :

Provided also that if upon the hearing of the charge the justices are of opinion that there are circumstances in the case which render it inexpedient to inflict any punishment they shall have power to dismiss the person charged without proceeding to a conviction upon his finding surety or sureties for his future good behaviour or without such sureties.

(2) Every conviction made by justices as aforesaid shall contain a statement that the offender consented to the charge being determined summarily.

102B. Where the justices before whom any person is charged as aforesaid propose, either—

- (a) on the application of the prosecutor before the hearing of any evidence (other than such evidence, if any, of the amount or value of any chattel money valuable security property debt or liability involved as the justices think fit) ; or
- (b) on the application of the prosecutor or the person charged or on the justices' own motion at any time during or immediately after the hearing of the evidence for the prosecution—

to dispose of the case summarily under the provisions of the last preceding section one of such justices shall state to such person the substance of the charge against him and shall then say to him these words or words to the like effect—

“ Do you consent that the charge against you shall be tried by us or do you desire that it shall be sent for trial by a jury ”—

and if the person charged consents to the charge being summarily tried and determined as aforesaid he shall then be asked how he pleads to the charge and then the justices shall proceed to deal with the case summarily.

102c. Where any person is charged before any justice with any offence mentioned in section one hundred and two A and in the opinion of such justice the case may be such as is proper to be disposed of under the said section by justices assembled in petty sessions the justice before whom such person is so charged may if he sees fit remand such person for further examination to the next practicable court of petty sessions having jurisdiction to be held nearest to the place at which such justice then is, in like manner in all respects as a justice is by law authorized to remand a party accused of an indictable offence.

(3) For section one hundred and three of the Principal Act there shall be substituted the following section :—

“ 103. The following rules shall be observed with respect to the hearing and determination by courts of petty sessions of indictable offences which are by this Act or any other Act now or hereafter in force authorized to be dealt with summarily :—

- (1) The procedure, until the justices sitting in petty sessions determine that the case shall be dealt with summarily, shall subject to the provisions of section fifty-nine of this Act be the same in all respects as if the offence were to be dealt with throughout as an indictable offence, but when the court of petty sessions proceeds to deal with the offence summarily the procedure shall be the same from and after that time as if the offence were an offence punishable on summary conviction and the provisions of this Act relating to offences punishable on summary conviction shall so far as applicable apply accordingly ;
- (2) The evidence of any witness taken before the justice or justices need not be taken again but his deposition shall be read to the court and every such witness shall (if the defendant so requires) be recalled for the purpose of cross-examination ;
- (3) The conviction for any such offence or dismissal of any such charge shall have the same effect in all respects as a conviction or acquittal on indictment or presentment for the offence, and the court may make any order for or in relation to the restitution of property or compensation which might have been made by the court before which the person convicted or dismissed would have been tried if he had been tried on indictment or presentment ;
- (4) Where a court of petty sessions has dealt with the case summarily and has dismissed the charge the court shall if required deliver to the person charged a copy (certified under the hands of the members of the court or under the hand of one of them or of the clerk of the court) of the order of such dismissal (including a statement that the person charged consented to the charge being dealt with summarily).”

(4) The *Crimes Act 1958* shall be amended as follows :—

 “(b) where water is supplied by measure to any lands and tenements being rateable property the minimum amount to be charged in any year for which a water rate is made and levied shall be the amount which would have been payable under this Act as a water rate in respect of the said lands and tenements if those lands and tenements were supplied with water otherwise than by measure.”;
- (d) At the end of paragraph (a) of sub-section (6) of section one hundred and seventy-five there shall be inserted the words “but the amount of the rate shall not in any case be less than such amount as the Board from time to time determines”.

(1) The Principal Act is hereby amended as follows:—

(a) In sub-section (1) of section three—

(i) after the interpretation of “Chief Commissioner” there shall be inserted the following interpretation:—

“ ‘Commercial trailer’ means any vehicle without motive power of its own and used for the carriage of passengers for hire or for the carriage of goods for hire or in the course of trade and drawn by a motor car and detachable therefrom.”;

(ii) after the interpretation of “Primary producer” there shall be inserted the following interpretation:—

“ ‘Private trailer’ means any vehicle without motive power of its own, constructed or adapted for being drawn by a motor car and any machine which is mounted on wheels and is constructed or adapted for being drawn by a motor car, but excluding—

(a) a machine constructed and used exclusively as an agricultural implement;

(b) a vehicle constructed and used exclusively for any purposes other than for the carriage of a boat and—

(i) weighing less than four hundredweights unladen;

(ii) the width of which does not exceed the width of the towing vehicle as produced by the manufacturer; and

(iii) the overall length of which does not exceed ten feet.”;

(iii) for the interpretation of “Trailer” there shall be substituted the following interpretation:—

“ ‘Trailer’ means a commercial trailer or a private trailer.”;

(b) For section C of the Second Schedule under the heading “FEES ON THE REGISTRATION OR THE RENEWAL OF THE REGISTRATION OF MOTOR CARS AND TRAILERS.” there shall be substituted the following section:—

“C.—*Trailers attached to motor cars (other than motor cycles)*—

(a) For any commercial trailer—

(c) In sub-section (1) of section ninety-three after paragraph (a) there shall be inserted the following paragraph :—

“(aa) prescribing and making provision with respect to the construction of and equipment to be carried on trailers or any specified type or classification of trailers.”

(2) At the end of section three of the *Road Traffic Act* 1958 there shall be inserted the following section :—

“ 3A. (1) There shall be established and kept in the Treasury a fund to be called the ‘ Traffic Commission Fund ’.

(2) As soon as practicable after the thirtieth day of June in each financial year there shall be paid out of the Country Roads Board Fund into the Traffic Commission Fund an amount equal to four-fifths of one per centum of the total amount paid into the Country Roads Board Fund during the last preceding financial year other than any amount paid to the credit of the Roads Maintenance Account.

(3) Moneys to the credit of the Traffic Commission Fund shall be applied by the Minister on the recommendation of the Commission—

- (a) for any works or projects calculated to improve road safety or traffic control ;
- (b) for the establishment or improvement of school crossings ;
- (c) for or towards the construction purchase and installation on any road of traffic control lights ; and
- (d) for the costs of the administration of and with respect to the carrying out of the functions of the Traffic Commission.”

(3) Sub-section (3) of section thirty-nine of the *Country Roads Act* 1958 shall be repealed.

(4) In sub-section (4) of section thirty-nine of the *Country Roads Act* 1958 the words “and in addition to any amounts authorized to be applied for traffic control lights under the last preceding sub-section ” shall be repealed.

No. 2.—*Valuation of Land (Rates) Bill*—Clause 2, as amended.

After section eight A of the Principal Act there shall be inserted the following section :—

“ 8B. (1) Notwithstanding anything in this or any other Act where a rate is made on the net annual value of rateable property after the first day of May One thousand nine hundred and sixty-three but not later than the thirty-first day of December One thousand nine hundred and sixty-four by or for the purposes of or in respect of moneys due to—

(a) the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works or the Geelong Waterworks and Sewerage Trust or the Mildura Urban Water Trust or the Ballarat Water Commissioners ; or

(b) any authority under the *Water Act* 1958 or the *Sewerage Districts Act* 1958 and that rate would be made on a valuation required to be made and returned for a municipality not later than the thirtieth day of September One thousand nine hundred and sixty-four pursuant to section eight A of this Act and on one or more other general valuations—

such rate shall, whether or not a later general valuation has been made and returned for * any municipality or any subdivision thereof, be made on the same valuation as the rate last made by the Board Trust or Commissioners or that authority before the first day of May One thousand nine hundred and sixty-three except in so far as that valuation may be altered by any subsequent supplementary valuation which is **** made pursuant to sub-section (2) of this section :

Provided that in the case of any municipality which used for the year commencing the first day of October One thousand nine hundred and sixty-one a general valuation of net annual value which pursuant to the provisions of this Act the Valuer-General reports or has reported to the Minister as being generally true and correct as at the thirty-first day of December One thousand nine hundred and sixty-one, such rate shall be made by the Board Trust Commissioners or authority on the same valuation as the rate made for the year immediately preceding that for which the rate was last made before the first day of May One thousand nine hundred and sixty-three.

(2) Subject to sub-section (1) of this section but notwithstanding any other provision in this Act or any provision in any other Act, whether or not a general or supplementary valuation of any rateable property has been made and returned for the municipality in which that property is situated since the valuation upon which the rate last made by such Board Trust Commissioners or authority was so made and returned, the Board Trust Commissioners or authority in any of the circumstances specified in sub-section (1) of section two hundred and fifty-eight of the *Local Government Act* 1958 may, subject to that section, cause to be made a supplementary valuation based on the same general levels of value as the valuation upon which pursuant to the provisions of this section the Board Trust Commissioners or authority makes a rate not later than the thirty-first day of December One thousand nine hundred and sixty-four.”

Further amendment proposed—That the following further proviso be added to the clause :—

Provided that any amount in excess of the amount which would have been payable had this Act, as amended by the *Valuation of Land (Rates) Act* 1963, been in force at the time when such amount was paid shall be refunded to the ratepayer. Such refund may be made by return of the excess moneys so paid or by crediting the amount of such excess to the ratepayer against future rates payable.
