*Victorian Inland.*—183,524 parcels were posted during the year, yielding a revenue of £8,894 12s. 4d. Of these 172 could not be delivered owing to various causes, but in 116 cases they were returned to the senders, 56 still remaining on hand. Three parcels were posted without any address, but delivery was effected in one instance.

## OFFICERS OF THE DEPARTMENT.

The Honorable Agar Wynne on the retirement of Sir James Patterson's Ministry ceased to occupy the office of Postmaster-General, and his place was taken by the Honorable John Gavan Duffy on the 27th September, 1894.

Retrenchment has been steadily continued throughout the Department, and among the most prominent of the officers who retired during the year 1894 are—Messrs. H. M. Boom, Chief Clerk ; C. M. Maplestone, Inspector ; H. B. Bristow, Postmaster, Ballarat ; D. W. Forbes, Postmaster, Bendigo ; T. Green, Postmaster, Warrnambool ; J. Fraser, Postmaster, Maryborough ; J. A. B. Smith, Postmaster, Carlton ; P. R. Arkins, Postmaster, South Melbourne ; J. J. Barry, Postmaster, North

Melbourne ; W. T. Swann, Postmaster, Ballarat East ; A. L. Nott, Cashier ; T. Gay, and W. P. Hamilton, Telegraph Branch ; and J. Dethridge, W. H. Saxe, and J. H. Fielden, Mail Branch.

The total number of the staff of the Department on the 31st December, 1893, was 2,837, and the number on the 31st December, 1894, was 2,642, a decrease of 195.

No new appointments were made.

During the year ended 31st December, 1894, 207 officers retired or were dismissed or transferred to other Departments, their annual salaries amounting to £26,501 8s. 10d.

From the above date to 10th May, 1895, 125 officers, whose annual salaries amounted to £16,505 2s. 6d., have retired from the Postal and Telegraph Department, or have been dismissed or transferred to other Departments ; 42 of these officers having been permanently transferred to the Income Tax Office.

In addition 15 officers have been transferred temporarily to the last-named office, their salaries amounting to £2,470.

#### DEAD LETTER BRANCH.

The number of letters, &c., received and dealt with in the Dead Letter Office during 1894 was 509,905, showing a decrease on the number for the year 1893 of 1,809.

351,967 letters were returned under cover to the senders ; of these, 13,037 were registered, and 24,151 foreign letters.

1,918 letters were received without any address whatever.

Under the provision of section 30 of the Post Office Act, 664 letters relating to racing sweeps were intercepted and returned to the senders.

Irregularly posted letters numbered 12,395.

Packets and newspapers dealt with during the year numbered 134,223, of which number 98,479 were destroyed.

The letters opened at the Dead Letter Office contained cash, cheques, money orders, and stamps amounting to £5,910 9s. 8d.

#### MISSING LETTER BRANCH.

4,365 inquiries were lodged during the year relative to the non-delivery, &c., of letters. 1,698 letters were traced, containing value, £3,798 11s. 9d.

Six officers of the Department were arrested and tried for stealing letters ; one was acquitted and the remainder were found guilty and sentenced to various terms of imprisonment.

#### ANNUAL POSTAL CONFERENCE, 1895.

Owing to the Federal Council of Australasia holding its sitting at Hobart at the end of January, 1895, the meeting of the annual Conference of the Ministerial and Departmental heads of Postal and Telegraph Departments of the Australasian Colonies, which was to have taken place this year in Melbourne, was held at Hobart instead, 1st to 8th February.

The principal matters dealt with were:—

- The Canadian Pacific Mail Service,
- The Ocean Mail Service,
- The Pacific Cable,
- The Cable Guarantees,
- Electric Light and Power Services.

A full report of the proceedings has been published and will be presented to Parliament.

## BUILDINGS, ETC., 1894.

The new Post and Telegraph Office premises at Kyabram were completed early in the year. Contracts were let for additions, alterations, and repairs to premises at Casterton, Maryborough, and Sorrento; and minor works were carried out at other offices. Several leases for office accommodation were renewed at reduced rentals. Sixty premises were rented at a cost of £3,857 for the year.
