

FIRST SESSION—THIRTY-FIFTH PARLIAMENT.

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- Administration and Probate (War Service): Bill to amend section 2 of the Administration and Probate (War Service) Act 1940—(Mr. Macfarlan).—Initiated and read a first time, 17 Nov., 1943, p. 72; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 Nov., p. 75; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 25 Nov., p. 77; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Dec., p. 82. (Assented to 6 December, 1943. Act No. 4982.)
- Appropriation: Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the 30th day of June, 1944, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this session of Parliament—(Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 Dec., 1943, p. 94; the Council's agreement notified, 18 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4998.)
- Capital Punishment Abolition: Bill to abolish capital punishment in the State of Victoria—(Mr. Barry).—Initiated and read a first time, 12 Oct., 1943, p. 47.—Bill lapsed.
- COAL MINES REGULATION: Bill to amend the Coal Mines Regulation Act 1928 in certain particulars—
 (Mr. Lind).—Initiated and read a first time, 29
 June, 1943, p. 6; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 20 July, p. 14; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 28 July, p. 19, the Council's agreement notified, 3 Nov., p. 64. (Assented to 8 November, 1943. Act No. 4956.)
- Coal Mine Workers Pensions: Bill to provide for payments to certain persons over the age of 60 years employed in the coal mining industry—(Mr. Dunslan).—Initiated and read a first time, 6 Oct., 1943, p. 44; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 13 Oct., p. 47; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 20 Oct., p. 52; the Council's agreement notified, 9 Nov., p. 68. (Assented to 15 November, 1943, Act No. 4959.)
- Consolidated Revenue (Bill No. 1): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £3,853,458 to the service of the year 1943-44—(Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 29 June, 1943, p. 11; the Council's agreement notified, 20 July, p. 13. (Assented to 1 July, 1943. Act No. 4943.)

- Consolidated Revenue (Bill No. 2): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £875,519 to the service of the year 1942-43—(Mr. Dunstan).

 —Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 29 June, 1943, p. 11; the Council's agreement notified, 20 July, p. 13. (Assented to 1 July, 1943. Act No. 4944.)
- Consolidated Revenue (Bill No. 3): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £3,745,019 to the service of the year 1943-44—(Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 25 Aug., 1943, p. 28; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Sept., p. 29. (Assented to 1 September, 1943. Act No. 4947.)
- Consolidated Revenue (Bill No. 4): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £2,307,904 to the service of the year 1942-43—(Mr. Lind).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 Oct., 1943, p. 43; the Council's agreement notified, 20 Oct., p. 50. (Assented to 20 October, 1943. Act No. 4951.)
- Consolidated Revenue (Bill No. 5): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £3,833,722 to the service of the year 1943-44—(Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 20 Oct., 1943, p. 54; the Council's agreement notified, 3 Nov., p. 64. (Assented to 3 November, 1943. Act No. 4955.)
- Country Roads Board Fund: Bill to further amend the Country Roads Board Fund Act 1932 (No. 2)—
 (Mr. Martin).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 13) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 20 Oct., 1943, p. 50; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 Nov., p. 62; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Nov., p. 67; the Council's agreement notified, 30 Nov., p. 81. (Assented to 6 December, 1943. Act No. 4973.)

 Bill relating to forest roads and stock routes—(Mr. Lind).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 July, 1943, p. 15; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 27 July, p. 18; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 4) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; debate on second reading resumed and adjourned, 28 July, p. 18; debate continued—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired,

28 July, p. 19; the Council's agreement notified, 19 Oct., p. 49. (Assented to 25 October, 1943. Act No. 4953.)

DISCHARGED SERVICEMEN'S PREFERENCE; Bill relating to preference in employment for discharged members of the defence forces, and for other purposes—(Mr. Macfarlan).—Initiated and read a first time, 23 Nov., 1943, p. 75; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 24 Nov., p. 76; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 28) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 1 Dec., pp. 81-2; debate on second reading resumed and adjourned, 1 Dec., p. 82; debate continued—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 2 Dec., p. 83; further considered in Committee, 8 Dec., p. 86; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments, 9 Dec., p. 86; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time and further amendments made; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Dec., pp. 87-8; report from the Clerk of corrections made by him in the Bill, 14 Dec., p. 89; the Council's agreement notified, 17 Dec., p. 92. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4989.)

EDUCATION: Bill to amend the Education Act 1928 and to make certain consequential amendments in the Factories and Shops Act 1928—(Mr. Lind for Mr. Hollway).—Initiated and read a first time, 1 Dec., 1943, p. 82; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 Dec., p. 83; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Dec., p. 92; the Council's agreement notified, 18 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4993.)

Factories and Shops (Chairmen of Wages Boards): Bill to amend section 11 of the Factories and Shops Act 1941—(Mr. Mackrell).—Initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 20 July, 1943, p. 14; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Aug., p. 24; the Council's agreement notified, 19 Oct., p. 49. (Assented to 25 October, 1943. Act No. 4952.)

Factories and Shops (Saturday Half-holiday): Bill to amend section 77 of the Factories and Shops Act 1928—(Mr. Hollway).—Initiated and read a first time, 20 Oct., 1943, p. 52; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 Nov., p. 62; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; motion, by leave, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider an amendment of section 97 of the Factories and Shops Act 1928, agreed to; Bill considered and reported with an amendment and with an amended title, viz.:—A Bill to amend Section Seventy-seven and Ninety-seven of the "Factories and Shops Act 1928"; Bill, as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 Nov., p. 73; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Dec., p. 82. (Assented to 6 December, 1943. Act No. 4976.)

FARMERS DEBTS ADJUSTMENT: Bill to amend the Farmers Debts Adjustment Act 1935—(Mr. Lind for Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—

debate adjourned, 24 Nov., 1943, p. 76; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 25) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 30 Nov., p. 80; debate on second reading resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Dec., p. 83; the Council's agreement notified, 8 Dec., p. 86. (Assented to 13 December, 1943. Act No. 4987.)

Farmers Protection (Amendment): Bill to amend sections 5, 6 and 17 of the Farmers Protection Act 1941—(Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Nov., 1943, p. 68; debate resumed and adjourned, 23 Nov., p. 76; debate continued—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 25 Nov., p. 77; the Council's agreement notified, 8 Dec., p. 86. (Assented to 13 December, 1943. Act No. 4984.)

Financial Emergency (Grants and Funds): Bill to further amend Part IV. of the Financial Emergency Act 1931—(Mr. Hyland).—Initiated and read a first time, 26 Oct., 1943, p. 57; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 27 Oct., p. 59; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Nov., p. 72; the Council's agreement notified, 25 Nov., p. 77. (Assented to 29 November, 1943. Act. No. 4969.)

Forests: Bill to amend section 7 of the Forests Act 1939—(Mr. Lind).—Initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 24 Nov., 1943, p. 76; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 25 Nov., p. 77; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Dec., p. 82. (Assented to 6 December, 1943. Act No. 4980.)

Forests (Exchange of Lands): Bill to make provision with respect to the exchange of forest land for unoccupied Crown land—(Mr. Lind).—Initiated and read a first time, 4 Aug., 1943, p. 22; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Aug., p. 24; debate resumed and adjourned, 20 Oct., p. 53; debate continued—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 26 Oct., p. 58; the Council's agreement notified, 9 Nov., p. 68. (Assented to 15 November, 1943. Act No. 4960.)

Grain Elevators: Bill to amend sections 5, 6 and 42 of the *Grain Elevators Act* 1934 and to make provision consequential thereon—(Mr. Martin).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Aug., 1943, p. 23; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Aug., p. 24; the Council's agreement notified, 25 Aug., p. 26. (Assented to 16 August, 1943. Act No. 4946.)

Housing: Bill to provide for increased housing accommodation in the metropolitan and other areas —(Mr. Zwar).—Initiated and read a first time, 12 Oct., 1943, p. 47.—Bill lapsed.

Housing (Bill No. 2): Bill to confer additional powers and functions upon the Housing Commission, and for other purposes—(Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated and read a first time, 3 Nov., 1943, p. 64; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 17 Nov., p. 72; debate resumed and

adjourned, 24 Nov., p. 76; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 24) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purpose of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 30 Nov., pp. 79-80; debate on second reading resumed and adjourned, 30 Nov., p. 81; debate continued—Bill read a second time and committed; motion, by leave, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider amendments to provide for an increase in the number of members of the Housing Commission by the appointment of a person residing outside the metropolis and having a knowledge of housing problems in urban and country districts, agreed to; Bill considered in Committee, 1 Dec., p. 82; further considered in Committee, 7 Dec., p. 85; 9 Dec., p. 86; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Dec., p. 87; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified; amendments considered and agreed to, 17 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4996.)

INEBRIATES: Bill to amend the law relating to inebriates—(Mr. Bailey).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 July, 1943, p. 15; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 27 July, p. 17; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 3 Aug., p. 21; further considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 20 Oct., p. 52.—Bill not returned from the Legislative Council.

Instruments (Insurance Contracts): Bill intituled "An Act to amend the 'Instruments (Insurance Contracts) Act 1936'"—(Mr. Macfarlan).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 8 Dec., 1943, p. 86; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 14 Dec., p. 90; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 16 Dec., p. 91. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4990.)

LAND (GRAZING LEASES): Bill to prohibit grazing leases in national parks—(Mr. Zwar).—Initiated and read a first time 12 Oct., 1943, p. 47.—Bill lapsed.

Land Settlement (Acquisition): Bill to make provision for the setting apart and acquisition of land with the object of making the same available on favourable terms in order to enable those who have been members of the fighting services to engage successfully in primary production and generally of promoting land settlement—(Mr. Lind).—Initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 30 Nov., 1943, p. 81; debate resumed and adjourned, 8 Dec., p. 86; debate continued—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 14 Dec., p. 90; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments, 15-16 Dec., p. 90; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time and further amendments made; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Dec., p. 91; the Council's agreement to the Bill with an amendment notified; amendment considered and agreed to, 18 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4994.)

LAND SETTLEMENT LOAN AND APPLICATION: Bill to authorize the raising of money for the acquisition of land for the purposes of land settlement and to

sanction the issue and application for such purposes of the money so raised or of money in the State Loans Repayment Fund, and for other purposes—(Mr. Lind).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 31) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 14 Dec., 1943, p. 89; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 15 Dec., p. 90; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Dec., p. 91; the Council's agreement notified, 18 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4995.)

Land Tax: Bill to declare the rate of land tax for the year ending the 31st December, 1944—(Mr. Dunstan).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 2 Nov., 1943, p. 62; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 4 Nov., p. 65, debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Nov., p. 67; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Nov., p. 76. (Assented to 29 November, 1943. Act No. 4967.)

Local Government (Valuations): Bill intituled "An Act to make Provision with respect to Valuations of Rateable Properties during the Present War and the Period of Twelve Months thereafter"—(Mr. Martin).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 3 Nov., 1943, p. 64; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 9 Nov., p. 67. (Assented to 15 November, 1943. Act No. 4961.)

Lunacy: Bill to amend section 234 of the Lunacy Act 1928—(Mr. Bailey).—Initiated and read a first time, 20 July, 1943, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 20 July, p. 14; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 28 July, p. 19; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Sept., p. 29. (Assented to 6 September, 1943. Act No. 4948.)

MARKETING OF PRIMARY PRODUCTS: Bill to provide for the abolition of certain boards appointed under the provisions of the Marketing of Primary Products Acts—(Mr. Zwar).—Initiated and read a first time, 12 Oct., 1943, p. 46.—Bill lapsed.

Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works:
Bill to reconstitute and to extend the powers and duties of the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works and to consolidate and amend the law relating to the said Board—(Mr. Martin).—Initiated and read a first time, 4 Aug., 1943, p. 22.—Bill lapsed.

Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works (Contributions): Bill to amend the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works (Contributions) Act 1927—(Mr. Oldham).—Initiated and read a first time, 4 Nov., 1943, p. 65; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 9 Nov., p. 67; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 Nov., p. 72; the Council's agreement notified, 25 Nov., p. 77. (Assented to 29 November, 1943. Act No. 4971.)

MELBOURNE (WIDENING OF STREETS): Bill to amend sections 3, 4 and 7 of the Melbourne (Widening of Streets) Act 1940—(Mr. McDonald, Goulburn Valley).—Initiated and read a first time, 25 Aug., 1943, p. 26. motion, That this ill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 5 Oct, p. 41; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 20 Oct., p. 52; further considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 Nov., p. 73; the Council's agreemnt notified, 17 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4991.)

MENTAL HYGIENE (MODE OF CITATION): Bill to alter the mode of citation of the Lunacy Acts and to make certain consequential provisions—(Mr. Bailey).— Initiated and read a first time, 25 Aug., 1943, p. 26; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 Oct., p. 41; the Council's agreement notified, 3 Nov., p. 64; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 22) recommending an amendment in the Bill; amendment agreed to; His Excellency's Message transmitted to the Legislative Council and their concurrence requested, 16 Nov., p. 71; the Council's agreement to the amendment notified, 17 Nov., p. 72. (Assented to 22 November, 1943. Act No. 4963.)

MILK AND DAIRY SUPERVISION: Bill to make provision for the improvement of the milk supply to the metropolis and proclaimed urban districts, to amend the Milk and Dairy Supervision Act 1928 and for other purposes—(Mr. Hyland for Mr. Martin).—
—Initiated and read a first time, 4 Nov., 1943, p. 65; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 17 Nov., p. 72; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Dec., p. 83; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified; amendments considered and agreed to, 17 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4997.)

MILK PASTEURIZATION: Bill to provide for the pasteurization of milk—(Mr. Martin).—Initiated and read a first time, 21 July, 1943, p. 15; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 3 Aug., p. 21; debate resumed and adjourned, 25 Aug., p. 26: 6 Oct., p. 44; 12 Oct., p. 47; debate continued—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 13 Oct., p. 47; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to, 27-8 Oct., p. 59; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Nov., p. 63: the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified; amendments considered and agreed to, 25 Nov., p. 77. (Assented to 6 December, 1943. Act No. 4972.)

MINES (PETROLEUM): Bill relating to petroleum prospecting licences and petroleum mineral leases—(Mr. Huland).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 26) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 30 Nov., 1943, p. 80; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 1 Dec., p. 82; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence

of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Dec., p. 92; the Council's agreement notified, 17 Dec., p. 95. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4992.)

MINISTRY OF HEALTH: Bill relating to the Department of Health—(Mr. Macfarlan).—Initiated and read a first time, 6 Oct., 1943, p. 44; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 12 Oct., p. 47; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 3 Nov., p. 64; further considered in Committee, 10 Nov., p. 68; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Nov., p. 71; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified, 8 Dec., p. 86; amendments considered and agreed to, 14 Dec., p. 90. (Assented to 23 December, 1943. Act No. 4988.)

NATIONAL SECURITY (EMERGENCY POWERS) Continuation: Bill to continue the operation of the National Security (Emergency Powers) Act 1939—(Mr. Old).—Initiated and read a first time, 24 Aug., 1943, p. 26.—Bill lapsed.

NATIONAL SECURITY (EMERGENCY POWERS) CONTINUATION (BILL No. 2): Bill intituled "An Act to continue the Operation of the 'National Security (Emergency Powers) Act 1939'"—(Mr. Old).—Brought from the Legislative Council and passed without amendment, 1 Sept., 1943, pp. 29-30. (Assented to 6 September, 1943. Act No. 4949.)

His Excellency the Governor's Speech.—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had that day attended His Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, as follows:—
 - MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:
 - Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I have taken the earliest opportunity after the recent General Elections of calling you together for this the First Session of the 35th Parliament of Victoria in order that you may consider public business which requires your attention.

Several Members of this Parliament continue to serve their country in the Armed Forces. Lieutenant-Colonel W. S. Kent-Hughes and Lieutenant G. H. Lamb, who have now been reported as prisoners of war, have been returned unopposed to the Legislative Assembly.

Despite the recent improvement in the war situation, the position is still serious, and the united efforts of all our people are essential in order that we may make the greatest contribution possible towards final victory.

My Advisers do not intend to depart from their announced policy of concentrating their activities upon the furtherance of the national war effort, and they do not intend to outline an elaborate programme of ambitious projects which, in existing circumstances, no Government could hope to put into effect.

However, despite the limitations imposed by the war, my Advisers believe that it will be possible to submit to you a number of measures designed to meet the needs of the people and to further the development of the State.

The full co-operation which has been given to the Commonwealth Government on matters relating to the defence of Australia and of the Empire will be continued.

The State War Advisory Council appointed by the Government is rendering valuable service.

The State Emergency Committees are still functioning effectively.

The loyal co-operation of the 60,000 civil defence workers is greatly appreciated.

In addition to administering plans for the protection and safety of the civil population in the event of enemy attack, State departments and instrumentalities have undertaken much important defence work.

Transport has been provided for large-scale troop movements, and roads, aerodromes, factory earth-works, tank and gun ranges, and railway sidings have been constructed.

Water supply, sewerage, drainage and electricity schemes have been undertaken at military camps and aerodromes.

Valuable hospital accommodation has been made available for military requirements.

As a result of the facilities provided by the Government for technical education over 26,000 technicians have been fully trained in special work associated with the war.

The wisdom of the policy of my Advisers in opposing the restriction of primary production is emphasized by the present acute shortage of various agricultural products, and the consequent need for the rationing of food.

Although the primary producers are hampered by a scarcity of labour and a shortage of superphosphate and other essential materials, the Department of Agriculture is doing everything possible to organize production in this State and to increase the area under cultivation.

The justification of the action of the Government in testing the validity of the Commonwealth Government's uniform taxation legislation is now apparent.

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

A review of the revenue and expenditure for the current financial year reveals a satisfactory budgetary position.

A Supply Bill for the months of July and August, 1943, will be brought forward to-day.

Interim Supplementary Estimates of expenditure for the financial year 1942-1943 will be introduced.

The estimates of revenue and expenditure for the financial year 1943-1944 will be submitted to you as early as possible.

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

A Department of Decentralization and Post-War Reconstruction will be constituted.

In order to promote decentralization, liberal concessions in land, water, electricity, railways, and other charges will be given so as to enable country industries to operate in conditions not less favourable than those in the metropolis.

Legislation to be submitted will include a provision prohibiting the establishment of further industries in the metropolis without the approval of the appropriate Minister.

A measure to make provision for the compulsory acquisition of suitable areas of land for post-war settlement will be introduced.

A Bill will be brought forward to provide for preference in Government employment for all members of the fighting forces, with absolute preference to those who have served overseas or in combat areas.

Action will be taken to further develop the brown coal and briquetting industries of this State in order that as far as possible Victoria may be independent of outside supplies of fuel.

A Bill to constitute a Ministry of Health will be submitted.

Legislation will be introduced to deal with the pasteurization of milk.

A Bill to enlarge the functions of the Housing Commission will be submitted.

A Bill to create a Ministry of Transport will be brought forward.

Legislation relating to the reconstitution and functions of the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works will be introduced.

Among other measures to be presented for your consideration will be Bills relating to-

Water Rates.

Melbourne City Council.

Probate Duties.

Stamps.

Valuation of Land.

Local Government.

Sewerage Districts.

Forests.

Lands.

Country Roads.

Petrol Pumps.

Since I last addressed you the united efforts of the Empire and its Allies have met with successes on land, on sea, and in the air, and it is with profound gratitude that we acknowledge the recent victories on all fronts.

These have not been achieved without sacrifice and loss. To our fellow citizens who are bereaved and sorrowful I wish, on behalf of my Advisers and myself, to offer sincere sympathy. They will, I know, find comfort in the knowledge that the sacrifice of those for whom they mourn has not been in vain, but has been the means of bringing victory nearer to us.

I now leave you to your deliberations in the earnest hope that with the blessing of Divine Providence your work may advance the interests of the State.

- (4) A copy of such notification shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament within fourteen days after the publication thereof if Parliament is then sitting and if Parliament is not then sitting then within fourteen days after the next meeting of Parliament."
