The following workmen and boys are employed at a daily rate of pay as long as their services are required :—

1 coiner, at 12s. 10d. ; 1 weigher, at 11s. 6d. ; 1 assistant melter, at 11s. 3d. ; 1 gauger, at 10s. 6d. ; 1 fitter, at 10s. 6d. ; 1 fitter, at 10s. ; 1 smith, at 10s. ; 1 carpenter, at 9s. ; 9 workmen (2 at 9s., 1 at 8s. 6d., 1 at 8s., 1 at 7s., 1 at 6s. 6d., and 3 at 6s.) ; and 15 boys (2 at 5s., 2 at 4s. 6d., 2 at 4s., 1 at 3s. 6d., 5 at 3s., 3 at 2s. 6d.).

A guard of Police, consisting of 1 sergeant and 2 constables, protect the Mint day and night, and are paid out of the Mint Annuity at the rates fixed by the Chief Commissioner of Police. The sergeant has quarters at the Mint and an allowance of 1s. per diem for special duties.
