

ADMINISTRATION AND PROBATE DUTIES: Bill to continue the operation of Part III. of the Finance Act 1930— (Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 4 Oct., 1949, p. 80; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 Oct., p. 81; the Council's agreement notified, 11 Oct., p. 85. (Assented to 11 October, 1949. Act No. 5402.)

ADMINISTRATION AND PROBATE (ESTATES): Bill to amend Part VI. of the Administration and Probate Act 1928, and for other purposes.—(Mr. Oldham).
—Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1949, p. 23; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 4 May, p. 27.—Bill lapsed.

AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION: Bill to consolidate and amend the law relating to agricultural education—(Lieut.-Col. Dennett).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 4) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 29 Mar., 1949, pp. 8-9; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 4 May, p. 26; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 May, p. 37; the Council's agreement notified, 18 May, p. 39. (Assented to 31 May, 1949. Act No. 5372.)

APPROPRIATION: Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the 30th day of June, 1950, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this session of Parliament—(Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 11 Nov., 1949, p. 116; the Council's agreement notified, 24 Nov., p. 131. (Assented to 6 December, 1949. Act No. 5440.)

Barwon River Improvement (Amendment): Bill to amend the Barwon River Improvement Act 1939, and for other purposes—(Mr. Bolte).—Initiated and read a first time, 25 Oct., 1949, p. 95; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Oct., p. 96; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 4 Nov., p. 106; the Council's agreement notified, 10 Nov., p. 113. (Assented to 22 November, 1949. Act No. 5424.)

Brown Coal Gasification Loan and Application:
Bill to authorize the raising of money for the purchase and erection of brown coal gasification plant and to sanction the issue and application for such purposes of the money so raised or of money in the State Loans Repayment Fund, and for other purposes—(Mr. Hollway).—Message from His

Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 31) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 13 Sept., 1949, p. 66; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 14 Sept., p. 68; debate resumed and amendment proposed, That all the words after "That" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof the words "in the opinion of this House, it is desirable that further information on the proposals contained in the Bill should be in possession of honorable Members, and that an all-party committee should be appointed to submit a report as early as practicable"; after debate—amendment, by leave, withdrawn; debate adjourned, 4 Oct., p. 79.—Bill lapsed.

third reading read and discharged; Bill recommitted; reconsidered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 23 Nov., p. 130; the Council's agreement to the Bill with an amendment notified; amendment considered and agreed to, 25 Nov., p. 134. (Assented to 6 December, 1949. Act No. 5449.)

(Assented to 6 December, 1949. Act No. 5436.)

COAL (OVERSEAS PURCHASE) AMENDMENT: Bill to amend the Coal (Overseas Purchase) Loan and Application Act 1948—(Colonel Kent Hughes).— Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 30) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported, 6 Sept., 1949, p. 58; motion made, That the resolution be read a second time-agreed to, on division; motion, That the resolution be agreed to by the House—agreed to, on division; Bill initiated and read a first time; motion made, That this Bill be now read a second time; amendment proposed, That all the words after "That" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof "this Bill be withdrawn with the view of the Government presenting a more equitable plan for the payment of the difference between the price of Australian and imported coal"; amendment negatived, on division; Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported without amendment; Bill read the third time, on division; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 7 Sept., pp. 63-4; the Council's agreement notified, 5 Oct., p. 82. (Assented to 7 June, 1949. Act No. 5379.)

CROYDON FRUIT COOL STORES: Bill relating to the Croydon fruit cool stores—(Lieut.-Col. Dennett).— Initiated and read a first time, 17 Nov., 1949, p. 120; order for second reading read; Bill ruled a Private Bill; motion, by leave, That all the Private Bill Standing Orders be dispensed with and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill, agreed to; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 22 Nov., p. 127; Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, as Deputy for the Governor (No. 53) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee;

resolution reported and agreed to, 23 Nov., p. 129; debate on second reading resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 23 Nov., p. 131; the Council's agreement notified, 24 Nov., p. 132. (Assented to 6 December, 1949. Act No. 5441.)

FOOTWEAR REGULATION (AMENDMENT): Bill intituled "An Act to amend the 'Footwear Regulation Act 1928'"—(Mr. Oldham).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 4 Oct., 1949, p. 80; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 5 Oct., p. 81; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 27 Oct., p. 99; further considered in Committee and reported without amendment; Bill read a third time, 23 Nov., p. 130. (Assented to 6 December, 1949. Act No. 5439.)

FORESTRY PULP AND PAPER COMPANY'S AFFORESTATION CONTRACTS: Bill to make provision for facilitating the realization of certain forestry lands and plantations and the produce thereof and for matters incidental thereto, and for other purposes—(Mr. Oldham).—Initiated and read a first time, 30 Mar., 1949, p. 11; order for second reading read; Bill ruled a Private Bill; motion, by leave, That all the Private Bill Standing Orders be dispensed with, and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill, agreed to; Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 Mar., p. 12; the Council's agreement notified, 11 May, p. 32; Message from the Deputy for His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 16) recommending an amendment in the Bill; amendment agreed to; Message of the Deputy for His Excellency transmitted to the Legislative Council and their concurrence requested, 17 May, p. 37; the Council's agreement to the amendment notified, 18 May, p. 38. (Assented to 7 June, 1949. Act No. 5373.)

(Assented to 25 October, 1949. Act No. 5407.)

GEELONG WATERWORKS AND SEWERAGE: Bill to reconstitute the Geelong Waterworks and Sewerage Trust and to amend the Geelong Waterworks and Sewerage Acts, and for other purposes—(Mr. Bolte).— Initiated and read a first time, 26 Oct., 1949, p. 97: motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 Nov., p. 103; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 8 Nov., p. 109; the Council's agreement to the Bill with

amendments notified, 10 Nov., p. 113; amendments considered and agreed to, 16 Nov., p. 119. (Assented to 28 November, 1949. Act No. 5427.)

GOVERNOR'S SALARY: Bill to amend section 10 of The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1928—(Mr. Hollway).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 6) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 29 Mar., 1949, p. 9; read a second time with the concurrence of an absolute majority of the whole number of the Members of the Legislative Assembly and committed; considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time with the concurrence of an absolute majority of the whole number of the Members of the Legislative Assembly; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 Mar., p. 11; the Council's agreement notified, 12 April, p. 17. Reserved for the signification of His Majesty's pleasure thereon, 26 April, p. 21. (Royal assent given, 30 June, 1949. Act No. 5380.)

GRETA LANDS EXCHANGE: Bill to provide for the revocation of the reservation of certain land in the parish of Greta temporarily reserved as a site for public recreation and for the exchange thereof for certain other land in the said parish to be reserved as a site for public recreation—(Mr. Guthrie).— Initiated and read a first time, 13 Sept., 1949, p. 65; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 14 Sept., p. 69; the Council's agreement notified, 27 Sept., p. 75. (Assented to 11 October, 1949. Act No. 5393.)

HEALTH (CATTLE): Bill intituled "An Act to amend Section Nineteen of the 'Health Act 1935'"—(Mr. Oldham).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 3 Nov., 1949, p. 106; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 8 Nov., p. 109; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments, 16-17 Nov., p. 119; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council with the Assembly's amendments desired, on division, 17 Nov., p. 120; the Council's agreement to the Assembly's amendments notified, 23 Nov., p. 130. (Assented to 6 December, 1949. Act No. 5437.)

Health (Tuberculosis Arrangement): Bill to ratify and approve an arrangement with the Commonwealth of Australia with respect to tuberculosis, to provide for the appointment of a Director of Tuberculosis, and for other purposes—(Mr. Oldham).

—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Oct., 1949, p. 95; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 44) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 2 Nov., pp. 102-3; debate on second reading resumed—Bill read a

second time and committed; considered in Committee; 8 Nov., p. 110; further considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Nov., p. 112; the Council's agreement notified, 23 Nov., p. 128. (Assented to 6 December, 1949. Act No. 5432.)

HORSHAM LAND: Bill to provide for an enlargement of the purposes of the reservation of certain land at Horsham now reserved as a site for a race-course and other purposes of public recreation—(Mr. Guthrie).—Initiated and read a first time, 30 Mar., 1949, p. 11; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 5 April, p. 13; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 13 April, p. 18; the Council's agreement notified, 27 April, p. 23. (Assented to 10 May, 1949. Act No. 5364.)

IMPORTED MATERIALS LOAN AND APPLICATION: Bill to authorize the raising of money towards the cost of certain materials imported from outside Victoria and to sanction the issue and application for such purposes of the money so raised or of money in the State Loans Repayment Fund, and for other purposes—(Mr. Hollway).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor (No. 13) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee and resolution reported, 17 May, 1949, p. 36; resolution considered, and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 18 May, p. 39; debate resumed-Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 2 Aug., p. 46; further considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 3 Aug., p. 47; amendments in the Bill suggested by the Council on the consideration of the Bill in Committee, 31 Aug., p. 56; suggested amendments considered, 13 Sept., p. 66; suggested amendments further considered and made, 14 Sept., p. 68; the Council's agreement to the Bill (including the amendments made by the Assembly which were suggested by the Council) notified, 20 Sept., p. 72. - 8. HIS EXCELLENCY THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.-Mr. Speaker reported that the House had that day attended His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, as follows:-
 - MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:
 - Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

My Advisers received with deep regret the announcement that His Majesty the King had been forced to postpone his visit to Australia because of ill-health.

They earnestly hope that His Majesty's health will continue to improve and that, with Her Majesty the Queen and Her Royal Highness the Princess Margaret, he will be able to visit our country in the near future.

His Excellency the Governor, Lord Dugan, and Lady Dugan, after ten years of valuable service to this State, left for England in February.

The appointment of Lord Dugan's successor is now under consideration.

The object of this early Session is to enable my Ministers to submit urgent legislation to promote the development of the State.

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

A Supply Bill for the initial months of the next financial year will be introduced.

Although the Commonwealth Government increased the tax reimbursement grants payable to the States in 1948-49, the increased grant received by Victoria was insufficient to meet needs.

At the Premiers' Conference at Canberra in August last, the Prime Minister intimated that the Victorian Government should raise railway charges to bridge the gap between revenue and operating costs. The necessary action has, however, been deferred until June pending the completion of the present investigation into both country and metropolitan transport systems.

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

An important feature of the Government's rural policy will be the establishment of a Rural Finance Corporation, designed to afford additional and more effective credit facilities for protecting, encouraging and developing country industries, both primary and secondary. With agencies throughout the country the Corporation will be responsible for the administration of all rural finance provided by the State.

My Ministers are fully aware of the importance of conserving and making full use of our natural water resources.

Tenders have been called for the construction of the first 8 miles of the duplicate water channel from Goulburn Weir to Waranga Basin.

Approval has been given for the construction of reservoirs at Tullaroop Creek and at Cobbledick's Ford.

Legislation will be introduced to ratify the Agreement between the Governments of the Commonwealth and the States of New South Wales, South Australia and Victoria for greatly increasing the capacity of the Hume Reservoir.

A recent conference of Commonwealth, New South Wales and Victorian Ministers adopted a revised scheme for the diversion inland of portion of the waters of the Snowy River. Under the scheme more water will be available for irrigation and the output of electrical power will be greatly increased. My Advisers insisted that the interests of all settlers on the lower reaches of the Snowy River, and particularly on the Orbost flats, should be properly safeguarded.

The Government intends to amend, and to proclaim at an early date, the Soil Conservation and Land Utilization Act of 1947 so that effective measures may be put in hand to protect vital water catchments, and promote soil conservation throughout the State.

My Advisors will continue to implement a progressive policy for the conservation and development of the forest resources of the State.

In pursuance of its policy of decentralization, the Government is fostering the concentration in selected country centres of sawmilling and other forest industries.

By improving existing facilities and providing greater reserves of modern equipment my Ministers are endeavouring to ensure that the forests of the State are adequately protected against fire.

Developmental and decentralization plans for Victoria are being closely related to increasing Immigration activities.

The development of the brown coal resources of the State is one of the most urgent problems facing my Ministers.

The State Electricity Commission is expediting the establishment of a new open-cut and briquette factories at Morwell. The stripping of overburden from the first section of the open-cut will commence shortly.

To hasten the progress of this great project engineers of the Commission have been sent to England and Europe to negotiate the purchase of plant.

A Bill will be introduced under which the Government will provide the sum of £1,000,000 for the purpose of assisting in the development of the Latrobe Valley in respect of certain matters for which expenditure is not directly chargeable against any particular authority.

The rapidly increasing demand for electricity threatens to overload the Commission's generating system. Major works designed to cope with the increased load include the extension of the Kiewa Hydro-Electric Project, the installation of additional turbo-generators at Newport and the enlargement of Yallourn Generating Station.

In addition Victoria will share with New South Wales the output of electricity from stations to be established in connection with the Hume Reservoir and Snowy River projects.

The inability of New South Wales to meet the full requirements of Victoria in black coal for 1949 was foreseen. The Government purchased 220,000 tons of coal from the United Kingdom and India. Without this imported coal the Victorian Railways would not have been able to carry the record wheat harvest.

The rehabilitation and modernization of the railway system is proceeding as rapidly as supplies of material and labour permit. Particular attention is being given to improvements in passenger rolling stock to provide greater comfort and convenience for railway travellers. Modern diesel rail cars are being imported from England.

To promote the development of Gippsland East an aerial survey of the proposed railway extension from Bombala to Orbost, together with a soil survey of the area, is being undertaken.

The Parliamentary Public Works Committee has been asked to report on proposals for the electrification of the Gippsland line and the Melbourne-Geelong line.

My Advisers appreciate the co-operation of the Right Honorable A. J. Barnes, Minister of Transport in the British Government, in granting leave to Mr. J. Elliot, Chief Executive Officer, Southern Region of the British Railways, to enable him to examine and report upon the Victorian railway system in particular and transport in general.

A Bill will be brought forward to co-ordinate the work of the various transport authorities.

Legislation will be introduced to authorize the raising of £5,000,000 for works of construction and reconstruction of State highways, tourists' roads and forest roads. As a result, additional moneys will be available from the Country Roads Board Fund and the Federal grant, for the maintenance of main roads, and for works on unclassified roads carried out by Municipalities. This is one of the practical steps to be taken by the Government to relieve country municipalities of some of their pressing financial difficulties.

The Government will vigorously promote agricultural education and research work, and measures dealing with these matters will be submitted. It is intended to establish two dairying colleges, one in the Western District and one in Gippsland, and to develop these into major research centres.

An Animal Husbandry Research Institute is to be established at the State Research Farm, Werribee.

Steady progress in Soldier Settlement has been made notwithstanding the difficulties associated with labour and materials in country centres.

Since November, 1947, 1,073 ex-servicemen have been settled under the Victorian Soldier Settlement Acts. Of this number 543 were allotted farms and a further 530 were advanced approximately £2,000,000 to enable them to buy farms. In addition, £460,000 has been advanced under the Commonwealth Re-establishment and Employment Act 1945 to assist eligible ex-servicemen to finance the purchase of farms, stock, plant and equipment.

During the period under review 63 properties aggregating 200,000 acres were purchased for Soldier Settlement at a cost of £2,000,000.

A Bill to amend the Vermin and Noxious Weeds Act will be brought before you

During the past year, my Advisers have obtained increased deliveries to this State of housing materials such as galvanized iron and timber, and the output of many locally produced materials has been increased.

During 1948 the Housing Commission built 2,361 houses, an increase of 432 on the previous year. It is expected that 3,000 houses will be completed by the Commission this year, and 11,000 by private builders.

To assist in alleviating the distressing shortage of houses and hospitals, legislation will be submitted making available the sum of £2,000,000 to meet the difference in the cost between imported and local building materials.

In furtherance of the general decentralization policy of the Government, the percentage of houses to be erected in country districts is being increased.

Since the development of the State is largely dependent upon housing and decentralization, the portfolios of the Minister of Housing and the Minister of State Development have been allotted to one Minister.

It is further proposed to co-ordinate under this Minister activities in relation to Housing, the State Development Committee, the Decentralization Committee, Regional Committees, and the Central Planning Authority.

An important feature of the decentralization proposals of the Government is the development of the Port of Portland. Major harbor works are now being planned and legislation will be introduced to provide for the establishment of a Harbor Trust to control and manage the Port.

The Government will provide increasing educational facilities, particularly in country districts.

The school leaving age will be raised to fifteen years as soon as teachers and buildings can be provided. This will involve widening the courses of study in high schools and technical schools, establishing multi-purpose high schools in small country centres, providing junior secondary schools of a new type and continuing the process of consolidation of rural schools.

A determined effort is being made to overtake the war-time and post-war lag in providing buildings and teachers' residences. The system of training teachers is being completely overhauled, and gradual decentralization of educational administration is being effected by giving increasing powers to District Inspectors, Head Masters, and School Committees and Councils.

Important reforms have been suggested by the Chief Justice's Law Reform Committee. It is proposed to implement these suggestions by legislation to amend the Trustee Act, the Crimes Act, the Transfer of Land Act, the Wrongs Act, and the law relating to the Limitation of Actions.

The transfer of the administration of prices and rent control from the Commonwealth to the State was smoothly effected. Full co-operation with other States is being maintained, although the withdrawal by the Commonwealth of subsidies has created many difficulties.

Major problems concerning the relaxation of controls are receiving the earnest consideration of my Ministers and important announcements will be made shortly.

Since the coming into operation in May, 1947, of the Free Library Service Board Act the number of municipal libraries of a standard qualifying them for subsidy has doubled. The Government is encouraging the establishment of a complete library service covering the whole State

Legislation will be submitted for the registation of Mothercraft Nurses, and Bills to amend the Medical Act and the Nurses Act will be introduced.

The recently appointed Hospitals and Charities Commission is considering comprehensive plans for the construction and improvement of Hospitals and Institutions. These plans will proceed as soon as materials become available.

Legislation will be introduced to set aside 10 acres of land at Royal Park upon which a modern Children's Hospital will be constructed.

Advanced measures for combating tuberculosis to be undertaken by the Government in co-operation with the Commonwealth include the erection of a 400-bed Hospital at Watsonia, increased X-Ray examination and home visitation.

The Bill to provide for the constitution of a Mental Hygiene Authority, which was before Parliament last Session, will be re-submitted with modifications.

Legislation will be introduced to authorize an agreement with the Commonwealth under which mental patients and their relatives will be relieved of the obligation to pay maintenance fees.

The erection of a large treatment block at Mont Park Mental Hospital is to be commenced at an early date.

The Government has arranged to purchase from the Commonwealth the property known as Attwood Camp, near Broadmeadows, where it is proposed to re-establish the police remount depot and develop a police training centre.

Consideration is being given to the establishment of a system of probation for first offenders based on the system in operation in England.

It is proposed to amend the Indeterminate Sentences provisions of the Crimes Act to permit separate treatment of young delinquents likely to benefit from reformatory training. A property suitable for development as a training centre for certain trades and rural occupations has been purchased. The training will follow the pattern of the English Borstal system.

Provision will also be made for separate treatment for habitual criminals.

Plans have been prepared for modernization of the female division at Pentridge.

The whole of the industrial legislation of the State is now under review. When this review is completed consideration will be given to the amendment and consolidation of the Factories and Shops Acts.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Constitution Act it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," stand prorogued until Wednesday, the twenty-sixth day of April, 1950: And whereas it is expedient to dissolve the Legislative Assembly: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, in exercise of the power in me vested in this behalf, do by this my Proclamation discharge the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council from their meeting and attendance on Wednesday, the twenty-sixth day of April, 1950: And I do dissolve the Legislative Assembly, such dissolution to take effect on Thursday, the thirteenth day of April, 1950: And I do hereby declare that I have this day given Order that Writs be issued in due form, and according to law, for the election of Members to be duly returned to serve in the Legislative Assembly.

Section twenty-three of the Principal Act as amended by any Act is hereby amended as follows:

- () in sub-section (1) after the words "intoxicating liquor" there shall be inserted the words "or of any drug".
- (a) In sub-section (2)—
 - () after the words "intoxicating liquor" there shall be inserted the words "or of any drug";
 - (i) after the words "shall be cancelled" there shall be inserted the words "by the court under section eight of this Act"; and
 - (ii) after the words "petty sessions" there shall be inserted the words "but no such last-mentioned order shall be made to take effect before the expiration of a period of twelve months from the date of conviction"; and
- (b) After sub-section (2) there shall be inserted the following sub-sections: --
 - "(3) Every person in charge of a motor car on a highway who is apparently under the influence of intoxicating liquor or of any drug may be apprehended without warrant by any member of the police force and charged with an offence against this Act and such motor car may be driven or conveyed to and detained at any police station pending the hearing of the charge against such person.
 - (4) Every person proved to have been under the influence of intoxicating liquor or of any drug while in charge of a motor car shall be guilty of an offence and liable for a first offence to a penalty of not more than Twenty-five pounds and for a second or any subsequent offence to a penalty of not less than Twenty-five pounds and not more than Fifty pounds or to imprisonment for a term of not less than seven days and not more than one month, and, without limiting the generality of section eight of this Act, upon any conviction for any second or subsequent offence under this sub-section the court shall under the said section eight, either cancel the offender's licence or suspend the offender's licence for such term as the court thinks fit.
 - (5) For the purposes of the last two preceding sub-sections a person shall not be deemed to be in charge of a motor car unless he is attempting to start or drive the motor car or unless there are reasonable grounds for the belief that he intends to start or drive the motor car.
 - (6) In this section 'drug' means any narcotic or dangerous drug within the meaning of the Sixth Schedule to the Poisons Act 1928 as amended from time to time".

- (2) Any such acquisition shall be upon such terms and conditions as are agreed upon by the acquiring corporation and the company, or as are determined by arbitration.
- (3) In default of such agreement the Treasurer of Victoria shall direct that the matter be referred to arbitration before a single arbitrator who shall be a judge of the Supreme Court of the State of Victoria nominated by the Treasurer.

- (5) After the award has been made by the arbitrator the Governor in Council may by Order published in the Government Gazette specify the day (being a day twelve months after the day on which the notice of intention aforesaid was given or such later day as to the Governor in Council seems proper) on which the compensation awarded by the arbitrator for the acquisition of the company's undertaking is to be paid to the company and upon payment or tender of the compensation on that day the undertaking of the company shall, by virtue of this Act, vest in the acquiring corporation."

 - (b) at the end of the sub-section there shall be inserted the words "but notwithstanding anything in this Part or in any Act relating to local government the minimum amount payable under any such general rate made upon any person in respect of any rateable property shall be Ten shillings".
- (2) In sub-section (2) of section two hundred and seventy-one of the Principal Act for the words "Three shillings" there shall be substituted the words "Four shillings".
- (3) In paragraph (b) of section three hundred and thirty-one for the words "Two shillings and sixpence" there shall be substituted the words "Ten shillings".
