### THURSDAY, 4TH AUGUST 1881.

1. Assembly met pursuant to Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the third day of August 1881—which Proclamation was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:—

#### SECOND SESSION OF ELEVENTH PARLIAMENT.

#### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Iroland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c.,

Whereas by The Constitution Act it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitations therein contained. such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly are called "The Parliament of Victoria": And whereas the present Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the fourth day of August instant: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation fix Thursday the fourth day of August instant, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at two of the clock in the afternoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Parliament place, Spring street, in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this third day of August, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, and in the forty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

Sir Bryan O'Loghlen then brought up a Bill intituled "A Bill to restrict the Influx of Chinese into Victoria," and moved, That it be now read a first time.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.—Bill read a first time, ordered to be printed, and read a second time Tuesday, 9th August instant.

6. GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had this day attended His Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council, when His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament (of which, to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy), which he read to the House, and is as follows :-

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The public necessities compel me to recur to your advice and assistance after a merely nominal recess.

Not alone have the claims of the public creditor to be at the present moment attended to with promptitude, but there are many measures of practical legislation of such pressing urgency that they

require to be considered and dealt with without any unnecessary delay.

Last year the expiring Land Act of 1865 having been temporarily renewed, general land legislation was postponed to the present time. An Amending Land Bill will be laid before you, mainly continuing the existing principles of the present system, but increasing the area of selection and easing the conditions on which title may be obtained by future selectors. The district known as the Mallee country will be dealt with under special provisions directed to securing by the creation of a leasehold tenure, combined with a freehold of six hundred and forty acres, the extirpation of the Rabbit Pest and the future settlement and improvement for grazing purposes of the Mallee district. The remaining Crown lands of the colony now held under pastoral licenses will still remain open for the purposes of selection. To temporarily utilize these lands, however, licenses of moderately sized blocks for grazing purposes, at a fixed rental, for suitable periods, but conferring no title against a selector, will be issued on an improved system of public competition.

The large investment made, during a series of years, by this colony in Public Works, especially in railway construction, is gradually beginning to yield an income approaching the interest payable on the capital invested, thus evincing the judicious nature of this outlay. To further carry out this policy, and to meet the pressing requirements of the districts yet unsupplied with railway accommodation, a Railway Construction Bill will be submitted to you.

Water for domestic and farming purposes is an absolute condition of successful settlement in various districts of the colony, and its supply in the summer season is a question of even more urgent necessity to selectors and miners than railway accommodation. Valuable reports have been from time to time furnished by experienced engineers, proposing a comparatively cheap and effective system of water supply. A measure dealing with this important subject, on the lines of these

reports, will be laid before you.

The yearly increase of expenditure necessitated by the extension of our system of public instruction and the alleged grievances of a portion of the population render desirable, in the opinion of my Advisers, a thorough enquiry into the whole administration, organization, and general condition of that system, with a view of ascertaining its deficiencies, improving its working, and, while retaining its efficiency, providing the most economic mode of further extending its operation. For the purpose of enquiry and to report for the information of Parliament on the evidence publicly taken, a Commission will be issued, composed, as far as possible, of gentlemen who have taken no decided public action on this question, but who by their integrity and personal standing command the respect of the community.

Many complaints have been from time to time urgently pressed against the continuance in the present Tariff of numerous items which neither yield any considerable revenue nor protect any native industry, while at the same time their inclusion hampers the operations of trade. view to giving relief in this matter, a Commission will be issued to enquire and report upon the Tariff, composed of leading men of different opinions, who have publicly agreed not to disturb the

existing protective system, but are anxious at the same time to facilitate trade.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The Estimates of 1881-2 will be forthwith laid before you. They have been framed with a due regard to economy and the requirements of the public service.

Provision will have to be made to meet the debentures falling due in future years, and my Advisers will submit to you a proposal for taking powers to issue, in substitution of such debentures, a new series of equal amount for an extended period at a lower rate of interest.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The available balance of the last Loan having been appropriated it will become necessary to raise a further Loan to meet the proposed extension of the National System of Railways, the necessary Water Supply Works, including the further outlay on the Yan Yean scheme, the erection of additional Schoolhouses, and the completion of our Public Buildings. In the event of the conversion of debentures proposed by my Advisers being successfully carried out, the additional interest on a new Loan can be covered by the reduction, within the next four years, of interest on the existing debentures. A Bill will be, therefore, laid before you to authorize a further Loan of a reasonable amount.

A Bill to amend the Harbor Trust Act will be submitted to you. This Bill has already passed through certain stages in the Assembly, and my Advisers propose to give their assistance in passing it through the remaining stages, with such amendments as may be deemed necessary.

A Bill for regulating Mining on Private Property will be submitted to you on the principle of giving facilities to the miner for the search of gold, while protecting private rights from unduc

infringement.

A measure to amend the Local Government Act will also be laid before you. My advisers propose to ask you to continue the endowment of municipalities heretofore authorized by that Act for a further time.

The Bill to restrict the influx of Chinese into Victoria, agreed to in the Intercolonial Con-

ference, will be submitted for your consideration.

The present basis on which the Land Tax is founded is admitted on all hands to be unequal and unsatisfactory. My advisers propose that, at the earliest opportunity, a Bill based on the taxation of the annual value of all landed property, with the exemption already established of Two thousand five hundred pounds, shall be submitted to you.

A Bill embodying important Law Reforms in matters of procedure, a Bill to Establish a School of Agriculture, a Bill to Preserve the Public Reserves of the Colony, as also Bills for Amending the Public Health Act, the Rabbit Suppression Act, Vines Diseases Eradication Act, the Married Women's Property Act, and the Diseases of Animals Act, will be laid before you.

I trust that your labors will, under the blessing of Divine Providence, conduce to the happiness and prosperity of the people of Victoria.

Concurring with His Excellency in the opinion that the available balance of the last Loan having been appropriated it will become necessary to raise a further Loan to meet the proposed extension of the National System of Railways, the necessary Water Supply Works, including the further outlay on the Yan Yean scheme, the erection of additional Schoolhouses, and the completion of our Public Buildings; and that in the event of the conversion of debentures proposed by his Advisers being successfully carried out, the additional interest on a new Loan can be covered by the reduction, within the next four years, of interest on the existing debentures; and thanking his Excellency for informing us that a Bill will be laid before us to authorize a further Loan of a reasonable amount.

Thanking His Excellency for informing us that a Bill to amend the Harbor Trust Act will be submitted to us. That this Bill has already passed through certain stages in the Assembly, and that his Advisers propose to give their assistance in passing it through the remaining stages, with such amendments as may be deemed necessary.

Thanking His Excellency for informing us that a Bill for regulating Mining on Private Property will be submitted to us on the principle of giving facilities to the miner for the search of

gold, while protecting private rights from undue infringement.

That a measure to amend the Local Government Act will also be laid before us, that his Advisers propose to ask us to continue the endowment of municipalities heretofore authorized by that Act for a further time.

And that the Bill to restrict the influx of Chinese into Victoria, agreed to in the Intercolonial

Conference, will be submitted for our consideration.

Concurring with His Excellency in the opinion that the present basis on which the Land Tax is founded is admitted on all hands to be unequal and unsatisfactory; and that his Advisers propose that, at the earliest opportunity, a Bill based on the taxation of the annual value of all landed property, with the exemption already established of Two thousand five hundred pounds, shall be submitted to us.

Thanking His Excellency for informing us that a Bill embodying important Law Reforms in matters of procedure, a Bill to Establish a School of Agriculture, a Bill to Preserve the Public Reserves of the Colony, as also Bills for Amending the Public Health Act, the Rabbit Suppression Act, Vines Diseases Eradication Act, the Married Women's Property Act, and the Diseases of Animals Act will be laid before us.

And expressing our trust that our labors will, under the blessing of Divine Providence, conduce to the happiness and prosperity of the people of Victoria.

Major W. C. Smith moved, That the debate be now adjourned.

Debate ensued.

Question—That the debate be now adjourned—put and negatived. Question—That this House do now resolve that a respectful Address be presented to His Excellency

the Governor, in the terms above proposed—put and resolved in the affirmative.

On the motion of Sir Bryan O'Loghlen, the Assembly ordered the said amendment to be amended by

adding thereto the words:—

"And, in the case of such exemption, no person shall mine under any such area until he shall have deposited with the Warden such reasonable sum as the Warden may assess as compensation to the holder of such residence area, and such sum, or any part thereof, shall be paid to such holder or otherwise dealt with as the Warden shall direct."

"Nothing in this section, or in section nineteen, shall affect the right of any person or company holding a claim under a miner's right, at the time of coming into operation of this Act, to mine under any residence area that may have heretofore been taken up as a residence area on the surface of such claim so held under a miner's right."

And the said amendment, as so amended, was agreed to by the Assembly.

And the amendment in clause 16 was read a second time and agreed to.

Sir Bryan O'Loghlen moved, That the following words be added to clause 6:—

"Provided that any person who has been in undisturbed occupation by himself or his agent of any residence area for twelve months prior to the coming into operation of this Act, shall be deemed to be a person entitled to occupy within the meaning of this section." Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. R. Clark moved, That the word "fifty" in the last line but two, in clause 16, be omitted, and the words "One hundred" be inserted instead thereof.

Debate ensued.

Motion, by leave, withdrawn.

Mr. Fisher moved, That the following words be inserted in clause 16, in last line but two, after the word "Area" viz., "permission having been first obtained from the occupier."

Question—That the words proposed to be inserted, be so inserted—put and negatived.

Mr. Speaker having reported that the Chairman of Committees had certified that the fair print of this Bill was in accordance with the Bill as reported, and that the Clerk of the Assembly had noted the amendments made on the consideration of Report-Bill, on the motion of Sir Bryan O'Loghlen, read a third time and passed.

"An Act to amend the Law relating to Residence Areas in Mining Districts."

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered—That the Bill be transmitted to the Legislative Council, and their concurrence desired therein.

12. LAND SETTLEMENT SYSTEM.—Mr. McColl moved, pursuant to notice—

(1.) That, in the opinion of this House, no land legislation will be satisfactory except such as shall secure a system of settlement providing for the occupation of that territory remaining in the hands of the Crown which is in the North-western plains, the Snowy plains, and mountain ranges of Gippsland, Cape Otway, and the Western district.

(2.) That such land shall be proclaimed as leasing areas, and opened as soon as possible for settlement at a yearly rental of One shilling per five acres, for a term of thirty-three years.

- (3.) That the minimum blocks shall consist of five acres, and the maximum blocks of 10,000 acres.
  (4.) That all easements and regulations now law, or that may become law, with regard to Crown lands, shall remain in full force on said leaseholds, allowing full ingress, egress, and regress for mining, irrigation, drainage, or traffic purposes.

(5.) That lessees shall be required to make bonâ fide improvements, to the attested value of Five

shillings per acre, within three years, under penalty of forfeiture of lease.

(6.) That no forest reserve in any district coming within the operation of the leasing land law shall exceed one-tenth of the area thereof.

(7.) That no area of water reserve, or reservoir, shall exceed one-tenth of the district it is intended to supply.

(8.) That all leases of said lands shall revert to the State three times in 100 years, with a period of four months' grace, rent free, to allow of a valuation and adjustment of rent; the occupant to have right of renewal of lease at increased rent, or half compensation for improvement after valuation.

(9.) That the water of all rivers, creeks, lakes, and watercourses, shall belong to the State, and may be leased for irrigation, traffic, and motive power purposes; such leases to revert to the State three times in 100 years.

(10.) That all metals and minerals in said lands shall remain the property of the Crown; and the right to mine the same shall be by separate and distinct leases, reverting to the State, as per 8th clause. Question—put and negatived.

D. No person shall drive or carry or kill any animal in any manner or in Cruel transport sition or in any circumstances which involves or involve cruelty.

Cruel transport or death forbldden. (7.)any position or in any circumstances which involves or involve cruelty.

E. No person who has the possession or the custody of any animal which is concaptive animal
to be cared
for. fined or otherwise unable to provide for itself shall omit to provide such animal so long as it remains so confined in his possession or custody with proper and sufficient food drink and shelter.

F. No person shall keep or use any place for the purpose of causing to fight Places for baiting animals or baiting or otherwise maltreating any animal or shall act in the management of any

forbidden.

- G. The following acts when done to any animal shall be deemed to involve Cruel acts. cruelty (that is to say)-
  - (a) Over-riding or over-driving or over-working; or
  - (b) Over-loading or driving when overloaded; or
  - (c) Riding or driving or employing or transporting any animal that is unfit for any such use; or
  - (d) Illtreating, or injuring, or tormenting, or torturing; or
  - (e) Doing in circumstances that amount to cruelty any of the following acts (that is to say) beating, wounding, mutilating, killing, or causing unnecessary pain;
  - (f) Causing or procuring to be done any of the acts aforesaid or permitting any such act to be done to any animal of which the offender has the custody or control:

Provided that the acts specified in this section shall be deemed to be mentioned by way of example only, and shall not be construed to restrict in any way the generality of any prohibition herein contained or to limit the same to cases resembling all or any of the cases specially mentioned.

H. If any person offend against any provision hereinbefore contained, he shall on offences. conviction before justices, be liable to a penalty for the first offence not exceeding Ten pounds, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding one month; and for the second offence to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding two months; and for the third and every subsequent offence to a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds, or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding six months.

Where any such offender is not the owner of the animal if by such offence he cause any damage to such animal or to any person or property, he shall in addition to such punishment make compensation to the owner of the animal or to the party damaged, and the justices by or before whom the offender is convicted shall determine the amount of compensation.

(12.)I. Every person shall be deemed to be guilty of any offence under this Act-Parties to offences.

(a) Who actually commits such offence; or
(b) Who aids or abets any person in the commission thereof; or

- (c) Who directly or indirectly counsels or procures any person to commit such offence; or
- (d) Who knowingly permits such offence to be committed in the case of any animal or any place under his control.
- J. Except as hereinafter provided nothing herein contained shall apply to any. Exceptions. act done in any of the following cases-

(a) In the extermination of rabbits foxes wild dogs or vermin; or

- (b) In the hunting snaring trapping shooting or taking of any animal not in a domestic state; or
- (c) In any experiment or vivisection performed upon any animal by any legally qualified medical or veterinary practitioner for the purposes of scientific investigation: Provided that the Governor in Council may from time to time make and alter regulations for the registrations of those practitioners who desire to perform such experiments or vivisection and for the humane conduct of their operations.

(14.)K. The exemption contained in the next preceding section shall not take effect— Limitations of exceptions.

(a) In any case of cruelty; or
(b) In any case of vivisection or other experiment wherein the following conditions are neglected (that is to say)-

The operation shall be performed in accordance with the regulations of the Governor in Council as aforesaid; and

(ii) The animal subject to the operation shall during the whole time thereof be so under the influence of some anæsthetic as to be insensible to pain; and

- (iii) Where the animal has in the course of the operation been so injured that its recovery would involve serious suffering, it shall be destroyed while still insensible.

- 2. Papers.—Mr. W. Madden presented, by command of His Excellency the Governor— Land Act 1869.—Regulations.

- 3. Melbourne Harbor Trust Act Amendment Bill.—Mr. Speaker announced that His Excellency the Governor had been pleased this day to approve of the Standing Order of this House adopted on the 23rd instant.
- 4. Message from His Excellency the Governor.—A Message from His Excellency the Governor by the Usher of the Legislative Council:—

Mr. Speaker-

The Governor desires the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Legislative Council.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went to the Legislative Council, when His Excellency the Governor was pleased to give the Royal Assent to the Public Bill following:—

- "An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending "on the last day of June One thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and to appropriate "the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament."
- 5. His Excellency's Speech.—After which His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament as followeth:—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentleman of the Legislative Council:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

It is with pleasure that I release you from the duties of the session, which it has been deemed advisable to close at the present juncture, with the view of returning to the more constitutional practice of commencing a new session at a convenient period before the beginning of the next financial year.

Short as the session has been, you have been enabled to give attention to many important measures. Some of those which you have passed promise to be of great advantage to the country

generally.

I regret that from the exigency arising from the shortness of time at your disposal the Land Laws amending Bill and the Bill for the Extension of Railways have had to be postponed; but I trust that next session you will be enabled to discuss and satisfactorily dispose of these two questions

of great practical importance.

The Victorian Water Conservation Act, to which you have given much time and attention, is intended to bring local energy and skill to bear on the pressing question of Water Supply. As little progress has yet been made in dealing with what is admitted to be a great national want, namely, the cheap yet efficient construction of waterworks in country districts, you have judiciously framed a system based on local co-operation, and have also provided for assistance by way of loan to encourage local exertion.

The Loan Act will enable the national system of Railways to be further extended, not only by an addition to the existing main lines, but also by the erection of light branch railways, should it be decided to adopt an economic plan of construction, based on the view of working such lines at a moderate rate of speed, and combined with the use of steel rails laid on the existing gauge, so as to provide strength to carry the ordinary rolling-stock and facilities for its free interchange amongst all lines.

Royal Commissions have been appointed to enquire into and report upon the Tariff and the Educational system respectively, and they have both commenced their enquiries systematically. The Royal Commission on the Police Force has sent in a progress report, accompanied by a mass of evidence that testifies to the assiduity with which they have pursued their labors.

The Chinese Immigrants Amendment Act is intended to carry out, in union with the neighbouring colonies the course of action agreed on in reference to this subject at the late Inter-

colonial Conference.

The Residence Areas Act is to provide for miners a more secure legal title to their holdings, as far as that object could be attained consistently with the general interests of the mining community.

The Act to regulate the Importation of Tea is a step in anticipation of a more general Act providing against the adulteration of food, and will confer a benefit on a large class of consumers.

You have practically amended many important Acts, including the Legislative Council Reform, Trading Companies, Rabbit Suppression, Regulation of Mines, and the Phylloxera Vine Disease Acts.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I thank you on the behalf of the Queen for the liberality of your grants towards carrying on the public services and in aid of the further development of the resources of Victoria.

I am happy to inform you that the finances of the country are in a most satisfactory condition. The increase of revenue has enabled my Advisers, while keeping the expenditure well within the income of the country, to pay off a considerable portion of the arrears that accumulated during less prosperous times.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

During the recess my Advisers will mature the various Bills which from time to time they have undertaken to lay before you. These and the important Bills which have been postponed from this session will invite your early attention next year.

In relieving you from your duties you must be gratified to be assured that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, all the great producing interests of this country continue to enjoy a more

than usual degree of prosperity.

I now, in Her Majesty's name, declare this Parliament to be prorogued to Tuesday, the twenty-eighth day of February next, and it is prorogued accordingly.

#### No. 3. Sludge Draining Bill.—New clause A.

A. On the application of any Waterworks Trust or Commission under any Act now or hereafter to be passed, or of any "local governing body" within the meaning of "The Local Governing Bodies Loan Act" "1872," it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council by order, from time to time on the recommendation of the Minister for Water Supply for the time being, to prohibit the discharge of any sludge caused or obtained by reason of mining operations into any watercourses or reservoirs which may be required for domestic water supply or into any channels flowing into any such specified watercourses or "reservoirs."

From and after the publication of any such Order in the Government Gazette every person or company who shall cause or permit the discharge of any sludge into any watercourse, reservoir, or channel specified in such Order, shall be liable to a penalty of Five pounds for every day during which such person or company shall cause or permit such discharge contrary to the provisions of such prohibition.—(Sir Bryan O'Loghlen.)
