TUESDAY, 16TH MAY, 1967.

1. The Council met pursuant to the Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the second day of May, 1967, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk and is as follows:—

FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FORTY-FOURTH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c.

THE Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation fix Tuesday, the sixteenth day of May, 1967, as the time for the commencement and holding of the First Session of the Forty-fourth Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Spring-street, in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this second day of May in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven, and in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

The Honorable Mr. Justice Winneke, the Commissioner from His Excellency the Governor appointed to open the Parliament, having been introduced to the Council Chamber by the Usher of the Black Rod, His Honor desired the Usher of the Black Rod to request the presence of the Members of the Legislative Assembly to hear the Commission read for the commencement and holding of this present Session of the Parliament.

The Members of the Legislative Assembly having presented themselves, the Honorable Mr. Justice Winneke said—

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Members of the Legislative Assembly:

His Excellency the Governor, not thinking fit to be present in person, has been pleased to cause Letters Patent to issue under the Seal of the State constituting me his Commissioner to do in his name all that is necessary to be performed in this Parliament. This will more fully appear from the Letters Patent which will now be read by the Clerk.

Then the said Letters Patent were read as follows:-

ELIZABETH THE SECOND by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom, Australia and Her other Realms and Territories, Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith:

Whereas by Proclamation issued the second day of May, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven, by His Excellency Major-General Sir Rohan Delacombe, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of Our Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Companion of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Governor of Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c., Tuesday, the sixteenth day of May, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven, was fixed as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of Our Parliament of Victoria, at the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Spring-street in the City of Melbourne: And forasmuch as for certain causes the said Sir Rohan Delacombe cannot conveniently be present in person in Our said Parliament at that time: Now know ye that We, trusting in the discretion, fidelity, and care of Our trusty and well-beloved the Honorable Sir Henry Arthur Winneke, Chief Justice of Our Supreme Court of the State of Victoria, do give and grant by the tenor of these presents unto you the said Henry Arthur Winneke, full power in Our name to begin and hold the said Session of Our said Parliament, and to do everything which for and by Us, or the said Sir Rohan Delacombe shall be there to be done; commanding also by the tenor of these presents all whom it may concern to meet Our said Parliament, and the said Henry Arthur Winneke, that he diligently attends in the premises and form aforesaid. In testimony whereof We have caused the seal of Our said State to be hereunto affixed.

WITNESS Our trusty and well-beloved Major-General SIR ROHAN DELACOMBE, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of Our Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, Companion of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Governor of Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c., at Melbourne in Our said State this sixteenth day of May, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven and in the sixteenth year of Our reign.

Then the Honorable Mr. Justice Winneke said-

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I have it in command from His Excellency to let you know that, later this day, His Excellency will declare to you in person, in this place, the causes of his calling this Parliament together; and, Members of the Legislative Assembly, as it is necessary before you proceed to the despatch of business that a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be chosen, His Excellency requests that you, in your Chamber, will proceed to the choice of a proper person to be Speaker.

The Members of the Legislative Assembly then withdrew.

The Honorable Mr. Justice Winneke withdrew.

2. The President took the Chair and read the Prayer.

[Sitting suspended from 11.17 a.m. until 2.31 p.m.]

3. Approach of His Excellency the Governor.—The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher of the Black Rod.

His Excellency came into the Council Chamber, and the Usher of the Black Rod was commanded to desire the immediate attendance of the Legislative Assembly, who being come with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:—

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I have called you together at the earliest opportunity for this the First Session of the Forty-fourth Parliament of Victoria in order that you may consider public business which requires your attention.

It is appropriate that we should record at this time references to some of the conditions prevailing at the commencement of a new Parliament.

Rain is urgently needed throughout the State to replenish water supplies, to provide winter feed for stock, and to prepare land for the sowing of cereal crops. Naturally this situation is a cause of concern.

Cloud seeding operations have been commenced and both the Department of Agriculture and the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission have plans for a continuing programme during the present season. Legislation relating to this activity will be submitted to you by the Government during this Session.

My advisers are convinced that with the massive fuel and power resources available in Victoria the industrial development of the State is assured.

A pilot plant to manufacture char from briquettes is to be established in the Latrobe Valley. This plant could well be the forerunner of another substantial industry in that area.

There are healthy indications of a rapid expansion of the use of natural gas when it becomes available early in 1969. The development of associated industries is already evident, and the planning of utility services required is in hand.

My Government, in its continued efforts to raise the social, economic and physical standards of the aboriginal people of Victoria, has evolved a plan ranging over housing, employment and education which it is convinced will make true equality a reality.

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

A Supply Bill to make provision for the services of the first three months of the financial year 1967-68, and Supplementary Estimates of Expenditure for the current financial year will be presented to you immediately.

It is proposed that when Supply has been granted, the Parliament should adjourn until the normal budget session. At that time detailed Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the financial year 1967-68 will be submitted to you, as well as any necessary further Supplementary Estimates for the current financial year.

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

In the field of education the Government will proceed immediately with the preparation of amending legislation to give effect to the policy it announced concerning the Victoria Institute of Colleges and the Colleges affiliated with it.

During the last Parliament legislation was enacted to enable a start to be made on the vast development programme required to exploit the off-shore petroleum discoveries. It is anticipated that later this year legislation complementary to that being submitted to the Commonwealth and other State Parliaments will be introduced in this Parliament. This legislation, when enacted, will provide an up-to-date mining code to regulate off-shore exploration and production, and extend all other appropriate laws to the off-shore area. The result of the Commonwealth-State Legislation will be to give the maximum legal efficacy to the law.

Legislation relating to the establishment of Centres for the reception and treatment of alcoholics will be introduced.

High priority will be given to legislation to permit the baking of bread at week-ends.

A bill to adjust the basis of pensions of widows of deceased State Government officers and employees will also be submitted to you.

Other bills to be introduced will provide for a re-enactment of the law relating to the selection of juries; the amendment of the Stamps Act to provide exemption from stamp duties on leasehold agreements between country municipal Councils and approved decentralized industries; and the amendment of the law relating to intestacy.

It is with regret that I must place on record the death of the Honorable B. D. Snider, the Honorable T. Hayes, the Honorable E. L. Kiernan and the Honorable Sir John Lienhop, all of whom served the State as Members of Parliament, and the latter three as Ministers of the Crown. Sir John Lienhop also served as Agent-General for Victoria in London.

In formally opening this Parliament I pray that the guidance of Almighty God may attend upon your deliberations.

WEDNESDAY, 17TH MAY, 1967.

 - (d) Has some 2,500 acres extending northerly from the Long Island Bay frontage been purchased by private industries; if so—(i) what is the extent of these purchases; (ii) by whom were they made; and (iii) do these purchases monopolize the Long Island area in conflict with the exhibited planning scheme and the report of the State Development Committee.
- *13. The Hon. A. W. Knight: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—
 - (a) When were the various oil companies and their contractors granted permits with respect to allowing the large road tanker vehicles of 25 tons or more to operate.
 - (b) What are the conditions of the permits.

 - (e) What provision is made for financial reimbursement to the municipal councils for repairing road damage caused by these large vehicles.
 - (f) Is the Transport Regulation Board aware of the operation and principle of the spread axle system employed on this type of vehicle.
 - (g) Is there any defined route for these vehicles to traverse.

- *14. The Hon. J. M. WALTON: To ask the Honorable the Minister for Local Government—
 - (a) Has he approved of the new accountancy regulations under the Local Government Act 1958.
 - (b) Is he aware that these regulations attempt to do by regulation propositions which Parliament rejected in 1949.
- *15. The Hon. I. R. CATHIE: To ask the Honorable the Minister for Local Government—
 - (a) When did the Shire of Hastings receive an application for a permit from Esso-B.H.P. to construct a fractionation plant and wharf facilities at Long Island.
 - (b) Was this application lodged well after press publicity of the intention to build at Long Island; if so, why.
 - (c) When was a permit granted by the council.
 - (d) Did the granting of this permit necessitate the drawing up of a new town plan by the Shire of Hastings; if so—(i) what wharfage area is now reserved for a future general cargo and passenger port under this plan; and (ii) did the council make provision to hear and consider any public objections to the granting of the permit.
- *16. The Hon. D. G. ELLIOT: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Health—How many tests for suspended dusts, nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide and other materials which affect human health were made on a comprehensive basis with modern continuously recording equipment in the State for the year 1966.
- *17. The Hon. A. W. KNIGHT: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—
 - (a) What is the estimated roadworks cost for the road leading from the South Gippsland Highway to the Esso-B.H.P. terminal at Barry's Beach.
 - (b) Will any of this cost be met by way of Country Roads Board contribution; if so, what is the amount.
- *18. The Hon. J. M. WALTON: To ask the Honorable the Minister for Local Government—
 - (a) Is he aware that the Metropolitan Fire Brigades Board increased its levy on metropolitan councils by .0579 of a cent in the dollar for this financial year.

 - (e) What is the estimated cost of preparing the proposed cargo port area ready for future construction.

Walton: To ask the Honorable the Minister for Local Government—In view of the Minister's reported statement in the Age newspaper on 2nd September that municipal candidates should only be allowed to spend a limited amount on their campaigns, will he inform the House what action he has taken or intends to take in this regard.

 - (a) Is he aware of a claim by a member of the Clean Air Committee that 151 individual complaints concerning air pollution were lodged during the ten months prior to March, 1967.

 - (a) Is it proposed to extend the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works water supply to the township of Bulla; if so, when will this work be carried out.

- 1. The Hon. A. W. KNIGHT: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—
 - (a) Is it proposed to extend the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works water supply to the township of Bulla; if so, when will this work be carried out.
 - (b) Is the Minister aware of the problems confronting the people of Bulla with respect to the difficulties of having a clean and fresh water supply and the pollution caused by deposits left on roofs by aircraft flying over-head.
 - (c) Will he assure the House that the township of Bulla will receive a proper water supply as quickly as possible.
- 2. The Hon. R. W. May: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—
 - (a) Since the commencement of the Roads (Special Projects) Act 1965 what number of works has been carried out in each financial year under this legislation.
 - (b) What was the work and what was the amount involved in each case.
 - (c) What projects have been approved and not completed, and approved and not commenced, respectively, and what are the priorities for such works.
 - (d) What special projects are under consideration.
- 3. The Hon. J. M. Tripovich: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—Has the Traffic Commission been requested by the Essendon City Council to prepare a design plan for the installation of traffic signals at the intersection of Pascoe Vale-road and Woodlands-street, Essendon; if so—
 (i) when was the request made; and (ii) when is it anticipated that it can be met.
- 4. The Hon. I. R. CATHIE: To ask the Honorable the Minister for Local Government-
 - (a) What investigations have been initiated by him into the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works proposal to discharge treated sewage effluent at Carrum.
 - (b) What committees have been set up in the Commission of Public Health, the Fisheries and Wildlife Branch and the Port Phillip Authority, respectively, to study this question.
 - (c) Who are the members of each of these committees, and what are their qualifications.
 - (d) When is it expected that these bodies will report back to the Minister or to Cabinet.
- 5. The Hon. A. W. Knight: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education—
 - (a) What schools in the Melbourne West Province will have temporary and portable class-rooms added to their present buildings for the 1968 school year.
 - (b) Have the District Inspectors for the respective areas in the Province completed their reports on this subject-matter; if not, what the reasons are for the delay.
- 6. The Hon, I. R. CATHIE: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Health-
 - (a) In the case of working mothers, what facilities are available to care for pre-school children.
 - (b) Does the Government consider that these facilities are sufficient to meet both present and future needs.
 - (c) What provisions are being planned for the enrolment of pre-school children of working mothers in—(i) pre-school centres; (ii) child-minding centres; and (iii) organized play groups; and for organized care in Housing Commission estates.
 - (d) If statistics are not available on these matters, will the Government make representations to the Federal Government to include such statistics in the census returns.
 - (e) Has any evidence been presented to the inquiry into child cruelty of an increasing use of barbiturates on children; if so, would this be caused by the present dearth of suitable child-minding centres.
 - * Notifications to which an asterisk (*) is prefixed appear for the first time.

- 7. The Hon. D. G. Elliot: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Health—How many visits to industrial properties were made by officers of the Clean Air Section of the Health Department during the year 1966-67.
- 8. The Hon. I. R. CATHIE: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education—
 - (a) Is he aware of a survey conducted by the Victorian Council of School Organizations which revealed that more than 1,000 children in 42 inner suburban primary schools are unable to speak English well enough to receive proper tuition.
 - (b) What research has been conducted by the Education Department and/or independent bodies into the question of migrant education and children with inadequate knowledge of English.
 - (c) When is it expected that the results and assessment of the research (if any) will be available.
 - (d) Is the survey correct when it claims that only two primary schools within a 5-mile radius of the G.P.O., Melbourne, reported full-time special teachers to help teach migrant children; if so, what steps has he taken to overcome these deficiencies.
- 9. The Hon. J. M. Tripovich: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—Was a revised list of the names and addresses of people serving as Justices of the Peace in Victoria compiled last year and issued in bound book form to Members of the Legislative Assembly; if so, why were Members of the Legislative Council not provided with similar information, and will the apparent oversight be now rectified.
- 10. The Hon. D. G. Elliot: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Health—Is the Government aware that the Commonwealth Aircraft Corporation is experiencing damage to jet engine component parts through air pollution emanating from Yarraville; if so, what action has it taken.
- 11. The Hon. J. M. TRIPOVICH: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—Has the Minister of Housing undertaken to supply Members of the Legislative Assembly with information concerning the homes on which demolition or repair orders have been issued in their respective Assembly Districts; if so, can this information be supplied to the Members of the Legislative Council.
- 12. The Hon. I. R. CATHIE: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education—
 - (a) Has he supported the request of the Victorian Teachers' Union for extra Commonwealth assistance for migrant education; if so, what consultations have taken place, who has represented Victoria and what decisions have been made.
 - (b) If the Commonwealth Government rejects this case, will the Minister establish a special fund with a guaranteed yearly allocation to assist overcrowded schools with special problems.
- 13. The Hon. A. W. KNIGHT: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture-
 - (a) For how long during each 24 hours on a Monday to Saturday basis have the railway gates situated at Blackshaws-road and Melbourne-road, Newport, been closed during the past three months.
 - (b) In view of the delays arising at these gates and the building of the Lower Yarra Crossing, is it proposed to alter the present system of manually operated gates.
- 14. The Hon. D. G. ELLIOT: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Health-
 - (a) Has he stated that Victoria does not need more research staff in the Clean Air Section of his department at present because of possible duplication of research being conducted in New South Wales.
 - (b) What research into air pollution was conducted in Victoria during the year 1966, and have the statistics and findings been published in any recognized scientific journal.
- 15. The Hon. M. A. CLARKE: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education—
 - (a) How many high schools and primary schools, respectively, are there in Victoria.

Section 7 of the Monash University Act 1958 provides that three members of the Council of the University shall be Members of the Parliament of Victoria who have been recommended for appointment by a Joint Sitting of Members of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly, and conducted in accordance with rules adopted for the purpose by the Members at the Sitting.

A vacancy on the Council has occurred as the result of the resignation of the Hon. John F. Rossiter, M.L.A., and it is requested that arrangements be made for such a Joint Sitting before the Houses go into recess.

From our records and information furnished by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly, it appears that the Parliamentary representatives on this Council have never been appointed by a Joint Sitting as required by the Act. The practice adopted was to ask each of the three Parliamentary Parties to nominate one Member, and an Order in Council was then obtained appointing them. I am satisfied that this procedure is not correct.

At present there are two members—Dr. H. A. Jenkins, M.L.A. (first appointed in 1961 and re-appointed in 1965) and the Hon. S. R. McDonald, M.L.C. (appointed to replace the Hon. P. V. Feltham, M.B.E., on 26th September, 1967), who have not been appointed in accordance with the I would like these two appointments to be regularised at the proposed Joint Sitting.

Section 25 of the Monash University Act provides, among other things, that no proceedings of the Council shall be invalidated if it is discovered afterwards that there is some defect in the election or appointment of the members of the Council.

I have addressed a similar letter to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly.

TRIPOVICH: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture—Has any of the work associated with the construction of "Harris" type suburban carriages ever been done at railway workshops located in country areas; if so—(i) what type of work was done; and (ii) how many men were employed and for what periods.

 - (a) Have discussions taken place between officers of the Minister of Transport's department and the Melbourne University student whose thesis was being examined by the department; if so, what has been the result of these discussions.

- *6. The Hon. I. R. CATHIE: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Education-
 - (a) In view of the answer to Question No. 10 asked in this House on the 12th March last, in which the Minister stated that very few country teachers were without satisfactory accommodation, is he aware of a survey conducted by the Technical Teachers Association revealing—(i) deplorable housing conditions; (ii) that four families have spent up to one month in caravans and tents on river banks before finding accommodation; (iii) that numerous teachers are living in out-of-the-way farm houses because they cannot obtain accommodation at their school; (iv) that single teachers are paying \$15 a week plus cost of living for flats in some areas and married teachers are paying \$25 a week for housing; and (v) that maintenance of departmental housing is painfully slow.
 - (b) Does he agree that these conditions exist; if so, what steps will he take as a matter of urgency to overcome these shocking conditions.

- (1) The Principal Act is hereby amended as follows:—
 - (a) In section 1 for the expression "(2) Receipts ss. 50-53." there shall be substituted the expression "(2) Receipts ss. 50-53L."
 - (b) For subdivision (2) of Division 3 of Part II. of the Principal Act there shall be substituted the following subdivision:—
 - '(2) Receipts.
 - 53J. (1) An employer may give notice in writing in the prescribed form to the Comptroller of Stamps that he elects to pay stamp duty under sub-section (3) in respect of salary or wages payable by him to his employés and any person who has given such a notice may revoke the notice by giving notice of revocation in the prescribed form to the Comptroller.
 - (2) The Comptroller of Stamps shall assign a serial number to every notice of election given to him under the last preceding sub-section.
 - (3) Where an employer has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) and has not given notice of revocation that employer—
 - (a) shall be an employer to whom this section applies;
 - (b) shall forward to the Comptroller at such intervals and in respect of such periods as are prescribed or as the Comptroller directs in writing in any particular case a statement in the prescribed form verified in the prescribed manner of the total of all amounts paid or deemed to have been paid by such employer during the period to which the statement relates as salary or wages; and
 - (c) shall pay in cash to the Comptroller as stamp duty on that statement an amount calculated at the rate of one cent (\$0.01) for every \$10 and for any fractional part of \$10 of the total of those amounts of salary or wages included in the statement.
 - (4) The duty paid by any employer in accordance with the last preceding sub-section shall be denoted on the statement by cash register receipt imprint.
 - (5) On the payment of salary or wages to an employé by an employer to whom this section applies that employer shall notify the employé that he is an employer to whom this section applies.

- (6) An employé shall not be liable to give a receipt or to pay stamp duty in respect of a payment of salary or wages by an employer to whom this section applies.
- (7) An employer to whom this section applies who fails to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty of not more than \$200 and to a penalty equal to double the amount of duty that would have been payable if he had complied with the provisions of this section.

 - (1) The Principal Act is hereby amended as follows:—
 - (a) In section 1 for the expression "(2) Receipts ss. 50-53." there shall be substituted the expression "(2) Receipts ss. 50-53L."
 - (b) For subdivision (2) of Division 3 of Part II. of the Principal Act there shall be substituted the following subdivision:—

'(2) Receipts.

- 50. (1) For the purposes of this subdivision and that part of the Third Schedule under the heading "II. RECEIPTS"—
 - "Employé" means a person who receives or is entitled to receive salary or wages and includes—
 - (a) a member of the Parliament or a person employed by the State of Victoria or an authority of the State of Victoria; and

- (b) where the Governor in Council has entered into an arrangement with the Governor-General, subject to the terms of the arrangement, a member of the Parliament of the Commonwealth who is elected in Victoria and a person employed by the Commonwealth or by an authority of the Commonwealth if that member or person is resident in Victoria.
- "Employer" means a person who pays or is liable to pay salary or wages and includes—
 - (a) in the case of an unincorporated body of persons other than a partnership—the manager or other principal officer of that body;
 - (b) in the case of a partnership—each partner; and
 - (c) except in relation to the imposition of a penalty—
 - (i) the State of Victoria and any authority of the State of Victoria; and
 - (ii) where the Governor in Council has entered into an arrangement with the Governor-General, subject to the terms of the arrangement, the Commonwealth and any authority of the Commonwealth.
- "Money" includes any bill of exchange or promissory note for money.
- "Receipt" means any note memorandum or writing whatsoever—
 - (a) whereby any money is acknowledged or expressed to have been received or deposited or paid;
 - (b) whereby any debt or demand or any part of a debt or demand is acknowledged to have been settled satisfied or discharged; or
 - (c) which signifies or imports any such acknowledgment—whether the same is or is not signed with the name of any person, and includes any cash sale docket—that is to say an instrument, issued tendered or forwarded to a purchaser of goods by the proprietor of or any salesman or other officer or employé in any wholesale or retail establishment immediately on the occasion of the purchase, which denotes the amount then paid therefor but does not acknowledge the receipt of such amount.
- "Salary or wages" means in relation to the remuneration of a person—
 - (a) in his capacity as an officer of the Commonwealth, his official salary earned in Victoria;
 - (b) in his capacity as a member of the Parliament of the Commonwealth elected in Victoria, the allowances and salaries payable to him either as a member or as a Minister of State of the Commonwealth or as presiding officer or chairman of committees of either house of the Parliament of the Commonwealth; and
 - (c) in any other capacity the gross amount before any deductions to which he is entitled as salary, wages, commission, bonuses or allowances (whether payable at piece-work rates or otherwise) earned in Victoria or paid in Victoria and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, including—
 - (i) any payments made under a contract which is wholly or substantially for the labour of that person;
 - (ii) any payments made by a company by way of remuneration to that person as a director of that company;
 - (iii) any periodical payments made by way of superannuation, pension or retiring allowance; and
 - (iv) any payments by way of commission to that person as a canvasser or collector.
- (2) For the purposes of this subdivision an employé is deemed to receive as salary or wages the gross amount to which he is entitled as salary or wages without regard to any deduction that might be made before payment to him of salary or wages.
- (3) Where money is exchanged for money a party to the exchange shall for the purposes of this subdivision and that part of the Third Schedule under the heading "II. Receipts" be deemed not to have received money except to the extent (if any) that he receives an amount of money which, or the nominal or face

value of which, being a bill of exchange or promissory note for money is greater than the amount of money or the nominal or face value of money, being a bill of exchange or promissory note for money, paid by him.

- 51. (1) Where a person—
 - (a) deposits or causes to be deposited to the credit of a bank account in Victoria of another person; or
 - (b) authorizes his banker to debit his bank account with and to—
 - (i) transfer to the credit of that banker or to the credit of the bank account of another person with that banker;
 - (ii) transmit to the credit of the bank account of another person with another banker; or
 - (iii) transmit to another banker (not being a transmission to the credit of the bank account of another person with that banker)—

any amount in respect of which duty would have been payable if the amount were paid in cash by the first-mentioned person into the hands of that banker or other person, the amount so deposited, transferred, or transmitted is for the purposes of this Part, deemed to have been received by—

- (c) in a case to which paragraph (a) applies, the person to the credit of whose account the amount is deposited or caused to be deposited;
- (d) in a case to which sub-paragraph (i) or (ii) of paragraph (b) applies, the banker to whose credit or the person to the credit of whose account the amount is transferred or transmitted; or
- (e) in a case to which sub-paragraph (iii) of paragraph (b) applies, the banker to whom the amount is transmitted—

and that banker or other person shall forthwith after having notice of the making of the deposit transfer or transmission give a duly stamped receipt therefor.

- (2) A person who fails to comply with the requirements of sub-section (1) shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than \$100 and to a penalty equal to double the amount of the duty that would have been payable if the sub-section had been complied with.
 - (3) This section applies—
 - (a) whether such a deposit, transfer or transmission is made on a single occasion or at regular or irregular intervals; and
 - (b) whether or not any agreement or arrangement has been made for payment by means of such a deposit, transfer or transmission.
 - (4) In this section—
 - "Banker" includes any person who receives money on deposit or holds money on current account for any other person; and
 - "Bank account" includes a current account of money held for a person by another person or deposited by a person with another person.
- 52. Where a person resident or carrying on business in Victoria receives or is deemed to have received outside Victoria payment for goods supplied or services rendered in Victoria, the payment shall for the purposes of this Part, be deemed to have been received in Victoria.
 - 53. (1) Every person who-
 - (a) gives any receipt liable to duty and not duly stamped; or
 - (b) receives or is paid or is deemed to have received or been paid any money, and—
 - (i) refuses or without reasonable excuse omits to give or tender a receipt duly stamped; or
 - (ii) gives a receipt for an amount which is not the amount of money received or paid or deemed to have been received or paid or separates or divides that amount with intent to evade the duty—

shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty of not more than \$100 and to a penalty equal to double the amount of the duty that should have been paid.

- (2) The obligation imposed by sub-section (1) of section 51 or by sub-section (1) to give or tender a receipt duly stamped shall not be affected or diminished in any way by any commercial practice or by any acquiescence intimation or indication expressed or implied by the payer relating to the giving or tendering or non-giving or non-tendering of any such receipt but does not extend to requiring a receipt to be given or tendered—
 - (a) by a person who has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53E and who has not given a notice of revocation unless that person is requested by the payer to give a receipt; or

- (b) by a person for money a receipt for which is exempt from stamp duty unless that person is requested by the payer to give a receipt.
- (3) Where a receipt has not been requested a receipt shall be deemed to have been given for the purposes of this section if a receipt is made out and duly stamped notwithstanding that the receipt is not sent or delivered to any person.
- (4) Where a receipt is made out and duly stamped but not sent or delivered the person making out the receipt shall retain possession of that receipt for three years after the receipt has been made.
- (5) An instrument to which any other Division of this Part or any other subdivision of this Division applies which acknowledges the receipt of the consideration therein expressed is not liable to duty under this subdivision or under the heading "II. RECEIPTS" in the Third Schedule but the obligation imposed by sub-section (1) to give or tender a receipt duly stamped is not discharged by the making of that instrument.
- (6) An instrument which acknowledges the receipt of the consideration therein expressed to which this Act other than this subdivision does not apply is not liable to duty under this subdivision or under the heading "II. RECEIPTS" in the Third Schedule if the Comptroller of Stamps is satisfied that duty under this subdivision or under the heading "II. RECEIPTS" in the Third Schedule has been paid in respect of the payment of that consideration.
- 53A. An information for any offence under this subdivision may be laid any time within three years from the date on which the offence was committed.
- 53B. If the duty upon a receipt is not denoted by an impressed stamp, such duty may be denoted by an adhesive stamp which shall forthwith be cancelled by the person by whom the receipt is made out or given.

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- 53c. (1) Where money has been received by a solicitor or agent from his client or principal for payment to another person the receipt to be given by the solicitor or agent to his client or principal shall be exempt from duty.
- (2) Where money has been received by a solicitor or agent on behalf of his client or principal, and a duly stamped receipt has been given by such solicitor or agent to the person by whom the payment was made, or the amount of the money so received is required to be included in a statement to be forwarded to the Comptroller of Stamps by the solicitor or agent pursuant to paragraph (a) of sub-section (1) of section 53F, the receipt to be given by any other solicitor or agent who receives the money for transmission to that client or principal shall be exempt from duty and the receipt to be given by the client or principal when such money is received by the client or principal shall be exempt from duty.
- (3) A solicitor or agent is not obliged to stamp a receipt for an amount of money or to include that amount in a statement forwarded to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to paragraph (a) of sub-section (1) of section 53F where the amount is received by the solicitor or agent on behalf of a client or principal who has given notice in writing to the Comptroller pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53E and who has not given a notice of revocation and who has requested the solicitor or agent in writing not to pay duty in respect of such an amount but where a duly stamped receipt for the amount is not given by the solicitor or agent and the amount is not included in the statement of the solicitor or agent forwarded to the Comptroller pursuant to the said paragraph (a) the client or principal shall be liable to include that amount in the statement forwarded to the Comptroller pursuant to the said paragraph (a) next after he has notice of the receipt of that money by the solicitor or agent.
- (4) The provisions of this section apply where money has been received by a solicitor or agent from or on behalf of his client or principal notwithstanding that part of the money so received is to be retained by the solicitor or agent but where the solicitor or agent transfers any amount held by him on behalf of his client or principal to his own account he shall for the purposes of this Part be deemed to have received that amount in cash at the time of the transfer unless the receipt for that amount was liable to duty when originally received by him.
- 53D. (1) A receipt given without being stamped may be stamped with an impressed stamp—
 - (a) within one month after it has been given—on payment of the duty and a penalty of \$25;
 - (b) after one month but within two months after it has been given on payment of the duty and a penalty of \$50;

(c) after two months after it has been given—on payment of the duty and a penalty of \$100, and such penalty shall in no case be mitigated or remitted pursuant to this Act to a less amount than \$10—

but this section shall not apply to receipts implied or expressed in instruments to be registered in the office of the Registrar-General or the Registrar of Companies or the Registrar of Titles or to receipts which have been executed at any place out of Victoria, which instruments or receipts (as the case may be) may be stamped after execution as provided in section 28.

(2) Where—

- (a) a return or statement required by the provisions of this subdivision to be lodged with the Comptroller of Stamps is not so lodged within the prescribed time; or
- (b) a note or memorandum required by the provisions of this subdivision to be made is not made within the prescribed time—

that return statement note or memorandum may be lodged or made-

- (c) within one month after the expiration of the prescribed time—on payment of the duty and a penalty of \$25;
- (d) after one month but within two months after the expiration of the prescribed time—on payment of the duty and a penalty of \$50;
- (e) after two months after the expiration of the prescribed time—on payment of the duty and a penalty of \$100, and such penalty shall in no case be mitigated or remitted pursuant to this Act to a less amount than \$10.
- 53E. (1) Any person to whom this section applies may give notice in writing in the prescribed form to the Comptroller of Stamps that he elects to pay stamp duty under the next succeeding section and any person who has given such a notice may revoke the notice by giving notice of revocation in the prescribed form to the Comptroller.
- (2) The Comptroller of Stamps shall assign a serial number to every notice of election given to him under the last preceding sub-section.
- (3) Where any person has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) and has not given a notice of revocation such person shall not be liable to pay stamp duty by impressed or adhesive stamps as aforesaid in respect of any receipt given by him after such notice has been given but shall be liable for the payment of stamp duty in accordance with the provisions of the next succeeding section.
 - (4) This section applies—
 - (a) to any person carrying on any trade business or profession otherwise than as an employé;
 - (b) to any body corporate or unincorporate;
 - (c) to any person who is a member of a class of persons declared by the Minister by notice published in the Government Gazette to be a class of persons to which this section applies; and
 - (d) to any person declared on the application of that person by the Minister by notice in writing under his hand to be a person to whom this section applies.
- 53F. (1) Where any person has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53E and has not given a notice of revocation such person shall—
 - (a) forward to the Comptroller of Stamps at such intervals and in respect of such periods as are prescribed or as the Comptroller directs in writing in any particular case a statement in the prescribed form verified in the prescribed manner of the total of all amounts received or deemed to have been received by or paid or deemed to have been paid to such person during the period to which the statement relates other than amounts or payments a receipt for which would have been exempt from stamp duty under this Act;
 - (b) pay in cash to the Comptroller of Stamps as stamp duty on that statement an amount calculated at the rate of one cent (\$0.01) for every \$10 and for any fractional part of \$10 of the total of the amounts required to be included in that statement; and
 - (c) indorse on every receipt given by him "S.D." and the serial number assigned by the Comptroller of Stamps to the notice given by such person to the Comptroller and thereupon every such receipt shall be deemed to be duly stamped:
- (2) The duty paid by any person in accordance with the last preceding sub-section shall be denoted on the statement by cash register receipt imprint.

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- 53G. (1) Every person who has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53E and who fails to comply with any of the requirements of section 53F at any time before he gives a notice of revocation to the Comptroller shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty of not more than \$200 and to a penalty equal to double the amount of the duty that would have been payable if section 53F had been complied with.
- (2) Any person who indorses any receipt with the expression "S.D." and a serial number or the words "Stamp Duty Paid" or with any similar words or expression unless he has given notice pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53E to the Comptroller and has not given a notice of revocation and unless the indorsement is made in accordance with this Act shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty of not more than \$1,000 or to imprisonment for a term of not more than six months or to both.
- 53H. (1) An employer to whom section 53J does not apply shall deduct from each payment of salary or wages paid by him to an employé the amount of stamp duty payable by that employé on a receipt for that payment of salary or wages.
- (2) An employé shall not be liable to give a receipt or to pay stamp duty in respect of a payment of salary or wages from which a deduction has been made under sub-section (1).
 - (3) An employer who has made a deduction under sub-section (1) shall—
 - (a) if he is a person who has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53E and has not given a notice of revocation or if he is a person for the time being authorized in that behalf by the Comptroller, lodge with the Comptroller at such intervals and in respect of such periods as are prescribed or as the Comptroller directs in writing in any particular case, a statement in the prescribed form verified in the prescribed manner of the total of the amounts deducted under sub-section (1) during the period to which the statement relates and pay that amount in cash to the Comptroller as stamp duty on that statement; or
 - (b) in any other case forthwith after the making of the deduction make a note or memorandum in or to the effect of the prescribed form of the total of the amounts deducted under that sub-section and pay the amount so deducted as stamp duty on the note or memorandum.
- (4) A note or memorandum referred to in paragraph (b) of sub-section (3) shall be retained by the employer for three years after the note or memorandum has been made.
- (5) The duty under paragraph (a) of sub-section (3) shall be denoted on the statement by cash register receipt imprint and the duty paid on a note or memorandum under paragraph (b) of sub-section (3) shall be forthwith denoted by adhesive stamps which shall be cancelled by the employer.
- (6) A person who fails to comply with any of the requirements of this section shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty of not more than \$200 and to a penalty equal to double the amount of the duty that would have been payable if this section had been complied with.
- 531. (1) A person resident in Victoria who has received or is deemed to have received a payment of salary or wages (not being a payment for which a receipt is exempt from duty under the heading "II. RECEIPTS" in the Third Schedule and not being a payment of salary or wages from an employer to whom section 531 applies) during the twelve months ending on the 30th day of June in any year in respect of which duty has not been deducted pursuant to section 53H shall within 31 days after the end of each such period of twelve months lodge with the Comptroller of Stamps a return in or to the effect of the prescribed form of the amounts of all such payments received or deemed to have been received by him during that period.
- (2) A person liable to make a return under the last preceding sub-section shall pay in cash to the Comptroller of Stamps as stamp duty on that return an amount calculated at the rate of one cent (\$0.01) for every \$10 and for any fractional part of \$10 of each of the amounts required to be included in that return.
- (3) The duty paid on a return under sub-section (2) shall be denoted on the return by cash register receipt imprint.
- (4) A person who fails to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty of not more than \$100 and to a penalty equal to double the amount of duty that would have been payable if he had complied with the provisions of this section.
- (5) This section does not apply to a payment of salary or wages received or deemed to have been received before the commencement of this section.

- 53J. (1) An employer may give notice in writing in the prescribed form to the Comptroller of Stamps that he elects to pay stamp duty under sub-section (3) in respect of salary or wages payable by him to his employés and any person who has given such a notice may revoke the notice by giving notice of revocation in the prescribed form to the Comptroller.
- (2) The Comptroller of Stamps shall assign a serial number to every notice of election given to him under the last preceding sub-section.
- (3) Where an employer has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) and has not given notice of revocation that employer—
 - (a) shall be an employer to whom this section applies;
 - (b) shall forward to the Comptroller at such intervals and in respect of such periods as are prescribed or as the Comptroller directs in writing in any particular case a statement in the prescribed form verified in the prescribed manner of the total of all amounts paid or deemed to have been paid by such employer during the period to which the statement relates as salary or wages; and
 - c) shall pay in cash to the Comptroller as stamp duty on that statement an amount caculated at the rate of one cent (\$0.01) for every \$10 and for any fractional part of \$10 of the total of those amounts of salary or wages included in the statement.
- (4) The duty paid by any employer in accordance with the last preceding sub-section shall be denoted on the statement by cash register receipt imprint.
- (5) On the payment of salary or wages to an employé by an employer to whom this section applies that employer shall notify the employé that he is an employer to whom this section applies.
- (6) An employé shall not be liable to give a receipt or to pay stamp duty in respect of a payment of salary or wages by an employer to whom this section applies.
- (7) An employer to whom this section applies who fails to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be guilty of an offence and liable to a penalty of not more than \$200 and to a penalty equal to double the amount of duty that would have been payable if he had complied with the provisions of this section.
- 53K. Where the Comptroller of Stamps is satisfied that it is not reasonably practicable to calculate precisely any total amount which is to be set out in the statement to be forwarded by a person to the Comptroller pursuant to paragraph (a) of sub-section (1) of section 53F or paragraph (b) of sub-section (3) of section 53F or to be lodged with the Comptroller pursuant to paragraph (a) of sub-section (3) of section 53H he may agree to accept statements from that person in which that total amount is calculated in such manner or on such basis as he thinks fit but any such agreement may be cancelled by notice in writing under the hand of the Comptroller given to that person.
- 53L. (1) Where the Comptroller of Stamps is satisfied that a person who has given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53E and has not given a notice of revocation—
 - (a) has paid any money received by him in respect of which he is liable to pay duty under this subdivision to any person or fund for the purpose of equalizing payments to producers under any prescribed marketing scheme; or
 - (b) has refunded any money received by him in respect of which he is liable to pay duty under this subdivision pursuant to a prescribed marketing scheme to the person or fund from which he received the money; or
 - (c) has refunded any money received by him as a deposit in respect of a tender or in relation to a contract or proposed contract—

the Comptroller shall allow a rebate to that first-mentioned person of an amount equal to one cent (\$0.01) for every \$10 and for every fractional part of \$10 of the amount so paid or refunded.

- (2) In this section and in exemption (24) under the heading "II. RECEIPTS" in the Third Schedule "prescribed marketing scheme" means any scheme for the marketing of primary products constituted under any Act of the Commonwealth or a State or declared by the Minister of Agriculture by notice published in the Government Gazette to be a scheme recognized by him as a scheme for the marketing of primary products.'
- (2) The provisions of the Stamps Act 1958 relating to receipts as in force immediately before the commencement of this section (in this sub-section called "the former provisions") shall apply to and in relation to any money received or deemed to have been received before the commencement of this section and notwithstanding anything in this Act for the purposes of such application the former provisions shall be deemed to remain in force except that any person who would have been obliged pursuant to the former provisions to have forwarded to the Comptroller of Stamps a statement of the total of all amounts received by him during a prescribed period ending on or after

the commencement of this section shall within 21 days after the commencement of this section forward such a statement in respect of the total of all amounts received by such person during the period commencing on the day after the day to which the last statement was made up and ending on the commencement of this section or, if no statement had previously been forwarded by such person, for the period commencing on the date that the notice was given by that person pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53A of the *Stamps Act* 1958 as in force immediately before the commencement of this section and ending on the commencement of this section.

(3) Save as aforesaid the Stamps Act 1958 as amended by this Act shall apply to and in relation to any money received or deemed to have been received after the commencement of this section but where any person had, before the commencement of this section, given notice to the Comptroller of Stamps pursuant to sub-section (1) of section 53A of the Stamps Act 1958 as in force immediately before the commencement of this section and had not given a notice of revocation that person shall be deemed to have given notice on the commencement of this section to the Comptroller pursuant to the provisions of sub-section (1) of section 53E of the Stamps Act 1958 as in force after the commencement of this section.

Receipt—

For an amount not exceeding \$10 0.01

For \$10 or more, then for every \$10 of the amount and also for any fractional part of \$10 of such amount 0.01

- (1) Receipt for any payment to Her Majesty or to any public department or to the Housing Commission.
- (2) Receipt for any payment to a municipality the Western Metropolitan Market Trust any sewerage authority under the Sewerage Districts Act 1958 any trust within the meaning of the Mildura Irrigation and Water Trusts Act 1958 any authority within the meaning of the Water Act 1958 any river improvement trust under the River Improvement Act 1958 or any Union under the Weights and Measures Act 1958.
- (3) Receipt for any amount paid to or received from any person for the amount of the principal of a deposit or loan where the deposit or loan is at call or for a term of 12 months or less.
- (4) Receipt given by a banker for money deposited in a bank for the credit of a depositor.
- (5) Receipt given by a depositor for money withdrawn from a bank.
- (6) Receipt for money paid to any person to be applied for any charitable purpose.
- (7) Receipt for any money on payment or delivery thereof by one banker to another in the ordinary course of banking business.
- (8) Receipt for any money paid to or by a registered bookmaker for or as a result of any bet on any licensed racecourse during the holding of a race-meeting.
- (9) Receipt for any money paid to or by the Totalizator Agency Board for or as a result of any bet.
- (10) Receipt for any money paid to or by persons for or as a result of any bet on a totalizator operated by any racing club.
- (11) Receipt for or in relation to any application or subscription for or any redemption purchase or sale of—
 - (a) any stock debentures or Treasury bonds Treasury notes or Treasury bills of the Government of the United Kingdom or of the Commonwealth of Australia or of Victoria or any other State of the said Commonwealth or any other part of Her Majesty's dominions;

- (b) any State Savings Bank Fixed Deposit Stock debentures or Credit Foncier Debenture Stock issued by the Commissioners of the State Savings Bank of Victoria;
- (c) stock debentures bonds or other securities of any public statutory body of the Commonwealth of Australia or of Victoria or of any other State of the said Commonwealth.
- (12) Receipt for any money delivered to or by any carrier approved by the Comptroller of Stamps for delivery from or to any bank.
- (13) Receipt for any money paid by any friendly or benefit society for sick pay or for funeral, hospital or medical benefits.
- (14) Receipt for money paid to the representative in Australia of the Government of another country, a foreign consul or a trade commissioner of any part of the British Commonwealth.
- (15) Receipt for any money paid to the trustees of any cemetery.
- (16) Receipt for any payment of compensation payable under the Workers Compensation Act 1958.
- (17) Receipt solely for accounting or office purposes for any payment-
 - (a) made by any person to any employé or servant of such person, or by any employé or servant of such person to such person or to any other employé or servant of such person;
 - (b) made in the course of the internal administration of the business of such person; and
 - (c) not being directly or indirectly a payment by way of wages salary bonus allowance commission fee reward or gratuity or in consideration of services rendered or of work or labour done or of goods bought from such person or from any employé or servant of such person.
- (18) Receipt upon the refund of a deposit lodged by a tenderer or offeree in relation to a contract or proposed contract or upon the refund of any over-paid rates taxes duties or other similar charges.
- (19) Receipt for any payment-
 - (a) under the Social Services Act 1947-1966 of the Commonwealth as amended from time to time;
 - (b) under the Repatriation Act 1920-1966 of the Commonwealth as amended from time to time;
 - (c) under the *Tuberculosis Act* 1948 of the Commonwealth as amended from time to time; or
 - (d) under any other Act of the Commonwealth of Australia or of a State of the Commonwealth which is declared by Order of the Governor in Council published in the Government Gazette to be an Act for the purposes of this exemption.
- (20) Receipt for a periodical payment made by way of superannuation, pension or retiring allowance at a rate not exceeding \$25 per week.
- (21) Receipt for any payment for relief or assistance granted by or on behalf of any Government or by or on behalf of any charitable institution.
- (22) Receipt for any money not exceeding \$10 received by or paid to any person to whom section 53e does not apply.
- (23) Receipt of a periodical payment made by way of salary or wages at a rate not exceeding \$20 per week.
- (24) Receipt for any money paid to a marketing or equalization board committee or other body pursuant to any prescribed marketing scheme.
- (25) Receipt by a solicitor or agent for money received on behalf of a client or principal who is not resident in and does not carry on business in Victoria.
- (26) Receipt for any money paid to a member of the Stock Exchange of Melbourne on the sale of marketable securities by him on his own account or behalf where the marketable securities in question were purchased by him within two clear days (not including any day upon which the stock exchange of which he is a member is closed) immediately prior to the sale of those marketable securities.
- (27) Receipt for any payment to a solicitor or agent on behalf of a client or principal where a receipt by the client or principal for that payment would be exempt from duty.
- (28) Receipt for any money paid to a credit society registered under the Co-operation Act 1958 or to a co-operative housing society registered under the Co-operative Housing Societies Act 1958."

After the heading preceding section 81 of the Motor Car Act 1958 there shall be inserted the following sections:—

'80A. (1) Every person who drives a motor car on a highway recklessly or at a speed or in a manner which is dangerous to the public having regard to all the circumstances of the case, including the nature condition and use of the highway and the amount of traffic which actually is at the time or which might reasonably be expected to be on the highway, shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable in the case of a first offence to a fine of not more than \$200 or to imprisonment for a term of not more than six months and in the case of a second or any subsequent offence to imprisonment for a term of not

more than twelve months, and upon any conviction for the said offence the court shall, if the offender holds any licence to drive a motor car under this Act, cancel that licence and shall, whether or not he holds any such licence, disqualify him from obtaining any such licence for such time, not being less than six months, as the court thinks fit.

- (2) Any member of the police force may without warrant apprehend the driver of a motor car if—
 - (a) such member has reasonable grounds based upon his personal observations for suspecting that the driver has committed an offence against sub-section (1); and
 - (b) the driver has refused to give his name or address or the motor car does not bear an identifying number.
- 80B. (1) Any person who drives a motor car while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or of any drug to such an extent as to be incapable of having proper control of the motor car shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable in the case of a first offence to a fine of not more than \$200 or to imprisonment for a term of not more than six months and in the case of a second or any subsequent offence to imprisonment for a term of not more than twelve months, and upon any conviction for the said offence the court shall, if the offender holds any licence to drive a motor car under this Act, cancel that licence, and shall, whether or not he holds any such licence, disqualify him from obtaining any such licence for such time, not being less than twelve months, as the court thinks fit; and at the end of any such period of disqualification a licence to drive a motor car shall not be issued to the offender except upon the order of a court of petty sessions consisting of a stipendiary magistrate sitting alone and no application for such an order shall be made to the court unless at least fourteen days' notice of intention so to apply has been given in writing to the Chief Commissioner of Police and to the clerk of courts.
- (2) Where application is made to a court of petty sessions for an order pursuant to the provisions of sub-section (1) the court may make or refuse to make the order sought, and for the purpose of determining whether or not the order should be made shall hear any relevant evidence tendered either by the applicant or by the Chief Commissioner of Police and, without limiting the generality of its discretion, shall have regard to the conduct of the applicant with respect to intoxicating liquor or drugs (as the case may be) during the period of disqualification and to his physical and mental condition at the time of the hearing of the application and to the effect which the making of the order may have upon the safety of the applicant or of the public.
- (3) (a) Any member of the police force shall have in relation to any offence against this section the same powers of arrest as he has in relation to felonies.
- (b) Where any person arrested in pursuance of the powers contained in paragraph (a) is in charge of a motor car any member of the police force may drive or convey the motor car to and detain it at any police station pending the admission of such prisoner to bail or (where that prisoner is not the owner of the motor car) pending a demand by the owner thereof.
- (4) In this section "drug" means any substance or preparation declared for the time being by the Governor in Council to be a drug for the purposes of section 318 of the Crimes Act 1958.

No. 4.—LABOUR AND INDUSTRY (SHOP TRADING HOURS) BILL.—Clause 2—

 - (a) specify the hours and period during which the exemption shall operate;
 - (b) define the place or district where such exemption shall operate; and
 - (c) be limited to such times and periods as would in the opinion of the Minister permit reasonable access by the persons who would not otherwise be able to resort to the shops.
- (4) The Minister may at any time by notice in writing under his hand published in the Government Gazette amend vary or revoke an exemption.
 - (5) The Minister shall not-
 - (a) exempt for any period exceeding six months any shopkeeper from being required to close and keep closed his shop in accordance with this Part;
 - (b) exempt any shopkeeper from being required to close and keep closed his shop on Sunday, Good Friday, Anzac Day or Christmas Day."

WEDNESDAY, 29TH NOVEMBER, 1967

The Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly having, pursuant to resolutions of the two Houses, assembled in the Legislative Assembly Chamber—

- 1. ELECTION OF PRESIDENT.—The Premier, the Honorable Sir Henry Bolte, M.L.A., moved—That the Honorable Vernon Christie, M.L.A., Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, be appointed President of this Joint Sitting, which motion, being seconded by Allan Clyde Holding, Esquire, M.L.A., was resolved in the affirmative.
 - The Honorable Vernon Christie, M.L.A., having expressed his acknowledgments for the honour conferred upon him by the Joint Sitting, then took the Chair.
- 2. Council of the Monash University.—The President read the relevant provision of section 7 of the Monash University Act 1958, viz.:—
 - "The Council shall consist of not more than thirty-six members and shall be constituted as follows:—
 - (a) Nine members shall be persons appointed by the Governor in Council of whom—
 - (i) three shall be members of the Parliament of Victoria recommended for appointment by a joint sitting of the members of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly conducted in accordance with rules adopted for the purpose by the members present at the sitting;".
- 3. Rules of Procedure.—The Honorable Sir Henry Bolte, M.L.A., submitted the following rules of procedure for the consideration of Honorable Members, and moved that they be adopted as the rules of procedure of this Joint Sitting:—
 - 1. On any debate arising the same shall be conducted according to Parliamentary usage.
 - 2. A Member, addressing himself to the President, shall propose a Member to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Monash University and such proposal shall be duly seconded. When any Member is so proposed his proposer shall state that such Member is willing to be so recommended for appointment, if chosen.
 - 3. If only three Members be proposed and seconded, the President shall declare—"That have been chosen to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Monash University."
 - 4. If more than three Members be proposed and seconded, the Members to be recommended for appointment shall be chosen by ballot in the following manner:—
 - 5. The President shall announce the names of the Members proposed and shall cause each Member present to be provided with a ballot-paper initialled by the Clerks of the two Houses.
 - 6. Upon such ballot-paper the Members receiving it shall write the names of the three Members he wishes to be recommended for appointment; and if any ballot-paper contains a larger number of names it shall be rejected. Having marked his ballot-paper as provided, the Member voting shall deposit it in a ballot-box provided for the purpose.
 - 7. The President shall appoint three Members to be scrutineers, who, with the Clerks, shall ascertain the number of votes for each Member; and the three Members who shall be reported to have the greatest number of votes shall be deemed to be duly chosen to be recommended for appointment. In any case of doubt arising through two or more Members having an equality of votes, the scrutineers by drawing lots shall determine which of such Members shall be chosen to be recommended for appointment.
 - 8. No informal vote shall be taken into account.
 - 9. The President shall be entitled to a vote.

- 10. As soon as the ballot is concluded the President shall declare—"That have been chosen to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Monash University."
- 11. The records of the proceedings and the ballot-papers shall be retained by the Clerk of the Parliaments of the State of Victoria, who shall be the custodian thereof, and shall keep the ballot-papers safely for one year and thereafter destroy them.

Allan Clyde Holding, Esquire, M.L.A., seconded the motion.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

- 4. Members Proposed and Chosen to be Recommended for Appointment to the Council of the Monash University.—The President announced that, the rules having been adopted, he was now prepared to receive proposals from Honorable Members with regard to the Members to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Monash University.
 - The Honorable Sir Henry Bolte, M.L.A., proposed the Honorable William Raymond Garrett, A.F.C., A.E.A., M.L.C., for recommendation for appointment to the Council, and stated that Mr. Garrett was willing to be recommended, if chosen, which proposal was seconded by the Honorable Murray Victor Porter, M.L.A.

 - 2. A Member, addressing himself to the President, shall propose a person to hold the vacant place in the Senate and such proposal shall be duly seconded. When any person is so proposed his proposer shall state to the Members present that such person is willing to hold the vacant place if chosen.
 - 3. If only one person be proposed and seconded, the President shall declare—"That has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Grey Gorton".
 - 4. If more than one person be proposed and seconded, the person to hold the vacant place shall, subject to the following rules, be chosen by ballot.
 - 5. Before giving directions to proceed with the ballot, the President shall ask if any Member desires to propose any other person to hold the vacant place, and, no other person being proposed, the ballot shall be proceeded with, after which no person shall be proposed.
 - 6. Each Member present shall be provided with a ballot-paper initialled by the Clerks of the two Houses, and shall write thereon the name of one of the persons duly proposed, and shall place his ballot-paper in the ballot-box.
 - 7. If two or more persons be proposed and seconded, the proposer of each of such persons shall name some Member present to be a scrutineer. The scrutineers, with the Clerks of the two Houses, shall retire and ascertain the number of votes for each person; and the scrutineers shall make a written report of the result to the President showing the number of votes for each person.
 - 8. No informal vote shall be taken into account.
 - 9. If on the first ballot no person shall have received an absolute majority of the votes polled, a second ballot shall be taken, and the name of the person who shall have received the fewest votes at the first ballot shall be excluded; but if at the first ballot the names of only two persons be submitted and the number of votes for such persons be equal, the scrutineers shall by drawing lots determine which of such persons shall be chosen to hold the vacant place, and the person whose name shall be first drawn shall be deemed to have been duly chosen.

- 10. Until one of the persons proposed obtains an absolute majority of the votes polled, or (as the case may be) is chosen by lot to hold the vacant place, successive ballots shall be taken, and at each such ballot the name of the person who shall have received the fewest votes at the preceding ballot shall be excluded.
- 11. If on any ballot it shall be necessary to decide between two or more persons as to which one is to be excluded from a subsequent ballot through the number of votes for such persons being equal, a special ballot shall be taken at which the names of only those persons shall be submitted, and the name of the person having the fewest votes at such special ballot shall be excluded; but if on any special ballot it shall be necessary to decide between two or more persons as to which one is to be excluded from a subsequent ballot through the number of votes for such persons being equal, the scrutineers by drawing lots shall determine which one of such persons shall be excluded, and the name of the person last drawn shall be excluded.
- 12. If at any ballot, other than the first ballot or a special ballot hereinbefore provided for, the names of only two persons be submitted and the number of votes for such persons be equal, the scrutineers shall, by drawing lots, determine which of those persons shall be chosen to hold the vacant place, and the person whose name shall be first drawn shall be deemed to have been duly chosen.
- 13. As soon as any person obtains an absolute majority of the votes polled, or (as the case may be) is chosen by lot to hold the vacant place, the President shall declare—"That has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Grey Gorton".
 - 14. The President shall in all cases be entitled to a vote.
- 15. The records of the proceedings and the ballot-papers shall be retained by the Clerk of the Parliaments of the State of Victoria, who shall be the custodian thereof, and shall keep the ballot-papers safely for one year and thereafter destroy them.

Allan Clyde Holding, Esquire, M.L.A., seconded the motion.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

- 3. Person Proposed and Chosen to hold the Vacant Place in the Senate.—The President announced that, the rules having been adopted, he was now prepared to receive proposals from Honorable Members of persons to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Grey Gorton.
 - The Honorable Sir Henry Bolte, M.L.A., proposed Ivor John Greenwood, Esquire, as the person to hold the vacant place, and stated that such person was willing to hold the vacant place, if chosen, which proposal was seconded by Allan Clyde Holding, Esquire, M.L.A.
 - The President having asked if any Honorable Member desired to propose any other person to hold the vacant place, and no other person being proposed, the President thereupon declared that Ivor John Greenwood, Esquire, had been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Grey Gorton.
- 4. Notification to His Excellency the Governor.—The Honorable Sir Henry Bolte, M.L.A., moved—That the President inform His Excellency the Governor that Ivor John Greenwood, Esquire, has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Grey Gorton, which motion was seconded by Allan Clyde Holding, Esquire, M.L.A.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

5. Vote of Thanks to the President.—The Honorable Sir Henry Bolte, M.L.A., moved a vote of thanks to the President, which motion was seconded by Allan Clyde Holding, Esquire, M.L.A., and carried unanimously.

The President, having returned thanks, declared the Joint Sitting closed.
