## THURSDAY, 3Rd DECEMBER, 1857.

1. House met pursuant to Proclamation under the Hand of His Excellency the Governor and Seal of the Colony, bearing date at Melbourne the thirtieth day of November, 1857, which was read by the Clerk as follows:-

Proclamation
By His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and ViceAdmiral of the same, \&c., \&c., \&c.
Whereas the present J'arliament stands prorogued to Thursday, the third day of December next: Now therefore I, the Governor aforesaid, do hereby proclain। and direct that the said Parliament shall assemble on that day, at the Parliament Houses, in the City of Melbourne, at two o'clock in the afternoon, for the despatch of business.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this thirtieth day of November, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and in the twenty-first year of Her Majesty's Reign.

2. Message from the Legislative Council by the Usher.-

Mr. Speaker,
His Excellency desires the immediate attendance of the Assembly in the Chamber of the Legislative Council.
Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House went to attend His Excelleacy, and being returned-

Chinese-Supplementary Regulation for the Chinese on the Gold Fields.
Ordered to be printed.
4. New Writ.-Mr. Speaker acquainted the House that he had, during the recess, issued a Writ for the election of a Member to serve for the Electoral District of Geelong in the place of Alexander Fyfe, Esq., resigned.
5. Oates of Office Bill.-Mr. Haines moved for leave to bring in a Bill to assimilate and simplify the Oaths of qualification for Office.
Question-put and resolved in the affirmative.
Mr. Haines brought up a Bill, intituled "A Bill to assimilate and simplify the Oaths " of qualification for Office," and moved that it be now read a first time.
Debate ensued.
Question-put and resolved in the affirmative.
Bill read a first time, ordered to be printed and read a second time Thursday, 17th December instant.
6. His Excellency's Speech-Mr. Speaker reported, That the House had this day attended His Excellency the Governor in the Chamber of the Legislative Council, when His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, which he read to the House as follows:-

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,
I regret that I am compelled to call you together for the despatch of public business almost immediately after the termination of an unusually laborious Session, and at a season during which many representatives of the Country Districts cannot relinquish without great inconvenience and loss the personal supervision which the successful prosecution of their business demands.

I should not feel justified in asking you to submit to this sacrifice of your time and interests, were I not sensible of the many cvils which may be caused by departing from the spirit of the Constitution, and imposing upon the Government the necessity of dealing with the public revenue before obtaining the sanction of the Legislature.

## Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

The Estimates for the ensuing year will be at once laid before you. I trust you will find that, while making sufficient provision for the Public Service, they have been framed with a due regard to economy. I need not point out how desirable it is, at this advanced period of the year, that your undivided attention should be given to their consideration without delay.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Jegislative Assembly,
Measures will be laid before you for the Amendment of the Coustitution Act Of these the most important will be a Bill for increasing the number of Members of the Legislative Assembly, and for effecting such alterations in the Electoral Districts as are rendered necessary by changes in the local distribution of the population, in order to secure to each class of the community its due representation in the Legislature.

A Bill will be submitted to you for reducing the duration of the Assembly from five to three years; and another for placing the independence of Parliament beyond the possibility of question, by rendering all salaried officers of the Government, with the exception of the Responsible Ministers, incapable of being elected Members of either House of Legislature.

A Bill for amending and incorporating in one Act the laws relating to proceedings at Elections, the return of Members to Parliament, and the prevention of bribery and intimidation, will also be laid before you.

As the measures of Reform which were passed in the last Session, and those which may be expected to become law during the present, can have but limited operation until followed by a dissolution and a general election, it is not the intention of my advisers to submit for your consideration any subjects with regard to which legislation is not immediately required, or which would be more properly dealt with by an Assembly representiag those electors upou whom the franchise has been recently conferred.

The only Bills therefore which will be brought under your consideration in addition to the measures to which I have alluded, will be one for simplifying the Oaths of Qualification for Office, and one for increasing the Assessment on Sheep and Cattle.

The subjects to which I have alluded are of high importance, and I have no doubt will engage your serious attention.

I pray God to prosper your counsels and gaide your decisions.

Ordered-That His Excellency's Speech to both Houses of Parliament be referred to the Committee, and that the Committee do at once retire to consider the Address.

We assure Your Excellency that our serious consideration shall be given to the measures of Reform which Your Excellency has directed to be laid before us.

We desire to express our satisfaction at learning that it is not the intention of your Advisers to submit for our consideration any subjects with regard to which legislation is not immediately required; and that the only Bills which will be brought under our notice will be one for simplifying the Oaths of Qualification for Office, and one for increasing the Assessment on Stock.

8. Audit Act Amendment Bint-On the motion of Mr. O'Sbanassy, the several amendments made in Committec of the whole Assembly on this Bill were read and agreed to by the Assembly.
Mr. Speaker having reported that the Chairman of Committees had certified that the fair print of this Bill was in accordance with the Bill as reported-13ill, on the motion of Mr. O'Shanassy, reud a third time and passed.
Mr. O'Shanassy moved, That the following be the title of the Bill:-

Arcier - Mr. Sitwell was procceding to move, That a Select Committee be appointed to inquire whether the statements made in this House by the Honorable the Solicitor General, regarding the Secretary to the Law Department, can be substantiated by evidence, with power to take evidence, when Mr. O'Shanassy rose to a point of order.
Mr. Speaker ruled that the question was out of order, jnasmuch as it referred to a previous debate, and appeared to impugn the veracity of a member of this House, and therefore could not be moved.

Debate ensued.

13. Geelong Gas Company's Bill.-On the motion of Mr. Brooke, the amendments made by the Legislative Council in this Bill were read and agreed to by the Assembly, and aro as follow:-
Clause XXVIII., line 50, after the word "them" insert " and not being within the corporate limits of the town of Geelong as altered during this present session."
Clause XXIX., line 3, after the word "Act" inscrt the words " and lying between such limits and the buildings and works of the company."
Clause XXXVIII., line 25, omit " thirty," insert " twenty-five."
Same clause, line 28, omit " thirty-three and a third," insert "twenty."
Clause XLII., line 55, after second word "company" insert " having first demanded the amount due."
Clause XLIII., insert at end of clause, line 9, " provided that all damages to property, of whatever description, occasioned by such removal aforesaid, shall be made good by and at the expense of the Company."
Ordered-That the Bill be returned to the Legislative Council, with a Message acquainting them that the Assembly have agreed to the said amendments.
14. Joint Standing Order.-On the motion of Mr. O'Shanassy, the Assembly adopted the following, as a Joint Standing Order of the Legislative Council and Assembly, viz: "Any Act which shall, as a Bill, have been passed by both Houses of Parliament, but reserved by the Governor for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, and shall afterwards receive the Royal Assent, shall be numbered with the number next in arithmetical progression to the number already given to the last Act assented to by the Governor," and ordered that a Message be transmitted to the Legislative Council, acquainting them thereof.

16. Geelong Water Supply Committee Special Report.-The debate on this subject having been resumed-
On the motion of Mr. Heales, a letter addressed "W. Sorell, Esq., Clerk to the Committee on Geelong Water Supply," and signed "C. Pasley," was read by the Clerk.
Question-That Mr. John Millar be summoned to appear now at the Bar of this House, to offer such explanation as he may desire to do, in reference to his conduct as a witness before the Select Committee appointed to inquire into the best mode of supplying the Town of Geelong with water-put and resolved in the affirmative.
Mr. Speaker having directed the Serjeant-at-Arms to ascertain whether Mr. Millar was within the precincts of this House, and the Serjeant-at-Arms having reported that Mr. Millar was so, he was forthwith called to the Bar, and examined by Mr. Speaker as follows:-

Mr. Speaker.-What is your name?-John Millar.
Mr. Speaker.-What is your profession ?-Civil engincer.
Mr. Speaker.-Where do you reside?-At Geclong.
Mr. Speaker.-You have been a witness before a Select Committee of this House appointed to inquire into the subject of the Supply of Water to Geelong?-Yes.
$M r$. Speaker. - You gave evidence before that Committee ?-I did.
Mr. Speaker.-Have you seen the Special Report of that Committee?-I have.
Mr. Speaker.-Have you observed that there have been certain charges there made against you, with respect to your conduct in your capacity as a witness? -I have.
M.. Speaker.-You are now called to the Bar for the purpose of affording the House an opportunity of hearing what explanations you have to offer in relation to those charges.

Mr. Millar.-I should wish, with the leave of the House, to avail myself of a few notes which I have made on this subject, lest my excited feelings should tempt me beyond the point of discretion.

Mr. Speaker.-You will be allowed to use your notes.
$M r$. Millar.-Mr. Speaker, in addressing this Honorable House on the very serious charges preferred against me, I am sure I shall receive the indulgence I crave, in consideration of the present painful condition of my feelings whilst under a charge involving my honor.

In the first place, I would beg the House fully to realise the position in which I stand. I am arraigned at their Bar upon charges the most criminal, and the most entirely
obnoxious to my nature, and which, as repugnant to the feelings of every man of bonor I must thoruaghly abhor and despise

Mr. Speaker.-I wish to cuation you in one respect, that in any observations which you are allowed to make bere you are in no way to impugn the Report or call in question the motives of the Committee before which you were a witness. You will bear that in mind.

Mr. Millar.-I will bear that in mind. That I may have been guilty of indiscretion I admit : that I may, in an over-zeal for the public service, have overstepped the bounds of official etiquette I do not deny; but I do most solemnly abjure the accusatious which, in the report, have been made against me-that 1 have been guilty of dishonesty, or disrespect, because it must have been the furthest thing from my intention to deceive, where deception must have been the most evident and transparent, or to have trifled with your Honorable Committee, or your Honorable House, when such triffing could only have frustrated, rather than have furthered, the object I bad in view-the furnishing of an important portion of this province with a full and unfailing quantity of water.

The charges which bave been preferred against me are four in number. I purpose
$y$ to them seriatim. to reply to them seriatim.

The first charge is that of a breach of privilege. in having published evidence unreported to your Honorable House.

The second is that of a breach of privilege, in having laid on the table of the Committee a report, purporting to be a report by me to the Commissioner of Public Works, which report it is said I had tampered with; and in having laid before the Ccmmittee a document purporting to have been furwarded from the office of Public Works, which the head of that department had not perused; and by having (by inference) surreptitiously laid before the Committee a report which was not genuine. In answer to Captain Pasley's letter, just read, I have this to say :-That the Committee ordered their clerk, Mr. Sorell, to write to the Commissioner of ، ublic Works, as the head of my department, for my report of April 25 th, 1858 , inasmuch as they could not receive a report direct from myself. Mr. Sorell, as far as I can remember, wrote that note in my presence-I recollect seeing it most distinctly, and Mr Balmain told me he had reccived the note when I called upon bim with the report in answer to a telegram from Mr. Balmain, dated the 4th of May, which I now hold in my hand, and which 1 would beg leave to read, it is as follows: "By Electric Telegragh, Dated Melbourne, May 4th, 1858.--Message for Mr. Millar, Water Com-mission.--The Committee require the infurmation-Addenda to Appendix' $U$, relative to mission.-Ten from the Barwon-T. C. Balmain."
water taken

That is the Report dated 25 th May. On calling upon Mr. Balmain, or rather upon the Commissioner of Yublic Works, he was absent ; Mr. Balmain in all cases, certainly in all cases of this kind at all events, has to arrange the business of the office, and I gave him my Report, and was myself by leave of that gentlemen the bearer of it, and I delivered it in due course together with the letter which he wrote, he having previously entered the Report in the records of the office, to Mr. Barker, the Clerk of the Assembly; What became of it after that, I know not, excepting that I have seen a copy of that Report printed and laid upon the table of the Committee. The third charge is this, that I had knowingly and flagitiously sought to corrupt the proof-reader in the service of the Assembly.

The fourth charge is, that I had from similar motives attempted to vitiate the evidence given by me before your Honorable Committee.

In reference to the first charge, I admit now, as I did before the Committee, that I did technically publish such evideace; but only technically, inasmuch as my remarks upon that evidence had proceeded no further than to the Board of Pubiic Works-a Government Department, I would remark-and was used for no other purpose than, by submitting those remarks to the Board of Public Works, to obtain my refutation of the evidence which was the subject matter of my observations recorded upon the minutes of the Committee, having been given to understand that only in such way could $I$ obtain the object I had in view. For this, an error of ignorance, and not a sin of design, I expressed my regret to the Committee, and for this aggression upon parliamentary propriety (as will be seen by the Committee's own Report) I was forgiven. I therefore pass on to the next head of offence.

With regard to charge No. 2, I beg to suggest that I am not responsible for the heads of departments not being able to read documents laid $b$ fore them with that despatch which may sometimes be needful for the prompt discharge of business before Committees of your Honorable House; but I aver, and the evidence proves it, that the report in question passed in due form through the office of Public Works, and was remitted to your Committee, accompanied by a letter from the responsible clerk in that department, in whose custody that document was, and which letter I myself saw signed, and which must, therefore, be is the archives of this House. The charge that I could have tampered with that report is thus at once, without my calling upon my own professional reputation and position to repel it, disposed of upon the commonest principles of evidence, which the House may in a moment satisfy itself upon.

With regard to charges 3 and 4, I hope to shom the House that the alterations I desircd to make in the report-because I did desire to do so-was simply the correction of a clerical error, substituting the number 40 for 20 in copying from my original manuscript; but, be it remembered, all the subsequent calculations, dependent thereon, were founded on the correct number, namely, 40. The document which I bold
in my hand, and which was printed by the Committee, will demonstrate this. The number 40 was with reference to 40 barrels of water being carted from the Barwon for the use of the Geelong railway. 20 had been by error, in the harry of the moment, entered in the column instead of 40 , notwitbstanding that the calculations were all founded on the 40 ; and it is quite evident, therefore, that had the figure 20 remained, there would have been a misunderstanding in the mind of any person reading it. I thereforo may be pardoued, if, when perusing the revise of that table, and for the first time discovering the error, I wished that the original manuseript document should not contain the accidental discrepancy.

I certainly might, and, but for the circumstances of the case, I would, have at once referred the matter to the consideration of the Committee, upon my discovering the mistake; but, as it was generally understood that Parliament would very shortly be prorogued, if not dissolved, I felt that time was so essential an ingrediont in this matter, that I was warranted in stepping aside from the old and beaten path of roatine; and this on my own Guthority, as a wituess whose actions were above suspicion, and whose character had, long ago, been too well established to be shaken by so trivial an incident as correcting a mere error of one of my clerks. The alteration, therefure, had no bearing on the reasoning dedueed from the correct numbers, given in evidence. I should mention that the numbers had reference to the loads of water daily supplied to the Geelong and Melbourne Railway Company, a mere bagatelle, and my information was derived from an official document, drawn up under the cognizance of their engineer, and signed by their secretary - which document I now lay before the House, it is as fullows:-"Geelong and Melbourne Railway, March 1st, 1855. My Dear Sir,-La reply to your inquiry, I beg to inform you that our daily consumption of water from the Barwon is from six to cight thousand gallons, by three engines. Yours truly, Martin Sholl.-J. Millar, Esq., C.E."

This document which I referred to in my evidence on this subject before the Committee, was the foundation of the column in the tabulated statement of water traffic, in which the error arose ; and any Honorable Member present, by simply dividing the 6,000 gallons by 150 gallons per barrel, will find that it brings out 40 barrels, the figure that should have been in the column there, such column having been entered as barrels. During the investigation on this Special Report I pledged myself, as will be seen by the evidence before the House, to lay before the Committee at their next meeting this document, from the Secretary of the Railway Company, it then being at tha Water Supply Office, Geelong. In accordance with that pledge, I tendered it at the noxt meeting; but from some cause, of which I am ignorant, it was returned to me without observation.

I am now satisfied, Mr. Speaker, that I should have gone to the Committee for authority to make this merely clerical alteration, and trust that this may be acknowledged to be, at the utmnst, but a venial fault. I may state, that those who know me best, are aware, that the enthusiasm and energy which have hitherto characterised my professional career and habits only could have led to this error in judgment.

I come now to the more serious part of the charge, namely : that of my tampering with a public servant. I approach this accusation with neither hesitancy nor doubt-not with hesitation, because I have an unanswerable reply; nor with doubt, because I can appreciate what the decision of the House will be when my plain unvarnished tale is told.

Allow me to state the case plainly pro and con; as I have nothing to fear, so I have nothing to conceal.

This charge in the report is thus broadly stated. I will read it. "In the course of your Committee's inquiry, it transpired further that the witness dosired also to make alterations in the proofs of some of the appendices, which, being objected to by the Reader, as the printed documents would then differ from the originals submitted to the Committee, the witness then sought to possess himself of the documents in question for the object, as stated by the Reader, of altering them so as to make them correspond with the alterations made by the witness in the proof." This alteration of appendices thus put, I would beg to impress upon the House, is the unimportant alteration of the figures 20 into the figures 40 , in order that the appendix might not be at odds with the body of the evidence, to which that appendix had reference, but not extending to my calcolations, and the particulars I have already disposed of. The report proceeds: "That to induce compliance with these requests," it is alleged, " $I$ held out the inducement of a better situation, in case the reader lost his appointment, by acceding to my desire."

In reply to this, I first avail myself of the weight due to my own reputation and professional character.

I deelare I made no offer, in the sense here implied, and I quote the evidence of the witness bimself, not in substantiation of my assertion, but in rejoinder to the vague suggestion of the report, " it is alleged." I did not make any such offer. If I know myself, I could not make such a corrupt bargain ; on the contrary, the utmost that I could have done was this: on finding that the reader (Mr. Hardess) hesitated in allowing me to make the mere typographical amendment, which was requisite to make the appendix square with the evidence, I might have said, as he in his evidence admits I did say, "I will do nothing that will be the means of getting you dismissed;", and it is not unlikely that I might have added, although I again say I do not remember it, intending simply to imply that I would hold bim blameless-so satisfied was I that there was no moral impropriety in what I asked-that even if it werc so, that he lost his situation, I would see that he was placod in a better one. I can hardly, therefore, suppose that even
ingenuity itself could torture this into a bribe; at all events, the witness did not so construe it, for the following is his evidence on this very point:-

I would read this evidence at No. 945, "Was any person present during the conversation when Mr. Millar made you a promise of a situation?-I believe the reading boy was, but I am not certain. 946. By Mr. Millar.-Do you mean to say in my presence that I made you a direct offer of a situation as a bribe? - What I stated and what the Shorthand Writer has on his notes I am quite content to abide by, aud if the Committee desire to put me on my oath I am ready to swear to it. 947. By the Chai:man.Mr. Millar bas asked you a question, and you ought to give a catt gorical answer. (To Mr. M $\mathbf{M}_{2} /$ lar $)$. Put your question again. 948. By Mr. Millar - $\mathbf{I}$ simply wish to know from Mr Hardess if I offered him a bribe to do what was wrong? -Mr. Millar never uffered me a bribe. 949. By the Chairman.-The bribe of a situation?-Nor did be offer me the bribe of a situation, but he told me if I lost my situation through him, he would place me in a better one, and, as near as I can recollect, those are the words that passed between us."

I would also refer the House to his answer to question No. 845. "By the Chairman. -You made a statement to the Committee yesterday with regard to some alterations in the appendices?-Yes. 846 Will you re-state what you said then ?-I beliere I stated to the Committee yesterday, that Mr. Millar bad upon one occasion asked me to make alter-ations"-the House will observe he there says "upon one occasion," in other parts of bis evidence he states that it was on several occasions-a complete contradictiou-"'and I told him I could not do anything of the kind, that they were not in accordance with the original, and if I did so I should be risking my situation. I :lso stated at the same time, and there are private reasons why I stated so to him, that I could not allow them. I said, if I do so, of eourse I risk my situation. He then stated that he would do nothing that would be the means of my getting dismissed, and if he did so he would see that I was placed in a better situation. I touk no notice of this, but on the 11th of May I stated to him that these corrections in the revise of Appondix $R$ were not in accordance with the original, and I could not allow them. I showed him the original, and there were one or two other things that I showed him. He was then very anxious indeed that I should give him the originals up, that he might make those alteratious in them. 847 . Huw do you know what his intention was?"-And his answer is this-"I do not assume anything from this; I merely state the facts of the case. The impression that they bore to my mind was, that he was desirous of altering the originals to meet these amended proofs. 84 8 That is only an impression?- It is only an impression; collateral circumstances have been connected with it, but it is merely an impression."

The conversation alluded to in the evidence, in $r$ fference to this document, at the utmost, reaches simply to this, that I would shield him from any personal blame if the Committee considered that he bad overstepped lis duty. I should be trifling with the House upon this charge to ald another word.

I now come to the last charge in the Committee's Report, which $I$ have no fear of disposing of as satisfactorily as I trust I have the furmer ones, that is, as to my having become irregularly possessed of a copy of a revise of a part of my evidence, and had, therefore, taken advantage of that fact to tamper with the pronf. The story is a very simple one. On the revise being put into my hands, I aiscovered the necessity fur further correction, which further correction had escaped my attention in correcting my first proof. With regard to the irregularity in possessing myself of the revise, I beg to state that througbout I was actuated by the most perfect good faith. I had, and could have, no private object to serve. I was an officer of the Government, I had, therefore, no patron to accommodate. I was Engineer-in-Chief to the Geelong Water Commissiun, and, therefore, the hope of promotion could have held out no inducement to me to do wrong. It was simply the supply of water to Geelong, the most abundantly and the most cheaply, that the Committce had to consider, and to aid this object there could have been no use in my resortiug to irrcqularity, to subornation, to bribe, or any such thing. There was no one whom I could seek to supplant; there was, then, no encouragement in any way to do what was discreditable, whilst ihere was every reason why I should act with honor and good faith. The evidence is again, as it is throughout, my defence. I went openly to the Clerk of the Committee; $I$ asked him to let me bave a revise, and he, actuated, I am sure, by the same esprit de corps as myself, gave me a letter, of which the following is a copy; I extract it from Questions Nos. 787 and $783:-$

The following is the evidence upon this point:-"Mr. William Sorell examined. 784. By the Chairman.-W'as any application made to you by Mr. Millar for copies of his evidence? - It appears from the uote bonk kept in the department that I sent up evidence to Mr. Millar in this case on the 12th of February, the 17 th February, and the 7th of May. 785. Was that in the regular course of business in the office ?--Yes. 786 Was any special anplication made to you by Mr. Millar for additional copies of his evidence or revises?-On one occasion, certainly, if not more. 787. Did you give him any authority to obtain copies of his evidence?-Yes. 788. On what date? -This is the document itself.-['/he same was read, and is as follows]:-'Will Mr. Ferres be good enough to let Mr. Millar have a revise of the evidence which I sent last night on the 'Geelong Water Supply.' W. Sorest, Clerk to Committee. Assembly Chambers, 6th May, 1858.' 789. Is it not altugether an unusual course to give authorities to witnesses to obtain more than one copy of their evidence? It has been done in more than one case; it is not
the usual conurse pursued." On reading the revise at Geelong I found that, most likely by my own want of clearness in giving evidence to the extent of sixty printed lines in one answer, I had slightly transposed my proposita, as will be seeu by reference to the table and corn parative summaries in page 29 of the printed Appendices, where it will be observed there are two propositions printed "fourth proposition," iustead of fourth and fifth. Thrse I wished to make right, as they stand at present, owing to this typographical error, evidently inconsistent and ridiculous; besides which, there nanifestly could not be two "fluarth propositions" in a series of seven.

Upun this puint I beg again to quote from the evidence of Mr. Hardess at No. 801 :-" Were there no enclosures with that document?-Only this, with this note. 802. Will you read the note? - [The same was read, and is as follows ]:-"Water and Sewerage Commission, Enginter-in-Chief's Department, 10th May, 1858. Mr. Hardess, I return herewith the proofs of evidence and appendices corrected up to May 8th, say evidence from page 25 to 34 . Pray observe 31 particularly, a gond deal of it was transposed. Appendices 25 to 38 inclusive. I shall be in town in the afternoon. Yours truly, Millar."

The House will be kind enough to observe most particularly this question, or this number rather-when I say, " Pray observe 31 particularly," I speak of the answer of sixty printed lines, to which I have already directed attention. Such was my letter of May 10, two days before the alleged diseovery of my so-called mal-practice. I corrected the evidence and appendices at Geelong, and sent them with the letter just quoted to the reader ; and on coming up to Melbourne, finding that it was again-t the rules of the House to obtain another conpy for my especial use, whercon to note the ameuded corrections, I took the original proof-it having then, to my thinking, become a useless document, as far as the Committee was concerned--and noted in the committec-room the revised corrections on it, under the impression that it was my own property, and would therefore serve me as a private memnrandum, inasmuch as I could not get another, although $I$ had no objection to shew it to Mr. Hardess when he asked for it.

I called at the reader's room with a view of ascertaining if the transposition and clearer explanation which I had made on the revise were within the rules of the House. Not finding him there I carelessly threw down the document on his table, stating to his assistant that as soon as the Committee rose, I would return relative to the revise loft. On returning to the committee-room, no qunrum being formed, I was there for some time engaged with an Hon Member, discussing with him the non-advisability of attempting a gravitation scheme from Buckley's Falls, which would cost the country about $£ 140,000$ for impure water. Mr. Dumas suddenly entered with both documents in his hand, and charged me with misdemeanor, which I doubt not the House will see, was at the utmost, but an inadvertence. I was afterwards extremely sorry to learn that, from the accident alluded to, an inference had been drawn to the effect that $I$ had endeavored to foist on the reader, under the authority of Mr. Webb's imprimatur, the corrections made on the revise, and which, without the shadow of fraudulent intention, I had transferred to the then
useless proof.

Here I would beg to draw the attention of the House to the evidence of Mr. Pumas, the Clerk-Assistant of your Honorable House, in which he says most distinctly that I showed no desire of concealment, as, indeed. I had no cause to do so, because I felt that I had not, of malice aforethought, done auything that could possibly render me culprable in the eyes of your Committee, nr make me desirous of the least shadow of enncealment. Mr. Dumas further says in confirmation of what I bave just alleged, when I had wo time for premeditation, even if I had desired it --." I then taxed Mr Millar with the impropriety of it, and then he afterwards explained that he had, in the first instavee, written the additions on the revise as be considered them merely, transpositions, and then he copied them on the proof, having placed them on the revise"

At ‘'uestion No 819 , Mr. Dumas is asked, "Did Mr. Millar allege any reason for copying from the revise on to the first proof?-None whatever; he did not state any reason whatever. In the first instance my impression of the transaction was, that he had obtained a certificate from Mr. Webb, and before taking the proof to the printing office to have it revised bad put these additions on it; but he explained to me that it was after it had been printed and the revise was in his hands that he had made the alterations in the revise and bad copied them on the pronf. 820 . Mr. Millar told you so?-Yes. 821. There was no concealment on his part then?-No. When I taxed him with having put these additions on the proof, he said, No. I put it on the revise, and copied it from the revise to the proof,'-in fact stating everything in the most honorable manner.

Mr. Speaker, I acknowledge that I may have transgressed the rules of this House in my anxiety to further the interests of this great colony, and particularly of the community in whom I am more immediately interested. If so, I freely submit myself to the judgment of your Honorable llouse, and I trust I shall receive its indulgence.

13. His Excellency's Spieech -After which His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, as followeth :-

## Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, <br> Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembiy,

I rejoice that $I$ am at length enabled to release you from your attendance in Parliament. Owing to the short duration of the recess, after a very protracted Session, you have been called upon to attend to your Parliamentary duties, with very little intermission, for upwards of nineteen months. Upon the inauguration of a new Constitution, and with the ministerial changes that have taken place, this was, perbaps, unavoidable. Moreover, the great and continued increase of the population of this country, and the rapid development of its resources, under circumstances almost unprecedented, necessurily gave birth to a large amount of legislation, of a new and experimental character. This could not be effected without a more than ordinary demand upon your time and labor. The cbeerfulness with which you have applicd yourselves to the legislative business of the country during the lengthened period to which I have alluded, claims from me an expression of the very high sense I entertain of the zealous assiduity with which you have devoted yourselves to the Public Service.

It will be within your recollection that the principal object which I had in view in calling you together in December last, was that of laying before you certain measures for the amendment of the Constitution. I then announced that it was not the intention of my advisers to submit for your consideration any subjects in respect of which legislation was not immediately required. My present advisers upon taking office concurred in that view, the more especially as the recent extension of the franchise rendered it both just and necessary that measures of importance affecting the interests and welfare of the whole community should be considered by a Parliament elected upon the broader basis of the extended franchise. This view has been as far as practicable observed. The Bill for altering the Electoral Districts of the country and for increasing the number of Members of the Assembly, passed by the House into which it was introduced, and the constitution of which it exclusively affected, has not secured the concurrence of the Legislative Council. I have no desire to interfere with the deliberations of either House of Parliament on the subject. It must, however, be obvious to you that in the present state of the constitution ropresentation is very unequally distributed, whilst the present Legislative Assembly is
too limited in point of numbers for the proper conduct of the legislative business of the country; it will therefore be the duty of my responsible advisers immediately upon the re-assembling of Parliament, again to introduce the Bill in question for your consideration.

The Bill for shortening the duration of Parliament was passed by the Assembly without the concurrence of a majcrity of the whole House. I bave been advised that such a majority was necessary under the Constitution Act, and that it was also requisite that it should be reserved for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure.

To have transmitted to the Secretary of State a Bill which had been irregularly passed, would have been to incur the risk of having it returned to me for re-introduction. As a means of avoiding this delay, I have disallowed it, with a view to its early introduction in the ensuing Session. As it could not take effect, even with the preseut Parliament, until the end of next year, this delay will be of no consequence, and it can be re-enacted, reserved, and received back from England, long before the earliest possible period for its operation can arise.

The other Bills which have been passed during the present Session, and to which I have given Her Majesty's assent, though not involving questions of constitutional importance, are nevertheless of a valuable character.

The Bill for the Simplification of the Oatbs of Office, places persons of all religious denominations on a footing of equality, and its enactment will, I have no doubt, promote, as intended, the harmony and welfare of Her Majesty's subjects in this Colony.

The Bill to facilitate the formation of Mining Associations has been framed with especial reference to the requirements of the mining community, and will, I trust, be found to promote that co-operation of capital and labor without which no productive industry can flourish.

The Bill to enable me to appoint a Vice-President of the Board of Land and Works has been rendered necessary by the great increase which has taken place in the business of the departments under the control of that Board, consequent upon the commencement of the great trunk lines of railway. I trust it will be found to relieve the responsible head of that department from a portion of his arduous labors.

The other Bills to which I have assented, in Her Majesty's name, though of a highly useful character, need no particular observation from me. They bear witness, however, to the care with which you have considered the public welfare.

Since the passing of 'the Acts of the last Session for the construction and maintenance of Railways, active measures have been adopted for carrying their provisions into immediate operation.

A contract has been taken for the construction of the main trunk line from Melbourne to Sandhurst, and the works will be commenced and prosecuted without delay.

The tenders for the line from Geelong to Ballaarat were, in the first instance, such as it was not deemed advisable to accept, and the line and sections were re-advertised. New tenders have been opened, and there seems no reason to doubt that the Government will be enabled to carry on this important line concurrently with that from Melbourne to Sandhurst.

Negotiations have been for some time pending for the disposal of the debentures, which you have authorised to be issued. $\Delta$ communication was addressed in December last to the eminent house of Baring Brothers, inviting them to state the terms on which they might be disposed to negotiate the whole of the loan. A communication was received from them in reply, which reached me in April last, to the effect that they would send a confidential agent to this country with full powers to treat with this Government on the subject. In consequence of this communication my advisers suspended all action in the matter until the arrival of the agent, which took place in May, when he immediately placed himself in communication with the Government. The terms he was enabled to offer were, however, deemed by my advisers to be not of a sufficiently advantageous character to justify them in recommending their acceptance.

In the mean time certain proposals were made by our principal Banking institutions, and after some negotiations an arrangement has been finally concluded, upon a basis which will, I hope, prove very satisfactory. I have directed that the whole of the correspondence on the subject should be laid before both Houses of Parliament. You will find that precautions bave been taken to secure ample means for the purpose of carrying on the great works you have authorised, without interruption or delay, and to effect this with as little disturbance as possible to the ordinary relations of commerce.

The importance of these measures cannot be over estimated; they will receive the unremitting attention of myself and my advisers during the recess, and the fullest information as to their progress will be from time to time communicated to Parliament.

The line of Electric Telegraph has been completed from Melbourne to Adelaide, and would have been opened to the public but for an accident to a portion of the line on the Adelaide side, the exact particulars of which have not yet reached this Government. The line to Sydney is nearly completed, and both will be opened to the public in a few weeks. Negotiations have also been brought to a successful issue for the telegraphic connection of Victoria with Tasmania, but from the difficulties in the way of determining the most safe line of deposit for the submarine cable some time must necessarily elapse before the work itself can be brought to a successful termination. No labor will be spared by my advisers in carrying forward these great public improvements, so essential to our material and social progress.

During the recess I shall otherwise avail myself of the powers which I possess to effect all such improvements as I am competent to carry out without further legislative aid from you. It will be my earnest endeavor to urge upon the Imperial Government the necessity of enforcing a more faithful performance of the contract for the mail service between England and Australia.

## Gentlemen of tee Leaislative Assembly,

I thank you for the readiness and liberality with which you have voted the supplies necessary for the public service. It will be my duty to administer the expenditure with due regard to economy and the efficiency of the public departments.

I am happy to be able to inform you that the revenue and the public credit are in a most satisfactory condition. The large proportion of the consolidated revenue which you have felt yourselves justified in devoting to public works of a beneficial nature, bears witness to the extent of the available surplus over and above the ordinary expenditure of the Government.

It is gratifying to find that the temporary check to our commercial prosperity, caused by the embarrassment which recently prevailed in England, has passed rapidly away, and there seems every reason to hope that our present satisfactory financial condition will be long maintained.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council and Gentlembn of the Legislative Assembly,

I now dismiss you to your homes and your private affairs. In future it will be my earnest endeavor to fix the periods of the meeting of Parliament at such a period of the year as will conduce, as much as possible, to your convenience. At the same time it will be the duty of my advisers to present the measures of Government for your consideration, in such manner as to afford you the opportunity of reducing the Sessions within reasonable limits.

The evils of a protracted Session are not confined to the exacting of sacrifices from you which may operate very seriously upon your private affairs. An almost perpetual Session operates most injuriously on the administrative business of the country, scarcely second in importance to that of legislation. Time is necessary not merely for the preparation of those legislative measures which the growing wants of the community require, but for the successful execution of those great measures of material and social improvement which your legislation has initiated. In the arduous duty of carrying these improvements into execution, I need hardly assure you that my advisers will receive at my hands the most active and earnest co-operation and support.

I now, in Her Majesty's Name, declare this Parliament to be prorogued to the 8th day of July.
