



CLARKE: To move, That a Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the circumstances connected with the alienation by the Crown of the land and claim held by, and registered in the name of, "The Rob Roy Gold Mining Company," at Gordon's; such Committee to consist of Mr. Stewart, Major W. C. Smith, Mr. Wm. Fraser, Mr. Jones, Mr. Garratt, Mr. Patterson, and the Mover, with power to call for persons and papers; three to form a quorum.

- 8. Mr. Purves: To move, That, in the opinion of this House, immediate practical steps should be taken to inform the minds of the industrial and agricultural population of England, and other labor exporting countries of Europe, as to the resources and advantages of this colony as a field for enterprise and settlement; and that, having in view the present scarcity of labor, immigration, in its true sense, should be fostered by the employment of a competent person or persons as lecturers, and by other kindred means.
- 9. Mr. STEWART: To move, That a Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the claim of Wardle and others in connexion with the Coliban water scheme; such Committee to consist of Mr. MacPherson, Mr. Bayles, Mr. Woods, Mr. McLellan, Mr. Johnstone, Mr. Sullivan, Mr. G. V. Smith, Mr. W. Clarke, and the Mover, with power to call for persons and papers; three to form a quorum.
- 10. Mr. Longmore: To move, That there be laid upon the Table of this House, copies of all papers connected with, and bearing upon, the refusal of the Lands Department to issue a license for the Cornelia Creek Run, held by Simon Fraser and Co.
- 11. Mr. Godfrey: To move, That this House will, on Tuesday next, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the Report of the Select Committee on the case of Mr. Reginald Green, with a view to its adoption as regards the re-instatement of Mr. Green as Superintendent of Police; and to consider the propriety of presenting an Address to His Excellency the Governor, requesting him to place, during the present Session, the sum of £1,050 upon an Additional Estimate for 1874-5, by way of some compensation to Mr. Green, for his deprivation of office and pay, since 1870, as recommended by the Report.
- 12. Mr. McLellan: To move—
 (1.) That the Land Act in force at the present time is of a very unsatisfactory character, and ought to be amended without delay.
 - (2.) That this House will not be discharging its duty to the public unless it takes an amending Land Bill into its consideration before the prorogation of Parliament takes place.
- 13. Mr. Duffy: To move, That this House will, on Tuesday next, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the propriety of presenting an Address to His Excellency the Governor requesting him to cause a sum of £3,250 to be placed upon an Additional Estimate for 1874-5 as a special grant towards the erection of the Bridge over the Goulburn at Molesworth.
- 14. Mr. GARRATT: To move, That this House will, to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the propriety of presenting an address to His Excellency the Governor, requesting him to cause the sum of £1,603 18s. 11d. to be placed upon an Additional Estimate for 1874-5, for the settlement in full of the claim of Mr. Robert Bennett.
- 15. Mr. Must: To move, That there be laid upon the Table of this House a Return showing the expenditure by the Government for harbor improvements at each of the ports of Belfast, Warrnambool, and Portland, during the last ten years, distinguishing between the outlay upon each port, and shewing which of the townships of those ports are private and which are public townships.
- 16. Mr. WITT: To move, That this House will, on Wednesday next, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the propriety of presenting an Address to His Excellency the Governor, requesting him to cause a sum of £10,000 to be placed upon an Additional Estimate for 1874-5, for the formation of bridle tracks, erection of finger or direction posts, and construction of dray roads over the alpine or mountainous regions of the colony, including the continuation of the track from Harrietville to Omeo, and making the same of sufficient width the whole distance to admit of a dray travelling that route; the same from Darlingford to Enoch's Point; the widening of the track from Jamieson to Wood's Point, via Gaffney's Creek; the formation of a bridle track from Harrietville to Mansfield, with direction posts every ten miles; the same from Omeo to Snowy Creek Junction; and the balance of the vote to be expended as this House or the Honorable the Commissioner of Railways and Roads might direct. -
