POST OFFICE ACT 1890.

FEE TO BE CHARGED FOR ADDITIONAL NAMES INSERTED
IN TELEPHONE DIRECTORY.

PRESENTED TO BOTH HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT IN PURSUANCE OF SECTION 98 OF
THE POST OFFICE ACT 1890.

THE Governor in Council, pursuant to the provisions of the *Post Office Act* 1890, has been pleased to allow subscribers to the Victorian Telephone Exchanges to have one name each inserted in the Telephone Directory free of charge, and has fixed the annual fee of Five shillings (5s.) for each additional name required to be inserted, the limit of names for any one subscriber to be six. Provided, however, that before any additional name can be inserted in the Directory evidence must be produced to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that the subscriber is acting as agent for the person or firm whose name he desires to be inserted, and that in no case will any one but the subscriber be allowed to use the telephone on behalf of such person or firm.
