

TUESDAY, 11TH SEPTEMBER, 1962.

Questions.

- *1. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Chief Secretary what racing and trotting clubs participated in the recent distribution of money from the Totalizator Agency Board, giving the amount received in each case and the basis of distribution.
- *2. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education, for the Honorable the Minister of Health, whether the dangerous drug Thalidomide, in any form, or in any mixture, has been imported into Victoria in recent years, and whether he has any knowledge of any importation of the drug into any other State or Territory of the Commonwealth.
- *3. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey, for the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—
1. Whether he (the Minister of Agriculture) has any knowledge of the total quantity of pigmeats imported into Australia from Canada during the last twelve months.
 2. Whether, in view of the serious outbreak of hog cholera in Canada, he (the Minister of Agriculture) will make representations to the Federal Government with a view to obtaining the prohibition, for the time being, of the importation of pigmeats from Canada.
- *4. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Transport whether any organization or company still holds an option in connexion with the roofing of the Jolimont railway yards; if so, what is the name of the organization or company and when the option expires.
- *5. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works, for the Honorable the Minister of Housing, whether it is proposed to set aside, for use as a school playground by scholars attending the Malvern-road State School, any of the land recently acquired by the Housing Commission in Surrey-road, South Yarra.
- *6. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works, for the Honorable the Minister of Housing, whether the Government has decided upon the erection of a new township at Hazelwood, near Morwell, to house employees of the State Electricity Commission; if so—(a) what area of land will be acquired, giving the names of the present landowners, the areas to be acquired in each case, and when the acquisitions will be finalized; (b) when it is anticipated that the erection of houses will be commenced and how many houses it is proposed to erect in each of the next five years; (c) how many houses could be erected on the area; and (d) whether water and sewerage services will be provided by the Morwell Waterworks Trust and the Morwell Sewerage Authority, respectively, or whether the Latrobe Valley Water and Sewerage Authority will provide all such services.
- *7. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works whether, in view of the statement attributed to him (the Commissioner) by the Press, that "It was essential that a sea passenger terminal of the same standard as Fremantle's should be built in Melbourne", he can give any indication as to when it is proposed to make a start on this work.
- *8. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Treasurer if he will lay on the table of the Library the file relating to loans made to fishermen's co-operative societies for the erection of freezers.

- *9. **SIR HERBERT HYLAND**: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Local Government if he will lay on the table of the Library the report of Dr. Richard Week and Mr. E. L. Erickson relative to the King-street Bridge.
- *10. **MR. DIVERS**: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Transport—
1. What was the total cost of repairs to tramway tracks in—(a) Ballarat-road, between Gordon-street and Rosamond-road; and (b) Barkly-street, between Nicholson-street and Argyle-street, since trams ceased to run on these routes.
 2. Whether, having regard to the present dangerous condition of these tracks, he will state when the Tramways Board proposes to remove these tracks and remake its sections of the roadways.
- *11. **MR. DIVERS**: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education—
1. Whether the work required for the proposed ground improvements at the Maribyrnong High School will be done by day labour or contract.
 2. What action has been taken to start the work and what is the anticipated date of commencement of work.
 3. What steps are being taken to avoid siting the proposed hockey field across the existing trotting track of the Barrett Recreation Reserve.
 4. Whether the boundary between the Barrett Recreation Reserve and the school can be adjusted so that the part of the school site on which the trotting-track was constructed could be given to the Reserve Committee in exchange for a strip of land from the River-street frontage extending along the back of the canteen, in order that a service road could be constructed to the boiler room and the woodwork and metalwork rooms?
- *12. **MR. LOVEGROVE**: To ask the Honorable the Treasurer—
1. What Commonwealth tax reimbursements were received by Victoria in each of the financial years 1955-56 to 1962-63, inclusive.
 2. What State grants, special financial assistance, or emergency grants were received from the Commonwealth Government in each of those years.
 3. What loan moneys were made available to Victoria in each of those years under the Commonwealth loan programme for—(a) Government works; (b) housing; (c) semi-Government and local Government works; and (d) any additional or emergency purposes.
 4. What were the Victorian net debt charges in each of those years.
 5. What was the total of Victorian taxes per head of population in each of those years.
- *13. **MR. LOVEGROVE**: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education, for the Honorable the Minister of Health—
1. Whether he (the Minister of Health) has examined the records of the coroner's enquiry into the killing of John Herbert McInroy, sixteen years of age, and formerly of Argyle-street, Fitzroy, by Duro Durkovic, an escapee from a mental institution.
 2. Whether the Government has reviewed the possibility of introducing legislation to secure improvement of the Mental Hygiene Act.
 3. Whether an enquiry has been held into the alleged conflict of evidence between officers of the Police Department and officers of the Mental Hygiene Authority concerning notification of Durkovic's escape or any other matter.
 4. What action has been taken to endeavour to prevent occurrences whereby mental patients have been able to inflict injuries on members of the public.

1. How many new industries were established in country centres during the period 1st January, 1959, to 30th June, 1962.

 5. How many males and females, respectively, lost employment as a result of such closures and whether the Government has any plan for relief and employment of those persons.
 6. What employment in country centres was provided for children who left school last year and what employment will be provided for children who will leave school this year, and where this employment has been or will be provided.

1. How many dwelling units were completed by the Housing Commission in the year 1961-62.

3. Whether a shortage occurs in either of the balance-sheets and whether the proceeds of the school play have been banked or accounted for.
4. Who operated the banking account in the Drouin State Savings Bank in the name of the Association in those years and whether any moneys were banked in the year 1960.
5. Whether the transactions shown in this account correspond with either of the balance-sheets presented.
6. Who drew up those balance-sheets and by whom they were audited.
7. Who determines the annual composite fee, at present £6, and by what authority.
8. Whether money received as fees for sport, library, and art is used for any other purposes than to buy sporting equipment, library books, and art materials; if so, what purposes.
9. Who authorized the construction of a school swimming pool at a cost in excess of £10,000.






