WEDNESDAY, 11TH APRIL, 1866.

1. Assembly met pursuant to Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the 10th day of April, 1866, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:—
PROROGUING PARLIAMENT AND FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE
SECOND SESSION OF THE FIFTH PARLIAMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR CHARLES HENRY DARLING, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Constitution Act* it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he may think fit, and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he shall deem it expedient: And whereas it is expedient to prorogue the said Council and Assembly called the Parliament of Victoria, and to fix a time for holding the next Session thereof: Now therefore I, Sir Charles Henry Darling, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation prorogue the said Council and Assembly or Parliament of Victoria; and I do hereby fix Wednesday, the Eleventh day of April instant, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session thereof for the despatch of business, at Four o'clock in the afternoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Parliament Place, Spring Street, in the City of Melbourne; and the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this tenth day of April, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and in the twenty-ninth year of Her Majesty's reign.

4. **VOLUNTEER LAW AMENDMENT BILL.**—Mr. Verdon moved, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Law relating to the Local Forces and Volunteers.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
Ordered—That Mr. Verdon and Mr. McCulloch do prepare and bring in the Bill.
Mr. Verdon then brought up a Bill intituled “*A Bill to amend the Law relating to the Local Forces and Volunteers,*” and moved that it be now read a first time.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.—Bill read a first time, ordered to be printed, and read a second time Wednesday, 18th April instant.
5. **DAYS OF BUSINESS.**—Mr. McCulloch moved, by leave of the Assembly, That Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in each week during the present session be the days on which the Assembly shall meet for the despatch of business, and that four o’clock be the hour of meeting on each day.

7. **LIBRARY COMMITTEE.**—Mr. McCulloch moved, by leave of the Assembly, That the following Members form the Library Committee of the Assembly, during the present session, with power to confer with the Committee of the Legislative Council :—Mr. Speaker, Mr. Edwards, Mr. Casey, Mr. Vale, Mr. Ireland.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
8. **PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS COMMITTEE.**—Mr. McCulloch moved, by leave of the Assembly, That the following Members form the Parliament Buildings Committee of the Assembly, with power to confer with the Committee of the Legislative Council :—Mr. Speaker, Mr. Bayles, Mr. Harbison, Mr. Frazer, Mr. Blackwood.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
9. **REFRESHMENT ROOMS COMMITTEE.**—Mr. McCulloch moved, by leave of the Assembly, That the following Members form the Refreshment Rooms Committee of the Assembly, with power to confer with the Committee of the Legislative Council :—Mr. J. T. Smith, Mr. Snodgrass, Mr. Aspinall, Mr. Sands, Mr. Tucker.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
10. **STANDING ORDERS COMMITTEE.**—Mr. McCulloch moved, by leave of the Assembly, That the following Members form the Select Committee on Standing Orders, three to form a quorum :—Mr. Speaker, Mr. Lalor, Mr. Macgregor, Mr. Snodgrass, Mr. Ireland, Mr. Higinbotham, Mr. Bindon, Mr. Gillies, Mr. McCulloch.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
11. **PRINTING COMMITTEE.**—Mr. McCulloch moved, by leave of the Assembly, That the following Members do form the Printing Committee during the present Session, three to form a quorum :—Mr. Speaker, Mr. Richardson, Mr. Lalor, Mr. Moore, Mr. Jones, Mr. Halfey, Mr. O’Grady, Mr. Davies, Mr. Ramsay.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
12. **PRIVATE BILL BUSINESS.**—Mr. McCulloch moved, by leave of the Assembly, That Private Bill business have precedence on Wednesdays over all other business from half-past four o’clock to half-past six o’clock.
Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
13. **GOVERNOR’S SPEECH.**—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had this day attended His Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council, when His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament (of which, to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy) which he read to the House, and is as follows :—

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

In order that the Supply Bill of last session may be again considered, it has been found necessary that there should be a new session of Parliament, and I have, therefore, called you together immediately after the prorogation for that purpose.

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

The Estimates which were laid before you last Session will be resubmitted for your consideration.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

In adopting the course I have taken to enable you again to deal with the Supply Bill, I have been actuated by an earnest desire that the differences between the Houses should be brought to an end.

I trust that in considering the remaining points of difference you will be enabled, while maintaining all that is essential to the public interests that each House should preserve, at the same time to give full effect to the wishes which the constituencies have so recently and so clearly expressed.

14. **SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.**—Mr. Verdon moved, by leave of the Assembly, That the Standing Rules and Orders of the Assembly relating to granting a Supply to Her Majesty be suspended to enable the Supply Bill to be gone through to-night.

Debate ensued.

Motion, by leave, withdrawn.

Mr. Verdon then moved, by leave of the Assembly, That the Standing Rules and Orders of the Assembly be suspended to allow His Excellency the Governor's Speech to both Houses of Parliament to be now taken into consideration.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

15. **HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH CONSIDERED.**—On the motion of Mr. Verdon, the House proceeded to take into consideration His Excellency the Governor's Speech to both Houses of Parliament; and the same was again read by Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Verdon moved, That a Supply be granted to Her Majesty.

Question—That this House will now resolve itself into a Committee to consider that motion—put and resolved in the affirmative.

16. **SUPPLY.**—The Order of the Day being read for the House to resolve itself into a Committee to consider the motion, That a Supply be granted to Her Majesty.

On the motion of Mr. Verdon, it was ordered that His Excellency's Speech be referred to the said Committee; and,

On the further motion of Mr. Verdon, Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the Assembly resolved itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the motion, That a Supply be granted to Her Majesty.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Lalor reported that the Committee had come to a certain resolution.

Ordered—That the report be received this day.

Mr. Lalor reported from the said Committee a resolution, which was read, and is as follows :—

That a Supply be granted to Her Majesty.

The said resolution being read a second time, Mr. Verdon moved, That this House doth agree with the Committee in the said resolution, That a Supply be granted to Her Majesty.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Verdon moved, That this House will this day resolve itself into a Committee to consider of the Supply granted to Her Majesty.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

17. **MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.**—The following Message from His Excellency the Governor was presented by Mr. Verdon, and read, and is as follows :—

19. **WAYS AND MEANS.**—Mr. Verdon moved, by leave of the Assembly, That this House do now resolve itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

Whereupon Mr. Speaker left the Chair, and the Assembly resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair ; and Mr. Lalor reported that the Committee had come to certain resolutions.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY—

WE, the Members of the Legislative Assembly of Victoria in Parliament assembled, have learned with extreme regret that Her Majesty has been advised to recall you from the Government of Victoria.

2. We cannot be unmindful of the great and unprecedented difficulties with which Your Excellency has been beset, nor of the fact that had Your Excellency adopted any other course of administration, the unhappy differences between the Houses of Legislature would not have been satisfactorily adjusted.

3. We are greatly beholden to Your Excellency for your steadfast adherence to the principles of constitutional Government, and recognize in Your Excellency's conduct a determination to rule by the advice of your responsible ministers. We do not hesitate to express our conviction that if Your Excellency had adopted the opposite course—if you had attempted to give effect to the opinions of the minority—the political contest, now happily at an end, would still be raging to the great injury of the country.

4. We therefore thank Your Excellency for having saved the colony from anarchy, and for having effected a settlement of the serious political differences from which we have just emerged. Especially we thank Your Excellency for not having interposed to influence the operation of responsible Government, to the possession of which, as British subjects, we have never ceased to be entitled.

5. We beg, at the termination of Your Excellency's official connexion with this colony, to express the deep and sincere interest we feel in Your Excellency's future welfare and in that of your family, and we desire also to express our belief that the widespread regret publicly manifested at Your Excellency's recall from the Government, will afford to Your Excellency the best assurance that you leave these shores possessed of the general respect and sympathy of the people of this colony.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair. Mr. Lalor reported that the Committee had come to the following resolution, which was read and is as follows :—

Resolved—That in the opinion of this Committee it is expedient that an humble Address be presented to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, praying that Her Majesty may be graciously pleased to sanction the acceptance by Lady Darling of a sum £20,000, to be granted to her ladyship, in accordance with the recommendation of a Select Committee of this House.

And the said resolution was read a second time and agreed to by the Assembly.

Mr. Balfour then moved, That the following gentlemen, viz., Dr. Heath, Mr. Macgregor, Mr. J. T. Smith, Mr. Bindon, Mr. Richardson, Mr. Vale, Mr. Reeves, Mr. McKean, Mr. Cope, Mr. G. Paton Smith, and the Mover, be appointed a Committee to prepare an Address upon the said resolution; three to form a quorum, and that they do retire immediately.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Balfour, Chairman, brought up the Report from the above Committee, which was read, and is in the words following :—

To Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

We, the Members of the Legislative Assembly of Victoria, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach Your Majesty with renewed assurances of our loyalty and affection.

We beg leave to inform Your Majesty that the recall of Sir Charles Darling from the Government of this colony, which Your Majesty has been pleased to command, must occasion very heavy pecuniary loss to his family.

Anxious to obviate in some degree this result, we appointed a Select Committee to consider by what means we could most suitably effect our desire, and a vote of £20,000 to Lady Darling was recommended for our adoption by the Committee.

Since the presentation of the report of the Committee to the Assembly Sir Charles Darling addressed to us the following Message :—

C. H. DARLING,

Governor.

The Governor perceiving from the proceedings of the Legislative Assembly that a Select Committee of the House, appointed to report on the steps the House should take with reference to the Governor's recall from the government of this Colony, have agreed to recommend that a Parliamentary grant be made to Lady Darling, desires to express his deep and grateful appreciation of the generous consideration for his family evinced by the recommendation of the Committee.

But the Governor feels it to be his duty, while yet administering the government, to intimate that his family would not feel at liberty to accept the bounty of the Parliament and people of Victoria until the Governor shall have first ascertained whether Her Majesty may be pleased to signify any commands therein, and until he shall have respectfully submitted to Her Majesty his earnest Petition that the whole of his conduct in the administration of the government of the Colony may be subjected to the most rigid inquiry and investigation.

Government House Victoria,

5th May, 1866.

We therefore humbly pray Your Majesty to be graciously pleased to sanction the acceptance of the proposed grant by Lady Darling.

And Your Majesty's Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Mr. Balfour then moved, That an Address be presented to His Excellency the Officer Administering the Government, requesting His Excellency to forward the above Address to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, for presentation to Her Majesty.

In accordance with the requirements of the 57th Section of the *Constitution Act*, the Officer Administering the Government recommends that the law relating to the Post Office be amended, and that a Bill be introduced for that object ; also, that an Appropriation be made out of the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes thereof, and that the fees, fines, or imposts provided for in such Bill, be appropriated in accordance with its provisions.

After the application of this Part of this Act to any city town or borough any person who shall throw or cause to enter into any stream reservoir or other place from which a supply of water for the use of the inhabitants of such city town or borough is taken any animal rubbish filth stuff or thing of any kind whatsoever or who shall cause or permit to run or be brought therein the water of any sink sewer drain engine or boiler or other filthy or unwholesome or improper liquid or shall do anything whatsoever whereby the water of such stream reservoir or other place as aforesaid shall be fouled shall for every such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds and a further sum of twenty shillings for each day whilst the offence is continued after written notice in that behalf from the local board of health Provided always that this clause shall not be construed so as to prohibit persons engaged in mining for gold from using any stream for that purpose.

2. MESSAGE FROM HIS EXCELLENCY THE OFFICER ADMINISTERING THE GOVERNMENT.—A Message from the Officer Administering the Government, by the Usher of the Legislative Council :—

MR. SPEAKER,

His Excellency desires the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Legislative Council.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House went to the Legislative Council, when His Excellency was pleased to give the Royal Assent to the following Bills, viz. :—

“ *An Act to apply a Sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the Service of the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and to appropriate the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament, and for other Purposes.*”

“ *An Act to remove Doubts concerning the Law relating to the Grant of Land Certificates to Volunteers.*”

“ *An Act to alter the Style and Title of the Australasian Fire and Life Insurance Company, and for other Purposes.*”

“ *An Act to amend the Law relating to the Post Office.*”

“ *An Act to protect the Rights of Inventors of Articles exhibited at the Intercolonial Exhibition, and at divers Local Exhibitions in Victoria, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.*”

“ *An Act to amend and explain the ‘Insolvency Statute 1865,’ and for other Purposes.*”

“ *An Act to simplify the Title to, and dealing with, Estates in Land.*”

3. HIS EXCELLENCY'S SPEECH.—After which His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, as followeth :—

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

I am glad to be able to release you from your legislative labors, after a session which has not been unusually protracted. Nevertheless the measures which, within the past few weeks, have become law are not unimportant, and must have a sensible effect on the interests and future progress of the country.

A Bill for the appropriation of the votes of the Assembly for the year 1865 has become law, and thus the final sanction of the Legislature has been given to the exceptional, but in the opinions of my advisers and of the Assembly, the necessary expenditure in the past year for the upholding of the various public establishments of the colony.

I am happy to be able to inform you that my advisers continue to receive the most favorable reports of the uninterrupted beneficial operation of the Amending Land Act of the year 1865. Throughout the various agricultural areas which have been opened to selection, large quantities of land have passed into the hands of the farming class of our fellow colonists, and in every district evidence is afforded of the increasing occupation of the country, by a settled and industrious population.

The new Tariff is also now in full operation, and, as yet, has not been followed by any of those injurious consequences to our commerce which were so confidently predicted by the opponents of that measure.

You will be gratified to learn that the act for the establishment of Post Office Savings Banks is still working most beneficially. Affording, as these institutions do, the means for the industrious and provident portion of our community placing the smallest savings in perfect security, the spirit of thrift is generated, and diffused by these facilities ; and the deposits are steadily increasing in amount from week to week.

A Bill for the reduction of our postal rates has become law, which will take effect from the 1st of August next.

The powers conferred upon the Government, by the Act for providing a general system of water supply to the colony, are being energetically acted upon by my advisers. Surveys have been effected in various extensive districts, and contracts have been entered into for performance of several most important works, which will be commenced forthwith. It is a necessary and interesting characteristic of the legislation of a young country like that of Victoria, the capabilities of which are but in a nascent state, that it shall aim at the future development of the colony, whilst providing merely for the exigencies of the present time; and I think that you may look back with pride on the enactment of a measure which, having regard to the probable future benefits it is calculated to confer on all the leading interests of the country, is certainly second to none on the Statute book of the Victorian Parliament.

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

I thank you on behalf of Her Majesty for the liberality with which, by your vote you have provided for the public service of the present year.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

In accordance with a recommendation of the Legislative Assembly, a member of the Government has proceeded to England for the purpose of carrying out the negotiations relating to our defences and other important subjects of public policy with Her Majesty's Government in England. The Honorable Mr. Verdon, the Treasurer, has been deputed by my advisers for the purpose of carrying out this object, and it is expected that his mission may be completed, and that he may be able to return to the colony within a few months.

I now release you from your duties; and in Her Majesty's name declare this Parliament to be prorogued to Thursday, the 12th day of July next, and it is hereby prorogued accordingly.

49. After the application of this Part of this Act to any city town borough shire district or place any person who shall throw or cause to enter into any stream reservoir or other place from which a supply of water for the use of the inhabitants of such city town borough shire district or place is taken and above the part of the stream from whence such water shall be drawn any animal rubbish filth stuff or thing of any kind whatsoever or who shall cause or permit to run or be brought therein the water of any sink sewer drain engine or boiler or other filthy or unwholesome or improper liquid or shall do anything whatsoever whereby the water of such stream reservoir or other place as aforesaid shall be fouled shall for every such offence forfeit a sum not exceeding ten pounds and a further sum of twenty shillings for each day whilst the offence is continued after written notice in that behalf from the local board of health and whosoever being the owner of any gas works or being engaged in the manufacture or supply of gas causes or suffers to be brought or flow into any stream reservoir or other place as aforesaid or into any drain or pipe communicating therewith any washing or other substance produced in the manufacture of gas or shall wilfully do any act connected with the manufacture or supply of gas whereby the water in any such stream reservoir or other place as aforesaid is fouled shall forfeit to the said local board of health for every such offence the sum of two hundred pounds and after twenty-four hours' notice from the said local board of health in this behalf a further sum of twenty pounds for every day during which the offence is continued or during the continuance of the act whereby the water is fouled and every such penalty shall be recoverable with full costs of suit by action of debt and if any water supplied for the use of the inhabitants of any district be fouled in any manner by the gas of any such owner or person as aforesaid he shall forfeit to the local board of health for every such offence a sum not exceeding twenty pounds and a further sum not exceeding ten pounds for every day whilst the offence is continued after the expiration of twenty-four hours' notice in writing from the local board of health in this behalf and for the purpose of ascertaining whether such water is fouled by the gas of any such owner or person the said local board of health may lay open and examine any pipes conduits and works from which the gas is supposed to escape Provided that before beginning to do so twenty-four hours' notice in writing be given to the person to whom such pipes conduits or works belong or under whose management or control they may be of the time at which the examination is intended to be made and if upon such examination it appear that the water has been fouled by the gas proceeding from or contained in the pipes conduits or works examined the expense of the examination shall be paid and borne by the person to whom such pipes conduits or works belong or under whose management or control they may be and shall be recoverable from him in a summary manner but if it appear that the water has not been so fouled then such expenses and all damages occasioned by the examination shall be paid by the said local board and shall be recoverable from them in a summary manner.

Motion made and question put—That in the opinion of this Committee the Government should be authorised to refer the claim of Mr. Pierce J. Williams to arbitration, to ascertain the amount due to him for damages and costs, as recommended by the Select Committee of the Assembly appointed to consider this question.
