#### TUESDAY, 8TH JULY 1879.

1. Assembly met pursuant to Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the twentieth day of June 1879-which Proclamation was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:-

#### THIRD SESSION OF NINTH PARLIAMENT.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Most Honorable George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, Earl of Mulgrave, Viscount Normanby, and Baron Mulgrave of Mulgrave, all in the County of York, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom; and Baron Mulgrave of New Ross, in the County of Wexford, in the Peerage of Ireland; a Member of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria and its Dependencies, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by The Constitution Act it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria, and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," stand prorogued until Tuesday the twenty-fourth day of June instant, and it is expedient further to prorogue the same and to fix the time for holding the next Session thereof: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Tuesday the twenty-fourth day of June instant until Tuesday the eighth day of July next ensuing; and also I do hereby fix Tuesday the aforesaid eighth day of July as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at Two o'clock in the afternoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Parliament place, Spring street, in the City of Melbourne; and the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twentieth day of June, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy-nine, and in the fortythird year of Her Majesty's reign.

#### GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

2. Message by the Usher of the Legislative Council-MR. SPEAKER,

> His Excellency the Governor desires the immediate attendance of the Legislative Assembly in the Chamber of the Legislative Council.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House went to attend His Excellency, and being returned—3. Issue of Writs.—Mr. Speaker announced that since the prorogation he had issued Writs for the election of Members to serve for the following Electoral Districts, viz.:-

For the Electoral District of West Bourke, in the place of the Hon. J. T. Smith, deceased; For the Electoral District of Footscray, in the place of Mark Last King, Esq., deceased;

For the Electoral District of Fitzroy, in the place of R. Macgregor, Esq.

For the Electoral District of East Melbourne, in the place of E. L. Zox, Esq.

4. RETURN TO WRITS.—Mr. Speaker reported that he had received a Return to the Writ he had issued for the election of a Member to serve for the Electoral District of West Bourke by which it appeared that Alfred Deakin had been duly elected in pursuance thereof, and that appended to the said Writ was a statement in the words following, that is to say—

"I annex to my return to the writ for the election of a member to serve in the Legislative

Assembly for the electoral district of West Bourke the following statement of facts:-

Upon the receipt of the writ I initialled a number of ballot-papers equal to the number of electors throughout the entire electoral district, and my substitute appointed under section 81 distri-

buted the ballot-papers so initialled to the deputy returning officers of the several polling-places in such proportions as had been accustomed, such proportions having been regulated by the apparent proportion of electors of the division residing in the neighbourhood of the particular polling-place, and from the numbers who had polled at such polling-places at the previous election.

At Newham the poll was opened at the proper hour and the polling continued without any difficulty until 3.30 p.m., when it was found that the ballot-papers were exhausted and several

electors claimed to vote.

The Deputy Returning-officer, having no means of supplying additional ballot-papers, adjourned the completion of the poll to the 22nd inst., and gave verbal notice at the polling-place that the poll was adjourned to that day. He also sent a telegram to the Returning-officer in the following terms:-

"Railway Station, Woodend, 18 | 2, 1879.

"Telegram for - Buchan, Esq., Substitute Returning-officer, Queen street.

"Ballot-papers exhausted. Voters still coming to poll. Adjourned to 22nd inst. Waiting instructions what to do with ballot-box, papers, &c. Reply by wire.

"JOHN SAVAGE,

Deputy Returning-officer, Newham booth, West Bourke election."

Upon receipt of this telegram I addressed the following letter to the Acting Chief Secretary:

"37 Queen street, Melbourne, 19 Feb., 1879. "SIR,-In accordance with the 55th clause of instructions to returning officers, I have the honour, in connexion with the polling for the West Bourke election on the 18th inst., to report that at Newham, one of the polling-places of the Lancefield division for the district of West Bourke, the Deputy Returning-officer, by some omission, was not supplied with sufficient ballot-papers, and that, consequently, some electors were unable to vote thereat. The deputy returning-officer adjourned the polling until the 22nd inst.

"I beg to suggest that, in order to cure any defect, the Governor in Council may under the 131st section of the Electoral Act, 'where any accidental or unavoidable impediment, misfeasance, or omission shall have happened, the Governor in Council may take such measures as may be necessary for removing such impediment or rectifying such misfeasance or omission, appoint Saturday the 22nd inst., between the hours of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon, as a time for finishing taking the poll at Newham, and publish the same in the Government Gazette of Friday.

And received the following reply from the Under-Secretary:—

"Chief Secretary's Office, Melbourne, 20 February, 1879.

"Sir,—I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of yesterday's date, suggesting action by the Governor in Council in respect to the poll taken at Newham on Tuesday, the 18th inst.

"The Acting Chief Secretary is of opinion that any such action now would be premature; moreover he sees grave objections to the course suggested.

"The responsibility at the present stage rests entirely with the Returning-officer, who ought

to follow strictly the requirements of the statute.

"In the opinion of the Acting Chief Secretary it is your duty to make your return in due course to the honourable the Speaker, disregarding the action of your deputy.

The votes at all the polling-places, save Newham, having been counted at the close of the poll at the several places on the 18th, it was ascertained that Mr. Deakin had a majority on such votes over the other candidate, Mr. Harper, and Mr. Deakin handed the following letter to the Returning-officer :-

"29 Temple-court, 20 2, 79. "SIR,—My attention has been called to a statement that Mr. Deputy Returning-officer John Savage, acting at the Newham booth for the Lancefield Division of the West Bourke Electoral District, at the election on Tuesday, the 18th inst., took upon himself to exceed his legal functions, and without any riot or other legal cause, to adjourn the polling to Saturday, the 22nd inst. I wish to point out to you the illegality of this proceeding, and to protest in the strongest terms against such adjournment as being totally ultra vires. Being a candidate at such election, I now call upon you to declare the poll as taken upon the 18th inst., the day fixed by the writ dated the 5th inst., and will hold you personally responsible if you proceed to countenance this illegal act of your deputy, Mr. Savage; and I would further caution you against your counting in your return to the Speaker any votes tendered on the day to which Mr. Savage has illegally adjourned the Newham poll, as such votes are necessarily void and useless.

My substitute, Mr. Buchan, then, by my authority, wrote to the Deputy Returning-officer the following letter :-

"37 Queen street, Melbourne, 20 February, 1879.

"Sir,-I have the honour, by direction of the Returning-officer for West Bourke, with reference to the present election, to inform you that no further polling can take place at Newham, and therefore you will be good enough, with the least possible delay, to have the ballot-box containing the votes taken at your polling-place on the 18th inst. opened within the building used as such polling-place, in the presence of your poll-clerk, and, if possible, the scrutineers. It will be necessary to name a convenient time (say not later than Ten o'clock on Saturday), and acquaint the scrutineers of the

"When the result has been ascertained, please make the usual return, and forward on to the Returning-officer, together with the other papers, precisely the same as if the polling had gone on without any interruption whatever on Tuesday last.

"Be good enough to more votes taken.

On Saturday, the 22nd, at 3.30 p.m., I was served with the following notice:-

"I, the undersigned Robert Harper, of Melbourne, in the colony of Victoria, merchant, being a candidate for election as a member of the Legislative Assembly for the electoral district of West Bourke, hereby give you notice that the polling for the said election has not been completed, and that unless a further day be appointed for taking the poll at Newham in connexion with such election, prior to the return day named in the writ for such election, you are required to endorse the fact of the polling not having been completed upon such writ.

I then addressed the following letter to the Acting Chief Secretary:-

"Sir,-Since the receipt of the Under-Secretary's letter of the 20th inst., in respect to the poll taken at Newham on the 18th inst., I have this afternoon been served by the agent of Mr. Harper, one of the candidates at the West Bourke election, with a notice of which the following is

'I have thought it right to acquaint you with this, in order that, if the Governor in Council be so advised, he may appoint a further day for taking the poll at Newham, before the return of the writ on the 26th inst., with a view, under the provisions of section 131 of the Electoral Act, to remedy the omission to supply the Deputy Returning-officer at Newham with a sufficient number of ballot-papers. I should mention, also, that I have received a letter from Mr. Deakin, the other candidate, a copy of which I attach.

To which I received the following reply:-

"23rd February, 1879, Chief Secretary's Office.

"SIR,-I am in receipt of your letter, dated yesterday, with copies of the protests of the candidates for West Bourke. For your guidance I append my opinion on the questions that have arisen in reference to the proceedings connected with the polling at Newham. In the first place, there can be no doubt that in sending only 75 ballot-papers to Newham, you have not complied with the provisions of the 95th section of the Electoral Act 1865. 'Before the day of polling the returning officer shall deliver to each deputy, and himself retain, such numbers respectively of the ballot-papers, so signed or initialled as shall be sufficient for the use of the electors, who shall be entitled to vote at each booth, at which such returning officer and deputy respectively are to take the poll.'

"The number of electors so entitled to vote at Newham for the Lancefield division was 529, and the Returning Officer should have sent that number of ballot-papers respectively to each pollingplace in that division, as the electors might all elect to vote at one only of these polling-places.

"I am aware a practice has been followed to be guided by previous voting as to the number

of papers sent, but such practice is not in accordance with the clear direction of the Act.

"In the second place, the Deputy Returning-officer at Newham, in practically closing the poll, in or about three o'clock on Tuesday, the 18th, by a so-called adjournment of that day's poll to the 22nd, acted clearly beyond his powers, and committed two illegal acts.

"The first in contravention of the 8th section of the Electoral Act Amendment Act 1876, which enacts that 'Every polling shall commence on the day appointed for the same at eight of the clock in the forenoon, and shall, unless lawfully adjourned, finally close at five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, repeating the words of the 100th section of the principal Act, and simply

altering the hours.

"This 'lawful adjournment' refers plainly to the 126th and 127th sections of the Electoral Act 1865, and it can only so refer, as it is clearly laid down that at Common Law a returning officer has no power of adjournment except in cases of riot, and that a poll once closed cannot be re-opened. In these two sections his powers are limited as to adjournments to these following cases:—Firstly. When the proceedings are interrupted or obstructed at any place by any riot or open violence, the poll may be adjourned to the following day, and de die in diem until such interruption or obstruction shall cease. Secondly. When no polling shall have been opened. As neither of these exceptions exist here, the closing of the poll by a so-called adjournment and the act of adjournment itself were both illegal acts, in contravention of the statute. Further, the adjournment to Saturday, the 22nd, was in itself in contravention of the seventh section of the Electoral Act Amendment Act, which provides that the day of polling shall be not less than four nor more than seven clear days after the day of nomination, which in this case was the 13th or 14th. This section makes no exception of adjournments, and appears to be in restriction of the principal Act. Your letter of the 20th refers me to section 131 of the Electoral Act 1865; but in my opinion the adjournment at Newham is so clearly an illegal act that it would be beyond the power of the Governor in Council to validate it; such validation would be practically repealing by Order in Council the Electoral Acts. As to your omission to send ballot-papers, and as to the completion of the poll partially taken at Newham, by counting it so far as it was taken, the Governor in Council has power (if it is thought fit to exercise it) to validate those proceedings. As to Mr. Harper's protest calling upon you to endorse the writ with the statement that the polling has not been completed, your duty in this case is, in my opinion, not to make any such endorsement. The 129th section of the Electoral Act 1865 refers by marginal note to limits of adjournment. A Contract for the conveyance of Mails fortnightly between Melbourne and Point de Galle, in connection with the Imperial Indian Service, has been entered into with the Peninsular and

Oriental Company, particulars of which will be duly laid before you.

On the outbreak of the Zulu War it was in the power of my Advisers to accede promptly to a request on the part of the Imperial Government, for their consent to the transfer of the cable intended to duplicate telegraphic connection with Europe, in order to place South Africa in communication with England at the earliest possible moment.

#### MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

We, the Legislative Assembly of Victoria in Parliament assembled beg to express our loyalty to our Most Gracious Sovereign.

We thank Your Excellency for having called us together for the purpose of obtaining our advice and assistance at a juncture of public affairs of serious importance to the future of this

We beg to express our regret that the marked depression of trade which extends throughout the whole world has also been felt here, although in a less degree than elsewhere. We thank your Excellency for informing us that indications of a beneficial change are fortunately now apparent, and we concur with Your Excellency in the opinion that the break up early this year of the longcontinued drought, the consequent promise of a prosperous season for agriculturists and graziers, and the improved prospects of many of the mining districts, will doubtless tend to create a more confident feeling in all the great interests of the colony. We thank Your Excellency for informing us that, in accordance with the provisions of the Act passed last Session, Your Excellency appointed a Commission to carry out the International Exhibition of 1880; and we thank Your Excellency for informing us that, not only from the Imperial Government, but also from foreign countries, the warmest expressions of sympathy and co-operation have been received, and that moved by Your Excellency's Advisers, Your Excellency had officially communicated with His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, in order to ascertain if he would consent to open the Exhibition in 1880. We express our regret that His Royal Highness will be unable to do so. We express our satisfaction that Your Excellency has reason to believe that he will visit this colony at some time during the period for which the Exhibition will be open, unless unforeseen grave reasons of State interfere to prevent him. We thank Your Excellency for informing us that to further the objects of our great undertaking, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to appoint a Commission, with the Prince of Wales as president.

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Advisers.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that important Commissions, appointed by Your Excellency's predecessor, have been prosecuting their labours throughout the recess, and we

trust shortly to receive their reports, which shall in due course be submitted to us.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that a Contract for the conveyance of Mails fortnightly between Melbourne and Point de Galle in connection with the Imperial Indian service, has been entered into with the Peninsular and Oriental Company, particulars of which will be duly laid before us.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that on the outbreak of the Zulu War it was in the power of Your Excellency's Advisers to accede promptly to a request on the part of the Imperial Government, for their consent to the transfer of the cable intended to duplicate telegraphic connection with Europe, in order to place South Africa in communication with England at the earliest possible moment.

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preparation, adequate provision has been made for the requirements of the Public Service.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that an amending Land Tax Bill will be submitted to us, the object of which will be to carry out the intention of Parliament in passing the

Principal Act.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that Your Advisers will at the earliest possible moment again submit for our consideration a measure dealing with the paramount question of Constitutional Reform, that its object will be to secure a final adjustment of the legislative functions of both Houses of Parliament, and thus terminate the frequent recurrence of dead-locks and protracted legislative delays which in the past have proved so disastrous to the prosperity of the colony.

We thank your Excellency for informing us that a Bill to amend in various important points the Electoral Act will be presented to us; that one amendment proposed will be the abolition of plural voting; and that provision will also be made for the subdivision of existing polling districts,

so that there may be but one polling place in each district.

We concur with your Excellency in the opinion expressed that the existing state of the Mining Laws is generally regarded as unsatisfactory; and we thank your Excellency for informing us that a Bill dealing with the subject will be submitted for our consideration.

We thank your Excellency for informing us that a Bill to amend the Local Government Act and to deal with the question of the endowment of local bodies has been prepared and will be laid before us.

We thank your Excellency for informing us that the Closed Roads Commission have earnestly pursued their labors during the recess, but that your Excellency has not yet received their report; and that your Excellency's advisers will, on receipt of the views of the Commission, deal promptly with this important question.

We thank your Excellency for informing us that in the opinion of your Excellency's advisers the circumstances of the colony warrant the establishment of a system of Government life assurances and annuities similar to that established in England in connection with the Post Office department; that the system has been found to be productive of beneficial results, both in a social and economic point of view; that it is found to be a special benefit to the working classes, who readily avail themselves of the facilities for making some provision against death or the infirmities of age when they have the security of a Government guarantee; and that a Bill will accordingly be laid before us giving effect to these views, which will, it is believed, prove most acceptable to a large portion of the community.

of the community.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that during the recess several lines of railway have been opened; that some more are rapidly approaching completion; and that our attention will be called again this Session to the authorizing of a portion of the great national scheme that

was prominently brought before us last Session.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that a measure will be also submitted to us for the amendment of the law relating to Public Health, in the preparation of which advantage has been taken of all the most recent sanitary legislation in other countries.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that as the present State Forests Act has not met with approval, a Forests Bill dealing with the regulation and preservation of the forests in the

colony has been prepared for submission to us.

We thank your Excellency for informing us that there will also be laid before us a Judicature Bill, an Amending Licensing Bill, and other measures of less moment than these, if the settlement of the question of Constitutional Reform does not absorb our attention to the exclusion of all other matters of legislation except those of the most urgent nature.

And, in conclusion, we beg to express our trust that our labors will, under the blessing of Divine Providence, conduce to the further happiness and prosperity of the people of Victoria.

In all cases in which the personal attendance of an executor administrator trustee receiver or committee of the estate under the "Lunacy Statute" is required in a court of justice or clsewhere the said company shall be entitled to make such attendance in the person of the managing director or of the manager of the said company; and the personal duties of executor administrator trustee receiver or committee may be discharged on behalf of the said company by the managing director or manager: And in every case where the said company shall obtain probate or letters of administration with the will annexed to be granted to the said company and also in every case where the said company shall be appointed and shall act as trustee receiver or committee, the managing director manager and directors shall be individually and collectively in their own proper persons responsible to the Court, and shall in their own proper persons be liable by process of attachment commitment for contempt or by other process to all courts having jurisdiction in that behalf for the proper discharge of their duties and for obedience to the rules orders and decrees of such courts in the same manner and to the same extent as if such managing director manager and directors had personally obtained probate or letters of administration with the will annexed and had acted as executor administrator with the will annexed trustee receiver or committee. But notwithstanding such personal responsibility of the said managing director manager and directors the capital both paid and unpaid and all the assets of the said company shall remain liable for any pecuniary loss which may be occasioned or which may happen through the imperfect or improper discharge or through the neglect of the said company or of any of its officers of any act or duty in respect of any office appointment or engagement held or entered upon by the said company.

On the motion of Sir Bryan O'Loghlen, Bart., the Assembly ordered that the following words be added to clause 18, viz.:—

Penalty. Sec. 41 "Companies Statute 1864." If default is made in compliance with the foregoing provisions of this section the company shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every day while such default continues, and every director and manager of the company who knowingly and wilfully authorizes or permits such default shall incur the like penalty.

Order for account on application of Treasurer. If the said Treasurer of Victoria shall be unable upon application to the managing director or to the manager of the said company to obtain a sufficient account of the property and assets of which any or every estate included in or which ought to be or to have been included in such statement of unclaimed moneys shall consist, and of the disposal and expenditure thereof or thereout, such Treasurer shall be entitled to apply to the Supreme Court or to any judge thereof upon motion after notice to the said company, but without suit or petition for an account, and if the said Supreme Court or judge shall be of opinion that no sufficient account has been rendered by the said company the said court or judge shall order such account to be rendered by the said company as to the said court or judge shall seem just, or if the said court or judge shall think that no sufficient case has been established to require the said company to furnish an account it shall be lawful for the said court or judge to dismiss the application, and the said court or judge shall have power in all cases to make such order as to costs either against the said court or judge shall seem right.

4. Mr. Speaker's Retirement.—Mr. Speaker addressed the House as followeth:—

As this is the last occasion on which the House will meet, it is proper and respectful to the House that I should state that I will not be able to undertake, in a new Parliament, the important duties with which the House has been pleased to entrust me in this one. The long sitting, the late hours, and the constant responsibility and anxiety which my office imposes, have so impaired my health that I do not feel competent any longer to discharge the duties adequately, and I mean to seek repose by a visit to Europe on private business. I have to thank the House for its constant and generous support, which has never failed, and without which it would have been impossible to execute my office satisfactorily for a single week. I will only say that, in return, I have taken assiduous pains to understand the duties of Speaker, and perform them without fear or favor, to the best of my humble ability. In whatever recreat I have failed and I am conscious I must often have failed it humble ability. In whatever respect I have failed, and I am conscious I must often have failed, it was not from neglect or carelessness, but from a too great anxiety that the character and authority of the House should not suffer in my hands. I desire also to thank the officers of the House for their co-operation; half the duties of the Speaker are performed out of the Chair, and it is a great gain to him and to the House that, at the head of the permanent staff, there is an officer whose character and capacity render the performance of these particular duties comparatively easy and safe.

5. Message from His Excellency the Governor.—A Message from His Excellency the Governor by the Usher of the Legislative Council :-

MR. SPEAKER,

The Governor desires the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Legislative Council.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House went to the Legislative Council when His Excellency the Governor was pleased to give the Royal Assent to the Public Bills following:-

"An Act to provide for the granting of certain Loans for Water Supply in the country "districts for the service of the year ending the thirtieth day of June One thousand eight "hundred and eighty."

"An Act to provide for the compulsory taking of land for the Dunmunkle and St. Arnaud " Shires Waterworks."

"An Act to sanction the Issue and Application of certain Sums of Money from 'The "Railway Loan Account 1878,' for the Survey of State Railways, and the purchase of "Permanent-way Materials and Manufacture of Points and Crossings."

"An Act to amend the Land Acts 1869 and 1878."

- "An Act to apply a Sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the Service of the Year ending on "the last day of June One thousand eight hundred and eighty, and to appropriate the "Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament."
- 6. His Excellency's Speech.—After which His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both FOURTH Houses of Parliament as followeth:
  - Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It is with pleasure that I release you from the duties of a Session, which, protracted beyond the ordinary period of parliamentary work, has still failed to settle the pressing question of Constitutional Reform.

Notwithstanding, however, this fact, there is reason to suppose that so great an advance has been made that, at the approaching general election, the country will be enabled to give a definite and, I trust, a decisive verdict on a question of such momentous importance to the peace, progress,

and prosperity of the country.

I am rejoiced to say that there are at last unmistakable signs that the almost universal depression in trade and business, which has necessarily greatly affected the Australian Colonies for so long a period, is now passing away, and that this country, in consequence of a very bountiful harvest, is in a fair way of returning to its normal state of prosperity. There are not wanting also most hopeful signs at Ballarat, Sandhurst, and other places of increased yields of gold, resulting from renewed exertions in developing the local gold mines. The success of this industry always most favorably affects the prosperity of the whole country.

I am happy to announce that the Eastern Telegraph Company has successfully carried out

its contract for the duplication of the cable, and thus a further security is provided against our being deprived of continuous telegraphic communication with other parts of the world—a provision that

may in time of war be of the greatest possible importance to Australian interests.

The conditions of the Fortnightly Mail Contract now being carried out are such as to secure to this portion of the world facilities of correspondence largely in advance of previous experience.

The invitation to all nations to friendly competition in Melbourne this year has been liberally responded to, and there is now every prospect of an International Exhibition which will fully justify the comparatively large outlay, and prove of vast importance to the industrial interests of the country. My advisers have considered it expedient, on the pressure of the English Commission, to authorize the Victorian Commission to increase largely the available space, which is eagerly sought

after by the various Commissions established in all the great countries of the world.

During the session Final Reports have been by my direction presented to Parliament from the Royal Commissions on Closed Roads and on the Occupation of Public Lands. The Commissioners in each case have, at a great sacrifice of time and trouble, collected a valuable amount of information in all parts of the country. No doubt can exist but that the mass of facts so obtained will tend to elucidate the proper treatment of each of these important questions in the ensuing

Parliament, and act as a guidance in the formation of new laws relating to each subject.

Nearly all the extensions of the Railways hitherto authorized by Parliament having been completed during the last Session, my Advisers have obtained power to survey permanently a number of Lines with a view of being ready to start with the necessary works as soon the ensuing Parliament may sanction them. Railway Lines have been selected with a view to meet the pressing wants of the selectors for transit facilities to carry to the seaboard their produce, and are laid out so to serve the great wheat-producing districts of the colony as to afford them facilities at not more than twenty miles from settlement in any such districts.

The question of Water Supply has also received your attention, and further loans have been sanctioned, not only to boroughs but to shires. The Lands Department also, with your approval, has been making practical experiments to obtain an underground supply of fresh water in settled

districts.

I trust that the extension of the liberal provisions of the Land Act of 1878 in respect of licensees desirous of prolonging their term to both lessees and licensees during the present year will enable the struggling members of those classes to tide over the effects of the bad harvests of preceding years and to start anew with fair prospects of carrying out their permanent settlement on the lands they have selected.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I thank you, on behalf of Her Majesty, for your liberality in voting the Supplies for the

current financial year.

Though you have been compelled by circumstances to impose new taxation, few persons will, it is hoped, be found to object to the mode of raising new revenue by the imposition of Stamp Duties. I am informed that these duties have been brought into operation at a minimum of expense, without the creation of any new department, and with little of the disturbance of trade that was

In increasing many of the Import Duties for the same object care was taken to select those items for increase which sooner or later would operate as a protective duty in favor of Victorian

manufactures.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council; and

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I now release you from your duty in Parliament. Steps have already been taken with a view to prepare for a dissolution of the Assembly, which will take place immediately, as the necessary arrangements are already completed. It is the wish of my Advisers that the new Parliament should be summoned to address itself to the business of the country as early as practicable, so that the final settlement of the all-important question of Reform of the Constitution left over from this Parliament may be no longer delayed to the detriment of the interests of all classes of the community.

I now, in Her Majesty's name, declare this Parliament to be prorogued to Tuesday the tenth

day of February instant, and it is prorogued accordingly.

All acts proceedings matters and things which at the time of the passing of this Act have under the enactments hereby repealed or any of them been begun and are pending shall respectively be continued carried on and completed: Provided always that if there be any vacancy existing in the Legislative Council at the time of the passing of this Act such vacancy shall be filled up in the manner hereinafter provided.—(Mr. Berry).

On information "given" to the Minister that there is reasonable cause to suspect that any person appointed to sell and distribute stamps or being or having been licensed to deal in stamps has in his possession any forged stamps, the Minister may by warrant under his hand authorize any person to enter between the hours of nine in the morning and seven in the evening into any dwelling-house room shop warehouse outhouse or other building of or belonging to any such suspected person, and if on demand of admittance and notice of such warrant the door of any such dwelling-house room shop warehouse outhouse or other building or any inner door thereof is not opened, then such authorized person may break open the same respectively and search for and seize any stamps that may be found in any such place as aforesaid or elsewhere in the custody or possession of such suspected person:

(2.) All constables and other peace officers are hereby required upon the request of any person acting under such warrant to aid and assist in the execution thereof:

(3.) Any person who-

(a) refuses to permit any such search or seizure to be made as aforesaid;
(b) assaults opposes molests or obstructs any person employed or acting in the execution or under the authority of any such warrant or aiding or assisting in the execution thereof;

and every constable or peace officer who upon any such request as aforesaid refuses or neglects to aid and assist in the execution of any such warrant as aforesaid shall forfeit the sum of Fifty pounds. -(Sir Bryan O'Loghlen, Bart.)

### Clause 36-

(1.) Except where express provision to the contrary is made by this or any other Act, any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument may be stamped after the execution thereof, on payment of the unpaid duty and a "penalty of" "Ten" pounds; and also by way of further penalty, where the unpaid duty exceeds Ten pounds, of interest on such duty at the rate of Eight pounds per centum per annum from the day upon which the instrument was first executed up to the time when such interest is equal in amount to the unpaid duty.

And the payment of any penalty or penalties is to be denoted on the instrument by a particular stamp.

#### (2.) Provided as follows:—

- (a) Any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument which has been first executed at any place out of Victoria, may be stamped at any time within two months after it has been first received in Victoria on payment of the unpaid duty only:
- (b) The "Minister" may, if he think fit, at any time within twelve months after the first execution of any instrument, remit the penalty or penalties, or any part thereof.

### No. 2.—Lands Acts amendment Bill.

Clause 4.

When buildings or other improvements have been erected or made upon any Crown lands held under any license granted under section 49 of The Land Act 1869, or under any lease issued under the forty-seventh section of The Land Act 1862, and of which land the licensee or lessee shall have been in possession for a period of at least two years and a half, if it be proved to the satisfaction of the Board that such buildings or other improvements have been erected or made and that the licensee or lessee has been in possession of such lands as aforesaid and that the conditions of such license or lesse have been complied with, and if there be no objection to the alienation of such lands on the ground of being auriferous or other reasons of a public nature to be stated by the Board within three months after being requested to do so by the licensee or lessee, or within three months after an application shall be made to purchase as hereinafter mentioned, the licensee or lessee shall have the exclusive right of purchasing the allotment on which such buildings or other improvements have been erected or made at "a price to be determined by the Board not exceeding the upset price of the nearest land sold by the Crown before the issue of such licensee"; and it shall be lawful for the Board previously to the purchase of any land under this section to grant to the licensee a certificate specifying the amount of rent paid by him during the period he may have

been in possession of such lands, and so much of the amount specified in such certificate for every acre or fractional part of an acre in such allotment shall be credited to the licensee in the purchasemoney of such allotment: Provided always that it shall be lawful for the Governor to grant a lease to such licensee of such allotment as the Board shall allow to purchase the land comprised in such license whereby the purchase-money may be paid and received by equal half-yearly instalments.—(Mr. Longmore).

Amendment proposed—that the words "a price to be determined by the Board not exceeding the upset price of the nearest land sold by the Crown before the issue of such license," in line 12, be omitted with a view to insert instead thereof the words "one pound per acre."—(Mr. Gaunson.)

Question—That the words proposed to be omitted stand part of the clause—put.
